Panhandle Wheat Is Responding To Favorable Moisture Conditions

Effective rains throughout the Panhandle in the past two weeks plus ideal growing weather have W. M. Pendleton allowed the wheat crop to make a remarkable recovery. Many fields that would have been afields that would have been abandoned two weeks ago are now showing at least fair prospects.

If the rains had not been received shortly after the severe freezes of April 8 and 9, the Panhandle would have had poor prospects at this time. Spider mites and dry hot weather were rapidly hurting the wheat three weeks ago and then the hard freezes just about put the finishing touches to some of the wheat. The good rains eliminated the spider mites and gave the wheat the means to make recovery. In those fields showing heavy freeze damage two weeks ago, the dead stems have dried up and fallen over. Undamaged stems and new shoots have come on to such an extent that near normal wheat plants der, Precinct 2; F. D. Mason, Prenow exist on some of the fields cinct 3; Mrs. Tommie B. Good wheat is particularly noticeable in the northern part of Moore County, Sherman County, western Hansford Counerts County in the North Plains 6th day of May, 1952. and in Floyd County, and parts of Briscoe County in the South Plains. Other counties in the Panhandle all have some good wheat but much of the acreage is rather late and thin and seeded acreage is off considerable from recent years.

There is about a third of the seeded acreage of approximately 51/4 million acres that will be abandoned in Texas shortly due to late thin wheat in the Panhandle. If this one-third abandonment materializes, then there will be about 31/2 million acres for harvest and a 10 bushel per acre average would produce a 35,000,000 bushel wheat crop. Much of the remaining wheat that will not be abandoned is now showing prospects of higher than a 10 bushel wheat crop so the 35,000,000 bushel crop is a minimum estimate at



For the past few years, the Food and Drug Administration has been carrying on a sanitation program in the flour mills that does not allow weevil infested wheat to be used in the production of flour. The program that will start very shortly will affect all handlers of the wheat crop including the farmer. Actually, the Food and Drug Administration has no jurisdiction over wheat stored on the farm. However, the Administration does have jurisdiction over wheat at the country elevator level and from there on through to the finished flour and bakery products. Regulations that will apply to insure sanitary raw material for processing into human food will be strict and will affect the farmer directly.

These regulations are in the interests of all people and every effort should be made to encourage all handlers of wheat that wheat is a human food and must be handled as a food. In recent meetings with Food

and Drug Administration officials, grain dealers have been told that starting April 1, 1952, inspectors started inspection of country and terminal elevators to check sanitary conditions and to advise the operators of any conditons existing that are contributing to unsanitary wheat. This first inspection will help the operators to meet the requirements. It is our understanding that only in flagrant cases of sanitary conditions on the first inspection will any drastic action be taken by the Food and Drug officials. It For Justice of the Peace, Premust be understood that the Food and Drug Administration has almost unlimited authority and in cases of very bad sanitation conditions, the Administration can condemn wheat in an elevator and seize wheat in For County Commissioner; Pretransit. 





Fashionable Stitching



Organdy and warmer weather go hand in hand when they're teamed with some of the newest thing available in stitching. Here is a beige organdy dress, iced with rich brown flowers and worn over a beige faille taffeta petticoat. This can be achieved on your sewing machine with a particularly loose tension and no special attachment, a spark stitch giving the flowers their frothy lock. Your local sewing center can give hemstitching service if you have the hemline

Give New Freshness To Bedspreads

If bedspreads are of the washable ype, give them much the same laundering treatment as you would blankets. Tepid water, mild suds and three minutes washing are recommended.

For the heavier types of spreads, two lines are recommended for drying, and a fan may be used to speed the process. For cotton spreads, one may be folded in half with the fold at the bottom, and both ends overlapping on the line, pinned on each side and once in the middle.

Chenille and candlewick spreads should be shaken several times while drying, and then brushed lightly when dry.

In most cases, if chenille and candlewick spreads are shaken thoroughly when they are drying, the machine which has been filled then brushed, little else will be needed. Since they do not take to a dry should be fairly heavy, made with iron, it is best to use steam. Check Color-Fastness Before Washing Quilts

You may have a very lovely quilt, but if the colors run, it may lose much of its beauty when laundered Be certain to check this feature be fore attempting to wash it.

Quilts which are quite flat, and well quilted, that is, with small patterned stitching, will wash very well, and they aren't too heavy to handle.

Support the blanket with both Use very lukewarm water and hands when it's lifted from the mild suds for the laundering. If water. If you are using a wringer, there are heavily solied parts on the quilt, finger-rub these with suds since there should not be too much before the all-over washing. Handle very gently during both when wet. The woolen fibers, in

washing and wringing so that the quilting will not be disarranged. Rinse carefully, two or three times to get out soap.

When hanging, it is best to use three or four lines because of the weight.

Store Bedding Well To Prevent Moths

Once blankets, quilts and spreads are clean, moth damage is cut down a great deal. However, you should also spray the blankets, quilts and other bedding or sprinkle them with crystals that deter moth activity, especially if they have any

wool in them. Large sheets of brown wrapping paper are good for storing before boxing the bedding. If you prefer, you might use the zippered plastic bags which simplify the problem, and can be reused time and again.

Cut in strips, 5 inches long and ¼ inch wide. Bake in a hot (425°F.) 8 to 10 minutes or until light brown.





Whose Sunday?

Lesson for May 11, 1952

newspaper column is entitled A "My Day;" not such a conceited title as you might think as first glance. Whose day is this, anyway? Yours, of course. What? you ask in surprise. My day? I have to work from morning to night in the house or on the

farm or in the schoolroom or in the office or on the road somewhere. My day, indeed! I'd like to get ten minutes of it for myself if I could. Now wait a min-

ute. Suppose you do Dr. Foreman

utes' worth. What do you do with your own personal uninterrupted part of the day?

But that's not the whole story, not the whole question. The day is more yours than you think. For you can bring, and you do bring, to every day you live, a certain mood, an intention, a spirit. The same scene in sunlight and under heavy clouds is quite different. The same person in sickness and in health is not one but two people.

How Will You Feel on Monday? THERE is one day of the week which, as Christians believe, is God's special gift to man. It is for everybody's benefit.

Let us suppose there is a town where everybody works, one way or another, for one man, spending most of their time making one man rich. Six days a week, that is: then comes Sunday and nobody works. This is everybody's day, not the boss's day.

Such a town would be a little hard to find; but even there everybody does have one day.

Jesus said, The Sabbath is made for man. Not for preachers, not for a favored few, not even for Jews and Christians only: but for man. The Jewish Sabbath of which Jesus spoke has its successor in the Christian Sunday. It is quite true that Christians appreciate the day more than atheists; but God made Sunday for man just as he sends rain and sunshine on one and all.

Our forefathers sometimes got hold of Sunday by the wrong handle, just as the Pharisees did in their time, with the Sabbath. They talked a good deal about not "breaking" the Sabbath as if it were a very fragile something to be kept under glass and never touched.

No, Jesus meant that the day is to be used; and the purpose of it is to keep man from being broken.

But that is still not all of it. This blessed day is not simply a day which we rise back, so to sneak, to our normal level after the weariness of the week has dragged us down. It should be. and it can be when wisely used. a day on which we can grow, mentally, socially, spiritually.

Do you need a rule or guide on ow best to spend your Sundays? Then ask yourself this question: How do I feel Monday mornings? I should be a better person Monday morning than I was on Saturday night. The best way to spend Sunday is to spend it in such a way that I shall begin next week a little better than I began last.

The Lord's Day

WHOSE day is it? Jesus said something else about it: The Son of Man (by this he always meant himself) is Lord of the Sab bath. So the Christian church has called it the Lord's Day ever since.

Now this particular Sunday in May happens to be "Mother's Day" in the United States, and every one can understand that there are good ways and poor ways to celebrate Mother's Day. You write your mother or visit her, or if she is gone from this earth you think about her, you spend the day doing the kind of things that she would enjoy doing with you.

So on the Lord's Day you celebrate in Christ's honor.

The Day of God

WE must also remember that this W is God's Day, the "Sabbath of the Lord thy God." It is his because he gave it; his because it is dedi-



> Don Dale, OTK executive secretary of Guymon, Oklahoma, spoke briefly on the project which includes 10 counties. The actual cost of the project, he said, is one cent an acre. Higher assessments are made as payments are made on a voluntary basis and several land owners in the district do not pay. Donors to the weather improvement association pay the cost for nonparticipating neighbors.

Dale expressed the belief that cloud seeding was still a gamble, but also stated that from what had been learned in recent years, it was a good gamble.

Lee Cox, representing the Denver office of the Krick Weather Improvement Association described the Denver Laboratory in which 60 well trained technicians are kept busy plotting maps of the weather. In turn ground operations men are informed of the path of the clouds and set their silver iodide generators in operation to best serve the target area.

Cox described the clouds as being made up of minute droplets of moisture, many of which could be collected on a pin point. When temperatures reach 13 degrees the droplets form snow and collect on dust particles. Their weight causes them to fall from the clouds. When the ground temperature is above freezing the moisture forms rain. • When the ground temperature is below freezing

the moisture falls as snow. Silver iodide, with which clouds in the target area are seeded, collect moisture in the same manner as dust particles at temperatures ranging from 25 to 27 degrees. The cloud seeding treatment is based on the theory that this variation gives a wider range of temperature in the clouds from which to draw moisture and increases the amount of rainfall over contracted areas.
