It was merely trying to do its duty in correcting a griev-ous wrong that was committed by the Federal Government and the Supreme Court when these opportunity to inspect the facility. opportunity to inspect the facilities of their new animal hospital is located south of Dalhart on U.

However, there is protty good assurance of great pretty good assurance of great oil production on the continent-al shelf off the coast of Texas, which is owned by the Federal Government and which does not belong to Texas and never was means continuous culling. claimed by Texas. This continental shelf extends about 135 miles out into the ocean. The tidelands that are in dispute consist of a strip of land only 10½ miles off the coast of Texas. So, you see the State of Texas only owns 10½ miles, while the Federal Government owns approximately 125 miles, and if there is oil off the coast, the Federal Government would get about 12½ times the potential production accruing to Texas, assuming that our 10½-mile strip of tidelands is restored to us as it should be. On the other states, with the exception of a part of Florida, the tideland strip is only three miles. But the people who want the Federal Government to take over these lands are willing to mislead and misrepresent the actual truth and thereby lead the people to believe that if the tidelands are returned to the several states, the Federal Government will be knocked entirely out insofar as income from oil and gas produc-tion of the coast of the United States is concerned. Such tactics are nothing less than the use of bare-faced propaganda. It is our duty and we should never miss the opportunity to tell the truth about the tidelands to everyone we meet. If the people in this country knew the truth about the tidelands, we would have had them back long ago.





Cover and cook over low heat for one hour or until meat is tender. Skim off excess fat, if desired. Serve over squares of corn bread that

have been split and heated in oven Golden Corn Bread

1 cup enriched corn meal 1 cup sifted, enriched flour 4 teaspoons baking powder ½ teaspoon salt

1 egg 1 cup milk

1/4 cup shortening, soft



Nibblin' Chocolate Balls (Makes 24 2-inch balls)

5 cups puffed rice 1 cup salted peanuts ½ cup butter or substitute

2 ounces unsweetened chocolate ½ pound fresh marshmallows (about 32)

Measure puffed rice into a shallow pan. Heat in a moderate (350°F.) oven for 10 minutes. Pour puffed rice into a large greased bowl; add peanuts. Melt butter, chocolate and marshmallows in the top part of a double boiler, stirring constantly. Pour over puffed rice and peanuts, stirring until all pieces are coated. Let stand a few minutes until cool enough to handle. Shape into balls two inches in diameter. Let cool on a wire rack.

Ranchman Wheeler reports that over-stocking results in smaller calf crops, less beef from the same acreage, lower prices for the calves because of condition at marketing time, a ruined turf and poor condition breed-

program. A final tabulation of reports from county agricultural agents show that 968,825 acres of rangeland were involved in deferred or rotation grazing de monstrations; 445,467 acres were involved in brush and poisonous plant control demonstrations—a lot of which was chemically treated; range reseeding demonstrations on abandoned crop land, barren rangeland and following brush eradication or control totaled 191,917 acres.

4-H club boys in 111 counties received training in plant or grass identification; 39 range demonstration teams were trained and 177 boys completed range management demonstrations.

Walker says county agents us-ed many different teaching methods in conducting range improment programs in the count ies. Meetings held on the demonstration ranches were well attended as were the field days and tours. Personnel from other agencies and organizations cooperated to make the county and state programs more effect-

The Range and Forestry Department of Texas A. & M. College conducted for the fifth straight year a field course in range management. County agents and teachers of vocational agriculture were enrolled. Training received in these "schools on wheels" has been used by the agents in conducting the range improvement demonstrations in the counties.

covered containers and be sure the lids are in place. Clean up and 'destroy breeding places a-round the farmstead and don't expect insecticides to do the entire job. They'll help, says Miss King, but there is nothing that can be substituted for cleanliness. Mix liberal amounts of sanitation with smaller amounts of insecticides and use them to keep flies under control.

One treatment is not enough. If complete control is to be maintained, regular checks must be made to see that breeding places are not reestablished and insecticides used to get those that go visiting without invitation. Remember, says the agent about the only safe fly to have around the place is a dead one and the use of insecticides and strict santation practices in and around the home will keep fly numbers at a minimum.

STAIN REMOVAL

Miss Lucile King, County Home Demonstration Agent, gives the following information on removing chewing gum and chocolate stains from clothing. Chewing gum

On white cotton and linen and washable colored fabrics . . . Rub with ice and scrape off gum. If stain remains, sponge with dry cleaning

On non-washables . . scrape off the gum and sponge with dry cleaning fluid. If sugar stains remain sponge with

Chocolate On white cottons and linen . . Dip fabric up and down in hot water. Wash in hot suds. Bleach remaining stain with household bleach.

Washable colored fabrics . Wash in lukewarm water. Use dry cleaning fluid to remove any grease spots caused by cream.

On non-washables... Sponge with dry cleaining fluid or with diluted alcohol.

Maybe you have a den or a spare bedroom that has a bed or a couch. What's the best way to cover it? The most usable decor for the room is tailored. It may then be offered to a man or woman as a guest, and still be in good taste.

Good tailored covers are easy to sew at home because they are not, as bulky and as big as the flounced and ruffled covers which seem to fill the room with their yardage before they're put together. A spread which is tailored is one of the simplest of articles to sew because there is nothing at all complicated in the

Tailored slip covers for a couch are not really much more difficult than the plain spread because your main problem, that of fitting, is simplified by your having the couch right there for a model and for fitting purposes. Basting, for example, can be done right on the couch, and the sewing is all straight seams, and no fancy stitching.

For seams, allow two inches extra, and for hems allow one inch or a little over.

If desired, an old sheet may be used to make a cover to be used for fitting purposes, and then as a guide for sewing the finished cover. If you want pleats at the corners, or pleating all the way around, these can be best estimated if you make the muslin cover.

To make the boxy type cover which gives a very tailored look, lay one piece over the seat. Around the couch, attached to the top should go another piece of from four to six nches. To this piece is attached the skirt of the couch. Welting or cording can be used in the seams to give the cover a profssional look.

If the couch has cushions, these may be covered with boxy covers to match the couch. Or, you might prefer bolsters or just soft cushiony pillows. In some cases, it's nice to have a single bolster and several small throw pillows.

Couches which are in reality a box springs on legs with a mattress, are really made best when in two parts, as it simplifies making the "bed." Have the skirt attached to

a muslin which goes over the top of the box springs. Then have a cover which fits over the mattress, to meet the skirt. It looks like a single cover, but saves putting a skirt on when making the bed.

One of the most popular is the simply gathered flounce which is attached to a piece of muslin or old but durable sheeting to fit over the box spring of the bed or couch. The top may be covered with a simple spread, just thrown over, or perhaps a quilted spread which you may already have.

In measuring for a gathered flounce you will need two to two and one-half times as much as the measurement around the bed. As for the length, measure from the top of the box spring to the floor, and 1/2 inch seam allowance at the top where it's attached to the sheet. and then 11/2 to 2 inches for the finishing hem.

In cases where you have a headboard or something like bookcases to serve as a headboard, the flounce need then go only around the three sides of the bed.

Flounce material may be made of the same fabric as your draperies. Then the top spread can take its color cue from one of the colors predominant in the flounce. This idea, of course, can be carried out in the reverse, too: have the spread made of the same as the drapery material, and the flounce in a contrasting shade.

Slipcover Colors Refresh Rooms

Any room in which you're going to cover a bed or couch will receive a lift from just the colors and materials you're using. The choice of both color and material is almost

Plaid gingham is excellent to use in youngster's rooms as it gives a trim tailored look, and at the same time is gay and cheering. This type can be used for a flounce very nicely on a couch or bed, with the guilted or plain spread in one of the main colors in the plaid.

Textured waffle weave is another good choice if you're looking for a material which will give a trim and neat appearance. This is especially good in solid colors, and the latter is excellent choice if the room is small so that you cannot crowd it with a printed material.

For something tailored but just a little bit fancy, look for a material with a nubby weave that has metal fiber shot through it. This is an excellent choice for a living room that doubles as a bedroom at night.

FINGER HOLES IN CHOPPING BLOCK . . . Rather than having metal attachments or wooden handles broken off by the ax or rough usage, simply bore finger holes in each side of your chopping block for carrying the block from place to place.
