SOS For Shrubs

Sometimes shrubs, like people, need a tonic to pep them up and keep them going. If your green shrubs have yellow leaves with green veins, Miss Lucile King, home demonstration agent, recommends a dose of copperas and sulphur.

She suggests 1-4 cup of copperas to 1 cup of sulphur for average shrubs and small trees. Spread the mixture over an area of about 25 square feet, do not get it on the stems, put it out one foot or more from the plant and water at once for quick results. The leaves will turn green again. Decayed leaves and other compost mixed with soil will help prevent further yellowing.

Miss King says now is the time to get ready for hot, drying summer temperatures. Spread decayed vegetable mulch around shrubs to keep the roots moist. Mulch holds moisture in the soil and makes it available to the plants. Mulch several inches thick spread over several square feet will gradually work into the ground.

Decayed compost of grass cuttings furnish a small amount of nitrogen and other plant foods, but their main value is as a compost. They also make the soil acid which aids plants in utilizing iron as food.

1952 Polio Precautions

Branches of the federal government cooperating with the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis are assuring widespread distribution of 35,000,000 copies of the 1952 "Polio Pledge" for parents prepared by the March of Dimes organization.

Earl James McGrath, United States Commissioner of Education, as well as the United States Post Office Department, have endorsed this annual project to alert American children and parents to safeguards which may lessen the possibility of contracting paralytic polio.

Mr. McGrath, endorsing the Pledge's distribution through all the schools of the nation, said, "The 1952 message about polio precautions, entitled 'Polio Pledge,' has been made available to all the schools in the country. I recommend that administrators and teachers give all possible help to the National Foundation and its Chapters in this school and community health program."

The Pledge, in poster form, will be displayed through October 31 in the nation's 44,500 Post Offices.

This March of Dimes project to safeguard children from the menace of polio was inaugurated in 1945 with a printing of 520,000 copies entitled "When Polio Strikes."

Two years later, in 1947, more than 29,000,000 leaflets called "A Message to Parents," were distributed through the schools in both an English and Spanish edition.

In 1951, so popular was the project that the original printing was exhausted. Recorders from schools both in the United States and Puerto Rico boosted the total to 32,500,000. This growth has paralleled not only the population growth of public, private and parochial schools, but the increasing recognition of the publication's value by administrators and teachers.

Here, in abbreviated form, are the essential precautions listed in the 1952 "Polio Pledge":

- (1) Avoid fatigue from work or play.
- (2) Don't get chilled. Don't swim too long in cold water nor sit around in wet clothes.
- (3) Don't mix unnecessarily with new groups. Don't take children out of camp where there is good health supervision.
- (4) Watch closely for signs of illness, headache, fever, sore muscles, stiff neck or back, trouble in breathing or swallowing.
- (5) Put a sick person to bed at once, away from others, and call your doctor. Follow his advice.
- (6) Contact your local March of Dimes Chapter for whatever assistance or financial help you may need.

For example, window screens and lawn furniture can be painted more easily when set up at a convenient height. Use a sturdy bench or table near the back door or garage on which to place the articles to be repaired. This will take the stoop out of many spring jobs.

She says refinishing, upholstering, and putting furniture in condition can be pleasant tasks when done out in the sunshine at a level where they are easy to handle as well as to see. Also Miss King concludes, this will help eliminate fatigue which often leads to accidents.

Keep Spraying

The rains we have had may cause many troubles to the home gardener in all kinds of bugs and insects. Miss Lucile King, home demonstration agent, says you will find two kinds of insects on your vegetables, the sucking kind and the chewing kind.

The sucking insects live entirely by sucking juices from the plants. In this group are the plant lice (aphids), tomato suck fly, cabbage bug, squash bug and stink bug. All sucking insects feed principally on the lower surface of the leaves and stay on the underside of the foliage when not feeding. Shoot these pests by dusting the underside of the leaves thoroughly with 1% rotenone or 1% pyrethrum. Only those bugs hit with poison are killed. Repeat applications at 7 day intervals as long as damage occurs.

For the chewing insects dust with 5% DDT. Stop using DDT 7 to 10 days before harvesting.

Easy Does It

BABY'S WARDROBE is bound to keep mother hopping if she wants to have it sweet, clean and soft. Many articles have to be washed daily: shirts, nightgowns, bibs, crib sheets and, of course, diapers!

Each article should be laundered according to directions for material out of which it's made. Woolens must be done in lukewarm water while the cottons need hot water so they can be sterilized at the same time as they're cleaned.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Blondie Bars
(Makes 24 small bars)
1/2 cup shortening
1 1/2 cups brown sugar (packed)
2 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup chopped walnuts
1/2 cup semi-sweet chocolate bits

Melt shortening; blend in sugar, well-beaten eggs and vanilla. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt; blend into first mixture. Stir chocolate bits and walnuts into batter. Spread in greased 9-inch square pan. Bake in a moderate (350° F.) oven 30 minutes. Cut into bars while still warm.

To keep sweaters, mittens, sacques, booties, blankets and bonnets soft and sweet, wash often. In this way they won't get soiled heavily and will require not so much work to get clean.

Bonnets should be washed as directed for the material used. Pad a bowl with soft cloth and finger-press bonnet after washing and place over the bowl to dry. There will be little pressing, then!

Starch is never used on small baby's clothing. The little dresses, slips and bibs should be very soft so they don't scratch tender skin.

Cod liver oil stains are difficult to remove. Always give oil after clothing is removed.

Diapers, if they're to be done at home, should be rinsed in clear water immediately after removing. Those with soil can be rinsed in the toilet bowl. Then place them in a solution of borax, 2 tablespoons to one gallon of water.




Devotional Gems

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

For scalding the beans, select a large enamelware, aluminum, or stainless steel kettle. Put a gallon of water in the kettle and bring to a rolling boil. Place about one pound of prepared beans in a wire basket or large loose cheese cloth bag and dip in the vigorously boiling water. Keep the kettle covered and the water boiling. The recommendation by the agent for scalding is two minutes for small beans, three minutes for medium beans, and four minutes for large beans. Chill in ice water and drain.

Catch And Freeze

Let's change the childhood jingle to "Wake up Jacob let's go fishing, catch a little mud cat and put him in the freezer." Now since fish can be frozen and stored in home freezers or lock-er boxes, fishing is considered a profitable hobby.

Miss Lucile King, home demonstration agent, tells us that fish are frozen in much the same way as meats. Important points are chilling the fish as soon as possible after catching and freezing them the same day as caught if possible. Otherwise pack in ice until they can be frozen.

In preparation for freezing, clean, scale, and wash thoroughly. Cut a large fish in pieces ready for cooking, freeze the small fish whole, cut off fins and tails. Dip fish 30 seconds in a salt solution of 1 cup to a gallon of water to form a film which cuts down drip loss. Do not dip fatty fish, salt will make the fat rancid.

The agent suggests moisture-vapor-proof containers or wrappers. She says packaging fish is very important, an off flavor may be given to other foods if not packaged correctly.

The agent will be glad to assist you with other information on freezing foods. Ask her for bulletin B-175, Frozen Foods, How to Freeze, How to Cook.


