



## **Easy Does It**

**T**O PICK OUT quality celery, se-lect stalks of medium length and thick stems free from damage. The exterior should be smooth with fresh looking leaves. Limp or stringy stalks with dry brown tops should be avoided. Good cauliflower has a creamy white color. It's clean, feels heavy and is firm. Outer leaves should be fresh and green. Avoid those with dark spots or yellowed leaves s this indicates age. Fresh, fine cabbage has no discolored veins, and is well trimmed. Lift it to test for heaviness. It should feel heavier than it looks. Cracked or water-soaked carrots will not give you the most for your money; neither will those which nave green on top of the carrot. The color should be a bright, fresh orange, and the skin smooth, firm and clean.
