

## Wohlford Wins Race For Representative

Sam Wohlford, pioneer Sherman County stock-farmer won the democratic nomination in the Democratic Primary Saturday in a clear cut majority over two opponents.

He will be the first State Representative from the newly established 95th district of Texas. The total vote for Wohlford was 3,948 votes with just a small number of unreported votes in Hansford County. Kemp was second with 1,903 votes and Arford polled 1,809 votes.

Arford carried Dallam County with 1,073 votes, Wohlford received 870, and Kemp 217. In Hansford County Wohlford received 605, Kemp 104 and Arford 59.

Hartley County favored Wohlford with 355, Arford received 247 and Kemp 84.

Kemp carried Moore County with 1,331 votes, Wohlford followed with 1,147 votes, and Arford received 168.

Wohlford and Arford tied in Oldham County with 227 votes each, and Kemp received 118.

Sherman County gave a heavy majority to Wohlford. He received 744 votes in his home county, Arford polled 35, and Kemp 49.

Sherman County cast a majority of votes for most of the winning state candidates.

In the governor's race Shivers received 720, Traylor 19, and Yarborough 108.

For Lieutenant Governor Morales received 187 and Ramsey 551.

For U. S. Senator, Beckworth received 102, Daniel 634, and Papier 54.

For Commissioner of Agriculture, McKay received 124, Beard 118, and White 456.

For Land Commissioner, Bascom Giles received 517, and Patterson 208.

For Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Owens received 527, and Woodley 165.

For Railroad Commissioner, Culbertson received 554 and Laird received 151.

G. Ross Turner received 18 votes in Precinct 1, 18 votes in Precinct 2, 18 votes in Precinct 3, 223 votes in Precinct 4, and 12 absentee votes for a total of 289 votes.

For County Judge, Bob Ferguson received 54 in Precinct 1, 58 in Precinct 2, 79 in Precinct 3, 415 in Precinct 4, and 35 absentee votes for a total of 641.

In a write-in campaign Walter Pendleton received 15 votes in Precinct 1, 8 in Precinct 2, 48 in Precinct 3, 124 in Precinct 4, and 2 absentee votes for a total of 197.

E. E. Coons received 65 votes in Precinct 1, 66 in Precinct 2, 84 in Precinct 3, 526 in Precinct 4, and 31 absentee votes for a total of 772.

## Bobby Bachman Wounded In Korean War

Pvt. Robert G. Bachman, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Bachman, is in a Tokyo, Japan Army hospital receiving treatment for serious wounds. Bachman was wounded in action in Korea on July 18, according to information released to his parents by the War Department.

A letter from Bobby, written to his parents by a Red Cross lady, stated that his worst injury was a fractured right leg. He was wounded by a mortar shell.

The Red Cross representative added a note in the letter that letters from friends back home would be the best morale builders for Bobby. Friends may reach him by mail at the following address:

Pvt. Melvin Bachman was on the high seas enroute to Japan at the time his brother was wounded in Korea. He arrived at Camp Drake in Japan Wednesday.

Red Cross representatives were making arrangements for him to visit his brother in Tokyo.

Pvt. Robert G. Bachman had been on the firing line for about 20 days when he was wounded. He was transferred to the front on June 28.

Mr. and Mrs. Bachman received a letter from their son, written just three days before he was wounded in which he requested them to buy and send him a pistol. He said he needed side-arms for self defense at close quarters while serving his time on night patrols. From his letter it is presumed that side-arms are not issued to privates.

So far as is known, Pvt. Bachman is the first Sherman County boy to have been seriously wounded at the front in the present conflict. Several Sherman County youths have served their time in Korea without being injured. One boy from the county has received minor bullet wounds.

Burk Green received 548 votes for Justice of the Peace in Precinct 4 and 32 absentee votes for a total of 580.

Precinct 1 elected R. K. Everett Executive Committeeman with 68 votes. Precinct 2 elected Luther Browder Precinct Committeeman with 66 votes. Precinct 3 elected F. D. Mason Executive Committeeman with 85 votes. Precinct 4 elected Leon Guthrie Executive Committeeman with 588 votes.

For County Chairman, Walter Pendleton received 64 votes in Precinct 1, 61 in Precinct 2, 81 in Precinct 3, 500 in Precinct 4, and 33 absentee votes for a total of 739 votes.

## Rex S. Darnall Has Duty In Korea

WITH THE EIGHTH FIGHTER BOMBER WING — Airman Second Class Rex S. Darnall of Kerrick, Texas, has arrived in Korea and has been assigned to the pioneer jet combat unit of the Korean War, the 8th Fighter Bomber Wing.

This unit is one of the Fifth Air Force's top ranking interdiction groups. Famous for bombing rail lines, destroying and damaging enemy equipment, their F-80 Shooting Star jet pilots send the North Korean Communists scurrying for cover when they roar through the skies to strafe and napalm enemy installations.

Assigned to the 8th Fighter Bomber Wing as an armorer, it will be Darnall's responsibility to keep the F-80 Shooting Star jets combat ready 24 hours a day. In this capacity it will be his job to load the jets with five inch rockets, 50 caliber ammunition, heavy demolition bombs and the deadly fire bomb, napalm. This vital work of arming and rearming the F-80 jets around the clock has enabled the 8th pilots to pass their 40,000 sortie mark, a jet world record.

Airman Darnall graduated from Stratford High School, and has been on active duty with the United States Air Force for 13 months.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Harbour of Kerrick, Texas.

Serve Decorative Punch for Parties

### It's Party Time!

GRADUATIONS, showers and weddings are in season! And that means plenty of opportunity for entertaining with pretty, gay and festive but light fare.

Any one of these events may be handled nicely in buffet style. In fact with the number of people served, it's usually much easier to do it this way rather than try for a sit-down affair.

Your table should be at its prettiest with white linen and silverware, good glassware and well-arranged flowers. All the food as well as the service which is required for it is placed on a dining room table. If you have a buffet, this might hold "extras" such as silverware, plates, and platters for "second servings" already prepared.

A beautiful bowl of punch can be a feature attraction at any of these events for it goes well with either sweet things such as cake and cookies, or the more nourishing foods such as sandwiches or frosted bread loaves.

Punches are pretty, but they should be tasty, too. Here's a good combination which can be made in a few minutes, as well as prepared in advance:

#### \*Orange Fruit Punch (Serves 25)

- 2 6-ounce cans quick-frozen concentrated orange juice
- ½ cup (½ can) quick-frozen lemonade
- 1 No. 2 can pineapple juice
- 1 cup strong tea
- 6 cups cold water
- Ice block
- Maraschino cherries
- Fresh mint sprigs

Combine orange juice, lemonade and pineapple juice. Add tea and water. Chill. To make the ice block, freeze water in any shaped 1-quart pan which fits the punch bowl. When ready to serve, remove ice from pan. Fill empty orange juice can half full of hot water. Hold in center of ice block long enough to make a depression about ¼-inch deep. Fill the depression with cherries and decorate with mint. Float in punch bowl, with the prepared punch.

Here's another punch not only easy to prepare but economical and attractive as well.

#### Festive Punch (Serves 25)

- 2 cups boiling water
- 4 teaspoons tea or 4 tea bags
- 4 cups grape juice
- 2 cups grapefruit juice
- 4 cups gingerale
- Orange, lemon slices

Add tea bags or tea to boiling water and steep 4 to 5 minutes. Strain, if necessary. Add fruit juices and gingerale to tea infusion and pour over block of ice in punch bowl. Garnish liberally with orange and lemon slices.

A beautiful frosted sandwich loaf is the last word in elegance for a shower or even a graduation party. Best of all, it can be done in advance.

To make a sandwich loaf, use a white sandwich loaf, unsliced. Trim off the crusts and cut bread into lengthwise slices (four slices if you are using three kinds of fillings). Spread with any combination of fillings. Put the loaf together, wrap in waxed paper and damp towel and store overnight in the refrigerator. Just before serving, spread with this delicate green-colored frosting:

#### \*Avocado Frosting (For Sandwich Loaf)

- 1 cup sieved avocado
- 2 3-ounce packages cream cheese
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice

- ½ teaspoon onion salt
- Few drops tabasco sauce
- Salt to taste

Remove seed and skin from avocado and force through sieve. Combine all ingredients to blend thoroughly. Use to frost top, sides and ends of a one pound sandwich loaf.

Suggested fillings for sandwich loaves: egg salad, ham salad, tart jelly; ripe olive and nut fillings; carrots and raisins; tuna fish salad; Chicken salad, sharp cheese spread, egg salad; shrimp or salmon salad, tart jelly, chopped cucumber and chives.

Here are some dainty sandwiches which you might like to make for assorted trays. They can be used at a graduation, shower or reception:

#### Bacon Roll-Ups

Use cheese spread on thin white bread slices. Roll up. Tie with partly cooked bacon. Broil until golden and bacon is crisp.

#### Lettuce Roll-Ups

Butter bread; top with thin slices of boiled ham and lettuce leaf from which core has been removed. Roll. Fasten with a strip of celery or tie with lettuce strip. For diploma or baby-shower roll-ups, tie these rolled sandwiches with ribbon. For minted roll-ups, fill with jam instead of lettuce and ham. Tuck mint at the ends.

Here are nice an simple sandwiches which can be used between two slices of buttered bread sliced cut with cookie cutters:

1. Sliced cheese, or cheese mixed with butter and sliced tomato.
2. Cream cheese blended with walnut meats and apple, sliced but unpeeled.
3. Cottage cheese and coconut (shredded) on brown or orange-nut bread.
4. Chicken salad and orange marmalade on enriched white or whole wheat bread.
5. Thinly sliced bananas placed on deviled ham spread on white or wheat bread.

A luscious dessert cake goes nicely with punch and sandwiches at one of these seasonal parties if you're serving a good sized group:

#### \*Chocolate Torte (Serves 16)

- 1 large angel food cake
- 1 cup sweet butter
- 2 cups confectioners' sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 ounces (2 squares) chocolate, melted
- ½ cup confectioners' sugar
- 6 tablespoons cocoa
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 2 cups whipping cream
- ½ cup chopped walnuts or pecans

Slice cake into three layers, using long, thin, sharp-bladed knife. Cream sweet butter well. Beat the 2 cups of confectioners' sugar into butter, creaming well. Add vanilla and melted chocolate. Mix well, then spread between layers of cake. Sift together ½ cup confectioners' sugar, cocoa and salt. Add to unwhipped cream. Chill two hours or more. Add vanilla to cream and beat until stiff. Spread on top and sides of cake. Sprinkle nuts around sides of cake. Chill several hours before serving.

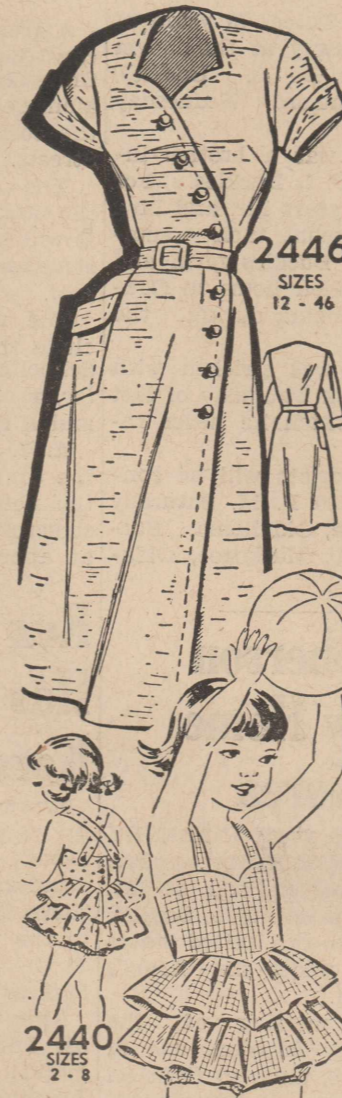

### Can Fruit In The Water Bath

For a good diet, the Texas Food Standard calls for two servings of fruit daily for each member of the family. Miss Lucile King, home demonstration agent, points out that fruits are generally popular and those canned now will help reduce the cost of living later.

Almost every homemaker has the equipment to can fruit. Miss King says water bath canners may be purchased but any big, clean kettle with a rack and tight fitting lid will do if it is deep enough to hold the cans or jars upright. Also there must be room to permit the water to boil one or two inches over the top of the containers.

The agent gives these general steps for canning fruit in the water bath. Before beginning the canning proper, wash containers in hot soapy water, rinse well; select only fresh fruit that is sound and well ripened, and prepare according to the type; make syrup according to personal preference as thin, medium or heavy. One cup of syrup usually covers one quart of fruit. To prevent discoloration use ascorbic acid, citric acid, lemon juice, vinegar or commercial solutions.

The next step is to pack the prepared raw fruit in containers and add hot syrup. Then place the containers on a rack in the water bath for steaming. Allow hot water to come 2 inches below the top of the containers. Place the lid on the water bath and start to count steaming time when the water begins to boil. The length of time required for steaming depends on the kind of fruit and size of containers.

At the end of the steaming time, press the fruit down, work out air bubbles, clean sealing surfaces and close according to the type of container being used.

The closed container of hot food is returned to the water bath. Add boiling water to cover the containers 1 to 2 inches. Replace the lid on the water bath and count processing time, remove the containers and plunge tin cans into cold water. Place jars upright, out of a draft and far enough apart to allow quick cooling.

### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 20 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electorate; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to read as follows: "Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact

laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and for payment of the costs, charges, and premiums on policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages"; and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages." Each voter shall mark out one

(1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

### Consecrated Genius

Lesson for August 3, 1952

ONCE IN A WHILE men are born who have more careers than one. Thomas Jefferson was architect, educator, lawyer, writer, executive; Samuel F. B. Morse was a painter and also the inventor of the telegraph; Theodore Roosevelt was a man so many-sided that some one has written an amusing article showing that several thousands of years from now, scholars might easily conclude that T. Roosevelt was not one man but several different men with the same name.

**Many-Sided Man**  
SAMUEL WAS ONE of these many-sided men. We call him Samuel the prophet, but we could just as well call him judge, priest, preacher, general writer and king-maker.

He was a prophet, for the people who knew him turned to him when they wanted to know what God thought. We can call him a preacher, for we know of one very successful revival which he conducted (I Sam. 7). He was also what we call a circuit judge, going from town to town to hold court. He was a successful general, for we know he not only advised military leaders but took the lead in raising an army himself and directing it in a successful campaign.

He was a priest, not only in a formal way, offering sacrifices at various places; but he also once said a memorable thing which marks him as a priest in the truest sense: "Ye have done all this wickedness, yet . . . God forbid that I should sin against you in ceasing to pray for you." (Chap. 12.)

He was a writer, for though he could not have written both books that bear his name, he did write "the manner of the Kingdom"—perhaps a kind of constitution. And next week's study will show him as a king-maker.

**No Dictator**  
THE MANY-SIDED MAN, the man of many talents, always has one great temptation: to be a dictator. It isn't bad people who become dictators; it isn't the weak; it is the strong and able.

A very able president, for instance, will take it on himself to run the State department and any other departments that specially interest him; in a small town a many-sided man may be superintendent of the mill, chairman of the school board, chief deacon in the church, superintendent of the Sunday school, major and postmaster besides.

It is not alone in public that the dictator flourishes. Sometimes in a home the father, or the mother, will be so energetic and brainy that he (or she) finds it much easier to do things than to wait for the children to do them, or to teach the children how it is done.

Now the prophet Samuel, who towered high above the average man of his country, must have been tempted to be a dictator.

Samuel perhaps could have done it all, but he knew when to retire from the foreground.

**Public Spirit**  
SAMUEL himself is a model for all the many-gifted men who reach and deserve positions of power. He never milked the people for his own benefit; he never used public office for private gain. (With one sad exception; he kept his worthless sons on the public payroll.) He was a man of true public spirit.

This means two things, and Samuel had them both. One is a wide vision: being able to see all sides of a question, and to see not only his own advantage, but how decisions and policies affect all kinds of persons.

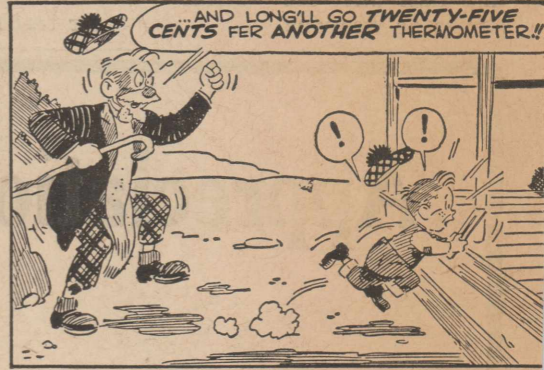
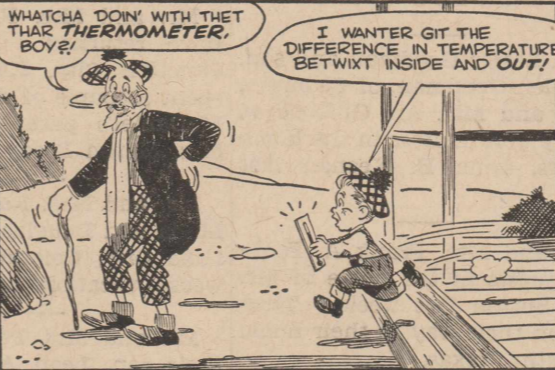
Most politicians will have at heart the interests of their own little balliwick; how many have the interests of the nation at heart?

Public spirit means wide vision, it means a wide concern, not only seeing but caring. In an election year, when politicians are clamoring at us from all sides, we may well inquire about every candidate: Does this man have any resemblance to God's man Samuel? Does he have a sense of responsibility to God? Does he have a wide vision, a wide concern? Whose side is he on? Is he out for himself, or for God and the whole people?

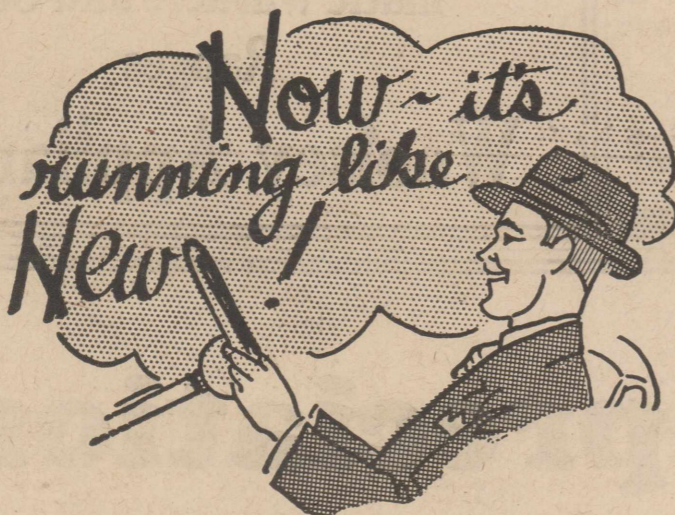

Have clothes hooks and towel bars at convenient heights for children. They will learn to hang things up and help keep order in the house.

Each member of the family should be responsible for putting his soiled clothes in the hamper. This saves mother gathering up the clothes on wash day.

Using the children's little red wagon to take the clothes to the lines will save 75% of energy required by stooping.

Have a business center which will invite you to sit and plan. Short rest periods are a thrift practice and save your disposition as well.

Miss King's advice is to divide the load, don't be a martyr, let the rest of the family help. There are tasks for all ages and all will enjoy helping to keep the home spick and span.

### PMA Election Dates Set

The annual election of PMA County and Community Committeemen will be held this year during the last two weeks of August and the newly elected committeemen will take office September 1, 1952, it was announced this week by B. F. Vance, Chairman of the State PMA Committee.

To be elected in each community are three PMA community committeemen and two alternates and a delegate and alternate to the county PMA convention. The county committee consisting of a chairman, vice-chairman and member as well as two alternate members will be named at the county convention.

The earlier election and convention dates have been made necessary by new PMA procedure which requires that farmers' intention sheets, showing proposed ACP work for 1953, be completed by January 1, 1953.

As a result of the earlier date for completion of intention sheets, it is felt the date for committeemen to take office should be moved forward in order to allow sufficient time for training newly elected committeemen and also sufficient time for them to review and approve farmers' requests for ACP assistance prior to the beginning of the program year.

The vote for community committeemen and delegates to the county convention will be conducted during the period August 18-23. Voting may be done by mail or at polling places.

County conventions must be held not later than August 30 with newly elected committeemen taking office September 1.

### Sandwiches Rank High On Nutritious Food List

You will be delighted to know that sandwiches rank high on the lists of food that nutritionists recommend. Miss Lucile King, home demonstration agent, says mothers can be sure the children are getting important nourishment when they eat sandwiches made of enriched or whole wheat bread with lots of filling.

The enriched or whole wheat breads in sandwiches supply three B vitamins, thiamin, riboflavin, and niacin, which promote growth, good appetites and healthy nerves. The breads also supply important cereal protein along with food iron for good red blood and calcium for building sound bones and teeth.

Miss King goes on to tell us that meat, fish, poultry, egg and cheese fillings in sandwiches add much to the food value. This plus the cereal protein in the bread provides essential amino acids nutrients necessary for growth and health.

A well balanced meal is made when a sandwich is served with cream soup, milk and cookies for dessert. Miss King says the convenience, economy and good taste of sandwiches make them America's favorite food.

### Flower Salads For Summer Appetites

Maybe you live in a dry climate with little water and your spring flowers have long since departed. Dress up your sandwiches and salads in flower designs for summer meals is the suggestion from Miss Lucile King, home demonstration agent.

Bring your black eyed susans to the table in the form of a simple sandwich. Cut the crust from slices of enriched bread. Brush lightly with yellow cake coloring, then with melted butter or margarine. Press into muffin pans and toast lightly in a moderate oven. Fill 'black eyed susans' with chopped dates and nuts mixed with a salad dressing.

A delectable and eye appealing flower salad is the "Water Lily." Cut hard boiled eggs four times lengthwise and once crosswise. Remove the yolks, mix with mayonnaise and season to taste. Arrange white sections like the petals of the lily on a lettuce leaf or nest of water cress. Place a tablespoon of the seasoned yolks in the center and you have a nutritious water lily for each member of the family.

The agent now leaves you on your own. Use imagination for other flower originals for eye appeal. The diminishing appetites of friend husband and the small fry will come to life in a hurry when they see your flower garden.

By the way, the agent suggests you complete the meals with tall glasses of iced milk and dishes of fresh fruit.

### How To Avoid Burns

Miss Lucile King, home demonstration agent, gives a few tips on how to avoid burns in the kitchen.

If small children need to be in the kitchen while work is done, fix a play area far enough away from the stove so they cannot reach the handles

of hot utensils. Watch hot fat, let it cool before moving it. If possible use tongs to put food into hot fat to cook.

Be sure handles are turned away from the edge of the stove so the pans won't be knocked off accidentally. Pans with flat bottoms are not likely to tip over. Have a place ready to set a hot pan before it is taken from the stove.

Remove the cover from a pan by raising the far side first. In this way the steam will come out away from you.

Round, chick pot holders are best for safety. There are no corners to scorch or touch the flame and thick, dry holders do away with steam burns to the hand.

Miss King says many burns are the result of carelessness or forgetfulness. So she suggests a review of familiar safety rules and says to think and be safe.

### Stretch The Clothing Dollar

Before buying new clothes take a look at the stock on hand. Miss Lucile King, home demonstration agent, suggests you select new clothes to fit in with your present wardrobe.

Miss King gives a few points to remember when you decide it is time to buy a new garment, such as:

Extreme styles, colors and materials do not lend themselves to several years wear as do basic styles. Decide on your best color and build the wardrobe around this, get bright colors in the use of accessories such as flowers, costume jewelry and glove. One should buy as good quality as the budget will allow, this is cheaper in the long run and the garment will always look well. Always try on the garment to be sure it is comfortable, sit down in it and raise and fold your arms, an uncomfortable garment is often left hanging in the closet a total loss. Keep garments in repair,

never put one away without sewing up rips and replacing fasteners, and have clothes cleaned as soon as necessary.

Miss King says if you take advantage of sales be sure you know what you are buying. Examine carefully material and construction. Be sure the garment is cut on the straight of the material and is both comfortable and becoming to you.

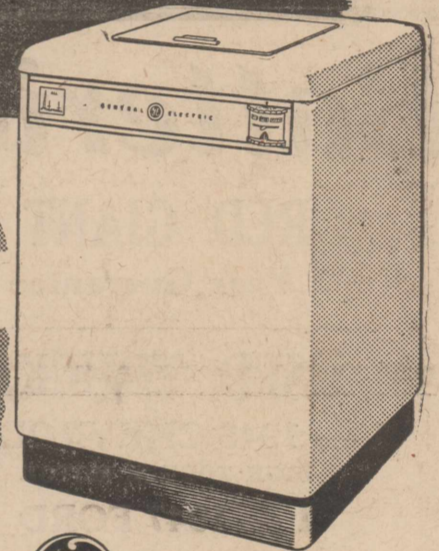

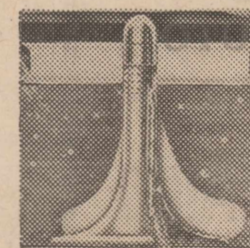

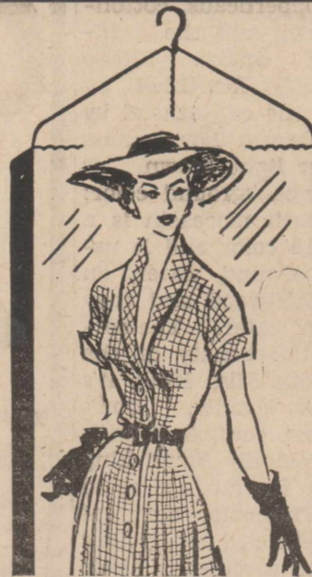

## Pre-School Clinic Will Be Held August 8th

Dr. Huston Pearson and Dr. Fowler of Dumas will examine children who will start to school this fall free of charge in a pre-school clinic which will be held Friday, August 8th.

Letters will be mailed to parents the latter part of this week, informing them as to whether the clinic will be held in the Stratford Clinic or in the Stratford School building.

The Stratford Parent-Teacher Association in cooperation with the local school, is making this service available for pre-school children.

The object of the summer physical examination is to enable parents to discover any physical defect in their children which might hamper their school work. It also allows time for them to have their children given medical assistance to overcome these handicaps.

## Important To Know The Poisonous Snakes

Some day your life may depend upon how quickly and accurately you identify a snake. Only four of the 103 species of snakes known in Texas are considered dangerously poisonous says Miss Lucile King, home demonstration agent. She urges Texans to become familiar with these poisonous snakes so that positive identification can be made quickly in case a member of the family is bitten.

The four species of snakes that are poisonous are the rattle snakes, copperheads, cottonmouth moccasin and the deadly little coral snake. Rattle snakes are easily identified by their rattles; the copperhead by its chestnut-brown hour glass markings over light brown or brownish gray background color; the cottonmouth moccasin is a dirty brown in color and is usually found around water, on old logs or driftwood and they can bite under water. The coral snake is the beauty of the group, but adds Miss King, it's also the most deadly. Don't says the agent, confuse it with the more commonly found king snake because the mistake could be fatal. The color rings of the coral snake are red, yellow and black and completely circle the body and if the red ring touches the yellow, you've found the coral snake. Treat him with care.

Fangs for ejecting the poison are common to all poisonous snakes. The marks left by the fangs are a sure identification sign. The venom ejected by the rattlers, copperheads and water moccasins is know as hemotoxic venom because it effects the blood cells. The coral snake, on the other hand, injects a neurotoxic venom and it effects the nervous system. Antivenins, which are available at most drug stores, are ineffective for treating the bite of the coral snake.

Snakes can be discouraged from moving in on the home lot, says Miss King, by keeping the place clean. Rubbish should not be allowed to accumulate and trash should be removed from such debris about the place that is usually inhabited by rats and mice. The rodents are favorite food for snakes and unless kept under control, snakes will move in to clean them up.

Here's a word of advice from Miss King on what to do in case a person is bitten by a poisonous snake. Keep the victim quiet; don't let them walk, become over-heated or take alcoholic stimulants. Don't cauterize the wound with strong acids nor inject potassium permanganate. Get the victim to the doctor as soon as possible but first aid measures will help. Apply a tourniquet above the bite

and make cross cut incisions at the bite and on the advancing edges of the swelling. Apply suction with the mouth or a suction cup but release the tourniquet every 15 minutes to keep up circulation. Inject antivenin, if available, as soon as possible. After the injection, release the tourniquet and continue the suction. In the meantime have the patient on the way to a doctor or the doctor on the way to the patient.

Miss King warns that hunters and campers should never go to the woods without a snake bite kit. She urges home owners to keep their premises clean and to be on the look out at all times for the poisonous snakes. All except the rattler strike without warning and the rattler some times does his biting without sounding off, so the safe thing to do is stay out of the way of all snakes and discourage them

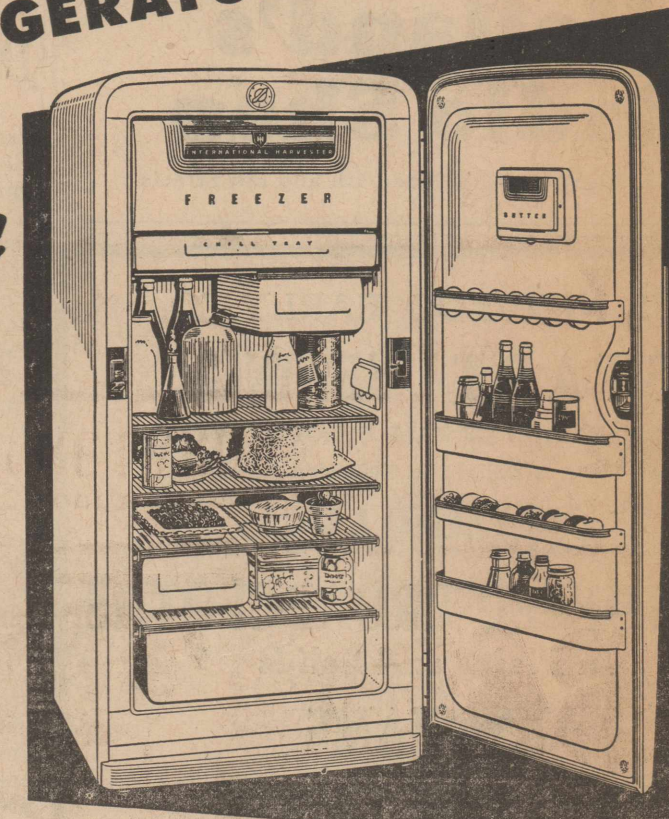

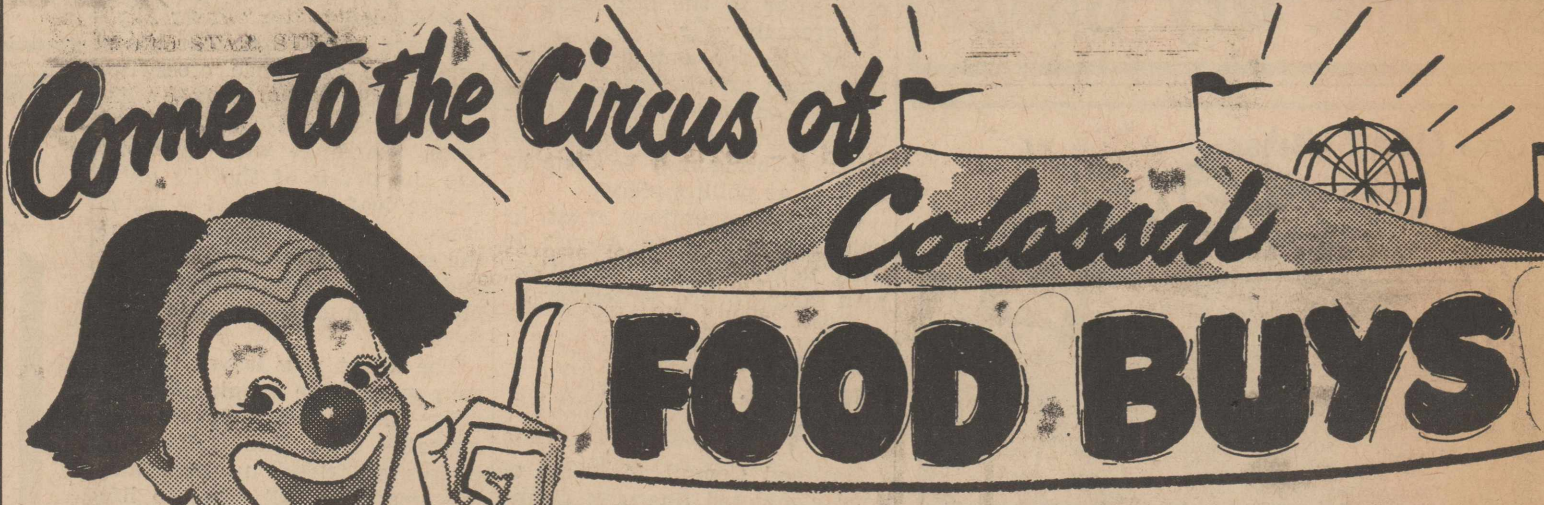
