Research has shown that caregivers are often at an increased risk for depression and illness, especially if they do not receive adequate support.

his covenant."

In Psalm, the Bible speaks of our resolve not to sin.

"May my vindication come from you; may your eyes see what is right. Though you me at night, though you test me, you will find nothing; I have resolved that my mouth will not sin," it says in Psalm 17:2-3.

In Matthew 15 is Jesus questioned by Pharisees who are distressed about the disciples "not washing" before they eat.

Jesus responds by saying, "Listen and understand. What goes into a man's mouth does not make him unclean, but what comes out of his mouth, that is what makes him unclean."

This situation wasn't about the disciples eating with soiled hands. Their reference to the traditions of the elders is a reference to rabbinic law rather than mosaic law.

Mosaic law, which we see in the Old Testament Books of Law, came from God, but rabbinic law was man inserting religion into Israel's relationship with God. Under rabbinic law, there was a specific washing ceremony that had to be completed prior to eating. This is what the Pharisees were asking about, and what Jesus was talking about in his response.

Christ was telling them what came out of their mouth was determined by what was in their heart. And if what was in their heart wasn't a true worshipful relationship with God, it didn't matter what they did prior to eating.

Ephesians 4:29 says, "Do not let any unwholesome talk come out of your mouth..."

When we look at what Paul wrote through the lens of Christ's words in Matthew 15, we need to remember that when there is sin in our hearts, it can't help but come out in our words and deeds.

A couple of months ago, an intoxicated Mel Gibson was taped uttering what was described as anti-Semitic words. I don't know what he reportedly said, but alcohol doesn't put words in your mouth, it only removes the inhibitions that kept you from giving voice to such things.

Our resolve not to sin must extend beyond our spoken words. Proverbs 29:6 says, "An evil man is snared by his own sins...

No matter what kind of sin you have in your life, the Bible tells us they won't remain hidden forever. Do you remember what God told David about the sins in his life? He said the sins David committed against others in darkness would be carried out against him in the light of

2 Chronicles 20:3-4 talks about resolving to seek God's guidance.

"Alarmed, Jehoshaphat resolved to inquire of the Lord, and he proclaimed a fast for all Judah. The people of Judah came together to seek help from the Lord; indeed, they came from every town in Judah to seek him," the Bible says.

In this scripture, Judah was in a time of crises, with their enemies preparing to attack. The Bible tells us to look to God in such instances.

This past year, Carrie Underwood of Checotah, Okla., was honored for her song, Jesus, Take the Wheel, about a young mother who was facing a crises, and recognized that she "couldn't make it on her own," and that she needed God's guidance.

Nowhere in the Bible does it say, "The Lord helps them

who help themselves." What it does say is, "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding."

God wants all of our probe my heart and examine decisions to be godly decisions, and if we don't know which option we have before us is the one God would have us make, he is pleased when we turn to him for advice.

> And in 1 Corinthians 2:1-2 we read about a resolve to submit to God's authority.

"When I came to you, brothers, I did not come with eloquence or superior wisdom as I proclaimed to you the testimony about God. For I resolved to know nothing while I was with you except Jesus Christ and him crucified," Pauls wrote.

Paul was saying God had supreme authority in his life, that he was totally dependent upon God, and that the message he carried could be summed up in the glory of the death, burial and resurrection of Christ.

God created man with free will, but we are also called to submit to God's authority in our lives.

As the heirs of Christ and the children of God, are in a true sense of the word "vassals" of his kingdom.

Yes, we were created with free will, but like the crowns we will one day receive as we before stand God's judgement seat, we have laid our "free will" at the feet of our Lord.

As we go into this new year, I ask how resolved are you? Is the pledge you've given to God as fleeting as many January resolutions, or are you truly resolved to submit to God's authority in all things.

But I learned the most beautiful hymns of the Christian faith not at church but at home singing with my family. I thought of that recently as I was watching on TV the funeral service at the National Cathedral for President Gerald Ford. What a beautiful service! What beautiful hymns! I listened to one of the Ford family's favorite hymns, "O God, Our Help in Ages Past" and the beautiful "God of Our Fathers" and realized that those were among my own family's favorite hymns.

I also learned early that our family had so many favorite hymns that if we were singing and you wanted some hope of

getting your favorite song in the lineup, you'd best not be timid about calling out the song number really quickly.

One of our family's favorite hymns was "Father and Friend, Thy Light, Thy Love." Once B & Ruth had gone to Africa, it became especially dear. Short but full of meaning, it particularly captured our hope and our prayer as we were separated from loved ones by an ocean and half a world:

(Vs. 1) Father and Friend, Thy light, Thy love,/Beaming thro' all Thy works we see;/Thy glory gilds the heav'ns above, /And all the earth is full of Thee.

(Vs. 2) Thy voice we hear, Thy presence feel,/While Thou too pure for mortal sight, /Enwrapped in clouds, invisible,/reignest the Lord of life and light.

(Vs. 3) Thy children shall not faint nor fear,/Sustained by this delightful thought;/Since Thou, their God, art ev'rywhere,/They cannot be where Thou art not.

I love it still and think of it often. It came to mind yet again this Christmas as we received a wonderful blessing. We held hands around the table at our Christmas eve meal. Nearby, the computer was on, its microphone and speakers also on, the "Skype" internet phone software running, and Stephan, our missionary son in Uganda, led our prayer for the meal from Uganda and later laughed with us as we opened presents. An ocean away, he was nevertheless "here" for Christmas.

Wherever God's children are, around the world or even beyond this world, we praise God: "They cannot be where Thou art not."




Can you imagine living in a land of cold, snow and ice all year long?
