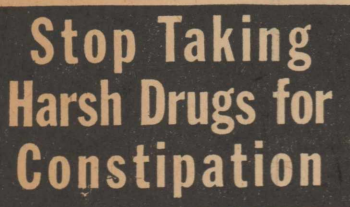

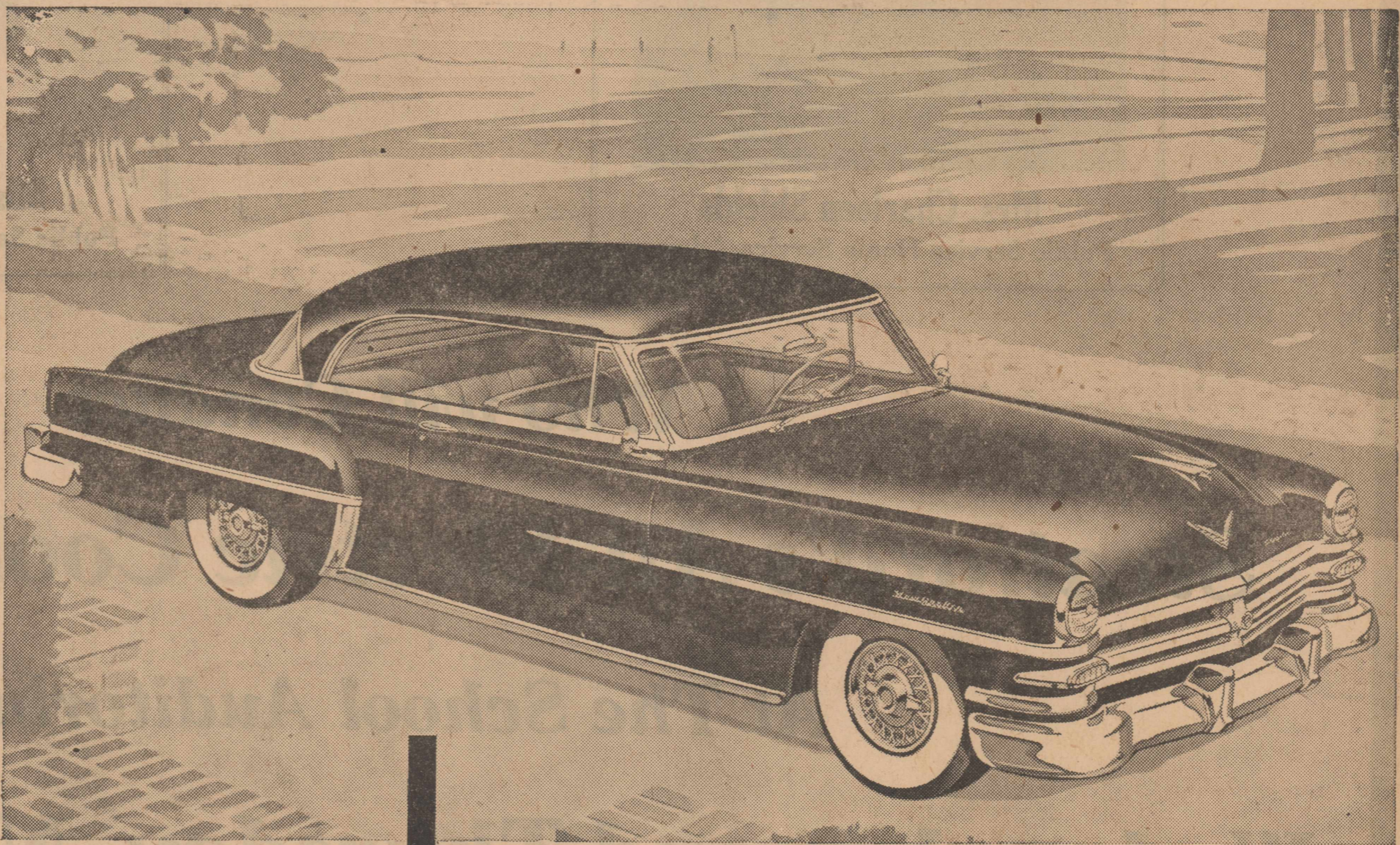



1-4 cup nuts, if desired.
Spread sliced apples in a shallow baking dish, sprinkle with sugar and lemon juice and pour honey over all. Combine flour, brown sugar and salt. Cut in

the fat to make a crumbly mixture. Spread this mixture evenly over the apples and bake in a moderate oven 375 degrees F. for 30 to 40 minutes, or until apples are tender and crust browned. Serve warm with cream, or whipped cream topped with a dash of cinnamon.

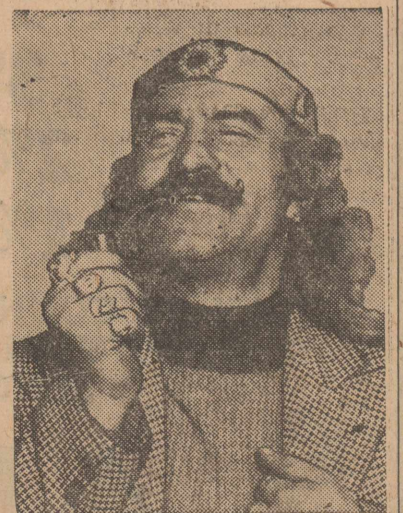

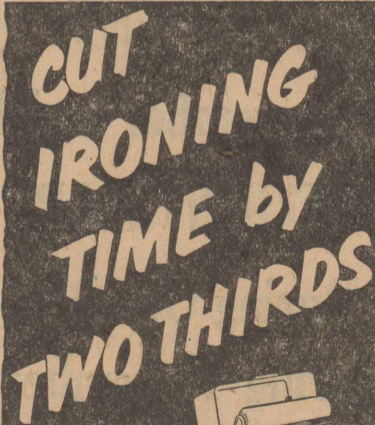
