

The TYC told the city it has enough beds in its own facilities to meet the needs after the reductions caused by the state budget shortfall; therefore it is ending the relationship with Littlefield.

The center has been in operation for four years and has 100 plus employees. The annual payments are \$750,000. The city has enough money to meet the

payments until February 2005.

























## FSA announces sign-up for GRP

On June 30, 2003, the Texas Farm Service Agency (FSA) began accepting applications for the recently announced Grasslands Reserve Program (GRP). FSA is partnering with the Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) to implement GRP, in cooperation with the USDA Forest Service.

According to Kim Hanlin, County Executive Director for the Bailey County Farm Service Agency, GRP is a voluntary program that provides financial and technical assistance to landowners and operators for the preservation and conservation of the nation's grasslands. Nationally, GRP will protect up to 2 million acres of privately owned grassland, rangeland and pastureland and provide \$49.9 million in funding for fiscal year 2003.

"Enrollment of land in GRP will have a positive economic impact on the country and improve environmental quality by preventing the conversion of grassland to other uses, including crop production and urban development," said Hanlin.

FSA or NRCS will accept GRP applications on a continuous basis for easements or rental agreements. According to Hanlin, this program has several enrollment options: easements (permanent or 30-year) and rental agreements (10, 15, 20, or 30-year). To participate in GRP, offers must be private land and include at least 40 contiguous acres.

Eligible landowners who enroll in GRP will receive payment for permanent easements based on the fair market value of the property less the grazing value of the land. Payment for 30-year easements will be equal to 30 percent of fair market value of the property less the grazing value.

Participants with approved rental agreements will receive annual payments that do not exceed 75 percent of the grazing value of the land. If restoration is

determined necessary by NRCS, a restoration agreement will be incorporated within the rental agreement or easement.

According to Hanlin, GRP enrollment permits common grazing practices, haying, mowing, or harvesting for seed production, subject to certain restrictions.

"GRP merges elements of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) and the Wetland Reserve Program (WRP) and like its predecessor programs, GRP funds allow for restoration and preservation of environmentally sensitive land and conserve water resources," said Hanlin.



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

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## Economic impact estimate highlights significance of June crop losses

SPECIAL TO THE JOURNAL

Oh what a difference 30 days in June can make. Following a pleasant Memorial Day weekend, highlighted by beneficial rainfall across much of the region, June promised to be just what the doctor ordered for the High Plains crop.

Unfortunately, the history books will recount June 2003 as a month that put an entirely different spin on the fate of the region's 3.6 million acre cotton crop.

During the month, High Plains cotton fields were blown, drowned and pummeled by wave after wave of June thunderstorms, an adversary that has not been a regular visitor to the re--gion for several years. So far, some 1.2 million acres of predominantly irrigated cotton in the region's northern tier counties, are estimated to have been lost.

Based on recent history, that lost acreage can be credited for nearly 50 percent of all High Plains production over the past couple of years.

By using the most recent 5-year averages for acreage and yield a conservative estimate of what the loss of these acres actually means in economic terms can be derived. Using the 1998-2002 numbers, the region's 2003 Farm Level economic loss is estimated to top \$320 million as a direct result of June crop losses.

Fortunately, every cloud does have a silver lining. Extended areas of the dryland production region south of Lubbock carry a

slightly delayed, but makeable, crop into the month of July for the first time in several years.

Dryland acres have been a piece of the High Plains production puzzle all but missing for several years due to drought. Should they continue to progress, they will help make up at least a part of the area's lost production potential.

Remaining irrigated and dryland acres, for the most part, are anywhere from significantly to only slightly behind based on the calendar. Either way, producers have a complicated set of management decisions to work through in order to maximize the production potential on every acre that is left.

Producers wanting tips on

managing late cotton, can request the latest version of the Texas Cooperative Extension's "Managing Late Cotton" publication. This valuable guide should help growers avoid management pitfalls associated with a late cotton crop. It is currently being updated and should be available in early July.

Growers may request copies through their County Extension agents and from the Lubbock Research and Extension Center. A link tot he downloadable version will be provided as soon as it becomes available.



# Running Mules to participate in TAAF state track meet

Nine individual members and the 400-meter relay team from the Running Mules summer track team qualified to participate in the Texas Amateur Athletic Federation state track meet in Grapevine July 26.

The meet will be held in conjunction with the TAAF's Games of Texas sports festival. The festival was created to showcase Texas amateur athletes and is the largest multi-sport event held annually in Texas.

Patterned after the Olympics, the first TAAF Games of Texas was held in San Antonio in 1986 and has been hosted by other Texas cities since its inception. The 2003 and 2004 Games will be hosted by the Northeast Tarrant County cities of Bedford, Colleyville, Euless, Grapevine, Hurst and North Richland Hills.

qualified for the state meet with a first or second place finish in a regional meet in Lubbock last Saturday. Other teams involved in the regional meet were from Dumas, Hereford, Canyon, Amarillo, Lubbock, Acuff, and Levelland.

Athletes competed in their age division to earn the right to go to state. The Running Mule team is comprised of 17 boys and girls. Nine of the 17 qualified in 18 track and field events.

Athletes winning gold and silver medals for the Running Mules were Marshal Head by winning gold medals in both the 100meter dash and the 100meter hurdles. Kendal Johnson took silver medals in both the 110-meter hurdles and the 300-meter hurdles.

Rudy Gonzales won gold in the 100-meter dash and silver medals in the 200meter dash and the triple jump.

Kelsi Tipps won silver in the triple jump and was a member of the gold medal 400-meter relay team. Joining Tipps on the relay team was Crescent Crawford, Ashley Scolley and Ashley Grumbles.

Sara Johnson took gold in the 800-meter run and silver in the 1600. Amy Withrow won gold medals in the 80-meter hurdles and high jump and silver in the long jump and 200-meter dash.

Jessica Withrow led the team with three gold medals in the 100- and 300meter hurdles and high jump. Melissa Casanova won gold in the 100-meter dash and silver in the 200.

Head also placed fourth in high jump and sixth in the long jump. Diego Del Toro placed third in 400meter run and the discus and finished fifth in the long jump. Blake O, Hare ran fourth in the 110-meter hurdles, fifth in the 300meter hurdles, sixth in high - urday and we had a lot of jump and placed ninth in the long jump.

K. Johnson finished third in the high jump and Gonzales placed third in high jump. K. Tipps took third in the long jump and Crawford ran fourth in the 200-meter dash and fifth in both the 100 and high jump.

Scolley-placed third in the high jump and Grumbles ran third in the 1600, placed fifth in long jump and sixth in high jump. Hillary Tipps won third in the 3200- and fifth in the 400-meter runs.

"The kids have worked really hard this summer on their events," said Running Mule coach Jeff Withrow. "All that work paid off Satsuccess in the meet in Lubbock. There is a qualifier meet in Hereford July 17 and then it is on to state."

"All our qualifiers are

very excited about the opportunity to compete in the Games of Texas," concluded coach Withrow.



He reacts, you see, not so much to reality as to his perception of reality. And he may be wrong.

If he's an exceptionally intelligent canine, he may later "learn" that his estimation of flawed. Maybe you'll go on to conclusion as you reach down more carefully to pet him with, your remaining hand.

may run over the hill before you have an opportunity to change his opinion of you, and he may be even quicker to sink his teeth into the next human who quite innocently reaches out her hand. He may well go

heaven a decade or two (in dog years) later still firmly wedded to the erroneous opinion that all humans who reach down to pet him are mean, malicious, mutt-haters. Now, he would be absolutely wrong, but he would believe deeply in his error and die not knowing that his perceptions were completely unfounded in reality.

I wish this sort of thing was only a problem with dogs. But I'm afraid that we humans are often just as witless and wrong when we react quickly, and very often poorly, just on the basis of our all-too-fallible perceptions. How hard it is for someone else who doesn't share our fouled up view of a particular person, situation, or issue to try to help us see reality when everything from our backgrounds, our upbringing, our unfortunate experiences, all the way to our lack of sleep and the state of our digestion conspires to cause us to have the wrong perceptions and, to some large or small extent, be absolutely blind to reality.

Then you know what happens, don't you? We go around biting folks who don't deserve to be bitten. And then too often they go off and bite someone else.

The fact that we are such poor judges both of reality and you and your intentions was of the motives of our neighbors is one significant reason help him reach a more realistic Jesus warned us not to spend time judging and criticizing those around us. You and I are very, very poor judges. Our Or, probably more likely, he dogs are pretty poor judges, too, but I personally would trust a dog with a good nose a lot farther than I'd trust a biting, barking, snapping, illtempered human.
