

#### My Fourth Family In Germany

(By Millie Bennett) Each month seems to be better than the last and each day brings something new and more interesting in the way of every day living. With the coming of this month, September, the Autumn weather has blown in with the wind and rain showers and cool nights. Now on my fourth farm near Stuttgart, all the trees are beginning to change colors, and the apples are just right for eating.

My family this month consists of the Dr. and Mrs. Barth, and one of their sons and his family. The other two sons have no families, and are still in school. One is studying to be a veterinarian doctor. The other one is studying Agriculture. The only daughter is married and living at Ulm. I visited her with the family one day and got to see the town of Ulm. Schafhof is the name of this farm, and it is situated like our farms in the U.S. That is, it is not like most of the farms here in Germany, for the bigger part of them are in small villages, not in the country all alone. The Schafhof is three hundred years old, and first had many sheep here. Later most of the land was turned into farm land. There are one hundred and sixty acres in farm land and twenty acres in woodland. 

As the representative of Paul, Titus was sent to Crete to organize the churches there, and Paul wrote to encourage the young man in his difficult task of dealing with unruly people.


It was, first of all, necessary to Titus to be an "ensample of good works." A man cannot lead others in high things if his own life is not a pattern of the things he declares. "Do as I say and not as I do" is a pitiable declaration on the part of anyone giving advice unto others.

Then Paul instructed Titus to urge upon the people subjection to the powers that were over them, to be obedient to rulers and to all in authority. In general, this is good advice. Good rulers are not a terror to doers of righteousness, but a terror to evil doers. Government. in its origin and authority, is from God. And it is Christian duty to be loyal to the established govern-

The people were also to be admonished to abstain from disputes that were likely to create division and strife. To put away strife could be attained through faith in the atoning Christ.

Ft. Worth - Monette Salmon 16-year old cheerleader at Hico, really had something to cheer about here this week.

An operation has added years to her life and removed the threat of death from an enlarged heart.

Her heart trouble developed because nature failed to do it. job at birth.

It left a tube (the ductus arterious) open which normally closes when a baby takes its first breath. The open tube caused Monette's heart to work overtime and enlarge.

If a surgeon here had not cut down to the open tube, tied it and stitched it up, Monette's heart would have cotinued its overtime pumping and would have grown larger as she became older.

To keep blood flowing into the arms, legs and other parts of the body, the overloaded heart would have to pump 25 per cent more than the normal heart.


