Wohlford To Introduce Gas Law

Wohlford has directed the following letter to the members of the Texas Legislature:

"Mr. Speaker, Members of the

House, Ladies and Gentlemen: A few days in advance of the special session of the Legislature, I want to take this means of directing to you, my fellow House Members, an open letter on a subject very near the heart of the tax problem which concerns us most at this time.

We are being asked to provide additional funds for a worthy cause. The guestion that confronts us is: Where We Gonna Get The Money?

All of us have been abundantly aware that the same old tax sources aren't inclined to let us saddle them with any new burdens at this particular time. The likelihood of a favorable Supreme Court decision on the gas gathering tax before we have to act seems remote



He stated that the most of the water available for irrigation in this area comes from the ogalala formation which is just above the red beds. 

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
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

Fertilizer Aids Plum And

Peach Trees

Fertilizer applied to peach and plum trees early in the year will give them the plant food needed for a fast start. According to Miss Lucile King, County Home Demonstration Agent, most tests show that a bearing orchard of 70 trees an acre will need at least 60 pounds of nitrogen, 80-100 pounds of phosphoric acid and 60-80 pounds of potash each

year. She says an application

of 300-400 pounds an acre of

12-12-12 fertilizer mixture in February or March followed in

April with a 300 pound application of 5-10-10 will do the job. She recommends using from four to six pounds of 12-12-12 mixture on each tree in February and the same amount of the second suggested mixture

for April application. The fertilizer should be scattered over an area around the tree from about the end of the tree branches to within three or four feet of the trunk. It should be disked into the soil to a depth of three to four inches immediately after it is applied,

The trees need and can utilize large quantities of nitrogen during the early season but heavy applications made later in the season may cause excessive terminal growth, increased framework suckering and delayed ripening of the fruit. Ample supplies of phosphorus and potash at all times are import-

ant, especially during the period of seed or pit development and fruit bud formation. The agent points out that peach and plum trees perform the double task of developing the fruit crop and next year's fruit buds at the same time and this takes place between late May





Storage Space Shortage

The Commodity Credit Corporation has recently announced Pfc. Monroe A. Fields that they own 108 million bushels of wheat in storage in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico and in addition expects to take over heavy holdings from 1953 crops now subject to government loans. If the cash market price does not rise above the government loan rates, at least half of the 1953 wheat crop of 94 million bushels and 62 million bushels of grain sorghum from the three state area may be taken over to nearly fill all the warehouses in the area.

Since very little of this grain is now expected to be exported this year, a serious shortage of storage space could develop for 1954 grain crops.

The U.S.D.A. started to relieve this situation months ago by encouraging elevator men to construct more storage under a guaranteed storage program that will bring from 50-55 million more bushels space to the three state area.

Although wheat farmers generally do not like to store wheat on the farm due to cost of handling, insect and rodent problems and the danger of grain going out of condition, it is estimated that some 35 million bushels of farm storage space is available throughout Texas.

New elevator construction and the large farm storage space will materially aid farmers to "find a home for their 1954 wheat crop." However, if the wheat crop should exceed normal yields, some difficulty is anticipated for storage of wheat and certainly for the 1954 grain sorghum crop unless further elevator facilities and some additional farm storage is built.
