Feed Supply In **Texas Improves**

AUSTIN -UP- A sharply imroved feed supply has resulted in many Texas farmers and ranchers delaying fall marketing of stock to pick up increased poundage, the U.S. Department of Agriculture reported Wednesday.

In its weekly crop and weather bulletin, the USDA said winter grazing prospects from wheat and oats pastures were materially boosted in the low rolling plains by additional rains.

'Native grass in that area, the High Plains and Trans-Pecos was coming along and will make considerable feed if frost holds off," the USDA predicted. On the high plains, dusted-in wheat was reported making "excellent growth," but only "limit-

ed grazing" was expected until early November. In favored South Texas areas, new range grass was coming along fast with some already making a

seed crop. "All classes of stock were picking up on improved range feed," the USDA said.

Meantime, light showers to flooding rains interrupted field work over much of Texas. However, only scattered showers hit most of the High Plains and wheat seeding in that area passed

vill proportioned, choose a wide pelt of self or contrasting material. If you are short and stout you will want to wear a slightly narow belt of self material. Study your figure proportions

and select the best type belt for rou. A belt 3/4 to 1 inch wide of elf material is a safe choice for nost figures. This width may be ncreased or decreased according to the figure proportions, fashion, and design of the garment.

Kits for covering buckles may e obtained at notion counters, or f you prefer, have your buckle overed professionally. In either ease be sure that it is the correct ize for your belt, that it will wear well and is washable.

To hold their shape, belts should e interfaced with belting or firm nuslin. For a permanent finish, elting is preferred. Muslin and cotton belting should be pre hrunk.
