IT'S UP TO YOU By Howard E. Kershner, L.H.D.

Not until Vladimir Petrov deserted his communist masters and told the story of 21 years as a member of the International Soviet Spy Ring, did the whole story of the traitors Donald Maclean and Guy Burgess, who fled to Russia in May, 1951, become public. Maclean was head of the American section of the British Foreign Office, and Burgess had just returned from a top assignment to the British Embassy in Washington. Maclean had been in Washington from 1944 to 1948 as head of the Chancery in the British Embassy. Both men had access to top secrets in . S. and British relations. It is not necessary to scald any kind of liver. If liver is to be ground, simmer in hot water for a few minutes. This makes grinding much easier. Beef and pork liver are especially adapted to braising methods, while lamb and veal liver are easily broiled.

Utilize the distinctive flavor of liver to advantage by combining it with other foods, such as bacon mushrooms, tomatoes, onions, potatoes, carrots, etc.

Porcelain Stains Can Be Removed

Many stains on porcelain can be removed with a stiff paste made of powdered whiting mixed with kerosene or ammonia, according to Lucile King, home demonstration agent. Apply the paste liberally then rub with soft cloth. Wash with soapy water and rinse well.

Two tablespoons of kerosene added to one cup of soap jelly makes a good cleaner for sinks, bathtubs and laboratories. Add the kerosene to the jelly just before it thickens. Another cleaner for porcelain enmel is a paste made of 1/4 cup kerosene and 1 cup soda. Apply with cloth.

Rust spots can sometimes be removed with lemon juice. Apply lib-Rinse immediately with ammonia keep it out of reach of children.





Previously, cooked vegetables or squash, tomatoes, and onions are bets, while cauliflower beets, uncooked whole sweet or white potatoes are more effective

cooked on the top unit. It is a wise homemaker who plans a complete broiler meal for each time the broiler is used. Some suggestions are: Scored ham slice boiled sweet potato halves, and apple rings with marshmallow in the center. Or try salmon steaks, with cooked potato slices and to mato halves arranged around them on the broiler pan.

To utilize the drippings from meat being broiled, string beans, or canned asparagus may be placed below the broiler rack in the pan and served with the juices of the meat over them. Peaches pears, oranges, grapefruit halves apricots, pineapple rings, etc., add essential minerals and vitamins to your complete broiler meal.



Cooking Story One Of Drama

The story of cooking from the day of the open fireplace to the modern electric range is an interesting one. Up to the electric range it might be called a "hot" story, because until the electric range came along, every method of home cooking created heat which contributed nothing toward cooking the food but did its share toward keeping the kitchen hot. An open fireplace was the pio-

place, of course, did double duty as it heated the house, too. Still another disadvantage of the open fireplace was the fact that it couldn't be "plugged in,,. As a matter of fact, its fuel supply had to be carried in from the wood-

The coal stove was quite an improvement over the open fireplace. The open fireplace limited the cook to one kettle. With the coal stove you could roast as well as stew. The old problem of hauling in the fuel supply, coal, and hauling out the ashes and clinkers remained.

Next in home cooking methods was the kerosene stove. The fuel problem continued to exist, and frequent replenishment from the kerosene barrel remained necessary. Kerosene did eliminate ashes and clinkers, but it kept the bottoms of the pans black.

The gas range provided the first constant fuel supply, with the range connected directly to the gas line. No more carrying fuel to the stove. No more spilling fuel on the kitchen floor. No more fuel-flavored foods. But still the flame, and with the flame, the carbon, etc.






