

**Phillips Oil Test Plugged Back To** Joe Brown was admitted to a 6,540 Feet

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 1 E Brady, 10 miles northeast of Stratford, has been plugged back to 6,540 feet to set casing. Attempts will be made to develop the oil found from 6,417 to 6,430 feet. In a drill stem test at this level 770 feet of clean 32 degree oil was recovered with 30 feet of mud cut oil in one and one-half hours from the Mississippian formation.

Drilling into the Ellenberger formation at the location near the 7,000 foot level, the company encountered salt water.




