Four Injured In Accident

Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Davis, their daughter, Donna Mae, and Mrs. A. E. Lowe, sustained injuries in a highway accident about 33 miles northwest of Clayton, New Mexico and about 11 or 12 miles southeast of Des Moines, New Mexico about 11:30 p. m. Sunday. They were returning home from Lake City, Colorado where they had spent Sunday, after the 4-H Camp which they attended last week closed Saturday.

The injured were hospitalized in Clayton, New Mexico.

W. W. Davis was the most seriously injured, but was responding to treatment Wednesday morning. He suffered lacerations on the hip and other parts of the lower body, and his hip is out of place and pelvis fractured. He was rational Wednesday and Wednesday night was reported to be showing continued improvement.

He is being fed intravenously and given blood transfusions. Mrs. Davis has a laceration over one eye, and minor cuts and bruises. She was able to be up Wednesday.

Donna Mae Davis, age 10, has chest injuries and it is believed her liver was injured by a hard blow. She was able to eat a little food Wednesday.

Mrs. A. E. Lowe received painful cuts on the top and back of her head. She also was able to get out of bed Wednesday.

All four received minor cuts and bruises, were badly shaken up and in a state of shock for several hours following the accident.

Mrs. Davis was driving the car on a narrow stretch of pavement when the right rear tire blew out. Officers investigating the accident, judged her speed at 50 miles an hour or less. Mr. Davis, who had been sleeping in the front seat was asked by his wife to help her hold the wheel. The car struck and tore off the end of a wooden banister from a bridge and fell about 15 feet into a canyon, went through a fence and into a pasture.

Mr. and Mrs. Davis were thrown from the car. Mrs. Lowe and Donna Mae Davis were in the back seat when the car came to a standstill.

On learning of the accident relatives left Stratford about 4:30 and 5:00 a. m. Monday. Among those going to Clayton were Mr. and Mrs. Van B. Boston, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Aduddell, A. E. Lowe, Helen Lowe, Mr. and Mrs. Tommie Ed Wakefield, and E. A. Davis. Jimmy Davis, who has been employed in Tennessee, is also in Clayton with his parents and sister. Two of Mrs. Lowe's other daughters, Mrs. Opal Johnson and Mrs. Georgia LaFever, are also with their mother.

The Davis car has been appraised as a total wreck.

Phillips To Place Brady Well On Pump

Preparations are being made by the Phillips Petroleum Co. to place the Brady No. 1, 8 miles northeast of Stratford on the pump. In continued swabbings the well has a daily production of 72 barrels of 32 degree oil. It is possible the volume may increase slightly after the well has been put on the pump.

A new Phillips drilling site has been located 5 miles northeast of Stratford and the rig and equipment was moved to the location Wednesday.

Progress Report Of FHA For Past Fiscal Year

Farmers and ranchers in Texas obtained loans totaling \$51,416,000 through the Farmers Home Administration during the year ending June 30, 1956. Walter T. McKay, the agency's State Director at Dallas announced this week. A total of 18,348 families were served by the agency during this period.

Eighty-six farm families in Sherman, Moore and Hutchinson Counties obtained loans totaling \$352,715.00, Joe B. Reese, FHA County Supervisor at Dumas, reports.

Credit was advanced to buy feed, sand, fertilizer, equipment, livestock and other farm operating items need to place farms on an efficient operating basis and to buy and improve family-type farms. Funds were advanced also for soil and water conservation purposes and to meet emergency needs.

County Farmers Home Administration committeemen must approve each loan application before funds can be advanced. The committee determines all loan applicants' eligibility and certifies the value of farms to be purchased or improved. It also makes recommendations on loan approvals and servicing actions.

Applicants are approved as eligible only if other lenders cannot adequately supply their credit needs and only if prospects are favorable for their being able to improve their farming and repay their loans. Families are expected to refinance their loans with other lenders as soon as they are in a position to do so.

Price Daniel Thanks Voters For Support

Senator Price Daniel this week thanked the 622,000 Texans who gave him an overwhelming lead in the first primary race for Governor, putting him more than 162,000 votes ahead of his run-off opponent.

"This is the widest lead a candidate for Governor ever has had in a run-off," Daniel said. "I am confident that, with hard work, we can win a landslide victory on August 25."

Daniel, a native of Liberty County, maintains his family home on a small ranch near his birthplace and is a member of the REA.

As a U. S. Senator, he supported 90 per cent parity on basic crops, authored an amendment to the farm bill which placed grain sorghum supports at a comparable level as corn, and helped obtain more realistic farm credit provisions.

Daniel is advocating a statewide water and soil conservation program, and a state drouth relief program that would include loans to farmers and ranchers facing mortgage foreclosure.

His program also includes stepped-up research into proposals to create additional water supplies, such as conversion of salt water and artificial "rain-making."

Daniel said that as Governor he would "put the full power of the State Government behind the farmers and ranchers, to help them regain their fair share of the national income and to help them fight the worst drouth disaster in history."

He had been a resident of Amarillo for 30 years and was associated with the grocery business. Mr. Armstrong was a member of the San Jacinto Methodist Church and the Hedley Masonic Lodge.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday at 11:00 a. m. in Blackburn-Shaw Memorial Chapel with Dr. H. Clyde Smith, San Jacinto Methodist pastor, officiating.

Rev. Charles Gates, pastor of the Methodist Church in Stratford, conducted the last rites in a simultaneous service at the A. J. Armstrong home in Stratford, as ill health prevented Mr. Armstrong from attending his father's funeral.

Masonic graveside rites were conducted at Llano Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Price Read Armstrong; two sons, A. J. of Stratford and Bryan of Clarendon; three daughters, Mrs. C. O. Baldwin of Lubbock, Mrs. Orville Keaton of Greeley, Colorado and Mrs. W. S. Sunday Was Hottest Day Of Summer

Three Rodeos At Celebration

Complete Plans For Experimental Wheat Plantings

Stratford High School Agriculture Department announces that preliminary plans for the irrigation experiment plot to be located on the James Craig farm, have been completed.

Marvin Jensen and Al Pope, both research men from the Amarillo Experiment Station, were in Stratford last week to aid Duard Lamb and James Craig in working out the details of the experiment. Jensen is an irrigation specialist, and Pope is a fertilizer specialist. Kenneth Porter, wheat specialist with the Amarillo Experiment Station is expected to take part in the development of the plot.

The 20-acre experiment plot is located 28 miles south and east of Stratford near the James Craig farmstead. The distance to the plot, will be offset somewhat, in as much as there is pavement all the way from Stratford to the demonstration.

Fertilization, variety tests, time of water application and introduction of new Crockett Wheat, are the four phases of wheat research to be conducted during the 1956-57 crop year.

The fertilization experiment will consist of three five acre plots. Plot number one will be seeded to Concho Wheat. Varieties for plots 2 and 3 have not been selected. Each of the three five acre plots will be divided into three fertilizer plots. One-third of each plot will receive no fertilizer, one-third of each plot will receive 50 pounds of Nitrogen per acre, while the remainder of the plot will receive 100 pounds of Nitrogen per acre. This same fertilization schedule will be carried out on each of the three five acre plots.

Of interest to all irrigation farmers, will be the wheat watering demonstration. As a check, one area of the plot will be watered on a minimum watering schedule, possibly three or four times during the entire growing season. An adjacent area of the plot, will be watered on a maximum watering schedule. The purpose of this demonstration, is to determine what effect the number of waterings might have on the yield. Some of the wheat will be watered at different stages of growth to determine what effect this might also have on the yield.

A moisture meter will be used to determine the regularity of watering the maximum irrigated plots. Gypsum blocks will be buried in the maximum irrigated plots before planting of the wheat. These block will have an extension to the surface of the ground, to which the moisture meter can be attached. Since Gypsum has the same holding capacity as soil, we can at any time determine the amount of moisture in the soil, by attaching the moisture meter to the Gypsum block and reading its moisture content. The expense of such an operation would rule out its use on a large basis. However, on small plots such as will be in operation, we can obtain valuable information on the watering of wheat. The cost of the moisture meter is \$87.00. The blocks will be made at the Amarillo Experiment Station at a cost of \$2.00 each. Several blocks will be buried in the experimental plot.

concentrated fertilization experiment on the farm. His demonstration will be about one acre in size. He plans to apply many, different applications of fertilizer, possibly up to 120 pounds of nitrogen per acre. Even though his plots will be small in size he expects to gain much valuable information from the test.

The Stratford chapter of the Future Farmers of America, has for the last three years, helped Kenneth Porter with his dry-land variety tests. This year, they are adding irrigated variety tests. This plot will also be located on the Craig farm.

Marvin Jensen will furnish research data on the irrigation of the plot. Concrete irrigation pipe has been installed, making it possible to water the entire plot in two days.

Through local research, much can be learned about the watering and fertilization of wheat. One plot, and one year's work, can't answer all the questions, but it's a start toward what might give many of the answers.

There's Danger About!

We're in a National Traffic Emergency Which Threatens Our Health and Wealth

We're in the midst of a national traffic emergency. It threatens the life, limb and pocketbook of every one of us.

The traffic fatality problem is not confined to the congested larger cities. In fact, three times as many persons are killed in rural areas and in towns under 2,500 population than in the larger cities. The highest rural death totals are recorded in July, August, September and October.

The awesome outlook is that within the next 12 months you or some one of each of four drivers in your neighborhood is marked statistically to be in an automobile accident.

Within the next 10 years one of every four families can expect to be stunned by the news that a loved one has been hurt, crippled, maimed, disfigured for life or killed in a traffic smashup.

Traffic injury expectancy, according to safety engineers, for the Kemper Insurance group, indicates that few children today can expect to go through life without being hurt—yes, hurt—in a motoring mishap.

Frightening, you say? Apparently not frightening enough. Last year more time, effort, money and energy was expended than during any previous year to stop the slaughter on our streets. And what happened?

We killed 38,300 of our fellow citizens—2,300 more than the previous year — and an estimated 1,500,000 received injuries.

The economic loss was more than \$4 billion, or enough to reduce the income tax of every family about \$100.

This year we're putting even more money, time and extra effort into solving our traffic problem than last year. But instead of getting better the picture is worse.

Homicide on the highway is hitting an alarming record pace in 1956. At the rate we're going so far this year, 42,000 Americans will die violently in traffic—the highest total in our history.

Sometime within the next five or so years, we're likely to pass the 50,000 mark in violent traffic deaths.

Accident pressures are mounting steadily as more and more high-powered cars roll off the production lines each year on to our already overcrowded streets and highways.

Twenty years ago about 27,000,000 motor vehicles were registered in the country. This year the figure is more than 60,000,000 and it's going up daily.

Meanwhile, our highway system has become woefully inadequate. Very little road building went on during World War II and during the early postwar years. Despite the high pitch of current activities on the local, state and federal levels, it will be many years—if ever—before our highway facilities can be considered adequate, authorities assert.

haven't we made any progress

in the war against traffic accidents? Yes, we have. But it's been strictly on the statistical side.

This so-called progress can be seen in what is called the "traffic death rate" which is based on 100,000,000 miles of motor vehicle travel. In 1936 the death rate was 15.1. In 1954 it dropped to a low of 6.4. Last year, it remained at 6.4.

In terms of actual lives lost, however, we Americans have worked feverishly to stop this slaughter, but have been unable to hold the line. Although the death rate per million miles has been going down, the number of persons killed has been going upward for the past 13 years.

Through all the carnage the public has been strangely apathetic. Sure, everyone knows we have a problem and recognizes the threat. But the killing continues.

It's going to continue—and get worse—until you, your friends and your neighbors get alarmed at the threat to you, personally, and get angry enough to demand a solution, to insist on one and to join in efforts to stop this highway carnage.

In the remaining articles in this special emergency series, we will explode some of the phony ideas that have handicapped the traffic safety drive and we will present facts that will help you decide what you can do to save your own life and the lives of your loved ones.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9 proposing an Amendment to Section 11 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding the new subsection to be designated as Section 11a, relating to denial of bail to a person charged with a felony less than capital who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people and for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 11 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a subsection thereto to be known as Section 11a and to read as follows:

"Section 11a. Any person accused of a felony less than capital in this State, who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony, the second conviction being subsequent to the first, both in point of time of commission of the offense and conviction theretofore may, after a hearing, and upon evidence substantially showing the guilt of the accused, be denied bail pending trial, by any judge of a court of record or magistrate in this State; provided, however, that if the accused is not accorded a trial upon the accusation within sixty (60) days from the time of his incarceration upon such charge, the order denying bail shall be automatically set aside, unless a continuance is obtained upon the motion or request of the accused; provided, further, that the right of appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals of this State is expressly accorded the accused for a review of any judgment or order made hereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a court, judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two (2) previous felonies."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a court, judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two (2) previous felonies."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 15-a, requiring medical or psychiatric testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of trial by jury where the person under inquiry has not been charged with commission of a criminal offense.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows:

"Section 15-a. No person shall be committed as a person of unsound mind except on competent medical or psychiatric testimony. The Legislature may enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for a waiver of trial by jury, in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, by the concurrence of the person under inquiry, or his next of kin, and an attorney ad litem appointed by a judge of either the County or Probate Court of the county where the trial is being held, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney ad litem."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney ad litem."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machines in such manner that each voter shall vote on the machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Three Methods For Killing Crab Grass

There are three methods of killing crab grass with applications of herbicides:

One method utilizes chemicals that will kill crab grass plants during germination. However, crab grass plants do not germinate all at once. While most of the seeds germinate in the spring, some germination will take place throughout the summer, even as late as September. Consequently, such herbicides must be applied at repeated intervals during the summer to insure adequate control.

A second method is to apply a selective herbicide on the lawn

which will kill the growing crab grass plants without excessive injury to turf grasses. Desirable broad leaf turf plants such as dichondra are seriously injured by most of this type of selective herbicide. Many grasses are discolored and some, such as bent grasses, are injured by them.

A third method is to kill the crab grass seeds before they germinate without injury to desirable turf grasses or dichondra.

One of the oldest pre-emergent herbicides of the third type used to control crab grass is lead arsenate.

one international problem at the moment. I hope there will be some order out of the present confusion by the time this letter reaches you, but I am afraid that the problem is too serious under present circumstances to be settled quickly. The news commentators and columnists have had a field day on this particular subject. Each of them seem to have different advice to Secretary of State Dulles as to how the problem should be solved. Frankly, I sympathize with Mr. Dulles on this particular issue. It is a tough

one. In fact, it is the toughest one that Mr. Dulles has come up against since serving as Secretary of State. Much of the information that he has on the subject is classified and, therefore, withheld from the public on the theory that its release would prove more detrimental than beneficial to the best interests of this country. Mr. Dulles is burdened with having to make decisions on this subject matter that may well bring much criticism on him. Let us all hope that he makes the right decisions.

Some officials, writers and other analysts of foreign affairs here have taken the position that this Suez Canal issue is not primarily the responsibility of this country. Literally speaking, this might be true, because we do not own the Suez Canal Company or stock in it. But let us not be naive to the extent that we tell ourselves that the United States does not have a stake in this situation. In fact, a great deal is at stake, materially and otherwise. Many people think that the Canal would never have been seized if this country and England had provided the loan for the present Ruler of Egypt — Nasser — to construct the Eswan Dam on the Nile River. It presently appears that the Aswan Dam matter was a political chess game between this country and Britain on the one side, and Russia on the other. The U. S. - British Team concluded that Russia did not intend to furnish the money for this project. They then served notice on Nasser that the money would not be available from the United States and Britain. It was generally thought that Nasser had strengthened his position of leadership with his people by selling them on the probability of the dam being built. Hence, when construction funds were denied him, his entire Administration was at stake. Some of the analysts feel that Russia did not take the position of absolute refusal of funds to Nas-

ser, but suggested that it would be much better for the Nasser government and the people of Egypt if the Aswan Dam was financed at home. Suggesting further that the Suez Canal was located wholly within the territorial boundaries of Egypt and could well provide sufficient revenue to finance the Dam. That if Egypt should seize the Canal, it would then have the wherewithal to build the Aswan Dam. That the end result would be ownership by Egypt of both the Canal and the Dam. Whether or not this took place is conjectural, but it is a certainty that Nasser seized the Canal and then told his people that Egypt would build the As-

wan Dam and finance it by revenues from the Suez Canal. Expropriation of property is a practice that is looked upon in this country as a crime. If our government needs private property, it proceeds to acquire the same by the exercise of the right of eminent domain. This proceeding, of course, requires the government to pay the fair value of the property taken. Such is not the case when property is expropriated. Most of you will recall the expropriation by the Mexican Government of all of its oil fields just a few years ago. Whether it is legal right or wrong seems to depend upon where you happen to be at the time.

WASHINGTON NEWS — TWO... Egypt will, no doubt use the expropriation of Arab lands in setting up the State of Israel, and the subsequent support of such action by the Western World as a precedent for her action in seizing the Canal. Also, the several actions subsequent to World War II when a certain country was permitted to expropriate and deport, not only property, but persons. Certainly two wrongs or two mistakes do not make a right, but this will not deter the peoples in these

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 46 proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the Oath of Office to include appointive officers of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1: That Section 1 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"I, _____, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly or indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected. So help me God."

The Secretary of State, and all other appointed officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:

"I, _____, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly or indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward to secure my appointment or the confirmation thereof. So help me God."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

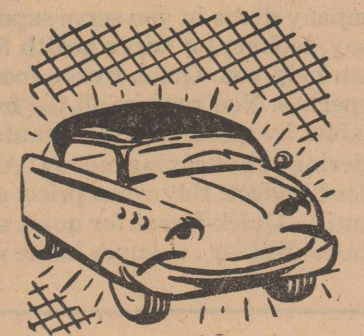
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing the form of the Oaths of Office for elective and appointive officers of the State."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
