PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9 proposing an Amendment to Section 11 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new subsection to be designated Section 11a, relating to denial of bail to a person charged with a felony less than capital who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people and for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a subsection thereto to be known as Section 11a and to read as follows:

"Section 11a. Any person accused of a felony less than capital in this State, who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony, the second conviction being subsequent to the first, both in point of time of commission of the offense and conviction therefor may, after a hearing, and upon evidence substantially showing the guilt of the accused, be denied bail pending trial, by any judge of a court of record or magistrate in this State; provided, however, that if the accused is not accorded a trial upon the within sixty (60) days from the time of his incarceration upon such charge, the order denying bail shall be automatically null and void unless a continuance is obtained upon the motion or request of the accused; provided, further, that the right of appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals of this State is expressly secured to the accused for a review of any judgment or order made hereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a court, judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two (2) previous felonies."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a court, judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two (2) previous felonies."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

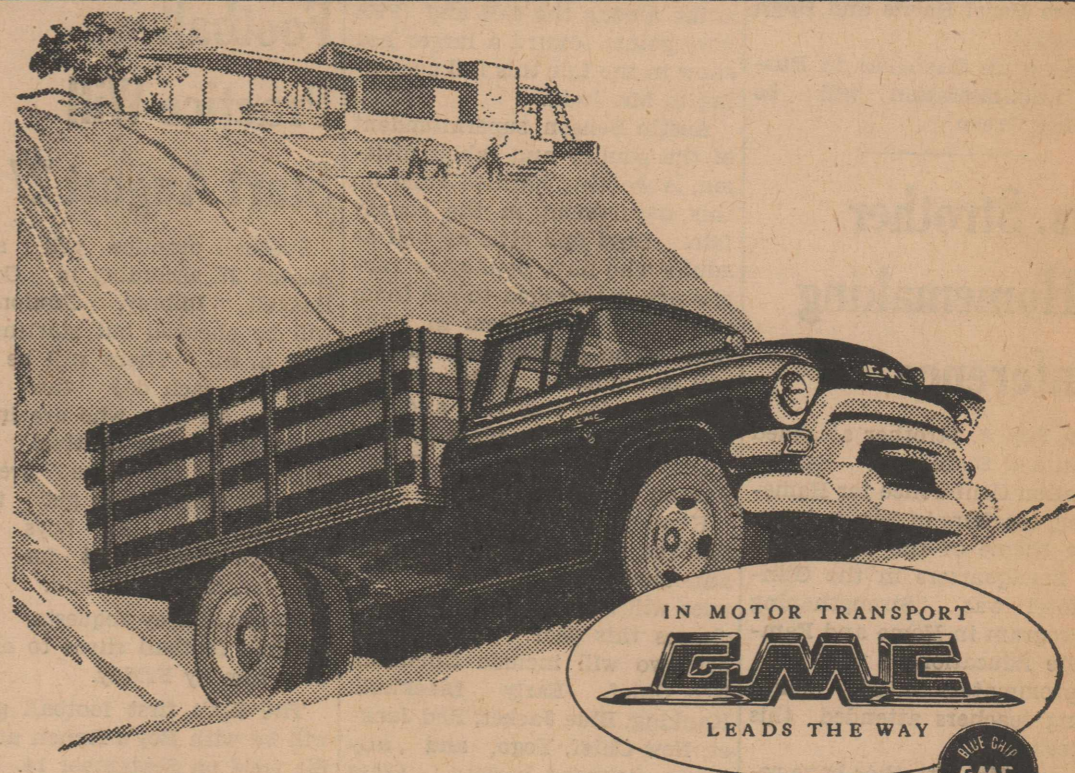

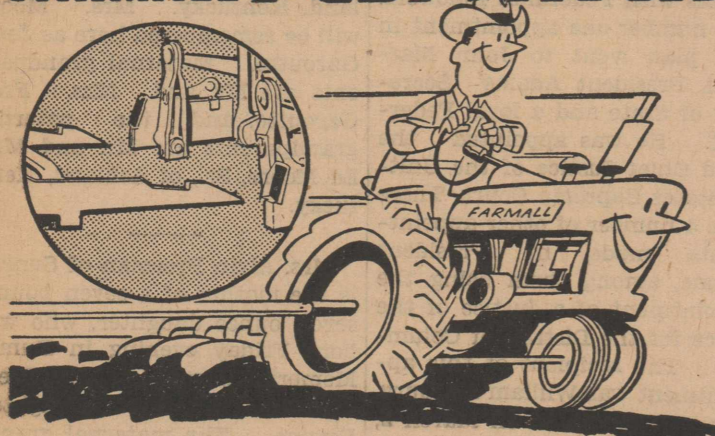

Rodent Control Man To Visit Sherman County

County Agent E. Goule announces that T. J. Sparks of the Rodent Control Service is expected in the county within the next few days. Any ranchmen having prairie dogs that they would like to have poisoned should notify the county agent's office so Mr. Sparks can get in contact with them while he is here.

Mr. Sparks with the help of two men can treat a large dog town with poison grain and then he usually cleans up the dog town with poison gas. His work has been very satisfactory in the county in the past, getting as high as 98 to 100% control in many cases.

Mr. Sparks will spend whatever time necessary to clean up the county and then move on to other areas. He works the western part of Texas and comes into the Panhandle area in the fall of the year.

Ranchmen are encouraged to take advantage of this supervised rodent control service while Mr. Sparks is available in the county.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 15-a, requiring medical or psychiatric testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of trial by jury where the person under inquiry has not been charged with commission of a criminal offense.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows: "Section 15-a. No person shall be committed as a person of unsound mind except on competent medical or psychiatric testimony. The Legislature may enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for a waiver of trial by jury, in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, by the concurrence of the person under inquiry, or his next of kin, and an attorney ad litem appointed by a judge of either the County or Probate Court of the county where the trial is being held, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

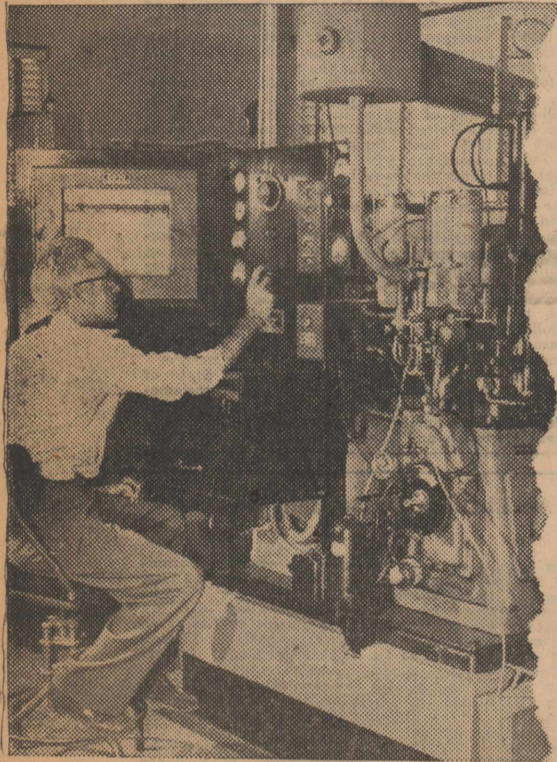
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney ad litem."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney ad litem."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on voter machines in such manner that each voter shall vote on the machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

bury vs. Madison, with which all students of the law are familiar.

Since the Supreme Court's power to take original jurisdiction in cases is limited to a very narrowly defined class of cases, there was much discussion about Marbury having filed his suit in the Supreme Court rather than a trial court. The filing of the case in the Supreme Court created a situation whereby John Marshall, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, was called upon to decide whether or not the Court could compel James Madison, Secretary of State, to issue a commission that Chief Justice John Marshall, while serving as Secretary of State John Marshall, had neglected to issue.

Since the Marbury case was clearly outside of the original jurisdiction of the Supreme Court, the normal procedure would have been for the Court to decline to hear the case and permit the complainant to file his suit in a proper court. However, for some reason, Chief Justice Marshall brought into the picture the Judiciary Act of 1789, an Act to control the procedures in federal courts. He indicated that, although the Supreme Court could not hear the Marbury case under the Constitution restrictions, there were provisions in the Judiciary Act, a statute passed by Congress, that would permit the Supreme Court to hear the case. He then proceeded to hold that, because according to his conclusions the Judiciary Act was in conflict with the Constitution, the Judiciary Act became unconstitutional and therefore void. This action on the part of Chief Justice Marshall has been interpreted as a master stroke of a devoted advocate to centralized government. It created the doctrine that the Supreme Court had the power to declare Acts of Congress unconstitutional. Power which was bitterly opposed by Jefferson's followers.

Had John Marshall held against Jefferson's followers on the Marbury case and had entered a judgment requiring Madison to issue Marbury a commission, there was a strong chance that Marshall might have been impeached. Many thought that Marshall realized this and thereupon conceived his idea of not endangering his position as Chief Justice, but at the same time, creating a strong weapon in the hands of advocates of centralized government. This approach left the Jefferson followers in the position of having won the Marbury case for which they could not complain, but of having had to accept, as a thorn with the roses so to speak, the establishment of a doctrine that vested the Supreme Court with final veto powers on all legislative actions. It is interesting to note that in the 35 years that John Marshall served as Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, he never again declared an Act of Congress unconstitutional.

It is also well to remember in this connection that as matters now stand, the laws passed by the duly elected officials of this land are in a strange position. Yet, a treaty between this country and a foreign country, written and entered into by the Executive Branch of the govern-

ment and duly approved by the Senate, is on a parity with, if not superior to, the Constitution. But in any event as the law presently stands, the laws passed by the Congress are subservient to such treaties, as well as the Constitution, so you can imagine how far down this puts the laws of the several states.

Texas Capitol Highlights

(By Vern Sanford)
The eyes of Texas are on Chicago this week. And, politically speaking, the state nestles in one man's pocket.

Sen. Lyndon Johnson heads the 112-member Texas delegation, each of whom will cast one-half vote of the state's 56 nominating votes. They are pledged to support him as a favorite son nominee until he releases them.

Thereafter they will vote under the unit rule, probably for whatever candidate is favored by Senator Johnson. All delegates and the 70 alternates were selected by the May convention with the senator's approval.

Another Texan, Speaker Sam Rayburn, figures prominently in convention affairs. He will be presiding over a presidential convention for the third time.

September Convention In Doubt
Who will win out and how at the September State Democratic Convention is a subject of heated debate.

Actual outcome will not be known until the meeting gets under way in Fort Worth. Rival conservative and liberal delegations will struggle for nearly 600 seats. Convention control

hangs on these places.

Precinct and county conventions named some 577 definitively liberal delegates, about 224 conservatives. But neither side can control the 1900-vote convention without the contested seats.

Mrs. Kathleen Voight of San Antonio, liberal leader, charged last week the conservative executive committee planned to "steal" the convention. She asked that the May state convention, which was recessed rather than adjourned, be reconvened to take charge of the situation.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 61-c, providing that the Legislature may grant aid and compensation to persons who have been fined or imprisoned under the laws of this State for offenses of which they are not guilty.

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto another Section, to be designated as Section 61-c, which shall read as follows:
"Section 61-c. The Legislature may grant aid and compensation to any person who has heretofore paid a fine or served a sentence in prison, or who may hereafter pay a fine or serve a sentence in prison, under the laws of this State for an offense for which he or she is not guilty, under such regulations and limitations as the Legislature may deem expedient."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all of the ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to grant aid and compensation to persons who have paid fines or have served prison sentences under the laws of this State for offenses of which they are not guilty."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to grant aid and compensation to persons who have paid fines or have served prison sentences under the laws of this State for offenses of which they are not guilty."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the Oath of Office to include appointive officers of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1, of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1. Members of the Legislature, and all other elected officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation: 'I, _____, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly nor indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected. So help me God.'

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing the form of the Oaths of Office for elective and appointive officers of the State."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

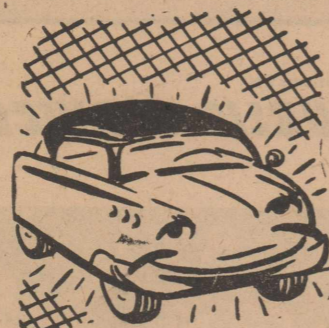
