## Ninth Jamboree Opens Friday

Stratford's ninth Jamboree Celebration and County Fair opens Friday. Entertainment will include three rodeo performances, a carnival, modern dance, bathing beauty contest, swimming and diving exhibitions, trampoline and foot balancing acts, the grand parade, an old fashioned barbecue, an enlarged county fair, a reunion of the Stratford Alumni, and a jamboree grab bag sale.

### Fair Opens Friday

The two-day county fair opens at 9:00 o'clock Friday morning. The fair building doors will remain open until 10:00 p. m. Friday. They open at 9:00 a. m. Saturday and will remain open until 6:00 p. m.

### Rodeo Opens Friday

The three day rodeo with performances from 2:00 to 5:00 p. m., opens its first show Friday. Top rodeo hands from several states plan to take part in the show. Jimmy Milam will direct the rodeo and stock will be furnished by Alec Long of Roswell, New Mexico. Top place winners will take home \$500.00 in prize money from the 3-day show. Contest events include bronc riding, bareback riding, bull riding, calf roping and double mugging.

A girl's barrel race will be an added attraction, with contestants working for the jackpot purse and a hand-made leather belt.

Belt buckles will be given top winners in each major rodeo event and a belt buckle will also be given to the best all-around cowboy. Hand-made leather belts will be given to fourth place winners.

### Kid Cowhands Work Saturday

A greased pig race for youngsters of the ages from 5 to 10 will be staged during the rodeo Saturday. Mothers of kid cowhands are warned to dress the contestants in old clothes.

Boys in the age range of 10 to 14, will have an opportunity to participate in the Saturday rodeo to win a beef calf in the calf scramble that will be staged.

### Water Show Friday

The Amazing Monahans will appear in a water show at the indoor pool from 6:30 to 7:30 p. m. Friday. Fancy diving and skin diving exhibitions will be given.

At 7:30 p. m. Friday the Amazing Monahans will move to the football field to entertain the crowd with trampoline acrobatics and the only American Risley act in the world. Ronald Munn, 17 years old, and the youngest to win the trampoline championship, will be among the performers. This performance will continue until 8:15 p. m.

Munn will be assisted in the trampoline acts by Bobby Clark and Joseph Castein. Nancy Hannon will be the fancy diving star and seven year old Jack Seeds will be among the skin diving performers. Others scheduled to appear in the water show are Ronald Munn, Don Berg, John Brown and Les Kilgore, their trainer.

## 478 Students Enrolled In Stratford School

Homer A. Cranmer, age 60, father of Mrs. Harold Baker, passed away early Sunday in his home in Amarillo.

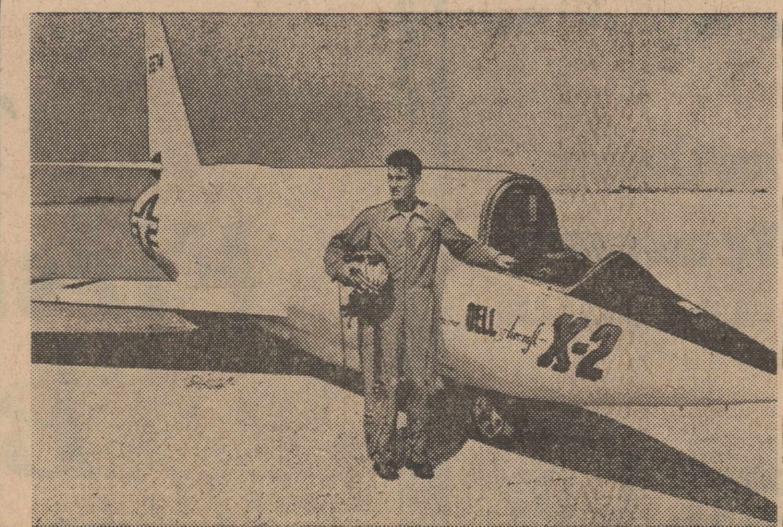

morning. The cattle department will accept entries Saturday morning. Gophers seldom, if ever, climb trees; eastern woodchuck will occasionally stretch out on a low limb, though.

An increase of entries in the livestock and poultry divisions of the fair is expected this year. Beef cattle will be displayed Saturday only. Swine, poultry and rabbits will be shown at the Fair both Friday and Saturday. Wheat, grain sorghum and truck farm exhibits of vegetables and fruit will swell the entries in this section of the

fair. P. J. Pronger, Jr., superintendent of the beef cattle, announces that cattle will be on display at the fair barn Saturday, September 8, only. The breeding stock and club calves are to be in place by 8:00 a. m. Saturday morning and judging will

start at 9:30 a. m. Mr. Pronger announced that there is a large increase in the number of entries in the club calf division this year. Cash prizes are offered both club members and adults. Mr. Pronger would like to encourage all of the local breeders to enter livestock in the adult class.

Arthur Judd, superintendent of the swine department, announced that the hogs would be exhibited both Friday and Saturday at the fair this fall. The entries should be in place Friday, September 7, at 8:00 a. m. and judging will start at 10:00 a. m. Increased interest in swine among the 4-H and FFA boys points toward a larger hog show in the fair this fall according to Mr. Judd.

Austin Benson, superintendent of the poultry and rabbit division, is working hard to build up this department in the county fair. Boys and girls as well as adults who have poultry or rabbits are encouraged to get them ready and enter them in the fair. The poultry and rabbits will be exhibited both Friday and Saturday this year and all entries must be in place by 8:00 a. m. Friday, September 7, Mr. Benson announced.

Kenneth Kendrick, superintendent of the wheat division, announced that all wheat entries will be divided into two classes this year. Class number two will include Chiefkan, Red Chief, Early Blackhull, Kanking, Blue Jacket, Red Jacket, New Chief, Yogo, and any other slickhead variety. Class number 1 includes any variety not included in Class number two.

The standard weight of a sample of wheat exhibited at the fair is eight pounds. This is a dry year and in order to make a good showing in the wheat division all of the club members and adults who harvested wheat this year are encouraged to enter a sample in

the fair. John Steel, superintendent of the grain sorghum division, announces that there will be no change in the grain sorghum class at the fair this fall but two classes for corn will be added. He would like to encourage more entries in this department; especially would he like to see samples of all the different hybrid as well as improved standard varieties grown in the county entered this fall. Any samples from a new crop grown in the county will be welcomed.

Floyd Brannan, superintendent of the garden and fruit division, announced that there would be no changes in the classes in this division of the fair this fall. This department has been expanding very rapidly as the fair has grown from

year to year and Mr. Brannan wants to encourage even wider participation by the youth and adults in the county. With irrigation, many truck farm patches have been added to the varieties of vegetables grown in the county and he would like to encourage more people to bring their fruits and vegetables to the fair.

Boys, girls and adults who are interested and plan to make entries in the county fair are encouraged to contact the superintendent of the department at the fair barn when they bring in their entries.

Each of the above superintendents will be in their department at the fair barn or have someone there to accept exhibits in all but the cattle department Thursday afternoon and Friday

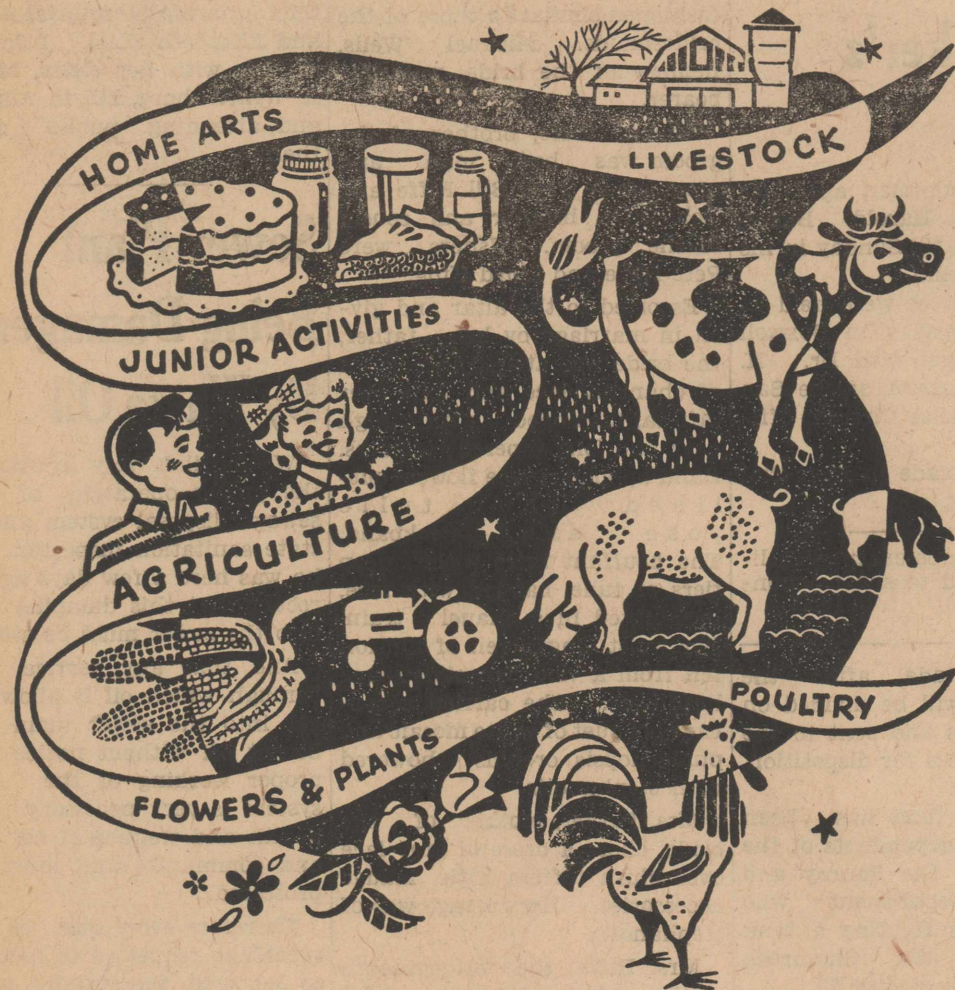

Legionnaires, business and professional men, farmers and ranchmen will man the serving lines, serving the crowd with the finest seasoned barbecue of the year, especially prepared by men who devote their time to barbecuing meat as a hobby, the only type of work in which a man puts out more effort than in that of his chosen vocation.

## SOIL BANK INFORMATION DISCLOSED

Producers were informed of the features of the 1957 Soil Bank program at a meeting held in the courthouse Wednesday afternoon.

To place acreage in the 1957 program, the operator will have to sign up by September 21. Payment rate will be based on the individual normal farm yield multiplied by \$1.17, the county rate. Individual yields have been established by the community and county committees, on a 10-year yield base, established on the years 1946 through 1955.

The 1957 soil bank program has the same compliance requirements as those in the present program. The acreage cannot be grazed from January 1, 1957 through December 31, 1957, and a crop cannot be harvested from the designated land. The operator must control noxious weeds. Wheat will be eligible for planting on the designated acreage as a cover crop, but must be destroyed in the spring at a date to be established.

One important change in the program is that if the county allocation of funds is more than enough to cover all agreements filed at the specified maximum, 50% of the wheat acreage allotment or 50 acres, whichever is larger. Producers who have indicated a desire to place more than the maximum in the acreage reserve will be permitted to do so, subject to the limitation of funds.

The final date for entering into the 1957 acreage reserve agreement is September 21, 1956. Applications will be approved by

the committee on a "first come, first served" basis.

The conservation reserve part of the soil bank is a long term program to divert land that is regularly used in crop rotation to conservation uses, by assisting in establishing conservation practices and by making annual payments for land placed in this program. Land designated under this program cannot be cropped or grazed during the life of the contract. It is anticipated that the annual payment rate for Sherman County will be approximately \$10.00 per acre.

To participate in this program for 1956, contracts must be signed by October 15. For 1957 the final sign-up date is March 15.

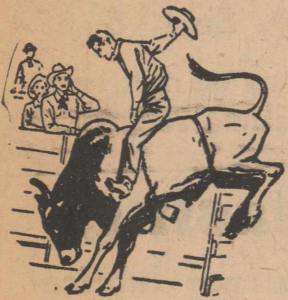

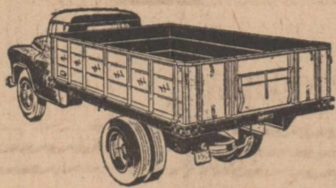

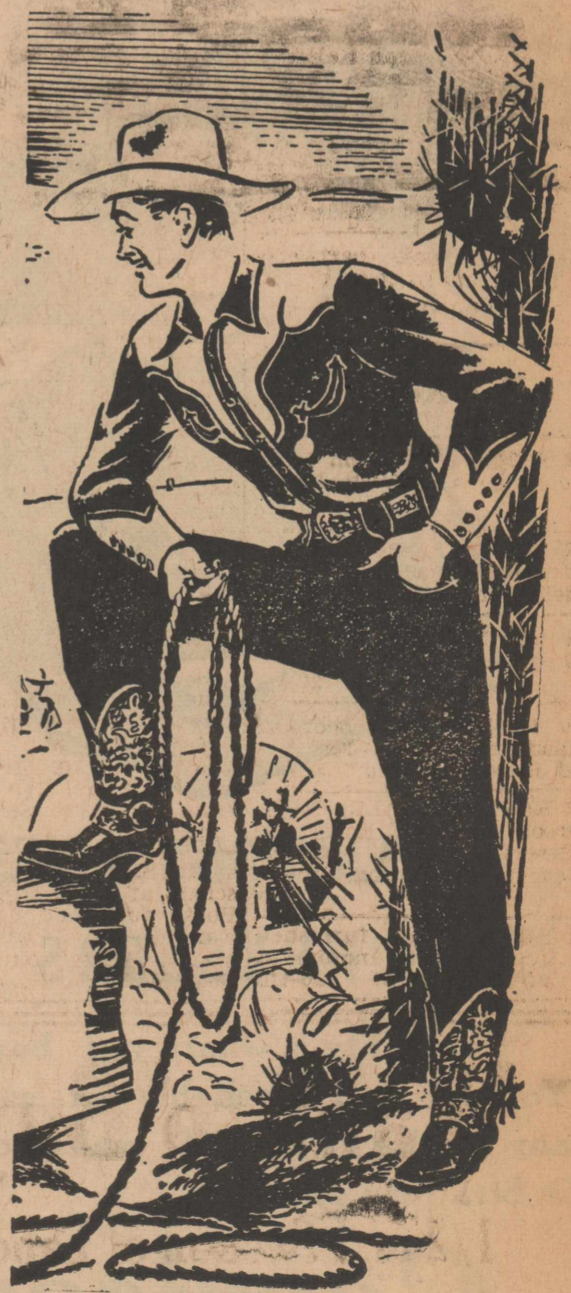

### SIMPLE, INEXPENSIVE DEVICE OFFERS 'ROUND-THE-CLOCK PROTECTION FOR BABY CHICKS

Poultry raisers can now go to bed secure in the knowledge that the safety of their baby chicks is guarded by a new protective warning device which rings an alarm bell should there be a temporary interruption of the flow of electricity.

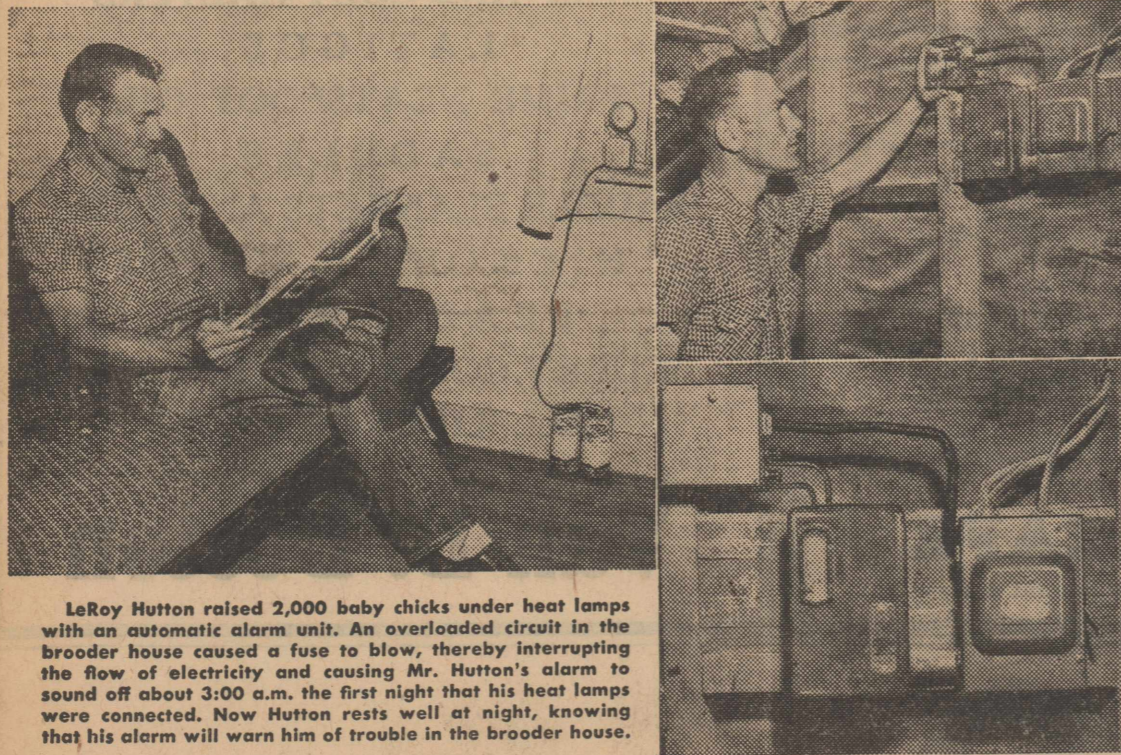
Brooding with electric heat lamps is recognized as

a superior method of providing life-giving heat to baby chicks, and this new warning device creates still another advantage to the use of electricity. Under no other brooding method can such protection be installed with such simplicity and with such inexpensive outlay of cash.

Here's how it works: The device pictured rings an alarm bell awakening the farmer who can then take measures to protect his baby chicks. Necessary to its operation is the self-contained

mechanism which trips the alarm bell, the bell, and two ordinary A batteries. In another device available, the bell is contained within the tripper housing. Regular electric wire of proper size must be used to connect these devices to the electric circuit. Chicken raisers who might wish to build their own alarm device can do so through the use of an electro-magnet which will "break" whenever current fails to flow through it, thereby triggering the alarm system.

Although LeRoy Hutton's brooder alarm is home made, when he saw the manufactured unit illustrated, his first words were, "Where can I buy one for my hens?" So impressed was he that he didn't even inquire as to the cost. However, the units are inexpensive and can be purchased for about \$10.00.



LeRoy Hutton raised 2,000 baby chicks under heat lamps with an automatic alarm unit. An overloaded circuit in the brooder house caused a fuse to blow, thereby interrupting the flow of electricity and causing Mr. Hutton's alarm to sound off about 3:00 a.m. the first night that his heat lamps were connected. Now Hutton rests well at night, knowing that his alarm will warn him of trouble in the brooder house.
