Oven Barbecued Chicken
(Serves 4-5)
1 frying chicken, cut up
2 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped celery
1/4 cup chopped green pepper
1 cup catchup
1 cup water
2 tablespoon worcestershiresauce
2 tablespoons brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon pepper
Coat chicken with 3/4 cup flour mixed with 2 teaspoons salt and brown in 1/2 cup hot lard. As pieces are browned, arrange them in casserole. Saute onion in butter until clear. Add all other ingredients and bring to a boil. Pour over chicken. Cover and bake in a moderate (350° F.) oven for about an hour or until tender.

1957 Wheat Soil Bank Program Available

The Acreage Reserve program now available for participation by farmers for their 1957 winter wheat crop is the second of four such programs authorized for wheat and other "basic" crops, according to R. C. Buckles, Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. Winter wheat growers who wish to take part in the 1957 program should call at the County ASC office and sign an agreement by September 21, 1956. The Acreage Reserve agreement must be signed not only by the farm operator, but also, if the operator is a share-tenant, by each person who as owner or landlord has control of the Acreage Reserve land or who is to receive compensation under the agreement. Provision is made for properly protecting the interests of tenants and sharecroppers under the program.

The Soil Bank legislation, enacted late this spring, authorizes such a program for basic crops over a 4-year period, that is, through 1959. Each acreage reserve agreement, however, covers the particular crop for only one year at a time.

Chairman Buckles explains that the whole purpose of the Soil Bank's wheat Acreage Reserve is to help farmers reduce the acreage of wheat below acreage allotments, thereby reducing excessive supplies of the crop. Land "reserved" under the Acreage Reserve may not be cropped or grazed for the period of the contract. For this reduction in his wheat acreage, the farmer receives a payment to offset the income he would otherwise have received from the diverted acres. Placing wheat in the Acreage Reserve will not reduce future wheat acreage allotments.

Farmers who wish to divert land from the production of tilled crops to a conservation use may also designate acreage for inclusion in the Conservation Reserve for periods of up to 10 years. For this, they may receive two types of payment: An annual payment for "reserving" the land from production, and a payment for the first year of the contract covering a substantial part of the cost of carrying out an approved conservation practice on the land. It is anticipated that detailed information concerning the Conservation Reserve program will be available in the County ASC office during the latter part of this month.

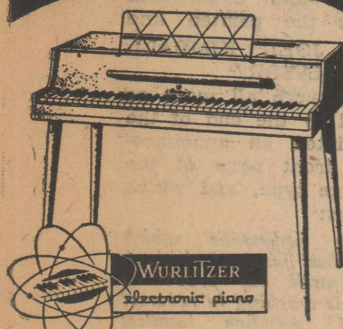

Did you know the Stratford School Cafeteria served 62,494 meals to students and 5,184 meals to adults last school year, making a total of 67,678 meals. Did you know the School Cafeteria serves type A meals. This means a meat or meat substitute (meat substitute not over once a week), two vegetables, salad, bread and butter, dessert and milk. Check the menus each week.

Do you know your child has as opportunity to eat a well balanced meal for 25c each day, a hot, well cooked meal, in your school cafeteria?

Encourage your child to clean his plate, drink his milk each day.

The menus for the Stratford school cafeteria will be printed in the Stratford Star each week so that parents will know what their children are being served each day and the mothers can plan their home menus so as not to have repetition of meals.

Monday, Sept. 17, sliced baked ham, sweet potatoes, apple casserole, corn, tossed salad, hot rolls, butter, pecan crunch ice cream, and milk.

Tuesday, Sept. 18, meat balls, chili sauce, carrot-raisin salad, hot rolls, butter, chocolate pudding, and milk.

Wednesday, Sept. 19, pinto beans, pork, spinach, onions, cabbage - apple - marshmallow salad, corn bread, butter, chocolate cake, and milk.

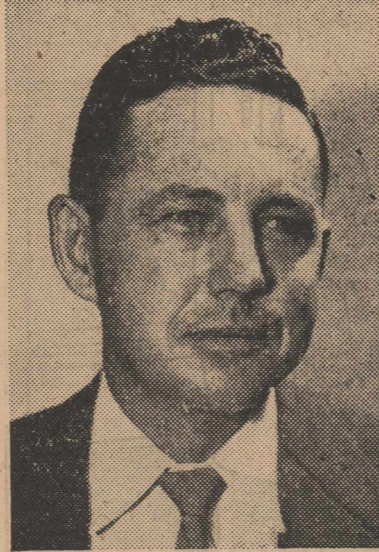

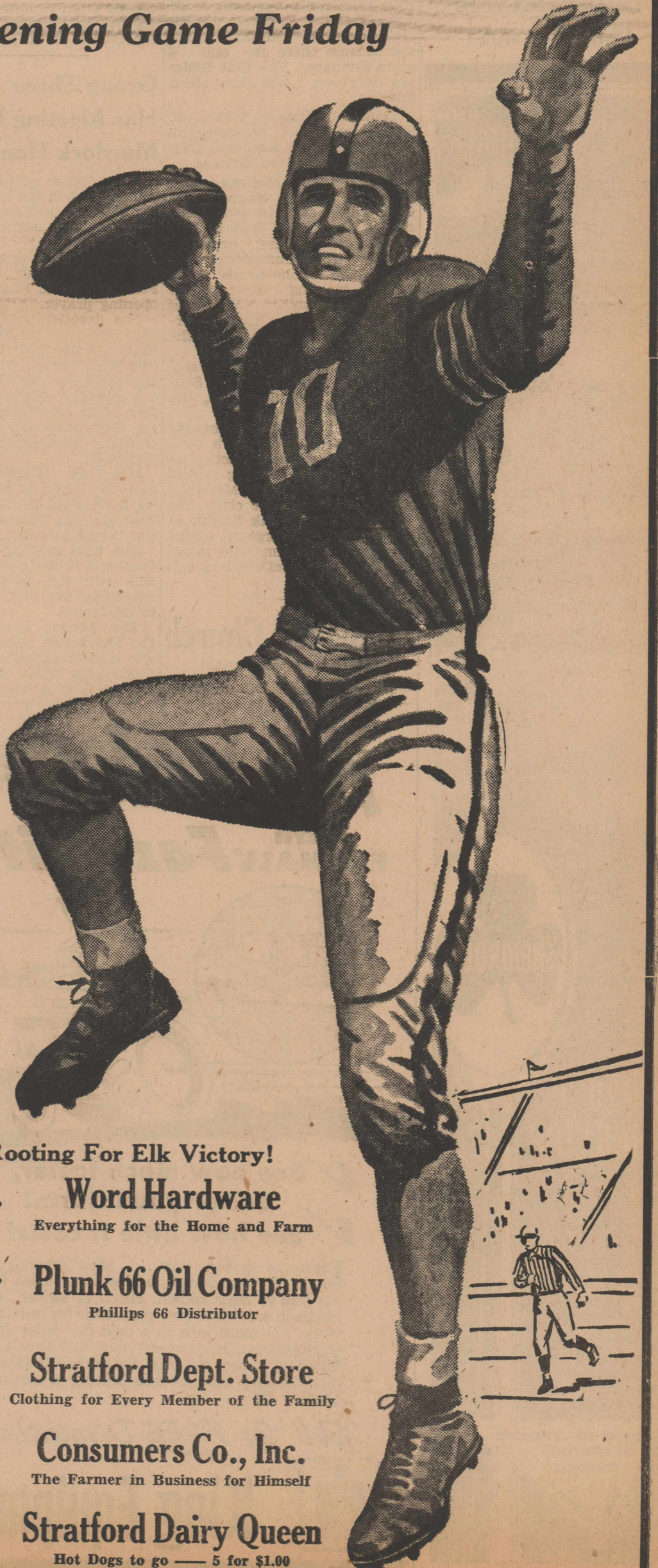

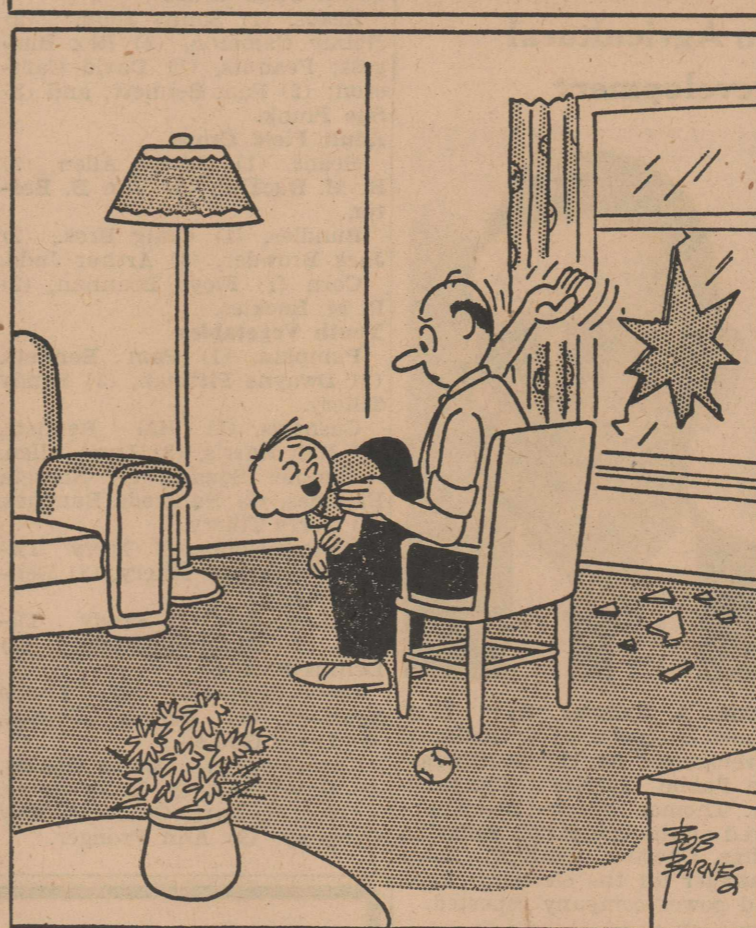
