Contract approved for new county attorney

County The Bailey Commissioners Court approved a contract for a new county attorney during Monday's special meeting.

Under an interlocal agreement with Lamb County, Assistant County Attorney Scott Say will be providing the needed prosecutorial services on a part-time basis.

County Judge Sherri Harrison reported that office space for the new county attorney has been set up in the Muleshoe Area Medical Center Outpatient Clinic, 118 W. Second.

Because the building is already owned by the county, Harrison said rent and utilities wouldn't be an

And, with information from MAMC administrator Ray Mason that the clinic's remaining services would probably be moved to one of the hospital district's other provider locations, Harrison said other county services such as Adult Probation or the Bailey County Extension, could be moved into the building as well.

Food safety program offered

Eating out has never been more popular. Almost half of the money we spend on food is spent away from home.

Each year, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimate that approximately one in four Americans will get sick from eating contaminated food at home or at food service establishments.

This spring, Texas Cooperative Extension of Bailey, Cochran, and Hockley County are offering training to reduce those numbers of illnesses.

The Food Manager Certification Training Program, called "Food Safety: It's Our Business" seeks to reduce the risk of foodborne illness. By taking the course, food service managers can receive the latest information on personal hygiene, how to use thermometers, how to store food safely, how to prepare and serve food properly and how to keep the food preparation areas clean and sanitized.

Participants can fulfill requirements for food manager certification if they pass the certification exam offered at the end of the course.

The training session will be offered for \$89 on March 8 and 9, from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., in the Hockley County Extension Office at 1212 Houston, Levelland.

The cost includes training materials and the state food manager certification examination. Deadline for registration will be March 2.




Being prepared for all kinds of weather
