# Soil And Irrigation **Specialists Will Speak**

The first of a series of adult education meetings, to be sponsored by the Agriculture Department of Stratford High School and the Texas Extension Service, will be held in the high school auditorium Monday night, February 25, at 7:45 p.m.

Dr. Alex Pope, soil specialist, and Marvin Jensen, irrigation specialist, both from the Amarillo Experiment Station, will be the guest speakers for the meethave been conducting research experiments in their respective fields at the Amarillo Experiment Station and on test plots located over the Panhandle. The information they have is very timely, and questions on fertilizers, their use and application, as well as irrigation water management, will be answered at

this meeting.

With acreage restriction, lower prices for principal cash crops, and continued high operating costs, more attention must be given to practices which conserve the soil, improve its feet. fertility, and the insurance of a higher return from each acre. The proper use of fertilizers and irrigation water makes it possible to increase crop yield, thus lowering costs and providing more net income. Irrigation is an expensive, scientific method of farming. Successful producers must at all times, take advantage of every opportunity to learn more about it.
