Tour Experiment Farm Saturday

FFA boys will be hosts to the public at a field day to be held on their experiment farm on the James Craig land southeast of Stratford Saturday morning, beginning at 9:00 a. m.

Two school buses will leave from in front of the Palace Cafe at 8:15 a. m. to furnish transportation for those who wish to attend the field day program.

Dr. Alex Pope, soil scientist, Marvin Jensen, irrigation specialist, all of the Amarillo Experiment Station, will aid the boys with the educational lectures.

Varieties of Concho, Wichita and Crockett wheat have been irrigated and the land fertilized with varied amounts of fertilizer for a study of the results.

The Vocational Agriculture Department of the Stratford High School, in cooperation with the Amarillo Experiment Station, has successfully developed an irrigation demonstration which in a small way may help farmers in Sherman and neighboring counties. When the Sherman County irrigation development was in its infancy, some looked upon irrigation as the answer to their production problems. Farmers who have operated their irrigation wells for two or three years, are finding that irrigation creates many problems. The right variety, the amount of fertilizer, and the time to water, are but some of these problems. FFA boys have attempted to establish the answers to some of these problems on their experiment farm.

Visitors to the experiment farm will have an opportunity to see the results of several approved methods of fertilizing, in the growing crops.

Car Accident Takes Life Of Keith Webb

Funeral services for John Keith Webb, age 36, were conducted in the Methodist Church at Fowler, Colorado Tuesday, where burial was made with military honors.

Tough Laws For Teenagers

Law enforcement officers will, in effect, have a new hickory stick for teenage troublemakers after August 22. New laws going into effect on August 23 provide:

(1) Youngsters 14 and over can be fined \$100 for speeding, DWI or driving without a license.

(2) Parents will be liable up to \$300 for property damage by minor children.

(3) Drivers licenses for youngsters under 16 will be harder to get. Department of Public Safety, rather than local county judge, will have say-so.

(4) A special "license" will be needed for driving motor bikes and scooters.

.36 Inch Of Moisture In Two Showers

Showers falling Saturday and Sunday brought .36 of an inch of rain to the Stratford area. Reports from over the territory are practically the same, except for one dry spot 15 to 25 miles west of Stratford. Here the ground is exceedingly dry and several producers in that area do not feel they will be justified in planting row crops.

Over the balance of the territory the row crop farmer is working as fast as possible to seed their fields during the first dry days in several weeks.

Wheat heads range in length from 3 to 6 inches. Heads in most irrigated fields are filled with grain. Kernels are just beginning to form in the heads in many dry land fields.

Yields may range from 10 to 40 bushels an acre in the territory this year.

Weed Control New Problem For Stratford

Rank weed growth during the monsoon season has presented Stratford with another problem in the control of mosquitoes. Citizens are encouraged to make every effort to clear their property of weeds in the hope of preventing a possible epidemic of sickness.

Since Texas is included in the "commercial wheat area" to which marketing quotas and acreage allotments apply, June 20 is the date set for the marketing quotas referendum to be held.

At least two-thirds of the growers voting must approve the quotas before the quotas may go into effect. Under a quota program, price support in the 1958 crop will be available at a minimum national average of \$1.78 a bushel. This rate is 75 per cent of the estimated parity applicable to the 1958 wheat crop. If quotas are not approved, the available support will be at 50 percent of parity, and acreage allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for the support.

Farmers eligible to vote in the June 20 referendum are those growers who will share in the 1958 wheat crop from a farm in the commercial wheat area on which the wheat acreage to be harvested, plus any acreage to be placed in the Soil Bank's wheat acreage reserve, will be more than 15 acres.

Every eligible voter in Sherman County is urged to vote in the referendum. There will be three voting places in the county. Polls will be open at the courthouse in Stratford, at the Texas side school in Texhoma, and in the basement of the Spurlock Chapel. The polls will open at 8:00 a. m. and close at 7:00 p. m. on June 20.

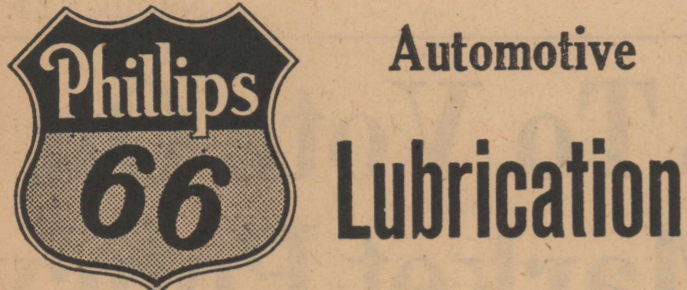
Ninety were enrolled in the school with a high attendance record.
