



 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO.
2 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 51a of the Constitution of Texas, so as to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children: and allocating and appro-priating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO.

not inconsistent with restrictions here-in set forth; provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of state funds for such assistance to the needy aged. needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year. The Legislature shall enact appro-priate laws to make lists of the recip-ients of aid hereunder available for inspection.



New Texas Teenage Driver's License Laws Become Effective August 23

(1) Youngsters 14 and over can be fined \$100 for speeding, DWI or driving without a license.

(2) Parents will be liable up to \$300 for property damage by minor children.

(3) Drivers licenses for youngsters under 16 will be harder to get. Department of Public Safety, rather than local county judge, will have say-so.

(4) A special "license" will be needed for driving motor bikes and scooters.





Accidents like these, involving children at school crossings and playgrounds, are happily getting fewer every year. But accidents that involve two or more motor vehi-cles are not. We believe there is a unique reason for this — a reason that lies deep within human nature itself.

Almost every motorist feels a strong personal responsibility for the safety of children. It is instinctive for any man or woman to protect the life of a child even at the risk of personal danger. Most of us are extremely careful when we see a little boy or girl in or near the street.

But tens of thousands of motorists feel no such personal responsibility for their fellow drivers. To the man at the wheel the person in the other car is often an enemy or a fool. He views him with impatience, suspicion and intent hostility. He is ready to cuss him out at the drop of a hat.

If you doubt this, why not check your own behavior at the wheel of a car? Have you never cut past another car too closely for safety because you felt it was hogging the highway and wandering all over the place? Have you never hugged the center line on the road — just because the stubborn driver approaching was doing the same thing? Or committed any number of other impatient and dangerous violations of good traffic manners and safety rules?

These are the things that cause bad accidents.

Safety experts and students of human behavior say we could eliminate the causes of many such accidents merely by thinking of the fellow in the other car as a friendly human being instead of as a foe bent on our own destruction. They remind us that the truly mature person feels a sense of kinship with every other person. They also remind us that when we feel friendly toward someone our acts bear us out. They are friendly, courteous and reasonable, too. And finally, that a courteous action usually begets a courteous response.

For the "safety" of everyone, be a courteous driver. Your thoughts and actions will make you a happy person.


