Farmers in Sherman County who have more than one farm which they operate separtely, either by themselves or through renters, tenants, or sharecroppers, may be eligible for 1958 Soil Bank Acreage Reserve pay-ments above the \$3,000 limit recently voted by Congress for the 1958 program, R. C. chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, announces.

Chairman Buckles explained that under an interpretation by the U.S. Department of Agri-culture, with the concurrence of the Comptroller General of the United States, the \$3,000 limit is to be applied to each producer with regard to each farm, rather than as a ceiling on the amount paid him for all farms in which he has an interest. which he has an interest.

By way of further explanation,

he cited these examples: "A" owns three farms, each of which he rents on a share basis to a tenant who operates the farm. Each farm has allotments for wheat, corn, and rice.
The producers ("A" and the respective tenant) on each farm wish to participate in the Acreage Reserve Program with respective to all the respective tenants. spect to all three commodities. In the absence of the \$3,000 limitation "A's" share of the total compensation for each farm would be \$1,500 or a total \$4,500 for the three farms. Each of the tenants would receive \$3,000 in compensation for each farm. It is our view that the \$3,000 limitation would not af-(Continued on Page 3)






