Elk Scramble Squad To Fight Follett Game

Coach Pete Bateman is completing a shifty practice drill to place a winning team on the field for the home game with Follett Friday night. Influenza has taken its toll in the starting Elk lineup, and there is always the possibility that others may be victims of the influenza epidemic before game time Friday. Monday afternoon coach Bateman counted the casualty list against his eligible men, and said at that time he could place 30 men on the field, although it would be the first time several had ever played a conference game in the starting lineup.

The game to start at 7:30 Friday night with Follett is the sixth game of the District 1-B conference schedule. The Elks have won 4 out of the 5 conference games, one of which was forfeited to them.

As the Elks and Follett both have teams accustomed to working on the prevailing dry fields of the Texas Panhandle, each may experience some difficulty in executing their plays.

Both teams have established records of strength. These records, however were established during dry weather when all of the men were in the best of physical fitness. In the approaching game neither coach is certain as to the men he will have available to place in the game.

If the Elks can muster enough manpower to win the game with Follett Friday, it is hoped all of the players will be in condition to defeat Groom the following Friday. This would place the district championship in a three-way tie unless other upsets occur in the district due to sickness among the players during the influenza epidemic.

To Pave Five Miles County Road

The Texas Highway Commission has taken the first step to inaugurate a new two-year Farm-to-Market Road program for Texas, Marshall Formby, chairman of the Texas Highway Commission states. Money for this program is derived from the fund established by Senate Bill 287, Fifty-first Legislature.

Charles W. Smith, district engineer of the Texas Highway Department at Amarillo, has stated that the following farm-to-market road in the county is scheduled for work under the program: Farm-to-Market Road 119, 4 miles north of FM Road 289, east for a distance of approximately 5 miles.

Mr. Smith stated that this year the Commission has authorized the development of some area roads which will serve the dual purpose of service to the adjacent land as well as aiding in the development of the entire area of the state.

It was announced that work will begin on these projects just as soon as final planning is completed and right of way secured. Resident Engineer H. L. Gallegly will be in charge of the work in this area.

A benefit chili or soup and pie supper will be served in the Palace Cafe Tuesday, November 12, from 5:00 to 8:30 p. m. by members of the Eastern Star. Adults will be served for 75c and children under 12 will be served for 50c.

Third Mass Polio Vaccinations Will Commence Tuesday Afternoon

The third and final shots of the mass polio vaccination of school children will be given in the Stratford Clinic from 1:00 to 4:00 p. m. Tuesday, November 12.

The polio serum will be made available to adults on Wednesday afternoon, November 13. Preparations will be made to give shots to all those whose names are alphabetically listed from "A through D."

Tuesday, November 19, shots will be given to adults whose names are in the alphabetical file from "E through G." Wednesday, November 20, shots will be made available to adults listed in the alphabetical file from "H through L."

Polio vaccine will be administered in the afternoons while Dumas physicians are present to either give or supervise the administering of the inoculations. Cost of the mass inoculations will be \$2.00 per person. An increase in the cost of the inoculations has been caused by the purchase of the vaccine and additional operating costs of the clinic. Previously, much of the vaccine had been made available at no cost to the people participating in the venture.

The polio vaccination schedule will be continued until every one in Sherman County and those in Dallam County who are served by the Stratford Independent School District have had ample time to take advantage of the protection of the Salk vaccine.

Arriving by plane were the Oklahoma Day queen, Cecille Roberts of Norman, and the two finalists, Kay Camp of Waukomis and Charlotte Holloper of Blackwell and their chaperone, Mrs. T. L. Shumate of Oklahoma City. A dinner and reception was given in the senate caucus room.

Kerrick H. D. Club To Meet Nov. 15

The Kerrick Home Demonstration Club will meet at the Community Building on Friday, November 15, at 2:00 p. m. The program on reducing will be given by Mrs. Grady Stubbs of Amarillo.

A month of fog, drizzle, light shower and even snow showers has held men and combine crews helpless for about a month in their attempt to harvest maize growing in this area, although only an average of about two inches of moisture has fallen over most of the territory.

Small acreages of dryland fields was harvested before the damp monsoon season set in. In many cases the yield was only about 1,000 pounds of grain to the acre. Little or no work has been reported in irrigated fields, where the yield if not lessened by stalks going down under the weight of grain and moisture, should be approximately 3,500 pounds to the acre.

The fall season is unusual for the Panhandle section. Normally tree leaves remain green until the first freeze or frost and drop within a few days. This year with the relative humidity varying between 70 and 100 percent, the leaves have remained on the majority of the trees, some turning yellow and others turning red, to allow the beauty of autumn colors on the high plains.

Indirect lighting that will put to shame the best of lighting engineers has often been visible in Stratford. Fog has acted as a ceiling reflector. On several nights when the football field has been lighted, the glare from the floodlights along with street lights and neon signs, has produced a night light over most of the city in which no shadows are present. It has given a peculiar sensation to many who were impressed by the bright moonlight, and later discovered neither the moon nor stars were visible.

A continued monsoon may result in the adoption of methods which are being used by farmers in the midwest. Maize is being grown in many fields where corn allotment acreage has been reduced. These fields have produced yields of 120 bushels to the acre. The problem with these farmers has been what to do with the grain. Their aerated corn cribs on the farm in the presence of a relative humidity running in the 90's allows the grain to absorb more and more moisture with every passing day. Dryers which operate on much the same order as the housewife's clothes dryer have been devised. False bottoms are placed in wagons and trucks which are backed up to the dryer. The moisture can be reduced to 11 or 12 percent. Not having moisture proof elevators, they find the moisture content in the grain may be back up to as high as 20 percent the next morning.

End of Season Outlook:

Polio Threat Is Reduced; But Millions Unprotected

MARION B. FOLSOM, Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare, has reported a dramatic 80 per cent reduction in paralytic poliomyelitis in this country over the past two years. He warned, however, that millions of Americans under 40 still have not received full vaccine protection and thus "are needlessly risking disability or even death."

Mr. Folsom, summarizing the polio season now coming to an end, reported 1,576 paralytic cases so far this year, compared with 7,886 cases two years ago, before widespread use of the Salk vaccine, and 5,241 cases last year. "For many years," Mr. Folsom

officers, and the Advertising Council are all joining in a campaign this fall to urge vaccination of as many persons as possible with the full recommended schedule of three doses.

Surgeon General Leroy E. Burney of the Public Health Service gave this summary of the polio picture now:

Incidence—
There have been 1,576 paralytic cases so far this year, compared with 7,886 for the same period in 1955 and 5,241 in 1956. Only 63 cases of paralytic polio have been reported among the 28 million persons who have received 3 shots of vaccine, and not all of these cases have been confirmed yet. Three doses are estimated to reduce paralytic polio incidence by up to 90 per cent.

Although the vaccine is designed to prevent paralytic polio, as distinguished from non-paralytic, the total number of polio cases this year also shows a sharp reduction. There have been 4,851 cases so far, compared with 21,687 2 years ago, 12,146 one year ago, and an average of 24,928 a year over the past five years.

Vaccine Production—
More than 215 million cc. (doses) of vaccine have been released for public use since April, 1955 when manufacturers were first licensed to produce the vaccine. More than 84 million cc. have been released this year. Production has been running about 12 million cc. a month recently and manufacturers will be asked to maintain this rate or to increase it if the demand is sufficient.

It now appears possible, for the first time, to have enough vaccine available to give protection to substantially all the population under 40 before the start of next year's season of peak incidence.

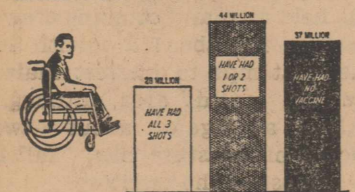
Vaccine Use—
It is estimated that more than 72 million Americans already have received one or more doses—out of a total population of 109 million persons under 40. Estimate indicates:

Of the 67 million persons in the priority group, under 20 years of age and expectant mothers, 25 million have received all three injections, 22 million have received 2 injections, 11 million have received 1 injection, and 9 million have received no vaccine. Attention should be given particularly to vaccinating teen-agers.

Polio can and does strike severely at adults, however. Of the 42 million persons 20 through 39 years old, 14 million have been vaccinated—3 million with 3 doses, 5 million with 2 doses, and 6 million with 1 dose. But 28 million adults have had no vaccine.

Vaccine Supplies—
The inventory of vaccine on hand already has begun to pile up. The supply reached a low point of 3.2 million cc. during the week ending March 25. In recent weeks it has climbed from 9 million cc. on August 9, to 18 million cc. on September 13, 23½ million cc. on September 20, and remained at almost that level (22.3 million) on September 27.

said, "this country anxiously sought the means to avert the suffering and anguish caused by polio. Today, with steadily increasing supplies of Salk vaccine, the means are at hand."

"If people will use the vaccine available, it is possible to give paralytic polio a knockout blow within the next year."

"Still, more than 37 million Americans under 40 have received no vaccine, and 44 million have taken only one or two doses and have yet to complete the full schedule of three doses."

"It will be a tragedy if, simply because of public apathy, vaccine which might prevent paralysis or even death lies on the shelf unused."

The Secretary noted that last fall, use of the vaccine dropped sharply, supplies piled up in warehouses, and production was cut back. By last spring, however, the demand had risen to such a peak that supplies were short again and many planned community and industry vaccination programs had to be postponed.

"We are most anxious to avoid this sort of boom-or-bust cycle, which seriously impedes an effective vaccination program," he said.

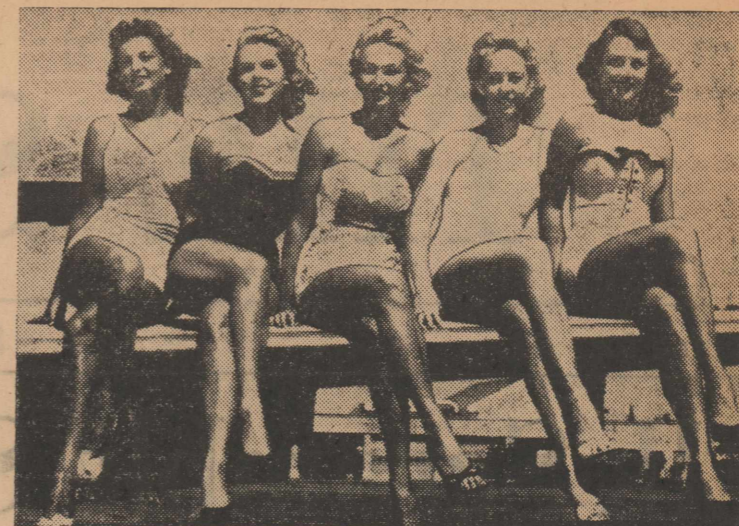
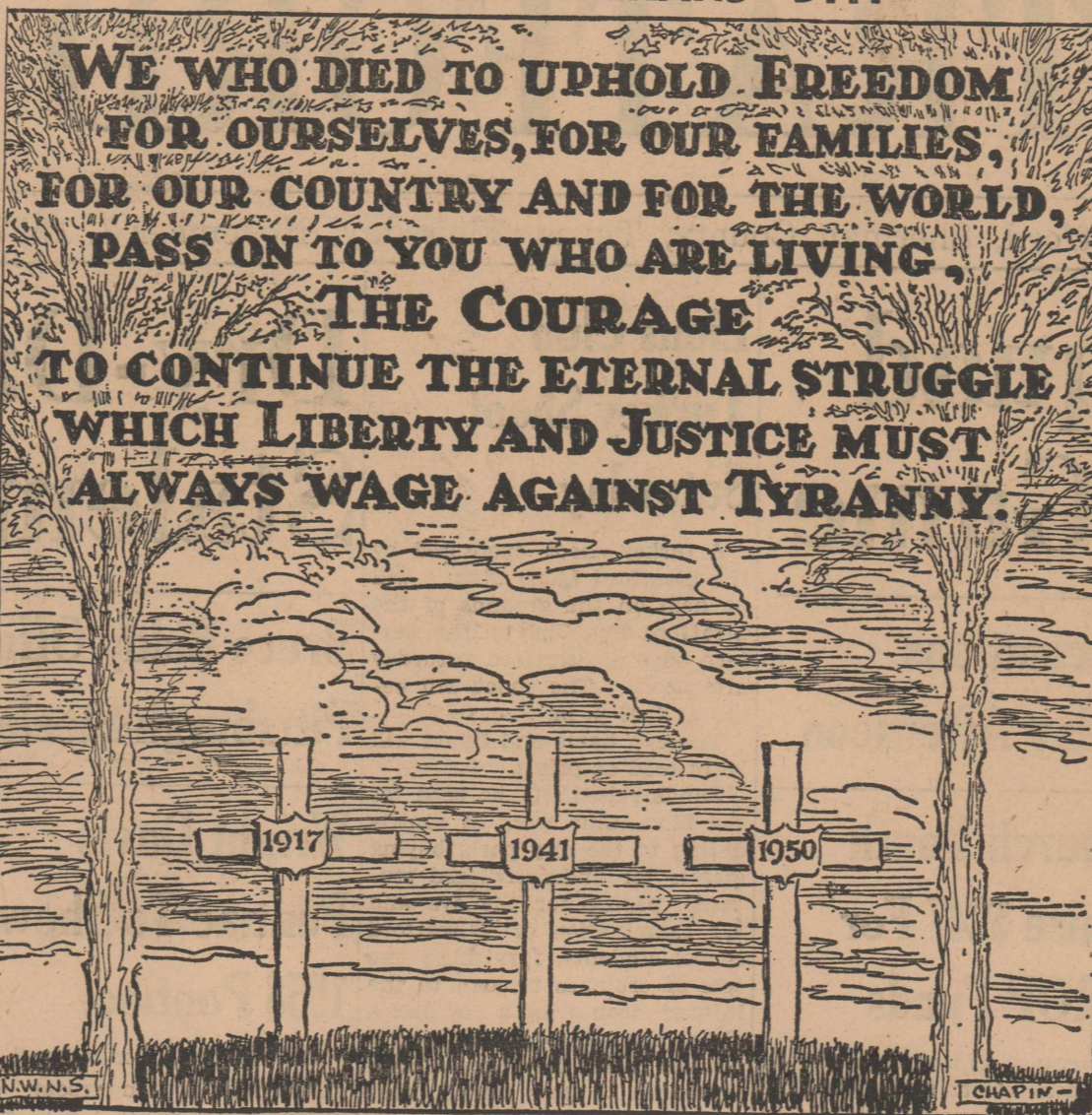
"Although all the reduction in paralytic polio may not be due to the vaccine, the vaccine certainly has played a major part in this dramatic progress."

"And yet supplies already are beginning to pile up. This is the best time for medical societies, local health departments, schools, industries, and individual citizens and physicians to make sure that everyone who needs protection gets it."

"If unvaccinated persons will start now, they can get the full schedule of three doses before the next polio season begins."
