Dr. Hose Raman To Head Stratford Clinic

Dr. Hose Raman of El Paso, Texas will take over medical practice in Stratford as head of the Stratford Medical Clinic on January 1. Dr. and Mrs. Raman (pronounced Rayman) and 10 month old baby were in Stratford during the latter part of last week to view the opportunity in Stratford. Dr. Raman is a resident physician in the El Paso General Hospital at a salary of \$500.00 a month. He was under contract with the hospital until the middle of next summer, but will exercise the use of a clause in the contract which will enable him to enter private practice by giving them a 30-day notice in order that a replacement may be secured. Dr. Raman has been guaranteed an income of \$500.00 a month by the city to enable him to support his family while his practice gains the confidence of the general public. In his youth Raman was quarterback on the Marfa, Texas high school football team. He served as president of the student body of Marfa high school. (Continued on Page 10)

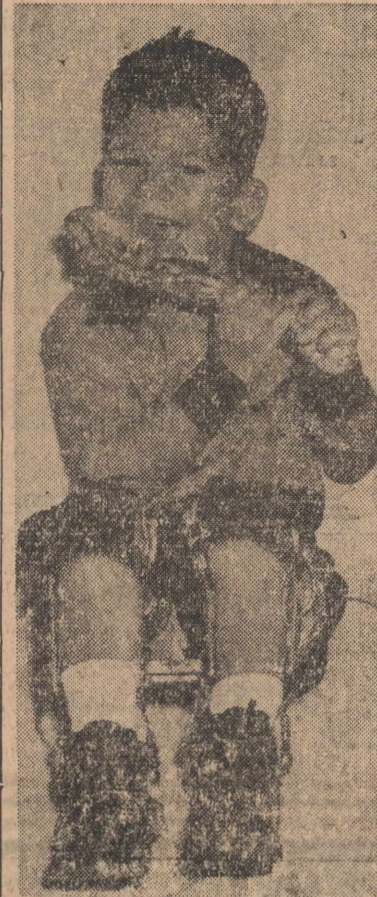

To Begin Signing 1958 Conservation Reserve Contracts

County ASC Committees are authorized to begin accepting applications for 1958 contracts for conservation reserve (long term soil bank program) or modify 1956 or 1957 contracts by adding additional land in the reserve.

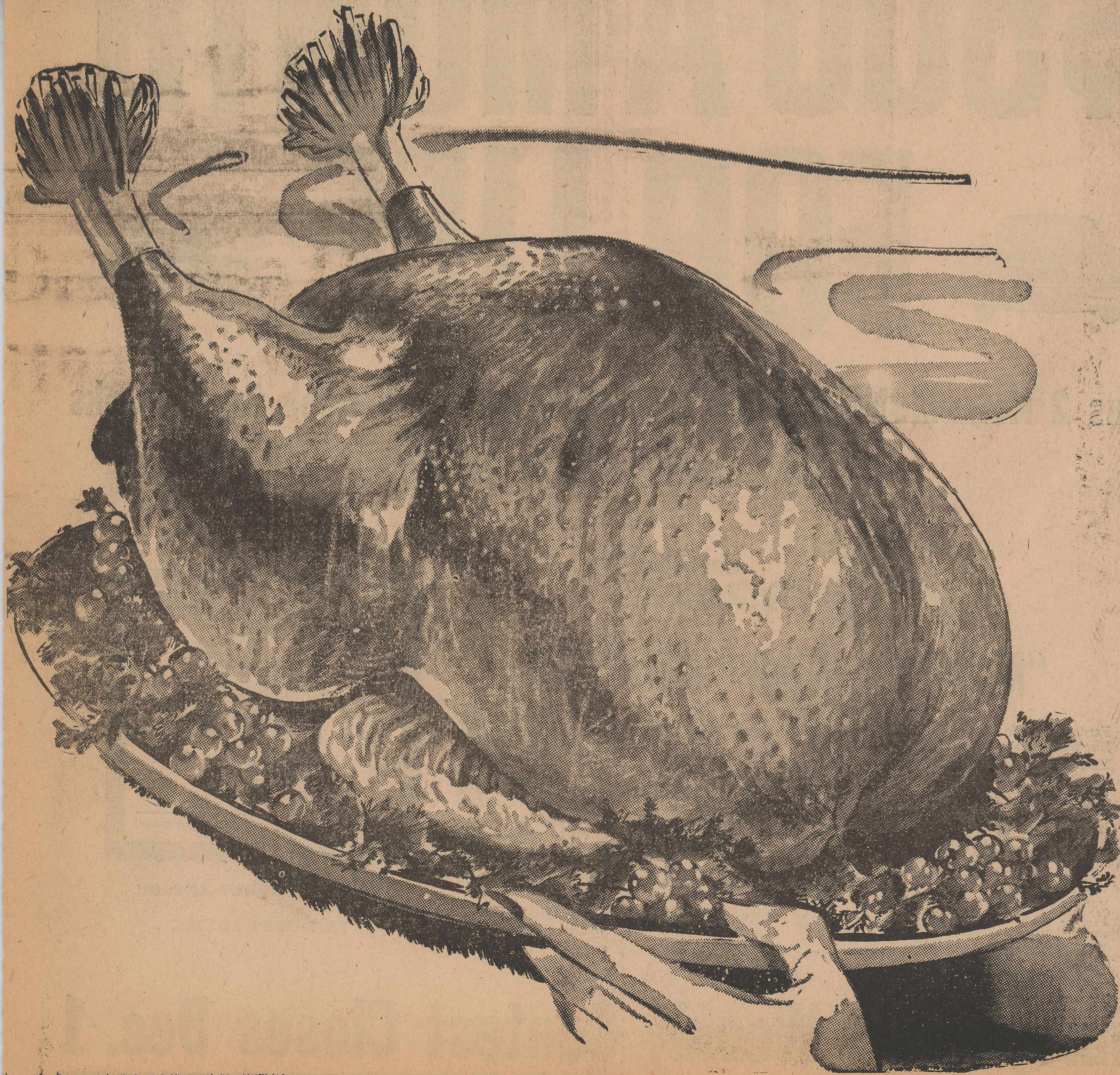
The county rates previously established under the 1956-1957 Conservation Reserve program will remain in effect for 1958, the payment being \$10.00 an acre in Sherman county. The state has been authorized to obligate \$15,948,000 for new acreage to be signed on 1958 new contracts or modified contracts. It is believed that present state allocation of funds will be sufficient to cover all acreage of (Continued on Page 10)

Q—I sold my GI house for reasons of health. My GI loan eligibility has been restored by VA. Now, do I have to use this restored entitlement to buy another house, or may I use it for a GI business loan?
 A—You may use it for a business loan, or it may be used for any purpose authorized by law: a home loan, farm loan or business loan.

Q—Is there a new Senate Office building under construction in Washington?
 A—Yes, it is almost completed at a cost of \$17,200,000. Site and equipment will run the cost to about \$21,700,000. A third house office building also is under construction to cost approximately \$15 million.

Q—I read in the paper that Queen Elizabeth and her party were served luncheon in the old Supreme Court room. Is that in the Supreme Court Building?
 A—No. It is on the Senate floor of the Capitol building, about midway between the House and Senate chambers.

Q—Of what material is the original part of the U. S. Capitol Building constructed?
 A—It is sandstone which came from quarries owned by the government at Aquia Creek, Va.

Q—Is all news media represented in the Capitol Press galleries?
 A—Yes, representatives of daily newspapers and press associations serving daily paper; Representatives of Radio and TV stations and networks serving radio and TV stations; periodicals, including magazines, trade publications, and weekly newspapers, and photographers and news photo services.

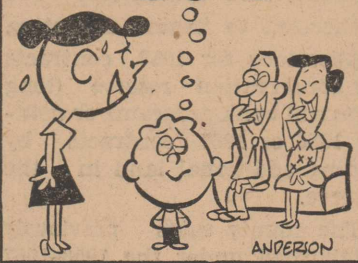

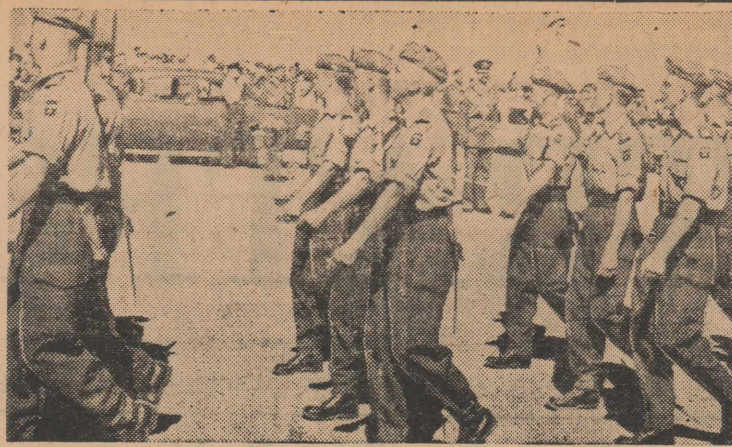
We would sniff the coal smoke issuing from their chimney as we passed as none of us had such blue smoke, as we burned wood. We decided they must be very rich since they burned coal.

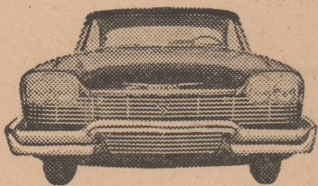

James H. Atha Died Of Heart Attack Tuesday

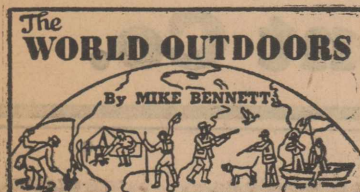

But big game hunting in the jungles is an expedition, not a mere hunting trip. The hunter doesn't go out alone in quest of a lion or a tiger. But danger is not a necessary ingredient for successful and happy hunting. Thrills are to be found in the whirring blast of a flushed covey; in the sudden spurt of a startled rabbit, and in the heart-beat, whistling sound of big wings against the sky.

For thrills unlimited, few gun activities equal duck hunting. The cold winter winds whips icy pellets of sleet through a hunter's frozen blind. Hands and feet grow cold and numb and a dull, drab morning shuts out any promise of even a slight warmth from the hidden sun. Minutes of anticipation always seems like hours of endless waiting. The horizon is bleak and empty.

But icy cold and anxious waiting are part of it all for the duck hunter. He gladly endures it for hours, asking only for that brief reward that comes when his eyes spot that first flight in the morning sky. His pulse quickens and his body becomes warm and tense. Broad wings that have been bent to the sky turn to the call. The long, grey lines swing round in a circle over decoys and blind. At any moment, the reward for patient waiting may be reaped in a moment of thrilling excitement.

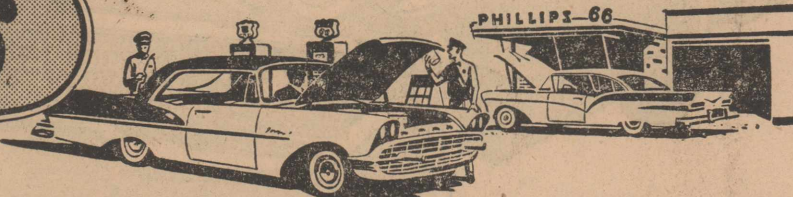

tuce salad-offering, meat-scrip-ture, vegetables, different scrip-ture, dessert, special song. This was a very interesting program.

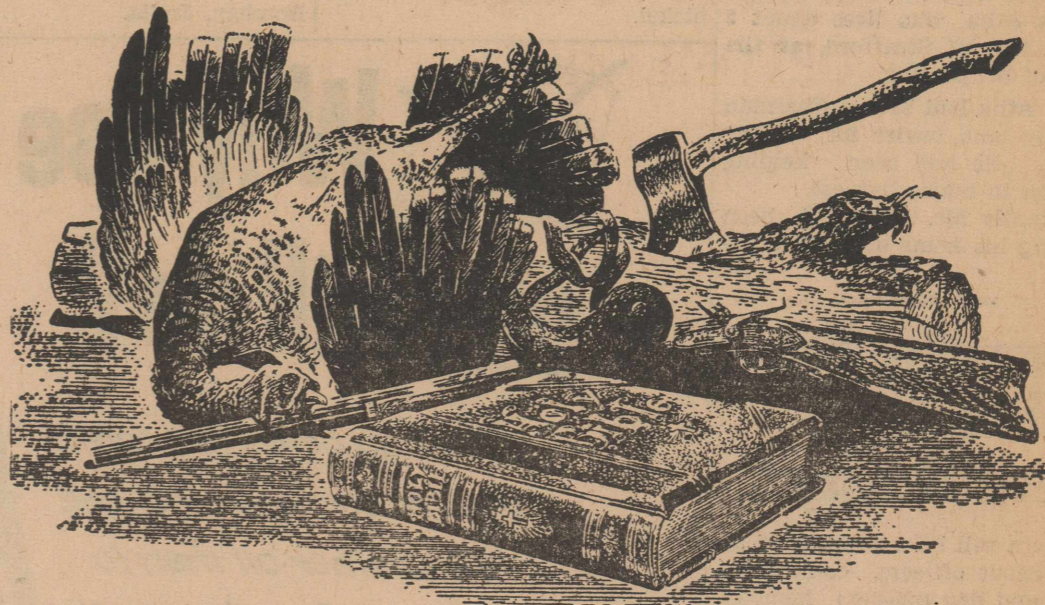

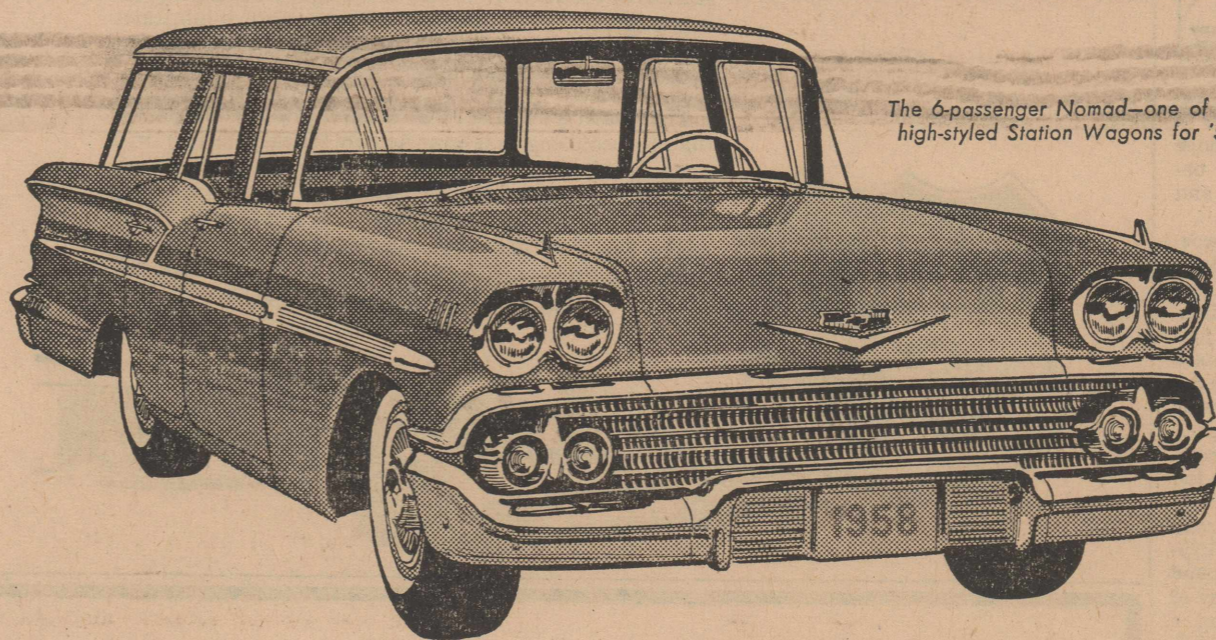

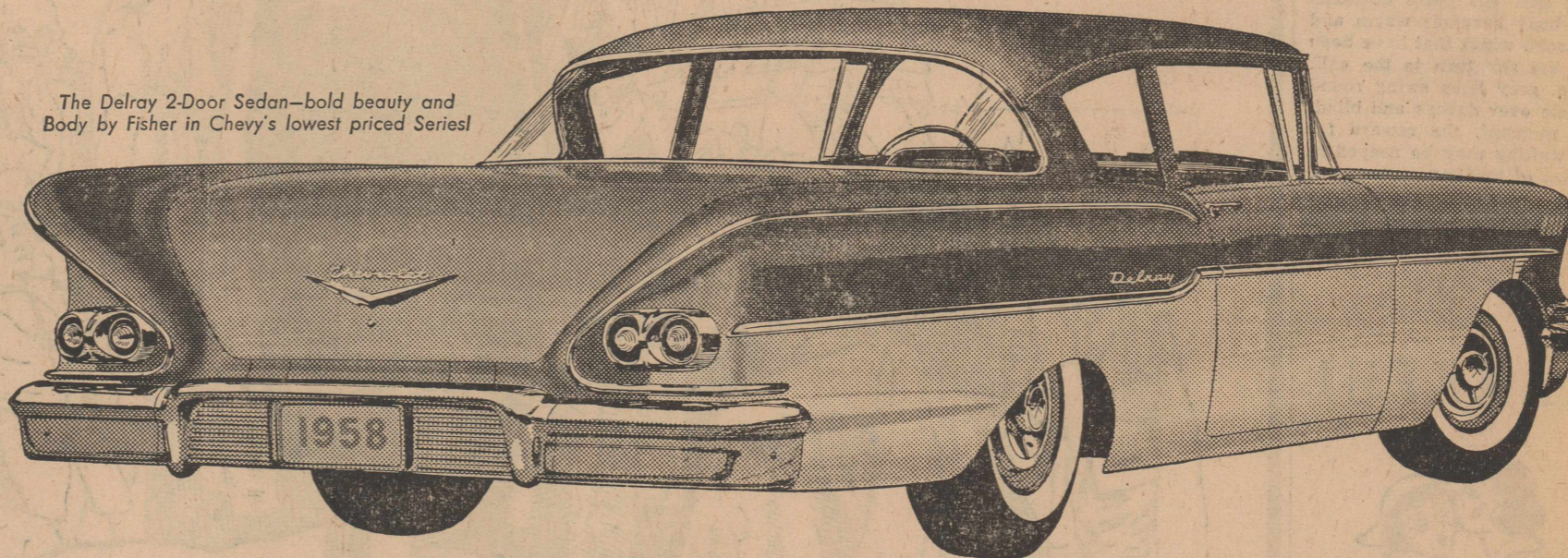

Meditations Of A Principal

Education is an investment in the future. Texas spent \$255.00 per pupil in A.D.A. in 1956-1957. The national average was \$295. Texas ranked 32nd among the 48 states, 40,955 teachers are needed as replacements and additions by 1962-1963. More than 10,000 teachers leave their positions each year.

Texas Education Agency reports 1,121 emergency certificates or permits were issued in 1955-1956. The number issued in 1956-1957 was 3,199.

Texas ranks second only to Arizona in percent of teachers

holding degrees. More than 96% are degree holders.

In 1955 Texas spent 2.73% of its personal income on its schools. Texas then ranked 27th among the 48 states.

Total spent for current education expenses is 1-3 of a billion dollars.

Hope some of our young people do not overlook the possibility of a career in atomic energy. Here are some applications of atomic science:

Biology — effect of atomic radiation on plant and animal life.

Medicine — doctors are utilizing the products of atomic energy in studying the diseases such as anemia, arthritis, cancer, diabetes, heart disease, nervous diseases and certain chronic illnesses.

Agriculture — radioactive isotopes are being used as research agents to obtain further knowledge about solids, fertilizers and growth of plants and animals.

Manufacturing — radio active isotopes have already resulted in more efficient productive methods, refinements in testing, simpler inspection procedures. Here is one for you. By using radio isotopes oil companies can flow two kinds of oil. This alone saves oil companies millions of dollars.

Mining — mining engineering is a very rewarding field.

Nuclear power — propulsion of sea craft and air craft, guided missiles.

The above is just barely touching the surface never before has the need been so great for people who will train themselves to think beyond the border of necessities.

MAN'S noble companion and friend, the dog, is an excellent partner for almost any type of hunting venture. From the "just plain dog" type that is usually so efficient when the game is squirrels, to the beagles that put the rabbit on the run and the setters and pointers that hold to a covey of quail, a hunter and his dog make a pretty picture in any outdoor setting.

If you own a hunting dog, you're proud of him. You do not hesitate to boast of his accomplishments in the field and you feel a sort of personal failure when he appears to perform poorly. But don't feel badly if your dog has an occasional bad day. He isn't a human being, but he has his faults just the same.

A cold or respiratory ailment is a serious affliction for a hunting dog, for vision is not a dog's best sense. No pun intended, the dog's nose is his strongest asset. The dog uses his eyes to avoid obstacles, not to observe details. This explains why he will fail to see a rabbit running away, but pick up the chase the moment his keen nostrils pick up the scent.

The vision of different dogs may vary, even in the same breed. Some can see a moving object 800 yards away, but probably do not recognize it at more than 150 yards. Large dogs usually have better eyesight than smaller ones.

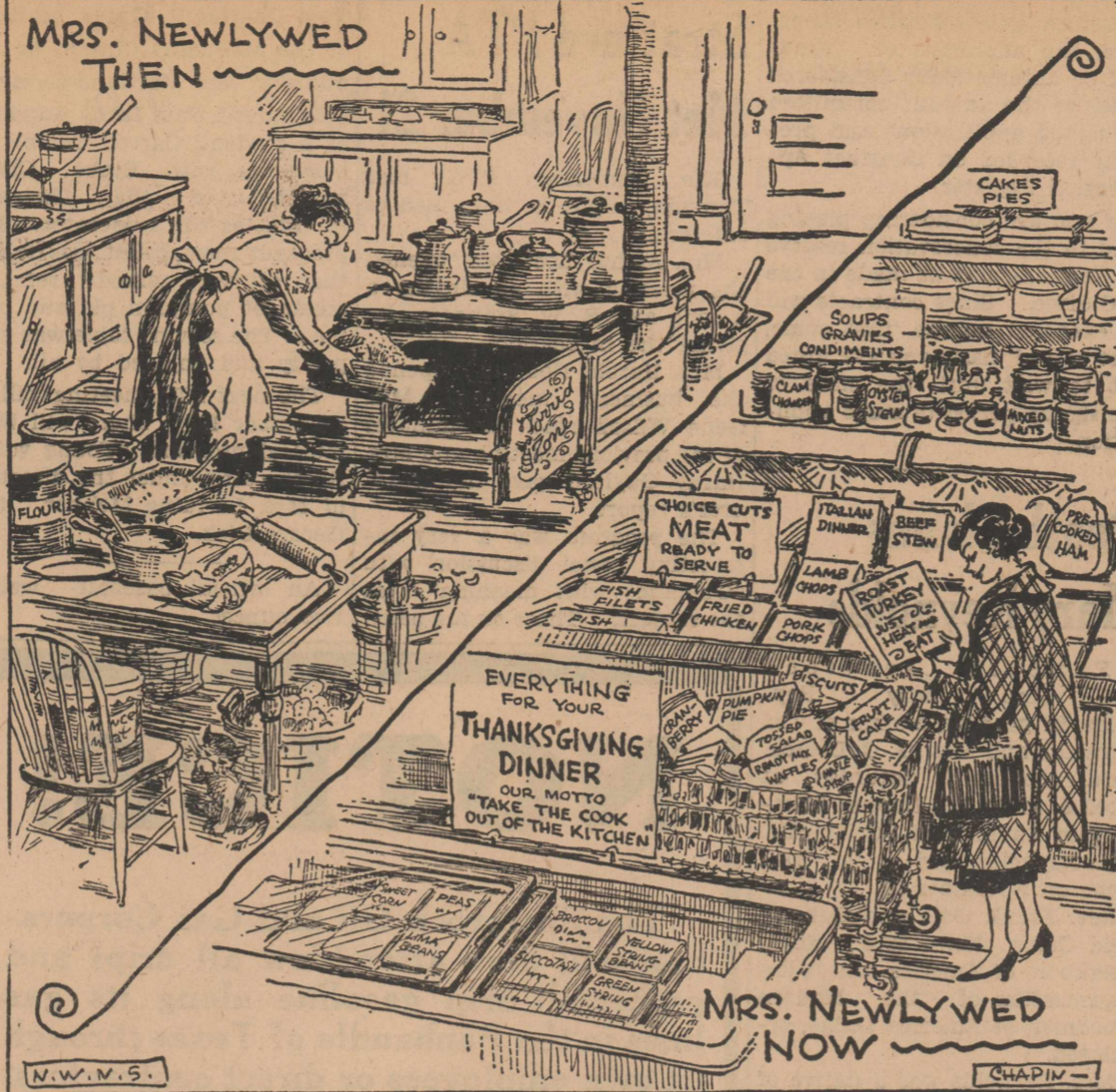
Quick recognition depends upon motion. A dog will recognize his master by his gait, last of all by his face.

So, don't be upset too much if Old Faithful doesn't perform to standard on a particular day, even if it is a day on which you wanted to impress a fellow hunter with the dog's skill. He may be having trouble with his sniffer. Next time out, he will probably perform feats which will leave even you surprised and amazed.

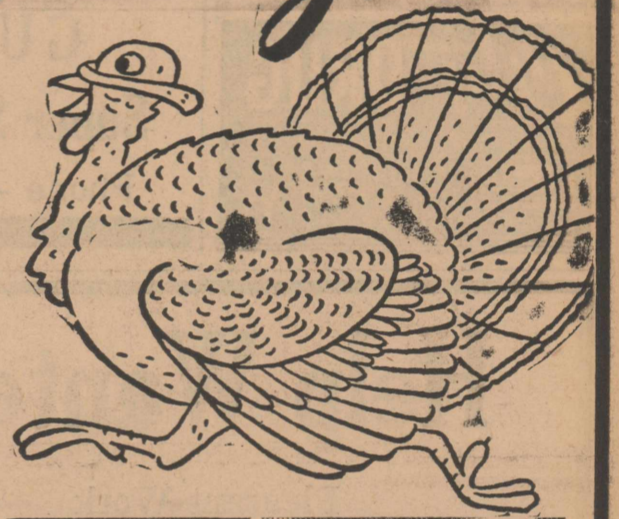
