

THIS WEEK'S RECIPE Walnut Cookies (Makes 4 dozen) 1/2 cup butter or substitute 1/3 cup sugar

1/2 teaspoon vanilla 14 cups sifted flour 1/4 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Cream together butter and sugar. Add egg and vanilla, beating thoroughly. Sift together flour and salt and blend into creamed mixture. Stir in walnuts. Drop by teaspoonfuls on greased baking sheet. Bake in a moderately hot (375°F.) oven about 10 minutes. Remove to wire rack to cool.
