Annual Livestock Show Saturday

FFA boys, 4-H boys and girls and adult breeders will place entries in the 13th annual Sherman County Livestock Show to be held in the county barn on the southern edge of Stratford Saturday. According to advance reports, the quality of the livestock will surpass entries of previous years.

Weighing in the entries will begin at 8:00 a. m. and continue until 9:30.

Judging of the livestock will start at 10:00 a. m. and continue through 3:00 p. m. An auction sale of the livestock will start after the judging has been completed. Bill Pendleton and Claude Ray Harland will auction the livestock.

FFA and 4-H club members who will exhibit calves include Walter Lasley, Zella Roach, Gay Judd, Ann Pronger, Scott Whorton, Paul Aduddell, Cleo Aduddell, Bob Pendleton, Gerald Preston, Larry Goule and Herman Borth.

In the swine division youthful exhibitors will include Dan Newman, Gay Judd, Hal Bennett, Charles Clements, Karl Kirkwood, Nell Harris and Bill Dyess.

Breeders who will exhibit livestock include P. J. Pronger Jr., J. E. Summerour, Keith Green and Rentie Hamilton.

Keith Green will judge the junior calves. In 1954, while serving as a member of the Oklahoma A. & M. meat judging team, Green won the honor of winning the highest number of points of any individual in the nation in judging meat. While still a student at Oklahoma A. & M. Green judged the Tri-County Livestock Show in Dalhart.

Ulys Hawkins, vocational agricultural teacher at Texhoma, will judge the swine.

Rentie Hamilton, well known Sherman County Hereford breeder, will judge the breeders entries.

The public is urged to visit the livestock show and view the constructive progress which has been made by youthful feeders and adults in the livestock industry.

Arthur Judd has the straw concession, and exhibitors may secure straw from him at the barn Saturday morning.

Club concession stands will sell soft drinks, coffee and home-made pie.

Johnny Summerour and R. M. Buckles will supervise the steer show. Arthur Judd and Horace Sneed will supervise the swine show.

P. J. Pronger, Jr. is chairman of the officials committee. Paul Chesmer, F. D. Brannan and Joe Billington compose the finance committee.

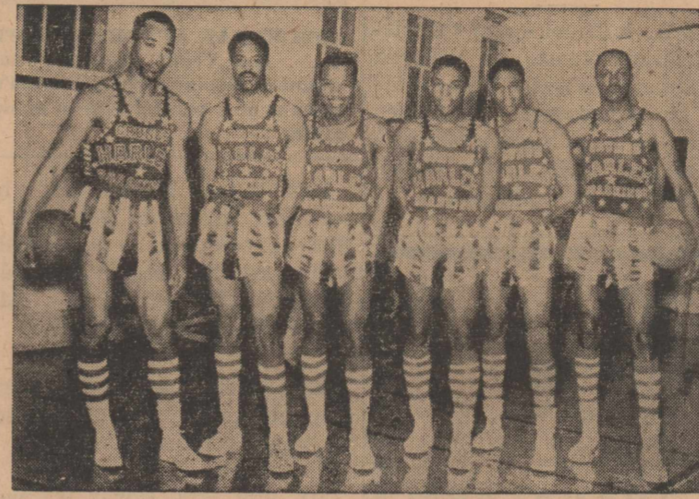

THE big bust that was the Vanguard rocket firing attempt has caused plenty of repercussions. Among the services, there has been much tossing about of the blame for too much prior publicity—too much in that it whetted the public's appetite for a real good show, causing just that much more disappointment with the big and expensive fizzle.

The press is likewise doing a bit of self-ciding for allowing itself to be carried along with the groundswell of enthusiasm to the extent that it overemphasized the importance of the "test" (as it was necessary to call the affair after it was all over).

In reality, it was only a test. But, who knows how many tests were necessary before the Russians put up their first Sputnik? There may have been more than a few. We'll never know.

One thing is certain, however. Our failure was a matter of grave concern only to our nation and our scientists. The Russians took it calmly. They knew that we will be successful, sooner or later, even if it is test-after-test—after-test later.

We have made many mistakes in our scientific efforts and, because we are a Democracy where it isn't cricket to shoot or imprison those who do not agree with our leaders, we will probably make more mistakes. Yet it is important that we note the fact that we are now aware that we have made these mistakes. We know that we are

behind the Russians. Our leaders and scientists don't all agree on just how far behind we are, but they all agree that we are behind. With this firmly established in our minds, we are certain to make progress at a more rapid rate in the future.

The results of our big build-up to the Vanguard letdown must be that we will temper our enthusiasm and that if we must make haste, we will do so with caution. We shall have our space satellite in time. We shall prove, as we have time and again, that we can come through when the chips are down.

Observers on the Washington scene predict that 1958 will see a substantial boost in the construction of U. S. air bases abroad. In view of the Russian sputniks and the status of our own missiles program, this is an expected move.

It is presumed that we will spend more in 1958 by speeding up construction and operation of bases for which money has already been provided for.

Military spending in this country is a more questionable matter. We are certain to spend more for missile sites and missile research, but in view of the fact that we must spend more for bases and for bombers for installations abroad, it might be that we will spend less than had been anticipated for bombers and other domestic aircraft.

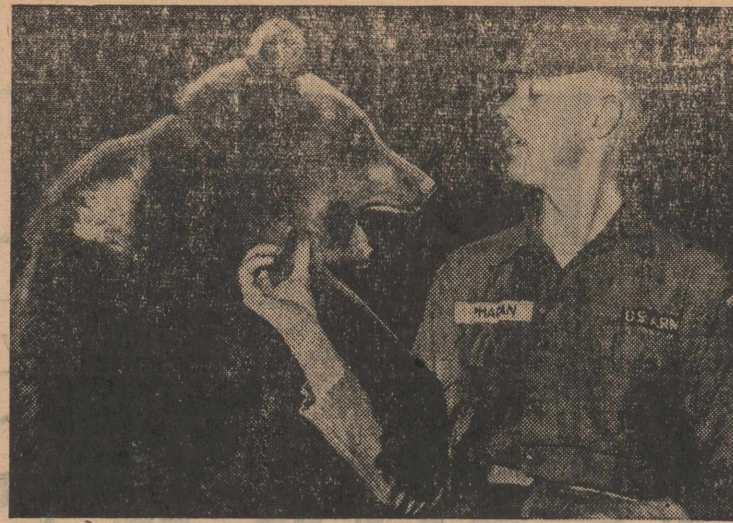

William and John Charles Stewart have been brought home from Dumas Memorial Hospital where they have been medical patients.

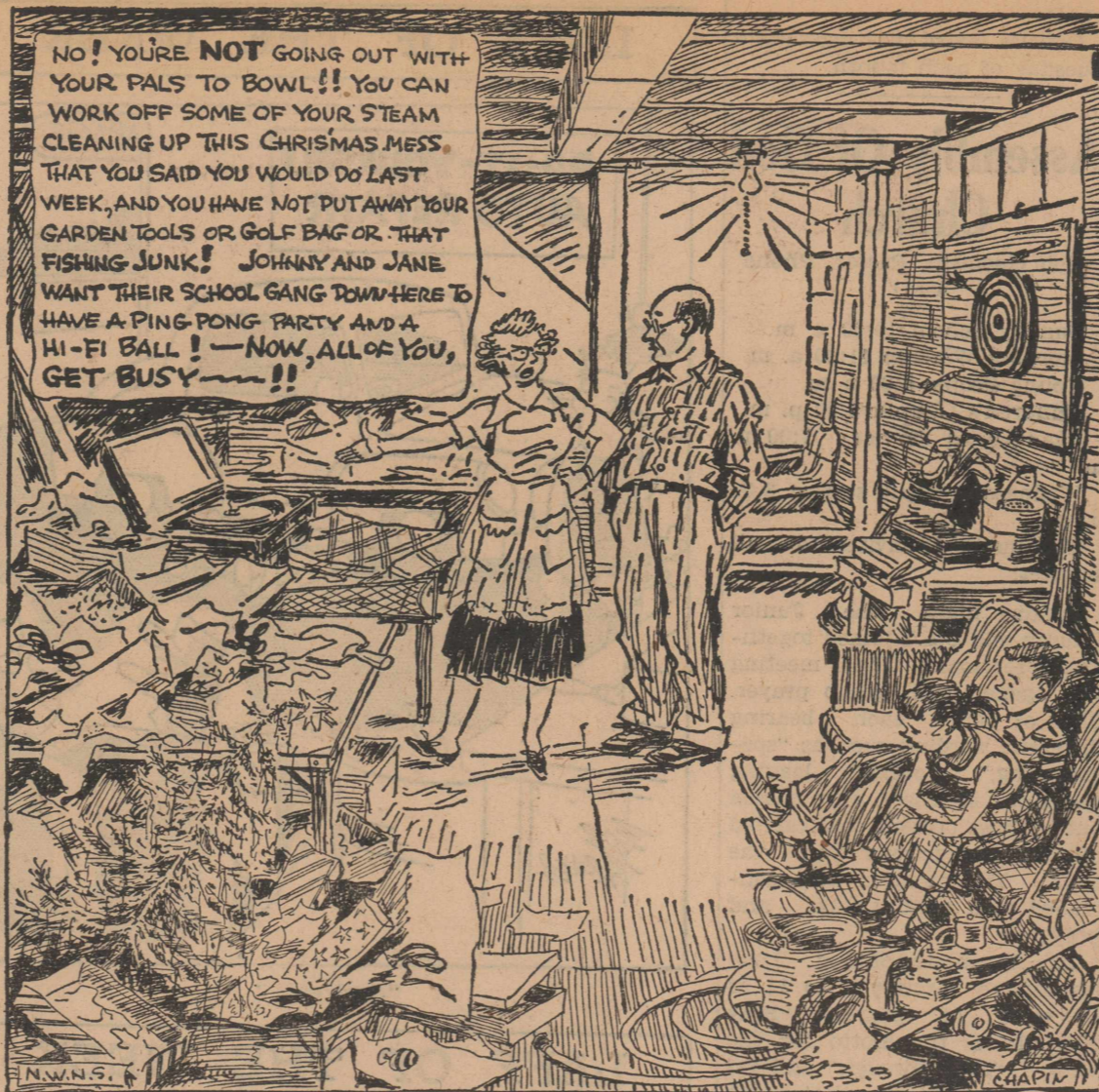
Rev. Charles R. Gates underwent surgery Monday in Worley Hospital in Pampa. He is in room 301.

Walnut Cookies
(Makes 4 dozen)

1/2 cup butter or substitute
1/2 cup sugar
1 egg
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/4 cups sifted flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Cream together butter and sugar. Add egg and vanilla, beating thoroughly. Sift together flour and salt and blend into creamed mixture. Stir in walnuts. Drop by teaspoonfuls on greased baking sheet. Bake in a moderately hot (375°F.) oven about 10 minutes. Remove to wire rack to cool.

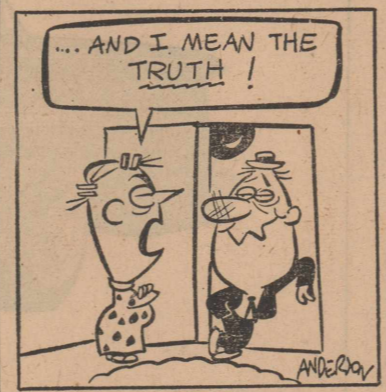

Overwashing is never good for clothes no matter what kind of machine is used. Prolonged washing action may actually redeposit soil on the clothes.

Washing boots in the machine? If you don't have the latest appliance which swirls out the sediment, then rinse the boots before washing to remove dirt, sand and other foreign particles.

Let oven cleaners stand on the porcelain enamel surface long enough to dry pretty thoroughly, then rinse them off. Crusted portions will come clean more easily.

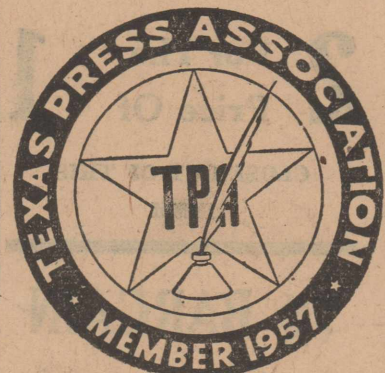

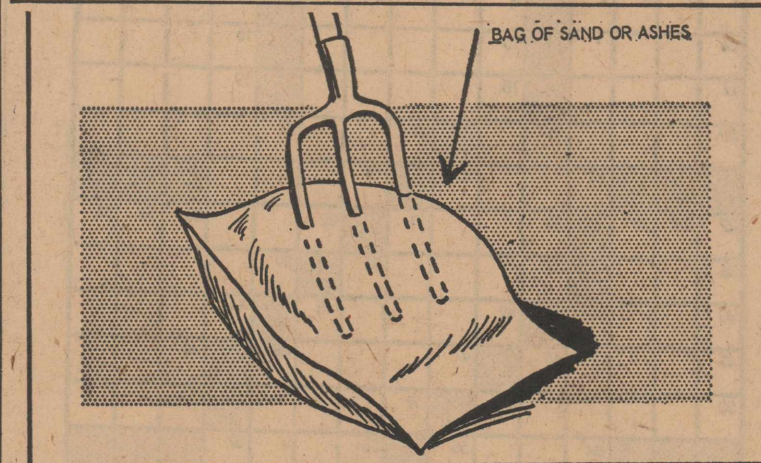

GREETING KING . . . Little girl curtsies to King Mohammed V as Moroccan monarch held "court" for Moroccans living in New York city.



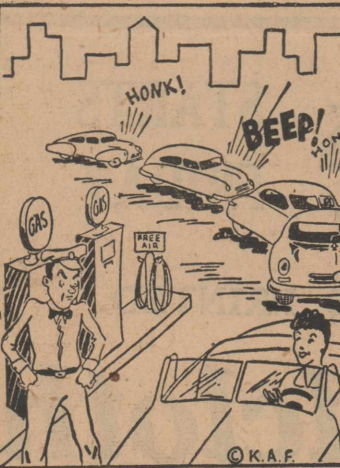
