Deciding to return home, he again became unconscious while stopped to see a doctor in Socorro, New Mexico. He was transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo by ambulance Wednesday.

Becoming ill Monday, he decided to return home with his wife and daughter. At Socorro, New Mexico they stopped for him to see a doctor and he suffered another fainting spell. When they were notified, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. R. Garrison, left immediately for Socorro, and remained with them until Bill was transferred to Amarillo Wednesday.

Mrs. Bill Garrison came home Wednesday night to bring Brenda and to rest before returning to Amarillo this morning.

Mrs. John Knight Will Head '58 Cancer Fund Raising Campaign

Mrs. John Knight will serve as chairman for the 1958 educational and fund-raising campaign of the Sherman County chapter of the American Cancer Society. The campaign will begin April 1.

Under her leadership, volunteers will seek to alert all residents to the need, for regular health examinations as a protection against needless cancer and they will work to raise \$550. The national goal is \$30,000,000 which will be used to further the ACS threefold fight of research, education and service.

"I am proud to be associated with such a meaningful public effort," Mrs. Knight said, "Cancer, considered man's cruellest enemy, annually takes a toll of approximately 250,000 lives.

"Thousands of these persons could have been saved by prompt treatment had they known the life-saving facts about cancer and acted in time. That is why public education is stressed in this campaign and urge all persons to have regular health examinations as a protection against needless death from cancer.

But the American Cancer society needs the generous support of all the citizens. Funds for research are needed to develop methods of diagnosis and treatment that many more lives may be saved. Many people are alive and active today because of the great support of the American people in past campaigns, support that has been translated into concrete results that have already cut death rates for some kinds of cancer."

Yarborough Would Loan Funds To Cities

In order to help men back to work fast, I am co-sponsoring a bill to help cities and counties finance construction of their own local public works projects.

Most Texas cities need to build hospitals, libraries, schools, streets, recreational facilities, city halls, but have been holding back for lack of money.

The bill I am co-sponsoring with Senator Fulbright (D-Ark) would set up a \$2 billion revolving fund to allow states and other political subdivisions to borrow the money they need at around 3 per cent interest for 30 years. This is an anti-high interest rate measure.

There are two major advantages in this program.

First, it would get men back to work quicker in the areas of greatest need, because cities could get their local public works jobs rolling much faster than bigger federal public works projects can be put in motion.

Second, there will be very little, if any, waste under this program. Some cities might take Federal public works funds for unneeded projects. But few cities will construct facilities they don't need with funds they have to pay back.

Boys Ranch Is 19 Years Old

Boys Ranchers celebrated the 19th anniversary of the founding of their "home" this month.

The Ranch birthday is a much cherished tradition with appropriately decorated cakes and plenty of ice cream, to which the boys all look forward.

As the 236 boys celebrated the 19th year of the Ranch the dining hall scene was quite different from the first year when six boys, a superintendent, his wife and cook were housed in the historic courthouse building at the site of Old Tascosa. This building, along with 120 acres, had been given by the late Julian Bivins to form the nucleus of the present ranch.

Today the spread has grown to approximately 10,000 acres and over the years has been home to more than 1,300 boys. Every state in the union has been represented in the enrollment, and boys from seven foreign countries and two U.S. territories have lived there.

For the first time in a number of years Founder Cal Farley and Mrs. Farley were unable to be at the celebration. They were in Arizona making arrangements to bring a boy, sentenced to reform school, to Boys Ranch. Because of their success, this boy will be one of the happy celebrants at next year's event.

The world's continents are America (North and South), Eurasia (Europe and Asia), Africa, Antarctica and Australia.

Noble Brooks, son of Mrs. R. A. Brooks, is in a serious condition in Northwest Texas Hospital as the result of injuries sustained in a highway accident on U.S. Highway 54 Saturday night about 6 miles north-east of Stratford.

A Long Beach, California couple, Mr. and Mrs. Poppenza, occupants of another car involved in the accident, were taken to Dumas Memorial Hospital in the Boxwell ambulance. Poppenza was released from the hospital Monday to continue his trip to South Dakota to attend the funeral of a sister. Mrs. Poppenza is being treated for chest injuries.

Dr. J. L. Wheeler of Texhoma drove upon the scene of the accident soon after it happened. He found Brooks sitting at the edge of the highway and took him to Guymon Municipal Hospital. Brooks sank into a coma soon after he arrived at the hospital. He was transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo Sunday where a brain operation was performed to remove blood clots. Brooks regained consciousness about 8:45 a. m. Wednesday, but his condition remains critical.

Roy Peters, a son of Mrs. W. P. Brooks, volunteered his services to sit up with Brooks at the hospital. He fainted and fell, striking his head on some object causing a slight brain concussion, and was hospitalized for observation.

Those reconstructing the traffic accident said the Brooks car sideswiped a southwest bound truck as he attempted to pass. The impact spun the Brooks car in front of the northeast bound California car. Both cars were demolished. Brooks was thrown from his car, to the pavement. He was returning home from work at Sunray. Mrs. Poppenza was driving the California car and sustained chest injuries. Mr. Poppenza suffered facial lacerations and bruises.

Texas Cars Must Bear '58 Plates On April 2

Midnight, April 1, is the last legal hour for placing 1958 license tags on Texas motor vehicles. To avoid delay and confusion, the certificate of title and last year's registration receipt should be taken to the office of the tax collector when new tags are secured.

Texas motor vehicles must bear 1958 state inspection stickers by April 15.
