THIS WEEK'S RECIPE Old-Fashioned Fruit Salad (Serves 4-6) 2 large oranges large red apple 2 bananas 1/2 cup walnuts 1/3 cup heavy cream, whipped 2 tablespoons lemon juice 2 tablespoons sugar Pare and section oranges. Core and dice unpared apple Peel and slice bananas. Break walnuts into large pieces. Add lemon juice and sugar to whipped cream. Pour over fruit

with just enough orange juice and cream cheese to hold together.

Nice sauce for ham loaf uses 1 cup of maple-flavored syrup heated with 1/2 cup crushed, drained pineapple.
