## County Development Association Arranges To Plant Four Sugar Beet Field Tests

Sugar beet demonstration plots will be planted in the fields of Lester Plunk, Conde Donelson, Buddy Miller and R. M. Buckles to establish the possible yields and sugar content of the beets which may be produced on Sherman County land.

W. S. Hallam of the Holly Sugar Corporation has authorized the expenditure of the cost of the seed, necessary fertilizer and the cost of the men and equipment to plant the crops in the plots furnished by local farmers for the demonstration.

Lloyd Bergsma of the Doane Agricultural Service interested the Holly Sugar Corporation in making experiments in Sherman County as a possible supply point for the production of sugar beets.

Paul Chesmer, president of the Sherman County Development Association, made the arrangements with local producers for plots of ground where the experimental demonstrations might be planted.

The sugar beet production experiment is one of the first phases of the Sherman County development program which is being carried out through the acquired service of the Doane Agricultural Service.

Beets which are produced this year will not be marketed and the land owners have no hopes of reaping any profits from participation in the program. Plunk, Donelson, Miller and Buckles have merely consented to do some additional work in an effort to determine the feasibility of profitable sugar beet production in the county.

The primary purpose of producing sugar beets is for sale as a sugar refinery product. Cured tops of the beets have an additional value. According to available information the cured beet tops have a nutrient value comparable to alfalfa.

Normal planting time for sugar beets is usually from April 1 to 15. The plantings in Sherman County will have a late start but it is the opinion of the men who will bear the expense of the project, that it will be possible to produce beets of a variety which will establish the potential value of the crop.

### Mrs. L. A. Walker Laid To Rest Tuesday

Funeral services for Mrs. L. A. Walker, 86-year-old grandmother of Alvin Judd, were conducted at 2:00 p. m. Tuesday in the First Baptist Church at Texhoma by Rev. Edward Donoho of the Nazarene Church. Burial was made in the Texhoma cemetery.

Mrs. Walker died Saturday in Guymon Municipal Hospital. She was born in Atlanta, Georgia June 5, 1871, and was a member of the United Brethren Church. In 1889 she married L. A. Walker in Grandview, Texas. The couple lived in Hooker before moving to Texhoma in 1919.

Survivors are the husband, L. A. Walker, three daughters, Mrs. Lillie Judd of Sun Valley, California, Mrs. Ethel Gribble of Maywood, California, and Mrs. Opal Teague of Texhoma; three sons, Jess and Elva, both of Texhoma, and Joe of Hooker; one brother, Henry Moore of Hickory, Oklahoma; one sister, Mrs. Pearl Kiser of Douglas, Kansas; 13 grandchildren, 30 great grandchildren and four great great grandchildren.

FFA boys sold the heifers they have had in a commercial feeding program in Oklahoma City last week for an average profit of slightly more than \$50.00 per head, according to Duard Lamb.

The boys invested \$6,875.00 in 60 head of Hereford heifers purchased the latter part of October. They were pastured on stubble and wheat until January 1. Beginning January 1 the boys used a 21 day period to get the cattle on a full feed ration consisting of 20 pounds of grain sorghum, 1 pound of cotton seed meal, 1 pound of alfalfa and 4 pounds of bundles with auromycin and minerals added. The heifers were on full feed for 111 days, not including the 21 day warming up period.

During the first part of May three packers bid on the calves. Armour placed the high bid of \$25.75. Some of the calves were sold locally but Armour bought a large percentage. The calves were delivered to the Santa Fe pens May 12 and were accepted by the company with an average shrinkage of 2%. The average pay weight of 850 pounds gave the boys a gain of 300 pounds on their 550 pound heifers.

The purpose of the commercial feeding program is to train boys to feed livestock under actual operating conditions.

The first year of the project, the boys fed 30 Hereford steers which were sold locally. Forty Angus heifers were fed the second year. These were sold to a Pueblo, Colorado packing house and the boys enjoyed their first marketing trip.

Jack Dettle, Baskin Brown and Duard Lamb accompanied the boys to Oklahoma City Tuesday of last week. Arrangements for their entertainment were made by Richard Wilson, formerly of Stratford, who is an agricultural reporter with WKY-TV in Oklahoma City. Wednesday was spent on an education-

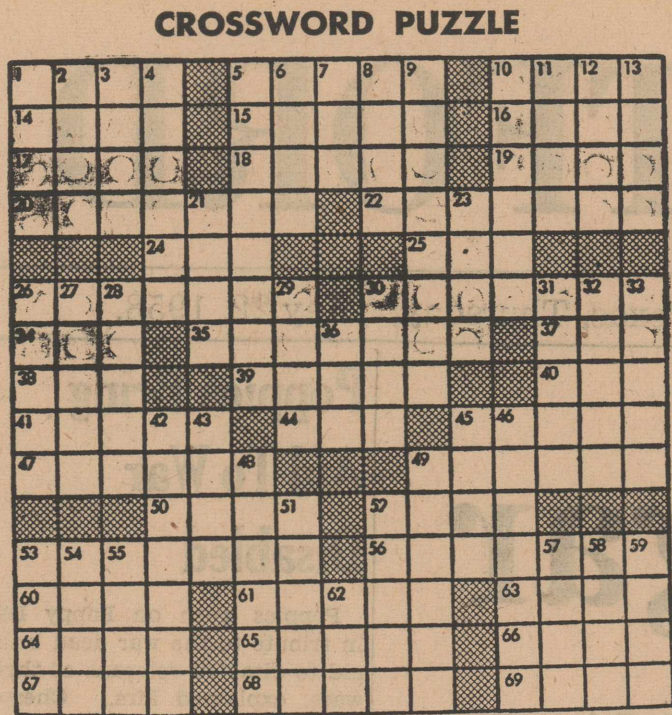

The guest of honor was assisted by her mother-in-law, Mrs. Glen Reed, with the pleasant

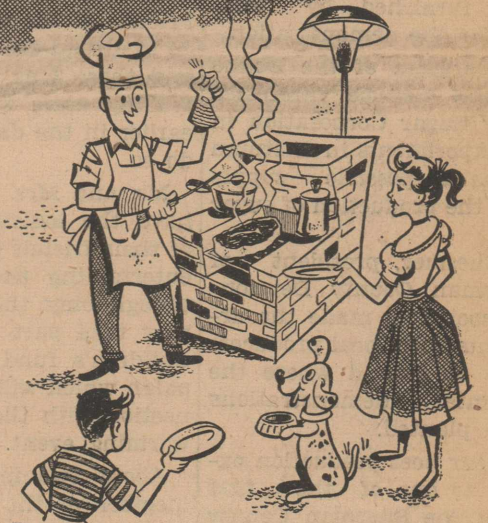
task of opening her lovely gift packages.

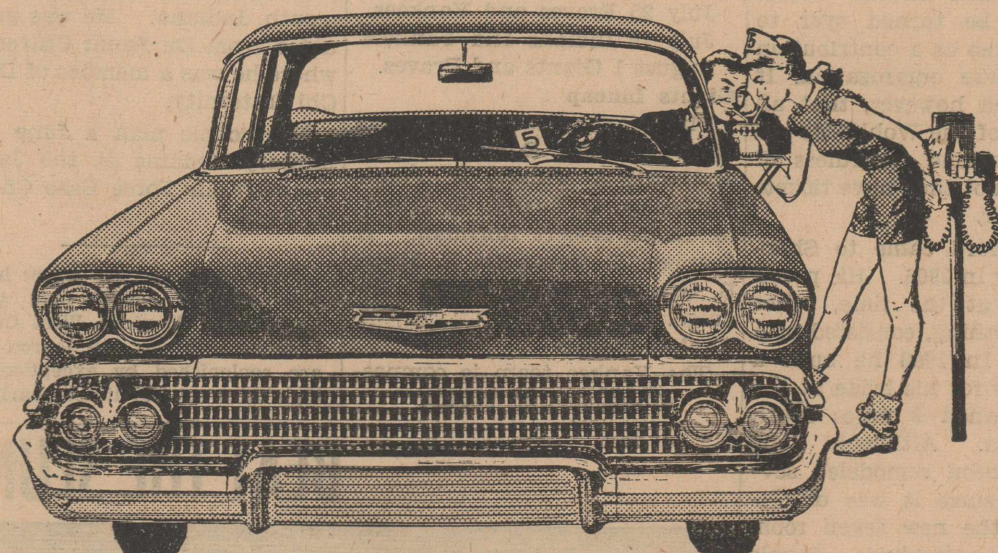

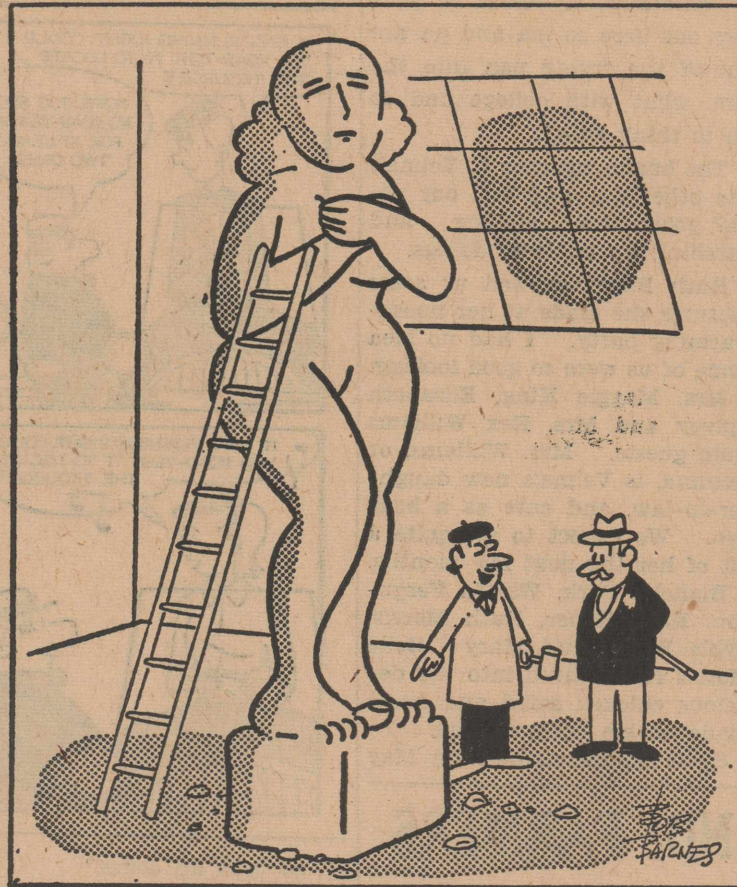
Elliott Crabtree gave a brief summary of the Lions Club sponsored tour of Sherman County on which various varieties of wheat were observed.

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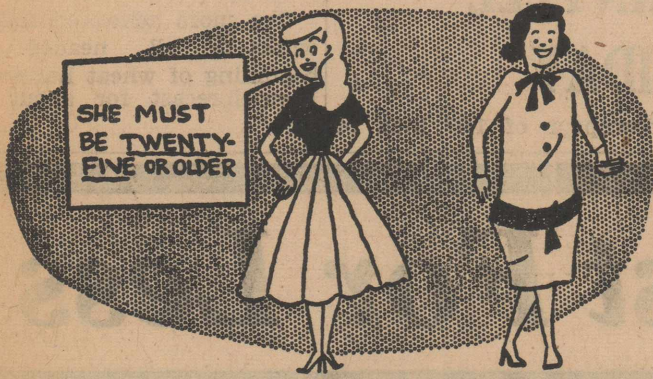

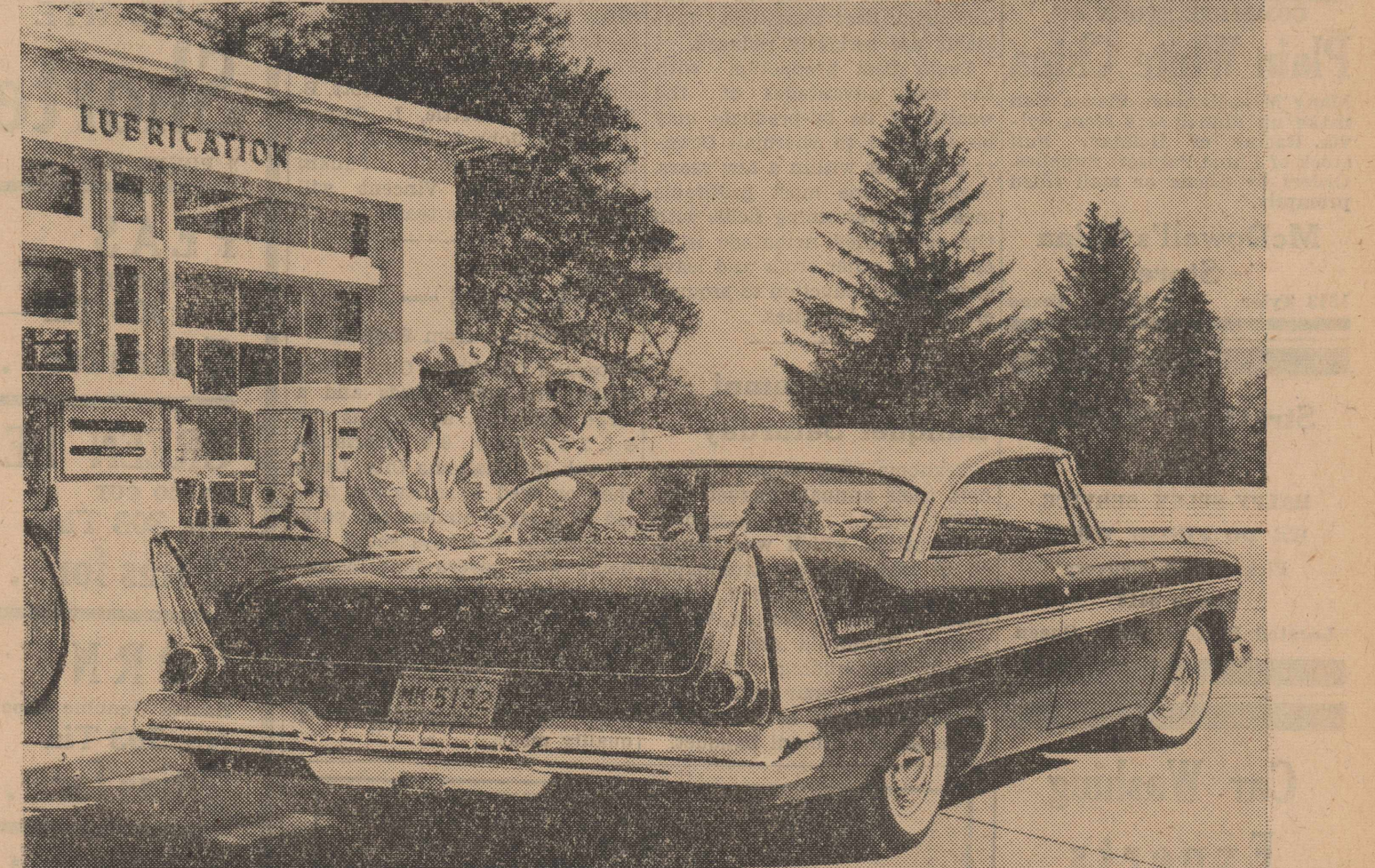

# \$1.81 Support For '59 Wheat

The price of 1959-crop wheat will be supported at a minimum national average rate of \$1.81 per bushel, R. C. Buckles, chairman of the Sherman County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, announces.

This support will apply if at least two-thirds of the growers in the June 20 referendum approve marketing quotas for the 1959 wheat crop. The support of \$1.81 per bushel will not be reduced but may be increased if the wheat parity price and supply situation as of July 1, 1959 indicates a higher support price.

If quotas are approved, chairman Buckles explains, producers in the commercial wheat area who stay within their farm allotments will be eligible for price support on their entire wheat production. Outside the area, county support rates will be 75 per cent of what they would be if the noncommercial counties were in the commercial area.

If quotas are not approved by the necessary two-thirds vote, support for the 1959 wheat crop in the commercial wheat-producing area will drop to 50 per cent of parity or about \$1.20 per bushel. Compliance with allotments would continue to be a condition of eligibility for the lower support price.

The chairman said that the \$1.81 per bushel represents 75

per cent of the estimated modernized parity price. The level of support is based on the relationship between the estimated total supply available for the marketing year and a determined normal supply for the year. The 1959-60 wheat supply is now estimated at 170.9 per cent of normal.

to Sherman County.

Although sugar beet production is a closed crop produced on allotment acreage, the interest of the sugar company in Sherman County may not be far fetched. Continued growth of sugar beets has resulted in the development of the sugar nematode to serious proportions in the soil. Such infestations make sugar beet growing unprofitable unless, through a long-time rotation system in which nonhost crops of the nematode are grown, the sugar beet nematode population is drastically reduced. After such a regime of control is established, sugar beets cannot be grown more than once in 5 or 6 years, and the other crops in the cycle must be nonhost plants.

Occasionally sugar beets have been grown continuously for several years with good yields in fields where manure has been applied in ample quantities. Such fields may have escaped the introduction and subsequent increase of the nematode. Other fields in the same districts with a similar history of intensive cropping with sugar beets have become so infested with the sugar beet nematode that yields are seriously reduced.

Sugar beet production with the many advantages of the wealth of its by-products may be available to Sherman County producers within a few years. Seemingly the most profitable means of overcoming fields with the established nematode is to change to other crops and leave sugar beet production to producers in other localities.
