The Trustees propose to keep the \$200,000 issue on a ten year bond schedule and can issue these bonds at 2.44% interest rate. This is the lowest interest rate ever available to the district and is due to the excellent financial condition of the district. Tax valuations for 1958 will be unchanged except for natural increases. A tax rate of \$1.27 will be used for maintenance and bond retirement. The total valuation of the district for 1958 will reach \$23,917,000 and is covered by valuations of approximately 68% utilities and natural gas, and 32% local property and land values.





Contract for spraying range and in Sherman County was let last week in conjunction with Dallam and Hartley County on 514,000 acres. Actual spraying operations are to get underway this week in Sherman County.

Ranchmen wanting any additional rang land sprayed will have to file application by this week end. The estimated cost, to the ranchman is about 30c per acre.

New provisions have been made in the grasshopper program whereby the federal government may lend assistance of 1/3 of the cost up to 25c per acre for spraying fence rows in the county. To benefit under this program the farmer will have to make application through the commissioners' court who will accept a minimum of 3 bids for spraving fence rows. This should not cause any delay to farmers who want to get fence rows sprayed provided they can arrange to have 50 or more miles signed up in one area. With the plains already operating in the county and other planes available in the area, the bids and business transaction can be completed very rapidly.
