Helium Plants Are Favored

Stratford, a potential helium capitol of the world, watched with eager anticipation this week, as administration cabinet members gave their support to a program which would construct 12 helium plants on the high plains. Construction of such a plant near Stratford would alleviate many of the short comings of an agricultural economy. It would open the future of a new world of opportunity to the young people of Sherman County and supply the life blood for a progressive territory during periods of drouth and over production in agricultural products. Development of the territory's natural resources, the surface of which has only been scratched, will mean "hope" for every individual who looks to this territory as a place to make his or her home. In the modern way of life, there are no substitutes for a solid financial foundation for the high ideals of civilization which can be developed in the climatic conditions of this region which stimulate ambition.

The Eisenhower administration will attempt to push through the next session of congress legislation which will permit private capital to produce helium for storage. Should this legislation fail, the government plans to launch an extensive conservation program.

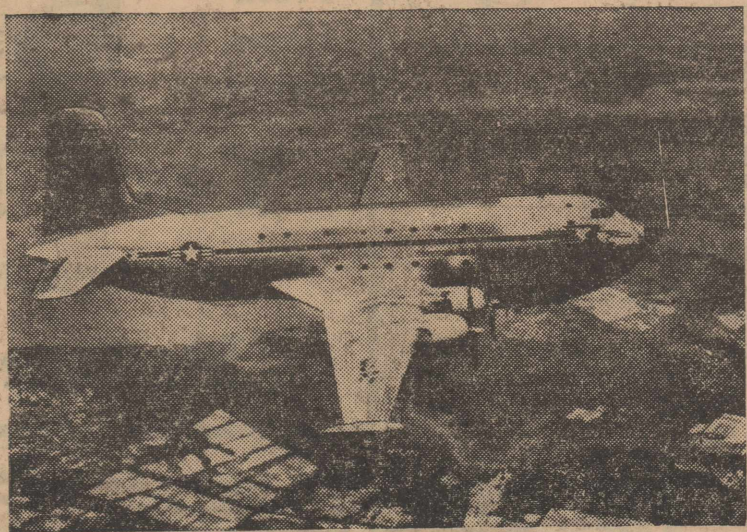
Once such legislation is passed, work will start immediately to line up private capital for the job and if that fails, the administration is committed to get the job done with federal funds, according to Hatfield Chilson, under secretary of the Interior Department. It is estimated the program will cost from 200 to 300 million dollars.

The proposed helium conservation program, has 100 per cent backing from the cabinet, Chilson states. Usually there is at least some slight opposition to any proposed program.

The proposed helium conservation program is designed to extract all helium from gas before it is sent to market and store the rare element in the government owned Cliffside Gas Field 12 miles northwest of Amarillo.

At the present time, under existing consumption and production, there are only enough known helium reserves to last the free world another 20 to 30 years. Each year billions of cubic feet of helium is lost in gas which is sent to market without processing to extract the rare gas and it is this gas which is

August 11 Is Rabies Shot Day

Dr. C. A. Thompson, Dalhart veterinarian, will be in Stratford Monday, August 11, from 9:00 a. m. to 11:00 a. m., to give inoculations as a protection against rabies to all pets unprotected from the disease. The shots will be given at the city hall.

It will be possible to inoculate all the unprotected pets within the two hour limit, if only those who have notified the city secretary, have pets that are unprotected by the dreaded disease of rabies.

Dr. Thompson has said that in view of the seriousness of the situation, he would remain for a longer time in the event more pets are brought in than can be inoculated within the two hour limit. He feels however, that he could not afford to stay away from his business for an entire day in order to give inoculations to only a dozen dogs when it would be possible through the cooperation of the owners to give the vaccine within a short period of time.

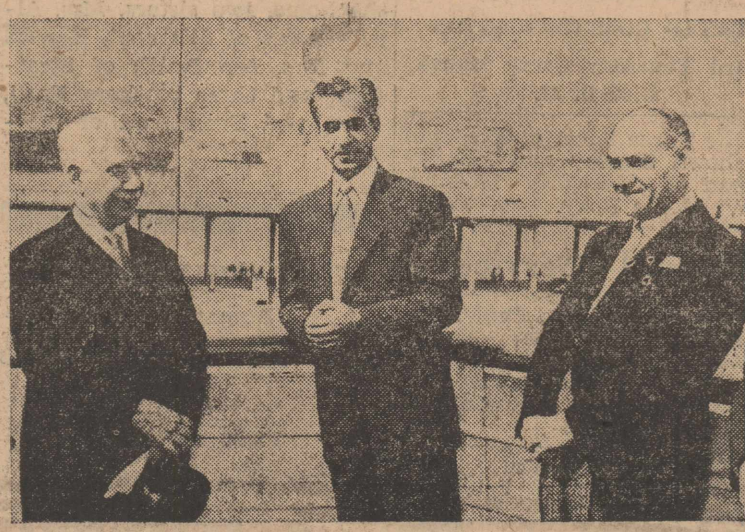

DARKEST DAY IN HISTORY



WITH the 1959 fiscal year only a matter of weeks old, Washington economists are predicting that it will not only come to an end with the \$8 to \$11 billion national deficit that has been forecast, but that it shall accomplish little to keep the fiscal year 1960 from continuing the big spread between government income and outgo.

The only thing that could offset the anticipated 1959 deficit would be a tremendous "boom"—and there is not too much possibility of such a boom taking place.

Actually, the government is in a rather puzzling position. Some of the things it might do to help the economy cannot be done for fear they would either bring about a further downward trend in business or else increase the federal deficit.

Economists are pointing out that a tax cut would provide only temporary relief. They say that it would make the federal deficit even greater, without offering anything of the type of long-range stimulant that is needed for economic recovery.

They also say that it is unwise for the government to reduce its spending. Reduction in government spending would cut away support for long-range programs, reverse the slowly rising consumer buying movement and unemployment would spiral again at a much faster rate.

No one anticipates a quick renewal of the boom-type prosperity our country enjoyed before the recession. This, of course, is the

only easy remedy for the current economic situation. With no "painless" relief in sight, observers conclude that it will be necessary for the government to raise its arbitrary debt limit, borrow more money from its citizens, and pump this back into federal programs to give the economy a boost.

Under this situation, observers say, Congress will probably have little reason to smile when next January the President submits his fiscal 1960 budget, which includes estimates of both income and spending.

Unless something happens in the meanwhile to make the anticipated deficit for fiscal 1960 smaller than the deficit at the end of fiscal 1959, observers say that Congress will have to knuckle down to the task of doing something about it. And this, in another language, means serious consideration of an increase in taxes. With the 1959 elections out of the way, observers say, Congress will most likely be in the mood to approach the problem in a realistic manner.

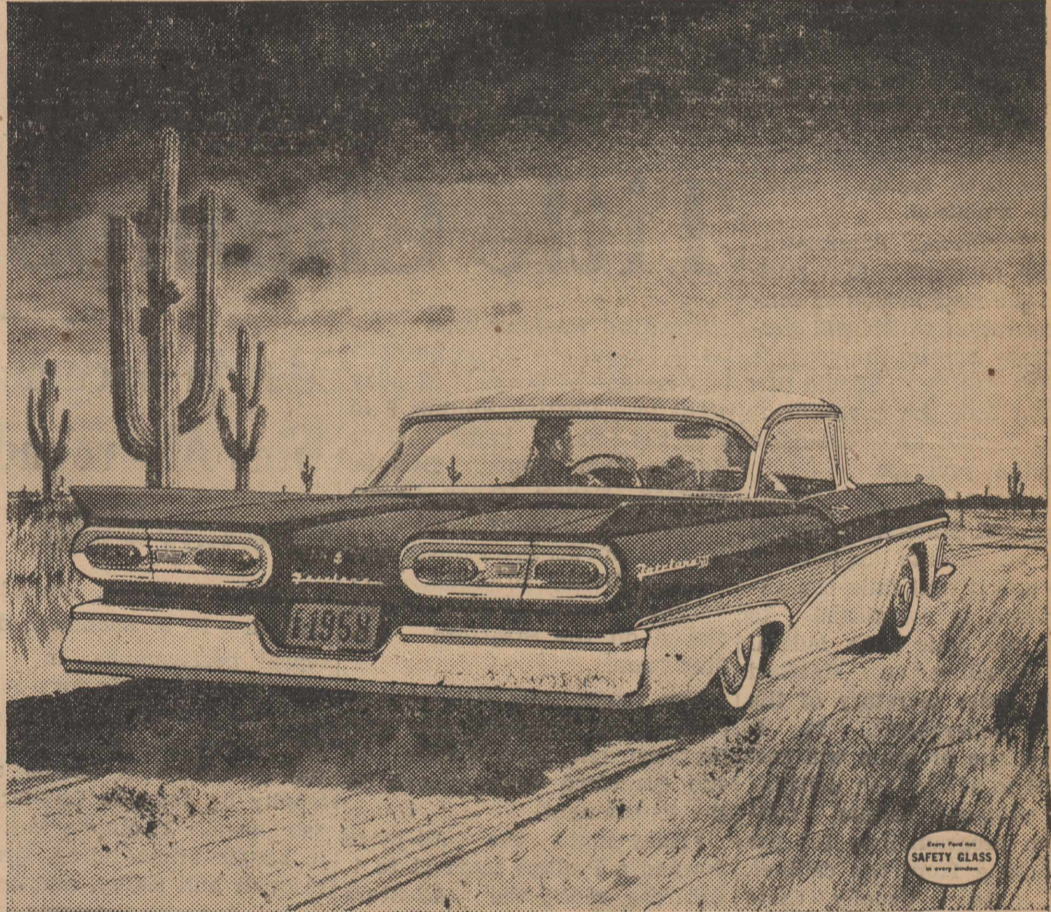

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.
HJR #17—Number Six on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 17 proposing an amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 66, to provide that the Legislature shall have authority to provide a system of retirement and disability pensions to certain retiring Texas Rangers and their widows, stating the maximum of such pension; and providing a fund from which such pensions may be paid.

SECTION 66. The Legislature shall have authority to provide for a system of retirement and disability pensions for retiring Texas Rangers who have not been eligible at any time for membership in the Employees Retirement System of Texas as that retirement system was established by Chapter 352, Acts of the Fifth Legislature, Regular Session, 1947, and who have had as much as two (2) years service as a Texas Ranger, and to their widows, as providing that no pension shall exceed Eighty Dollars (\$80) per month to any

SJR #3—Number Nine on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 5, to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas; authorizing the County of Potter to render financial aid to and participate in the operation of such Hospital District; authorizing the Commissioners Court of said county to assess and levy taxes on property outside the incorporated limits of such city; further authorizing a countywide Hospital District for Wichita County, Texas, and authorizing the creation of two districts in Jefferson County, Texas, and providing that any enabling Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character.

SECTION 5. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of two hospital districts, one to be coextensive with and have the same boundaries as the incorporated City of Amarillo, as such boundaries may be lawfully extended, and the other to be coextensive with Wichita County.

"If such district or districts are created, they may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of taxable property within the district; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property taxpayers who have duly rendered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections so long as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of Seventy-five Cents (75¢) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation, and no election shall be required by subsequent changes in the boundaries of the City of Amarillo.

"If such tax is authorized, no political subdivision or municipality within or having the same boundaries as the district may levy a tax for medical or hospital care for needy individuals, nor shall they maintain or erect hospital facilities, but the district shall by resolution assume all such responsibilities and shall assume all of the liabilities and obligations (including bonds and warrants) of such subdivisions or municipalities or both. The maximum tax rate submitted shall be sufficient to discharge such obligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to maintain and operate the hospital system, and the Legislature may authorize the district to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of improvements and initially equipping the same, and such bonds shall be payable from said Seventy-five Cents (75¢) tax. The Legislature shall provide for transfer of title to properties to the district.

"(b) The Legislature may by law permit the County of Potter (in which the City of Amarillo is partially located) to render financial aid to that district by paying a part of the expenses of operating and maintaining the system and paying a part of the debts of the district (whether assumed or created by the district) and may authorize the levy of a tax not to exceed Ten Cents (10¢) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation (in addition to other taxes permitted by this Constitution) upon all property within the county but without the City of Amarillo at the time such levy is made for such purposes. If such tax is authorized, the district shall by resolution assume the responsibilities, obligations, and liabilities of the county in the manner and to the extent hereinabove provided for political subdivisions with the district, and the county shall not thereafter levy taxes (other than hereinafter provided) for hospital purposes nor for providing hospital care for needy individuals of the county.

"(c) The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a hospital district within Jefferson County, the boundaries of which shall include only the area comprising the Jefferson County Drainage District No. 7 and the Fort Arthur Independent School District, as such boundaries existed on the first day of January, 1957, with the power to issue bonds for the sole purpose of purchasing a site for, and the construction and initial equipping of, a hospital system, and with the power to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of property therein for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on such bonds.

"The creation of such hospital district shall not be final until approved at an election by a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting at said election who have duly rendered their property for taxation upon the tax rolls of either said Drainage or said School District, nor shall

such bonds be issued or such tax be levied until so approved by such voters.

"The district shall not have the power to levy any tax for maintenance or operation of the hospital or facilities, but shall contract with other political subdivisions of the state or private individuals, associations, or corporations for such purposes.

"If the district hereinabove authorized is finally created, no other hospital district may be created embracing any part of the territory within its boundaries, but the Legislature by law may authorize the creation of a hospital district incorporating therein the remainder of Jefferson County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided by Article IX, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, except that such district shall be confirmed at an election wherein the resident qualified property taxpayers voting who have duly rendered their property within such proposed district for taxation on the county rolls, shall be authorized to vote. A majority of those participating in the election voting in favor of the district shall be necessary for its confirmation and for bonds to be issued.

"(d) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character.

SECTION 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the general election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas, and authorizing Potter County to lend financial aid to and participate in the operation of said Hospital District, and further authorizing the Legislature to create a countywide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas."

AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas, and authorizing Potter County to lend financial aid to and participate in the operation of said Hospital District, and further authorizing the Legislature to create a countywide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas."

SECTION 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

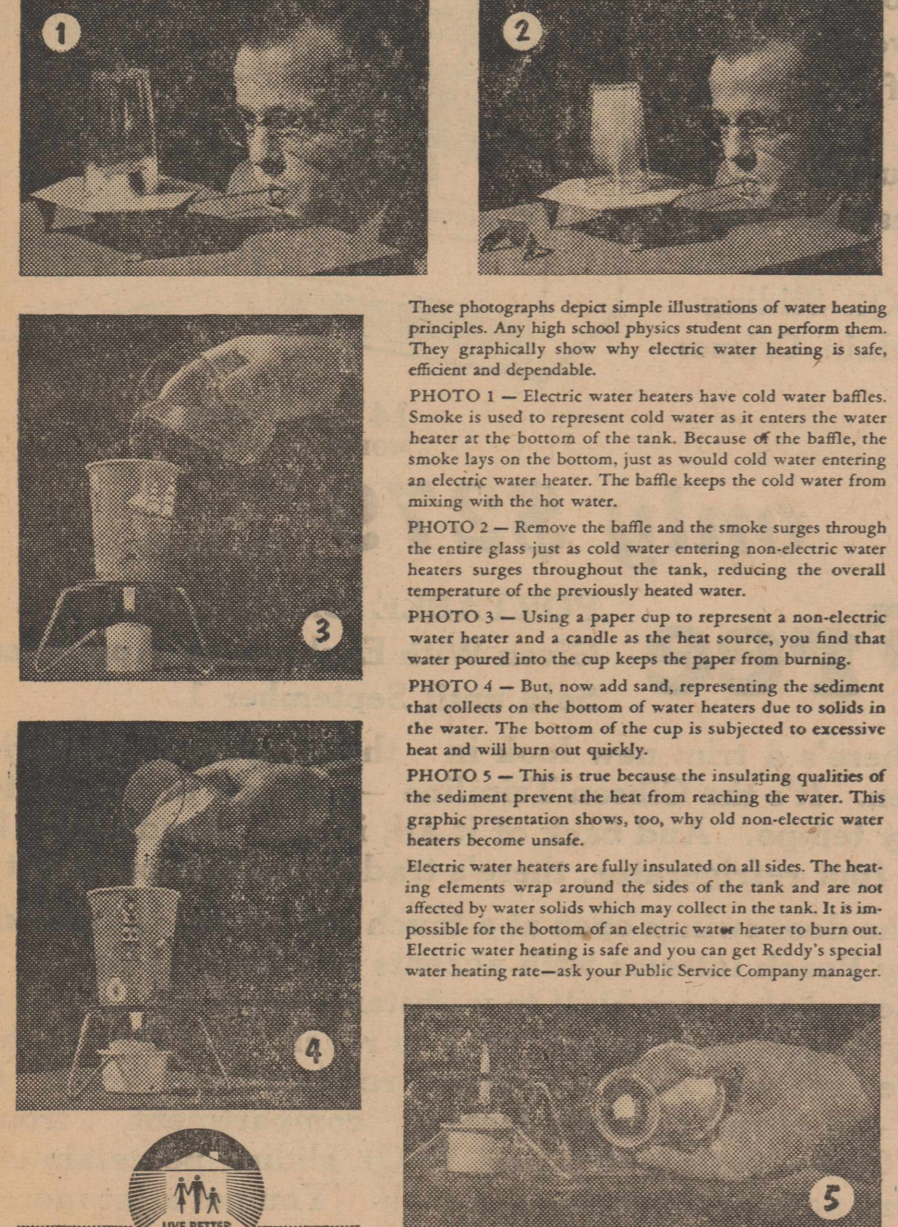

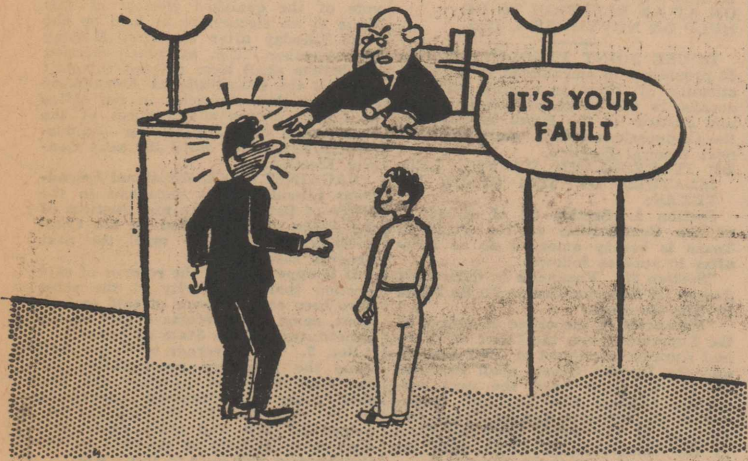

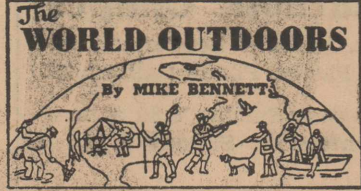
Teenagers are full of fun and full of life. But they need understanding yet firm parental guidance and for this reason it isn't fair or smart, to look the other way.

WHILE some thirty million Americans of all ages have found boating to be an exciting, invigorating — and safe — sport, thousands of others deny themselves the pleasure of enjoying recreation on the water simply because they are afraid of it.

Water is always dangerous, and it is wise to have a healthy awareness of this fact. Yet, when the proper safeguards are observed, boating and other water sports can be as safe as putting around in the backyard.

Most people fear water for good reason—they cannot swim. Yet, barring some physical disability, there is today little excuse for an individual not being able to swim. Few communities do not have regular learn-to-swim programs. While it is true that these programs are mainly geared to teaching youngsters, adult instruction is offered in most instances.

If you are a non-swimmer, check first with your local YMCA and Red Cross chapter. Chances are, instruction is available to you. Both of these organizations have been responsible for teaching thousands of youngsters and adults how to take care of themselves in the water.

Learning to swim usually takes only a short time. But it opens up a new area of wonderful outdoor recreational activity — swimming, boating, water skiing, skin diving and fishing. Thousands and thousands are taking up one or more of these sports each year.

It is natural that the inability to swim brings a psychological fear of water—but it is a fear that is simple to overcome through learning to swim.

Swimming, like bicycle riding or roller skating, calls for only a little co-ordination and effort. With proper instruction, it is usually as simple as rolling off a log.

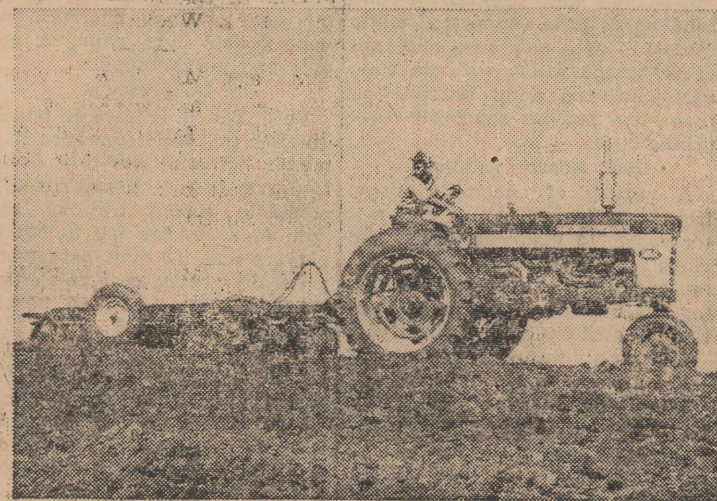

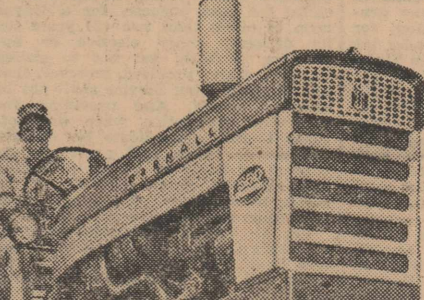

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas...

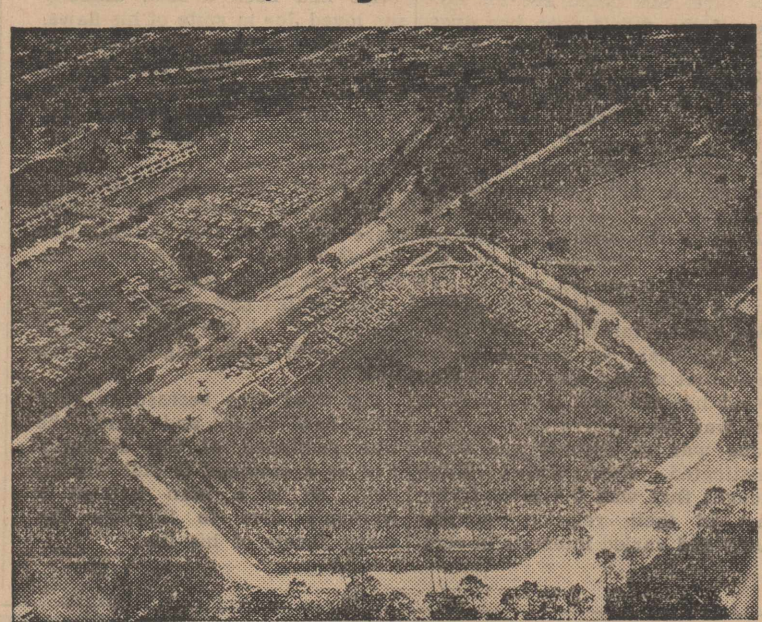

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas to require that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election, to be resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas. Section 1. Section 28 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows: "Section 28. Vacancies in Offices of Judges of Superior Courts To Be Filled By The Governor. "Vacancies in the office of Judges of the Supreme Court, the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Court of Civil Appeals and the District Courts shall be filled by the Governor until the next General Election; and vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court until the next succeeding General Election."

STAGGERING TERMS OF OFFICE.—The following officers elected at the General Election in November, 1954, and thereafter, shall serve the full term provided in this Constitution: (a) District Clerks; (b) County Clerks; (c) County Judges; (d) Judges of County Courts at Law, County Criminal Courts, County Probate Courts and County Domestic Relations Courts; (e) County Treasurers; (f) Criminal District Attorneys; (g) County Surveyors; (h) Inspectors of Hides and Animals; (i) County Commissioners for Precincts Two and Four; (j) Justices of the Peace."

Range Grasshopper Program Completed

The Sherman County Grasshopper Committee announces the spraying of grasshoppers under the range program in Sherman County has been completed and financial statements are being prepared for settlement with the contractors. In closing out the program the committee gave the following report on spraying operations; grasshopper situation present in county and outlook for this fall.

The results of the range grasshopper control program was not

as satisfactory as hoped for. There were a number of factors that contributed to the poor results obtained, such as weather, 10 different species of grasshoppers present that spread hatching period over a longer time, some shortage of trained personnel, small area signed up under program and migration of hoppers resulting from delay in spraying.

The committee requested a survey of the area by a competent entomologist not connected with the contractors, to evaluate results of program and make recommendations for completing operations. A. E. Frazier of the Pest Control Division, Department of Agriculture, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, made this appraisal of Sherman County.

Frazier is one of the most able authorities on grasshoppers in the nation and has had a lot of experience in grasshopper control work. The committee feels that he did an excellent job and made a very detailed and impartial report on the grasshopper situation as found.

Mr. Frazier identified 10 different species of grasshoppers present, only a very few range grasshopper species remain but there are too many grasshoppers that feed on weeds and crops left to evaluate the program as satisfactory as hoped for by the government and contractor, or ranchmen to be happy with the results, Frazier reported finding a count of hoppers on range land inspected of less than 1 per square yard on most of the short grass area, with the county on some local spots as high as 1 to 3 or 4. In the low areas infested with weeds the count run 1 to 3 per square yard on most of the area with some spots with the count running as high as 6 or 7, but he said with these hoppers being weed feeders and having excessive vegetation this year they could be expected to remain in local areas until frost and die, without doing much damage to grass. He observed a number of parasites working on the grasshopper which normally help reduce their population. One of the main grasshopper parasites observed is a gray fly that attacks the hopper in flight; another is the blister beetle that destroys grasshopper eggs.

He stated that of the hoppers left, the worst one is the Mexicanas which is classified as forb hopper and prefers thistles, some other weeds and small grain to eat. He is a migratory hopper, however if plenty of desired vegetation is present, will not leave the immediate area. These hoppers produce two generations during one growing season. Mr. Frazier observed the population of these hoppers in wheat stubble and volunteer

as high as 2 adults per square yard and found as many as 5 egg pods per square yard. These egg pods contain as high as 25 to 30 grasshopper eggs per pod. He also observed some second generation Mexicanas grasshoppers present which he warns will be a potential source of severe hopper infestation this fall and poses a great threat to any small wheat unless the hoppers are brought under control.

Mr. Frazier advised the committee after his inspection of the area, that taking things into consideration as they existed during the time of spraying operations, the results were probably about as good as could be expected, although not as satisfactory as hoped for. With as few range hoppers present now and the other hoppers reduced to number, he observed it was not advisable economically to spend any more money spraying grasshoppers under this program. He explained that in the weeded areas more insecticides mixed in larger quantity of carrier spray per acre may have given more effective control. But he said the range program was set up to kill hoppers on short grass range land.

After receiving the report from Mr. Frazier, the County Grasshopper Control Committee requested the contractors to complete cost statements and present them for consideration and settlement.

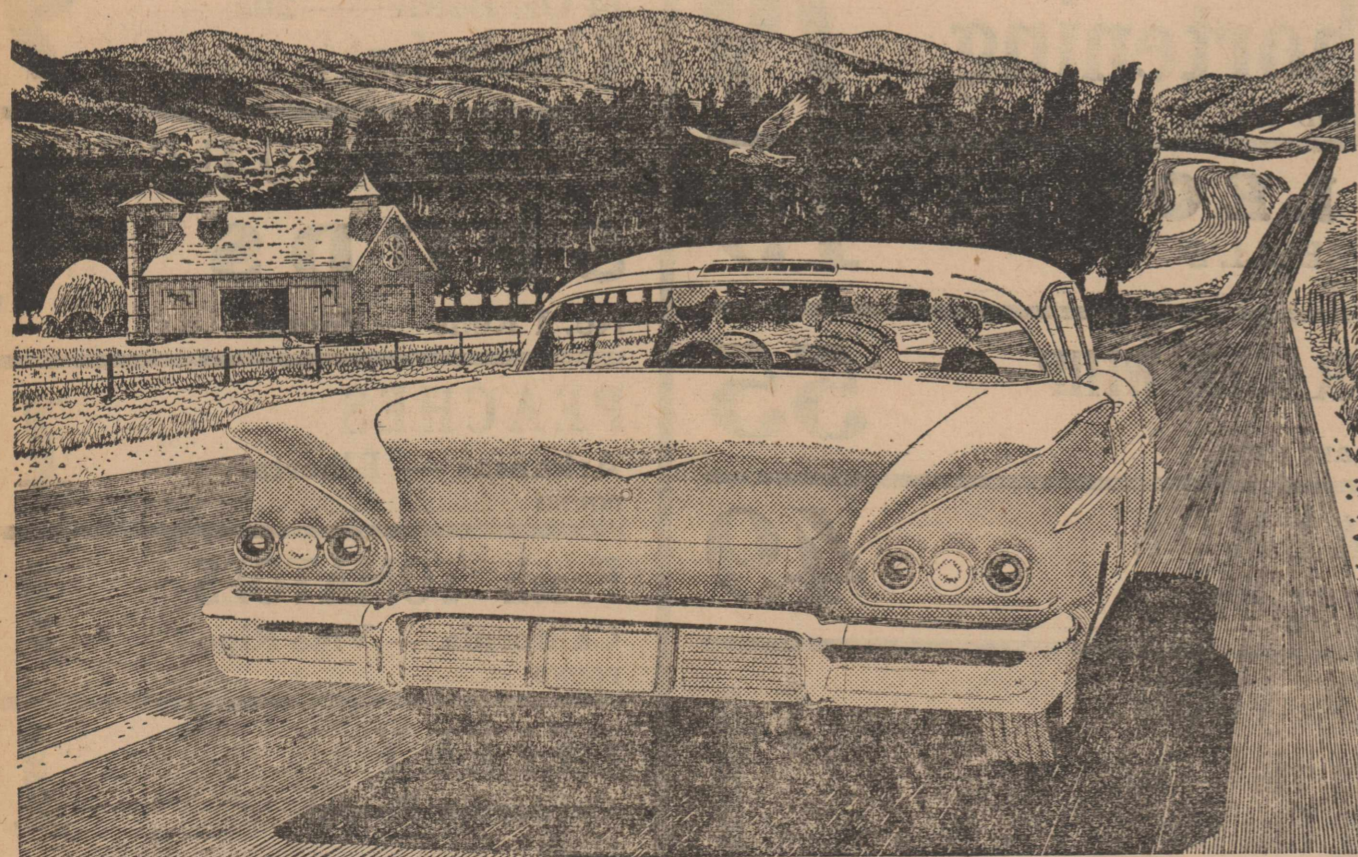

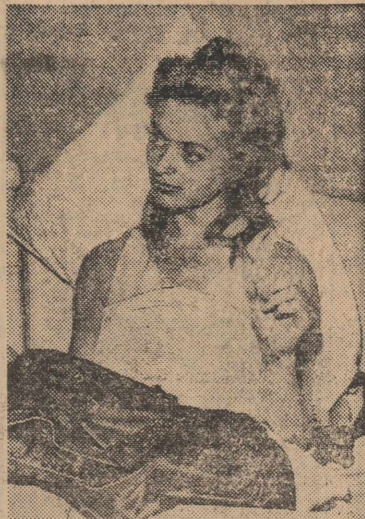

Grasshoppers Threat To Young Fall Wheat

Reports received from farmers and A. E. Frazier, Entomologist, who recently made a hopper survey in Sherman County indicate the county is confront-

ed with a threat of severe grasshopper infestation in wheat fields this fall. Mr. Frazier found as many as 25 adult grasshoppers per square yard present in some of the wheat stubble fields and volunteer wheat, he also found as many as 5 pods of grasshopper eggs per square yard. Each of these pods contain from 25 to 30 grasshopper eggs. These are Mexicanas hoppers and the second generation are hatching now. Many of the crop of hoppers can be expected to stay here until frost and with this second generation hatching now added to the

present population, farmers can expect serious damage to small wheat this fall unless the hoppers are killed.

Farmers may control these hoppers or at least reduce the population by spraying and putting out poison baits. If there is green vegetation growing in the area to be planted to wheat, we recommend spraying with 4 ounces of aldrin in 3 or 4 gallons of water per acre. Spray the fence rows, bar-ditches and a strip 40 or 50 feet wide on any adjoining crops just before or at the time of planting wheat. Spread a band of poison bait 40 to 50 feet wide around the wheat field. This bait may be prepared by mixing 100 pounds of bran with 3 parts of sawdust by volume and adding 8 ounces of aldrin to the mixture, you may use dieldrin at the rate of 4 ounces per mixture. Chlor-dane or Toxaphene has given satisfactory results when mixed as directed on container.

The County Agent stated that it is very important that the fence rows or crop land adjoining the wheat be sprayed a day or so before the wheat is planted and that the bait be put out immediately following planting in order to kill the hoppers before the wheat germination.

Farmers are encouraged to make preparations now for controlling their hoppers. There is no county, state or federal program that offers any financial assistance at this time. Each farmer should inspect his area where he plans to plant wheat. If hoppers are present in threatening numbers it may be well for him to complete plans for spraying and make arrangements for the chemical, sawdust and bran for treating his farm land.

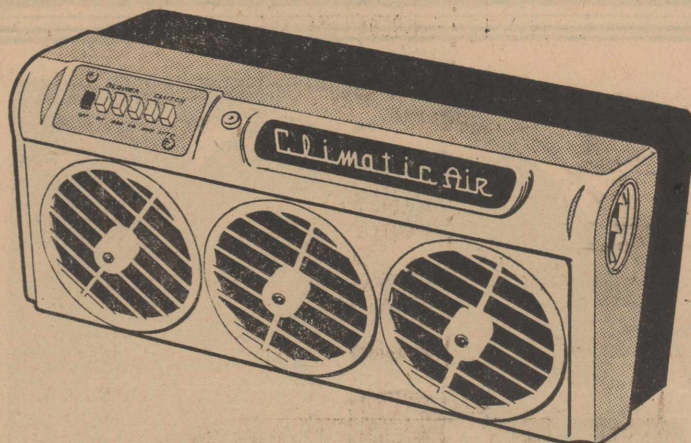

proposed to be stored. Chilson says the first step in the program would be to get the enabling legislation through Congress. After that work will start immediately toward getting the plan in operation.

Chilson said he didn't think there would be enough time to get the legislation through the

present session.

Secretary of Interior Seaton has proposed that private capital be urged to do the job. But if that should fail the government would continue to be the sole operator of helium extraction plants in the free world.

"The administration is fully aware of the emergency of this program," Chilson said. "Each year it is delayed the more wasting of this gas which is so vital to our national defense."

Chilson noted that 400,000 new oil and gas wells have been drilled in the United States since 1943 and none of them have supplied a major source of helium.

About 99 per cent of the known supply in the free world is found on the plains region.

Chilson said location of the plants, and even the fields where they would be located had not yet been made. "But we know where all the supply is at the

present time and locating them will be a minor job."

Chilson said the helium conservation program as outlined by Seaton was in addition to the extraction plant to be built by the government in the Oklahoma Panhandle. This plant is already in the works, he said, and is not a part of the conservation program.
