Elaine Spurlock won the County 4-H Baking contest held Friday, with a delicious cherry pie and fluffy biscuits. Her entries were judged the best entered by members of the Junior Cooks, Happy Girls Club, Clover Club, Country Club and Junior Workers 4-H Clubs.

The highest possible score to make was 125. Elaine Spurlock scored 110 points but since she has already won the district title, she is not eligible to place her entries in the district contest. Kay Spurlock and Ellen Dyess tied with scores of 109½ points. Ellen Dyess is under the age limit for district competition. Kay Spurlock will enter the District Better Baking contest in Amarillo September 20 as the champion 4-H baking queen of Sherman County.

## Sept. 26 Deadline For Filing Soil Bank Request

Texas farmers have until Sept. 26 to file a request with their county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee for a maximum rate for their farm under the 1959 conservation reserve phase of the Soil Bank program.

Then, after the maximum farm rate is determined, farmers have until October 17, 1958, to apply for a conservation reserve contract, according to I. H. Lloyd, who has charge of the Soil Bank program in the State ASC office. Lloyd and the State ASC Committee emphasize that under present legislation, there will be no acreage reserve program in 1959, and they urge farmers to become familiar with the conservation reserve.

Lloyd said 15 meetings were held in Texas during the week of August 11-15 for the purpose of training county ASC personnel in handling the 1959 program. Since these meetings have been completed, county offices are ready to accept applications from farmers for establishing the maximum conservation reserve rates for their farms. Rates will average \$12 per acre in Texas.

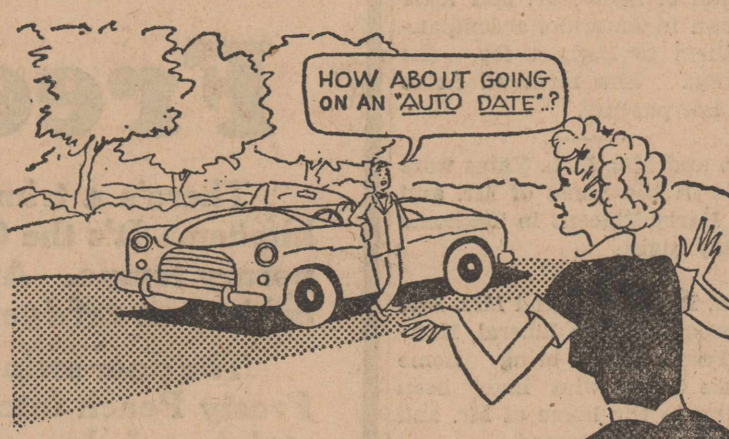

### Is Auto Essential To Teenage Dating?

A 15-year-old teenette writes that her folks allow her to date 16-year-old boys (and in this age, they drive, of course)—but she isn't allowed to go on dates with them in their autos. Not right, she says.

We're not inclined to back up her contention for several reasons. To begin, a wise parent must concern himself with the dating activities of the young teenager; the parent cannot simply say, "You're old enough to date," and then forget about the whole matter. There must be guidance and the restraining hand of experience.

matter of being "old" enough, nor is it a mere matter of being granted permission from one in authority.

In the writer's opinion, there is nothing wrong with a 15-year-old girl riding in the car with a 16-year-old boy—to and from such an event as a school picnic, church social, etc. In this instance the car is a convenient method of transportation, providing the boy is a competent driver. But, in this day and time "auto dates" often mean flitting back and forth along the highways and off-beat by-ways, sometimes taking part in "drag races" and in general risking life and limb in youthful exuberance. This is not a condemnation of teenagers in general. Many teenagers look upon a car as a means of transportation—and not as a "speed-boat." Some develop this idea before they are 16 or 17, but when it comes is not important. Until it does the teenager shouldn't have "auto dates" because he or she hasn't learned that they ought to use reason as well as the auto.

### Drilling Four New Wells

Four new wells are being drilled in the county in search of gas or oil.

Petroleum Exploration, Inc. No. 1-120 Bullington is located 1,250 feet from the north and west lines of section 120 in Block 1-C, 14 miles southeast of Stratford. The potential depth of the well is 3,300 feet.

Petroleum Exploration, Inc. No. 1-91 Lunt is located 1,250 feet from the north and west lines of section 91 in Block 1-C. The well is 17 miles southeast of Stratford and will be drilled to a potential depth of 3,300 feet.

Pumpco, Inc. No. 1 R. A. Strother is located 1,320 feet from the north and east lines of section 99 in Block 1-T. The well is 4 miles east of Stratford and will be drilled to a depth of 2,800 feet.

The Texas Co. No. 1 First State Bank of Stratford well is located 1,650 feet from the south and 2,310 feet from the east lines of section 5 in Block 1, PSL. The well is located 10.5 miles north of Stratford and will be drilled to a potential depth of 3,650 feet. An attempt will be made to find the same oil pool which feeds seven shallow wells in Oklahoma just north of the Texas line.

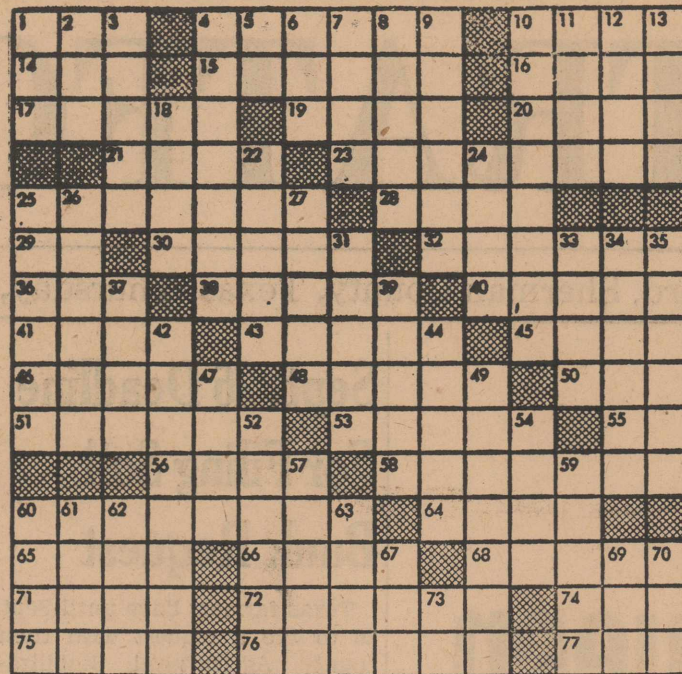


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## CROSSWORD PUZZLE

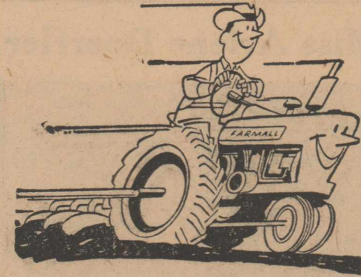

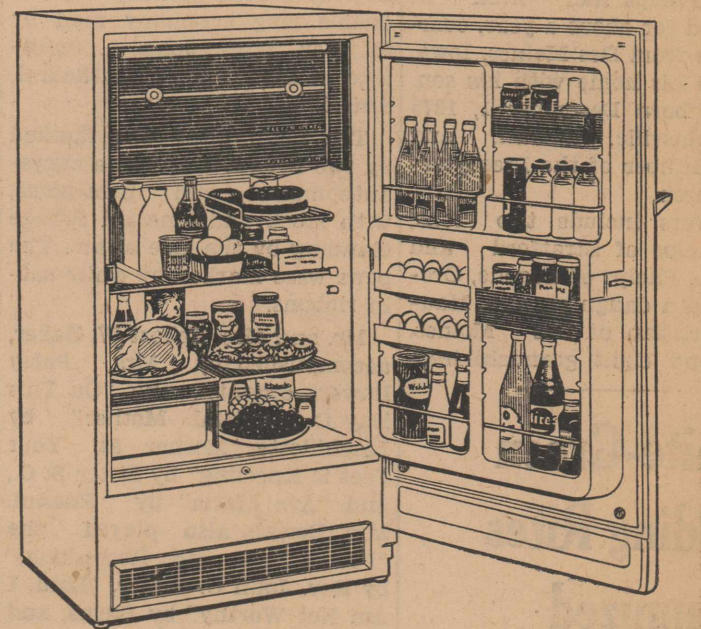

## Check Social Security Records

Do you know that you have an individual social security account with your name and social security number on it? This account shows all wages reported for you by your employers during your lifetime and all self-employment net earnings

you have reported when you filed your income tax return. This record is kept by the Accounting Division of the Social Security Administration in Baltimore. Your record accurately shows what your employers have reported, or what you have reported as a self-employed person. But, if your employer has made an error on his tax returns, or you have made an er-

ror in filing your income tax return, this error may affect future benefits to you or your family. You should take steps to learn about it. You can get a special post card for this purpose at your local social security office to send to Baltimore for a statement of your earnings. After you receive the statement, check it against your own records. If they do not a-

gree, contact your local social security office and they will take action to correct it. Remember, there is a time limitation for correcting your record, and for this reason you should check your account at least once every three years. This information is stated in a news statement released by John R. Sanderson, Manager of the Amarillo, Texas, District Office.

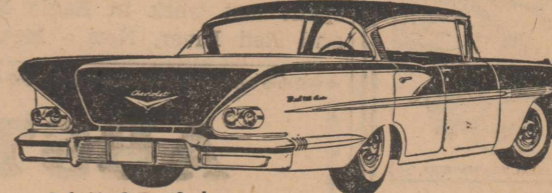

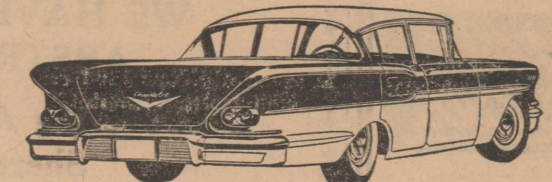

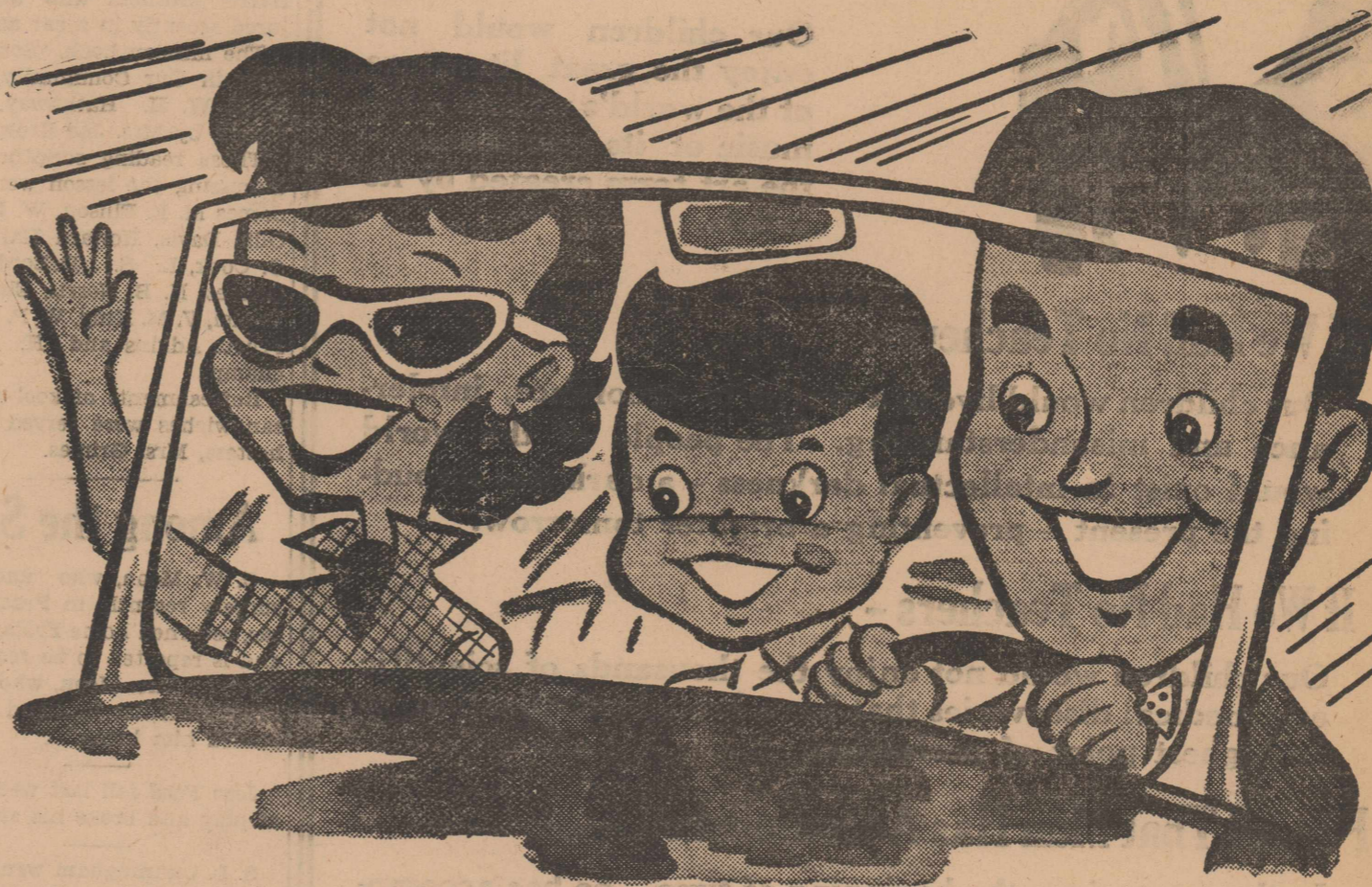

### Congress Passes New Farm Bill

Congress finally passed a farm bill which although it does

not meet all of Farm Bureau specifications, goes a long way toward getting government out of farming, heads off a drastic cut in rice and cotton acreage, gives cotton farmers a choice of more acreage at lower supports or reduced acreage for higher supports, extends the wool program until 1962. The Farm Bureau's new concept for sup-

porting prices at 90 per cent of previous three-year average was not included in the bill. However, prices are now more competitive and, in the case of cotton, offer a chance for that fiber to make a comeback against synthetics.

The fact that there is a new farm bill is due to an amazing show of Farm Bureau strength across the nation, and especially in Texas. Although the victory was a team effort on many segments of agriculture, it was Farm Bureau's organized pressure, coming at just the proper time, that tipped the scales. When the Senate Bill was first approved by its Agriculture Committee, it seemed headed for a slow death in the wings until Texas Farm Bureau members persuaded Senator Johnson that it should be brought out on the stage for a vote.

At the time the Senate passed the bill, Speaker Rayburn implied that it was "acceptable" to him. However, when the showdown came, he seemed content to let it die a natural death in the Rules Committee because the majority of Congressmen did not want a bunch of gimmicks that were tacked on in the House Agriculture Committee. Rayburn proclaimed, with a voice of authority, that there would be no farm bill this year, adding that he had been up the hill several times this year and that he cared to go no more.

Meanwhile back on the ranch and farm, the sentiment was for less politics and more workable legislation. Again the pressure mounted. A lot of farmers who didn't live in Rayburn's district contacted their own Congressmen and urged them to use their influence. A number of farmers flew to Washington. The result was that the bill was changed so that it would be acceptable to those who had backed the original Senate Bill and passed by the House. The Senate approved the House version on the advice of its Agricultural Committee.

**Rural Road Meeting**  
The Texas Agricultural Roads Committee, organized July 1, will hold its first meeting September 18 in Waco for the pur-

pose of hearing what the Texas Research League's report is all about. Jim McGrew, research director for the League, will be on hand to explain the recommendations of his organization and to answer questions. There will be questions due to the fact that the League, an independently-financed research outfit, has recommended to the Highway Commission that the building of farm-to-market roads be curbed.

B. J. Gist, district 7 director, and Loys D. Barbour, district 3 director, will represent the Farm Bureau on the roads committee which is composed of two representatives from each of several rural and agricultural groups.


