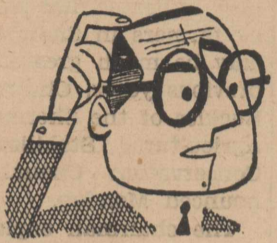

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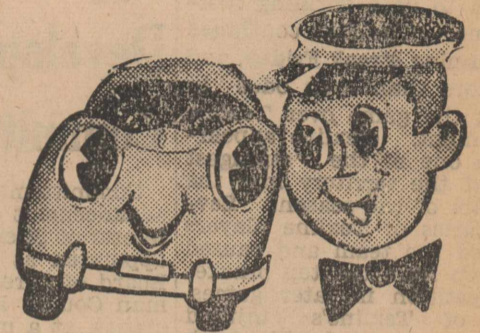

trian. An unsafe highway, an unsafe vehicle, or natural dangers such as bad weather are also cause of accidents.

The driver is the most important factor. A careful driver will keep his vehicle in good condition and will make allowances for heavy traffic, bad roads or bad weather.

Speed and other unsafe driving practices are found in at least two out of every three traffic accidents. About one in every five fatal accidents involves either a driver or a pedestrian who has been drinking. According to special studies based on mileage, drivers less than 20 years of age have the highest accident rate. The rate decreases steadily until about the age of 50, when it increases sharply.

Two out of every five persons killed in traffic are pedestrians. Two of every three pedestrians killed by motor vehicles are at fault in breaking a traffic law or otherwise acting unsafely. About six percent of the traffic accidents are caused directly by a defect in the highway, and about 11 percent may be charged to unsafe vehicles.

Darkness is definitely a factor in traffic accidents. Three of every five fatal accidents occur at night. In one of every four fatal accidents, cloudy, foggy, rainy or snowy weather is a factor.

Laws regulating speed and other driving practices have been passed, and special police have been detailed to help enforce the laws. Almost all of the states require a driver to be licensed, and in many of them the driver must pass a road test to qualify for a license. If it is proved in an accident that a driver is neglectful, he may lose his license. To help develop better drivers, some high schools have offered courses in automobile driving. This work has been promoted largely by the American Automobile Association.

Great improvements have been made in highway design and construction. Curves have been banked and made less sharp. Wide express highways have been built, and in some cases the lanes of traffic going in opposite directions are separated by a strip of parkway. Bad intersections have been lighted. Highway markers warn drivers of approaching curves, hills or other dangers which make a slower speed necessary. Many improvements have also

been made in the design of the vehicle: all steel bodies, better balance and easier control, safety glass, safer tires, brighter lights, wider windshields and automatic windshield wipers for better visibility. To make sure that automobiles are kept in a safe condition, some states re-

quire that they be brought in for inspection. This is done at official inspection stations at regular intervals.

The problem of pedestrian deaths is greatest in cities, where three of every five traffic victims are pedestrians. In rural areas the proportion is one

in five. Safe walking habits are taught in schools, and many cities have held campaigns to educate pedestrians. Some communities have adopted laws forbidding jay walking and other dangerous pedestrian practices.

Despite laws and mechanical

safety devices, traffic safety is still in the hands of the individual. To decrease the number of traffic deaths and injuries, the need is for drivers and pedestrians who not only know how to drive and walk safely but who are willing to use this knowledge.

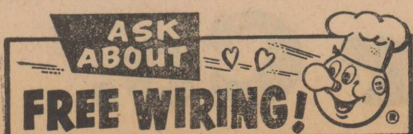
