Elks Play First District Game With Sunray

Stratford Elks, undefeated in the opening season games, will meet Sunray on the local field Friday night in the first conference game of the year. Play will commence at 7:30 p. m. In all probability the Elks will be playing against the strongest team they have met this season.

The Elk squad is being whipped through drill after drill in preparation for winning the first of their conference games and will no doubt give a good account of themselves in the game.

Elks Crush Textline In 50 To 14 Game

Practically every man on the Elk squad played in the game here Friday night as the Elks won over the Textline Tornados by a score of 50 to 14. The Elks piled up a score of 40 to 0 before the Textline team scored. Kenneth Knight scored the first touchdown and Cagle Kendrick carried the ball for 2 extra points. James Spurlock carried the ball 34 yards for the second touchdown but a try for extra points failed.

In the second quarter the Elks carried the ball to the Textline 17 yard line and fumbled. On the next play Textline fumbled and Ragsdale recovered the ball for Stratford. After an exchange of field drives the Elks took over on their own 31 yard line and began short drives for yardage. James Spurlock ran 53 yards for the next touchdown and Kenneth Knight carried the ball for the 2 extra points. The half ended with the Elks leading 22 to 0.

In the third quarter Jerry Galloway ran 35 yards for a touchdown and James Spurlock carried the ball for an additional 2 points. Joedale Reesing recovered a Textline fumble and Bill Steinberger carried the ball over the goal line for the next Elk touchdown although a try for extra points failed. Cleo Aduddell scored the last Elk touchdown of the third quarter.

Textline scored their first touchdown and were successful in their attempt for 2 extra points, resulting in a 42 to 8 score. Bernard Spruell ran 56 yards for the touchdown to give the Elks a score of 48 and Bill Steinberger carried the ball for an additional 2 points.

Textline made a 50 yard run to score their second touchdown, but their attempt for extra points failed, ending the game 50 to 14 in favor of the Stratford Elks.

This will be a business meeting and election of officers to serve in 1959. One very important part of the business will be the adoption of resolutions to be presented to the state resolution committee.

Officers of the organization urge all farmers and their wives to attend this important meeting.

Gasoline As A Fire Hazard

Do all members of your family know and realize that gasoline is a motor fuel and not a cleaning agent?

Do all members of your family know that it is the vapor from the evaporation of gasoline rather than the liquid itself which burns or explodes when mixed with air in the presence of a source of ignition?

Do all members of your family know that gasoline should always be kept in approved metal containers and never in bottles or open containers?

Have all members of your family been instructed to never (1) bring gasoline into the home, or (2) to use gasoline to cleanse clothing or anything?

Have all members of your family been instructed never to use kerosene to start or quicken a fire?

Are your oil heaters and oil stoves of the approved type and listed by the Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc.?

Do you always refill the fuel tank or compartment of your oil heaters and oil stoves out of doors in the daylight?

If you use a wick-type oil heater, do you trim the wick and clean it, regularly?

Do you regulate the flame and properly maintain your oil heater or stove to keep it from smoking?

Do you always see that your portable oil heater is placed well away from curtains, drapes, etc., and protected from children to prevent turning over?

Do you always turn out your portable oil heater upon retiring at night?

Do all members of your family know that domestic fuel gas like most flammable gases is more or less toxic and involves a health as well as a fire hazard?

Do you know that the installation, alteration and repair of gas piping in buildings should be done only by men fully experienced in this work, and the gas should be turned on only after the system has been thoroughly tested for leaks?

Where flexible gas tubing is used, is it of an approved type?

Do you know the rubber tubing deteriorates rapidly and has been responsible for many fires and explosions?

Do gas burning appliances have adequate clearance of at least 18 inches from woodwork and other combustible materials?

Are gas burning appliances, such as room heaters, provided in sleeping quarters or rooms generally kept closed, vented and equipped with an automatic pilot?

Do you keep all closets, store-rooms, and attic free from rubbish, oil, rags, old papers, broken furniture, etc.?

If you use an oil mop, do you keep it in a metal container or other safe place, well ventilated where it will not catch fire by spontaneous ignition?

If trash and rubbish are burned, do you use a suitable outdoor incinerator?

Is an adult always present during the entire time trash, leaves, etc., are burned out of

E. B. Turner Jr. Killed In Plane Crash Monday

E. B. Turner Jr., 36 year old son of Emmett Turner, was killed in a plane crash near Bakersfield, California Monday morning. The last rites will be held in Greeley, Colorado where burial will be made.

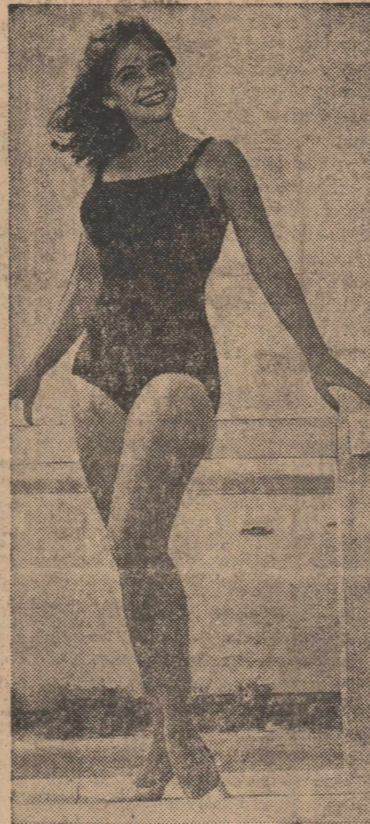
Turner, his wife and two daughters, had been making their home at Santa Maria, California. He was flying a crop dusting plane near Bakersfield Monday morning when the plane crashed and burst into flames.

E. B. Turner Jr. spent most of his childhood years in Stratford. At the outbreak of World War II he enlisted for training as a pilot in the U. S. Army Air Force. He received his commission as a pilot and served a tour of duty over seas.

At the close of the war young Turner took advantage of the GI bill to return to college in preparation for an education to practice international law. In the summers he used his knowledge as a pilot for employment as a crop duster. Turner received his law degree in Colorado and moved to California, planning to enter the practice of international law in San Francisco. He passed his bar examination in California and would have retired from crop dusting in a few weeks to follow the vocation for which he had prepared himself.

Other survivors include his mother, Mrs. Vesta Turner, and a brother, Ray, both of Greeley, Colorado.

Swine Feeders Study New Developments

The Sherman County Development Association Swine Committee held the first of a series of meetings on hog production Thursday of last week in the FFA shop in Stratford. This was an educational meeting. Ed Shores, district representative of the Peruna Feed Mills of Amarillo, showed films and discussed new methods and techniques in this fast changing livestock enterprise. He was introduced by the committee chairman, Conde Donelson, who states that Mr. Shores had been requested to present the program as he had valuable research information and recommended a hog ration with grain sorghum with protein supplements that had proven successful in this area.

Shores showed films of modern feeding operations and gave practical feeding facts obtained in his company feed laboratories, that local farmers may use in local hog production. He showed the modern pig parlor in operation using the 48 sow units. He explained how this set up was ultra modern in sanitation and turned out 600 finished hogs for the market and 168 feeder pigs per year. By placing 50 weaning age pigs in the parlor each month, the parlor is filled to capacity in three months with 150 hogs. When the first pen of feeders are finished out by rotating the 50 feeder pig units through this parlor the farmer can market 50 hogs each month at the popular weight of 200 pounds.

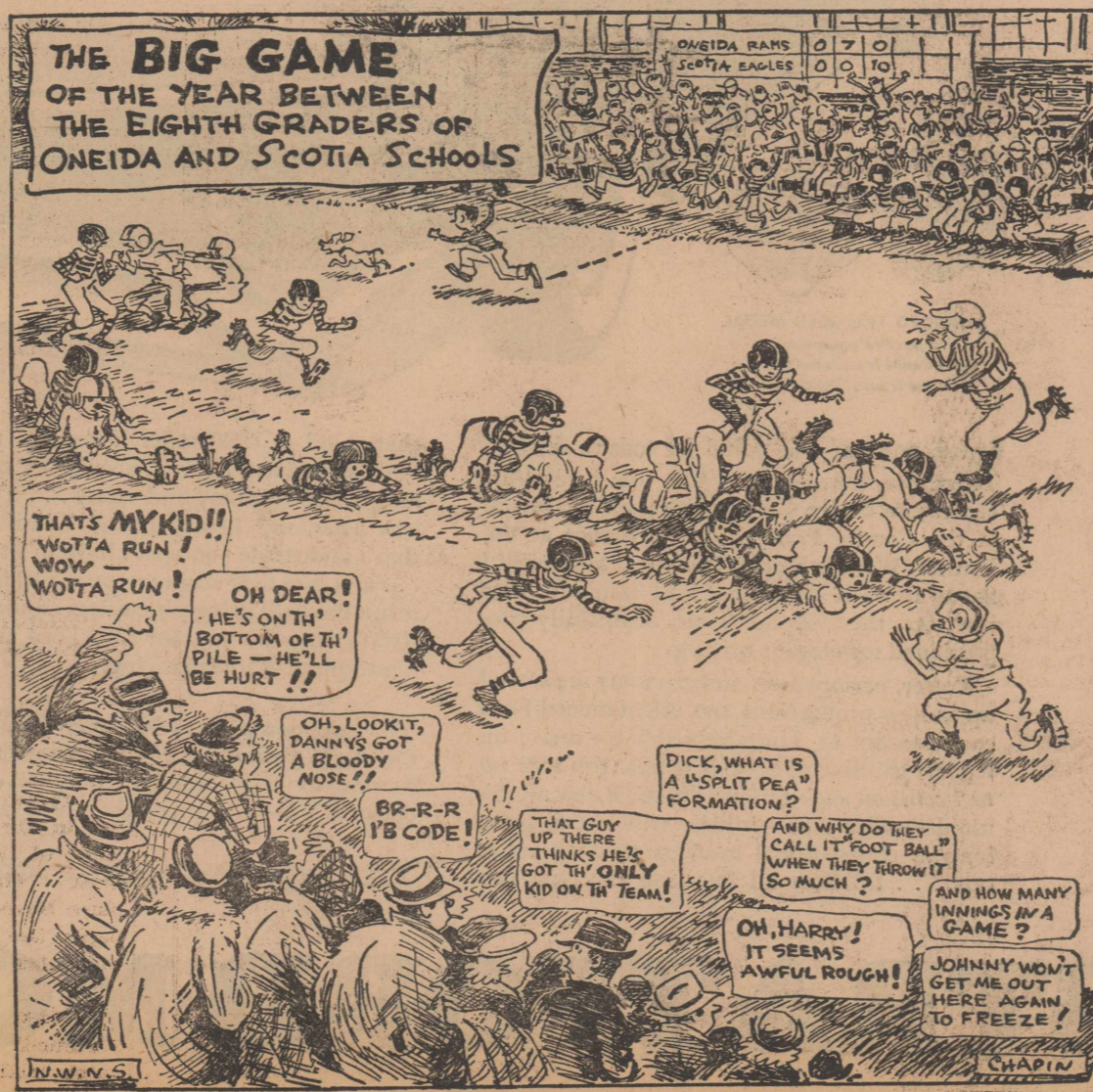
He stressed the necessity of efficiency to meet competition, and explained the late trend in early weaning of pigs to get more litters and fast gain necessary to produce high quality pork demanded by the house wife of today. He reported that there were four truck loads of hogs shipped into Amarillo every day from outside the area.

"I REMEMBER" BY THE OLD TIMERS

From Boyd Gilliland, Linesville, Pa.: I remember when my great uncle had a horse powered threshing machine.

It required three teams to haul the outfit around. They had to have an extra wagon to carry the tumbling rods and all the other equipment.

The neighbors would bring their teams. I think they used five or six teams on the horse power.

The thrasher was an Aultman Taylor. It had the picture of a skinny rooster on the side of the machine. The sign read, "Fattened on an Aultman Taylor straw stack."

It was a great day for me when they threshed at our place. My uncle always sat on the horse power when they were threshing. Sometimes he would be taking a nap while he sat there. He had a long whip and if some of the teams got to shirking he would make them do their part.

From Mrs. Ollie S. Brandenburg, Beattyville, Ky.: I remember the first print dresses for the girls in our family. We carried eggs three miles to a store, got five cents a day and bought the print at three cents a yard.

My Dad had no education as his Father died when he was 10 and he had to help his Mother raise a family—but you couldn't count him out of a cent. Soon as we children were old enough, he sent us to school and got all the books we needed. I went to the eighth grade and today can outspell and read some of my children and grandchildren who have gone through high school.

I like modern homes and necessities of life, but still like the old-time method of starting a young child out in school.

to fill the demand for this high grade hog that is not produced here. He recommended expansion of hog production in this area only of this high quality bacon type hog. Shores said the poor quality hogs are a drag on the market now. He explained that no breed of hogs had a monopoly in the market place but it was a matter of selection, feeding and management by the producer. He had records on 27 established successful hog feeders operating in

the high plains area to support the program he presented.

Seventeen attended the meeting, including Harold Mayfield

of Amarillo.

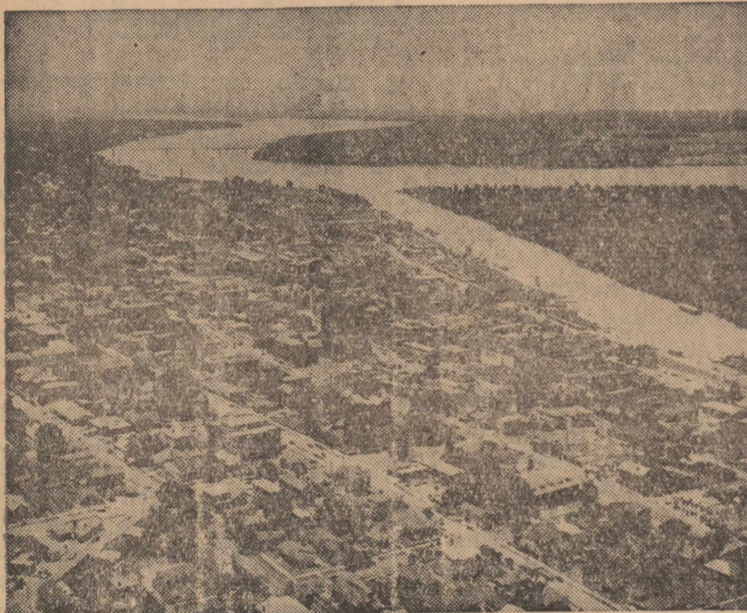

The fate of the Southern city shown above has long been linked to the mighty Mississippi River, which shows in the upper portion of the photograph.

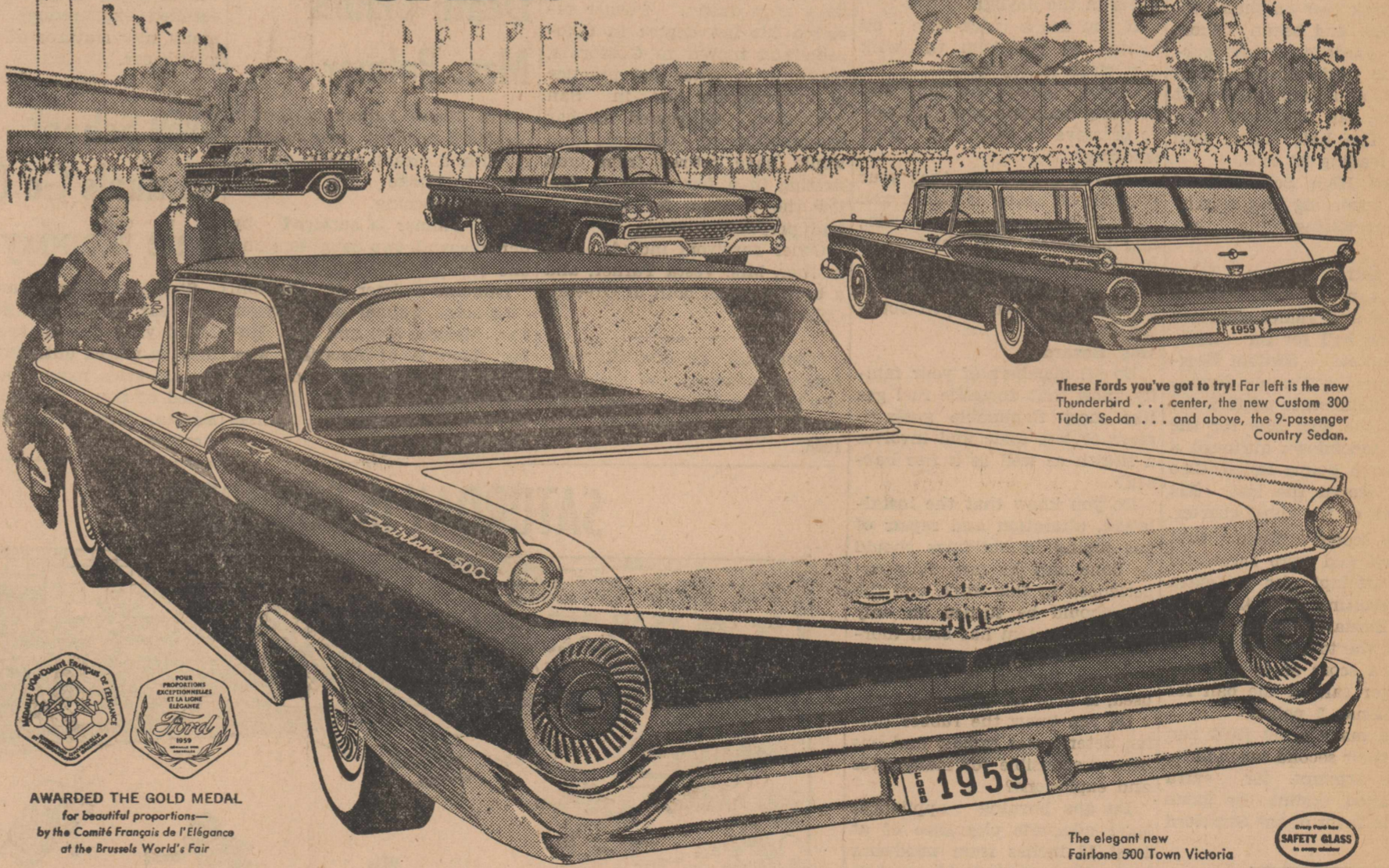
A vital link between the city's water front and the Mississippi is the Yazoo Canal.

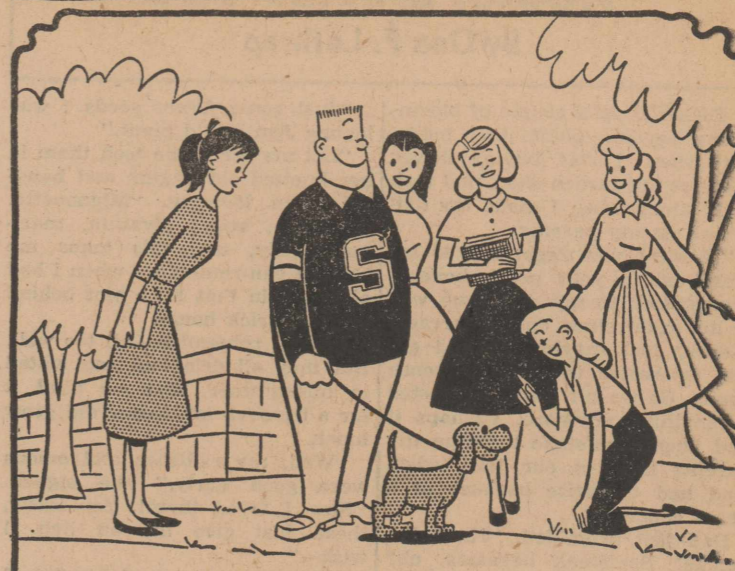

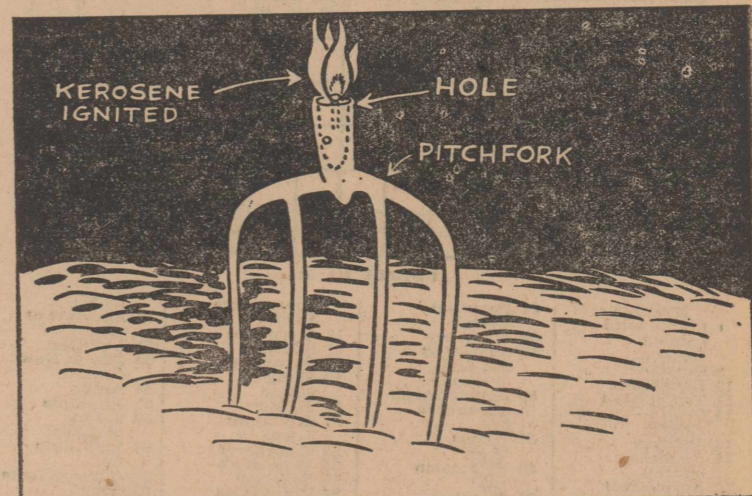

My dad was brushing the soft warm dirt with his big capable hands. "Might as well bring along a few onion sets too," he called after me, "and a red geranium."

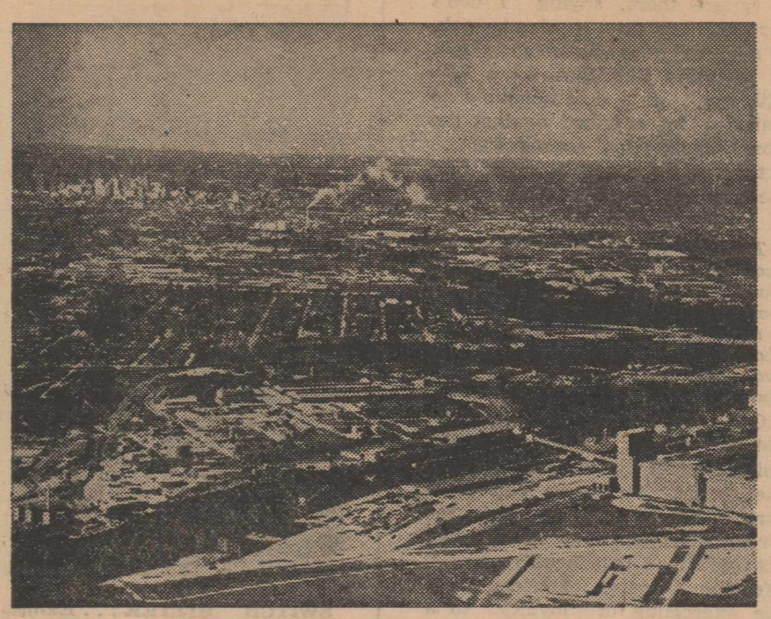
It had taken Other Mother and me together to do it, but perhaps they would be transplanted successfully after all!

AMERICANA Cities To See Houston—Wonder City Down South



Houston ship channel

Capital of the U. S. petro-chemical and petroleum industries, Houston, Texas, has a reputation for industrial might. But this largest city in the South (now eighth-largest in the nation) is also a major U. S. tourist center.

Last year KLM Royal Dutch Airlines inaugurated direct air service between Houston and Europe, making Houston the first city in the South and Southwest to possess such a link. But Houston is no newcomer to the fields of international trade and commerce. For many years, the city has been one of America's busiest deepsea ports.

Houston's astonishing growth (from a population of 63,000 in 1900 to 1,195,000) has, in fact, been closely tied to the growth of her port. Port Houston, located 50 miles inland from the Gulf of Mexico, was opened to deep sea commerce shortly after the turn of the century.

It is estimated that no other city in the world has on its doorstep such a wealth of natural resources as that with which Houston is blessed. The super abundance of mineral wealth, the geographic

location, and rich agricultural hinterland each contribute to Houston's destiny.
Oil derricks stand out against the skyscrapers. A rich oil strike is even paying off in the city dump. Location places Houston in the semi-tropical class with balmy breezes right off the Gulf of Mexico. The city lies in the center of the Coastal Prairie, an area of generally flat topography and fertile soil. With less than 5 per cent of the land area of Texas, this region in 1954 produced 90 per cent of the state's rice and nearly 28 per cent of the nation's total tonnage for that crop.

Houston has 109 parks and municipal golf courses, hundreds of swimming pools, parks and zoos, and eight regulation baseball fields.
The Port of Houston is third-ranked deepsea port in the U.S. in total tonnage moved.

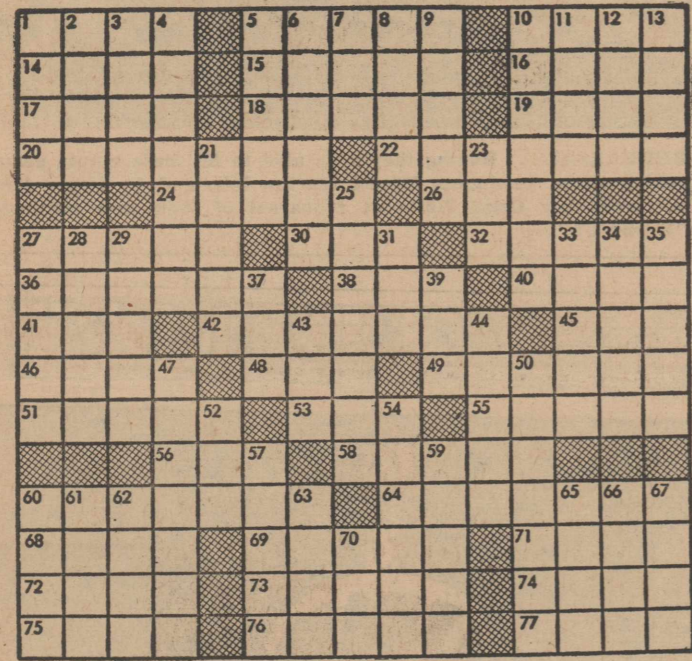
SCANNING THE NEWS

LIFE insurance companies of the United States extended a record volume of commercial mortgage financing last year, bringing the aggregate of such financing at the start of this year to \$7,660,000. These figures are based on an analysis of mortgage financing 1938-57 by the Federal Home Loan Bank Board.
During 1957, the life companies' commercial mortgage financing newly undertaken added up to \$1,440,000,000, according to the analysis. This record one-year total of new financing was up 2 per cent from the previous year's aggregate and was nearly twice the 1952 figure. It was more than eight times the year's financing of such mortgages 14 years earlier. The 1957 total represented 30 per cent of all non-farm mortgage acquisitions of the life companies in the year.
The aggregate commercial mortgages held by the life companies have increased steadily for the past ten years and at the start of this year were nearly three times the total ten years ago. They now represent nearly 8 per cent of the total assets of the more than 1,300 life insurance companies.
These commercial mortgages, according to the Life Insurance Institute, represent in large part financing for small business. An analysis made last year of the mortgage transactions of four years ending with 1956 indicated that over 80 per cent of the number of commercial mortgages acquired were in amounts less than \$250,000 each and about three-fourths of all commercial mortgage loans were to firms with assets of less than \$100,000,000.
The same analysis showed that the largest recipient of this type of business financing comprised retail trade establishments, which accounted for 43 to 48 per cent of the total number of commercial mortgage loans made. Manufacturing plants and office buildings were next, together accounting for 20 to 25 per cent. Hotels, garages, theatres and non-rail transportation accounted for 7 to 8 per cent. The remaining one-fourth of the loans were miscellaneous.

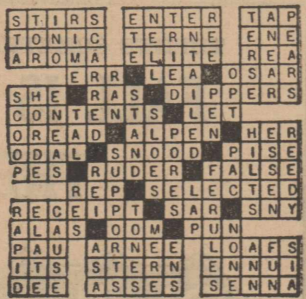

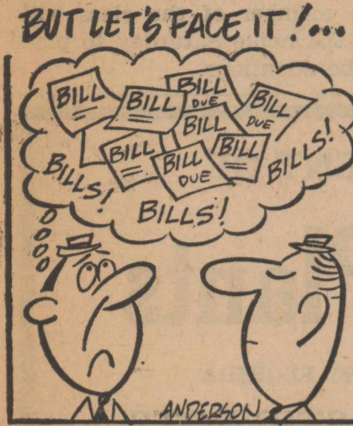

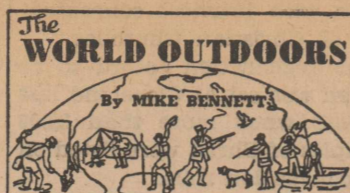

FISHERMEN? Picture this if you can: A body of water entirely surrounded by land that boasts an estimated million catchable-size fish.

Sure, there are plenty of such places on the face of this old earth—but the one we have reference to presents a special challenge to the most expert fishermen. The body of water is California's inland ocean, the Salton Sea. The fish is the corvina, a close relative of the white sea bass and a delicious food fish. The problem: the corvina's refusal to respond to standard lures and methods of fishing.

The California Department of Game and Fish created the unique fishery by transplanting parent stock from the Gulf of California. The corvina are said to be reproducing in prolific fashion. But they aren't pushing one another out of the way to take the lures being presented by enthusiastic fishermen—not yet, anyhow.

Fishermen will persist, tho as any angler will agree and this persistence is beginning to pay off for local fishermen who in recent weeks have been bringing a few corvina to net. Most of the fish run three to four pounds, with some eight pounders.

Some piscatorial scholar will probably discover a better way soon; but at the moment the corvina are being taken from shore, with surf-type rods and heavy red and white wobbly spoons about two inches long.

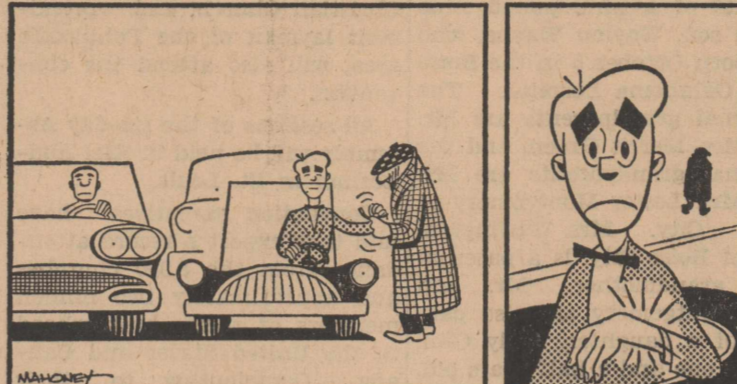
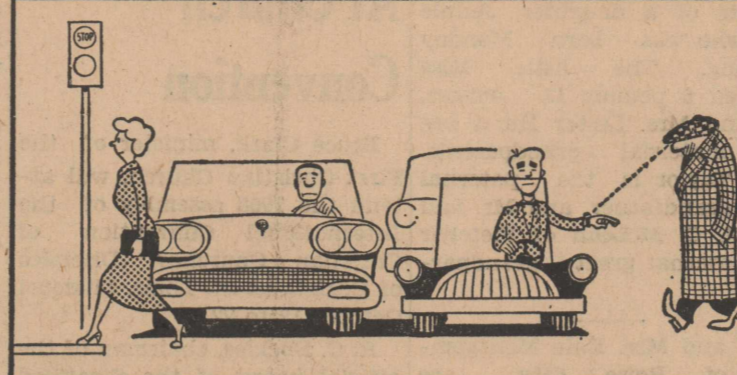

Do Teenagers 'Murder' The Language?

By C. D. Smith



LISTENING to the words that some TV writers like to put into the lines of teenagers appearing in their dramas and comedies, one might think that a new language has been introduced without the older generation knowing anything about it. One is also inclined to wonder what happened to some of the simple phrases like "thank you," "please," and "How do you do?"

Teenagers have a language of their

own, it's true. But it is not a complete language as it is oft pictured in books and on TV screens. They may use this language extensively within their own group, but otherwise, they know how to use the English language and they use it when the occasion calls for it. There are exceptions, of course, but the average teenager knows how to be courteous and mannerly and how to observe the rules of good behavior. Actually, if there were some way to make an effective count,

the author believes a survey would disclose that a definite minority of the teenagers in this country seldom use words like "crazy, man," "real cool" and such. We must be realistic about it and say there is probably one or more teenager in every town who talks this way, and, perhaps, talks this way all the time, but you'll never find them by the dozen in the average town.

The sad part of it all is that many grownups who have no children of their own, or who have no contact with teenagers in any way, accept the characterizations they read and see as typical of the teenage group as a whole. Teenagers are like adults in the respect that some are good; some are bad; some are courteous, others are not. But just as in the adult world, it is impossible to select a particular teenager's manner of speech or deportment and say that it is "typical." It can be said, but it will never be so . . . and anyone who has much to do with teenagers knows it well.

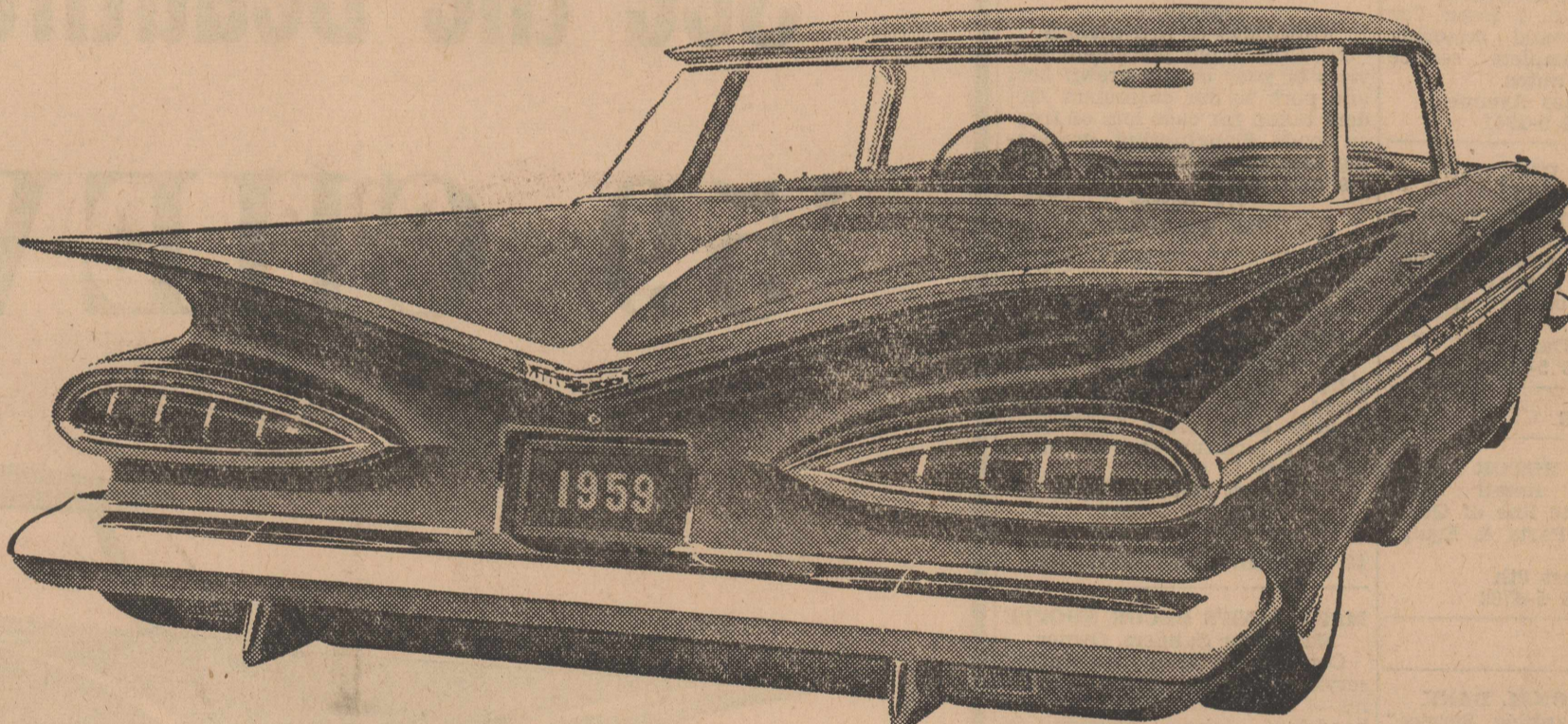

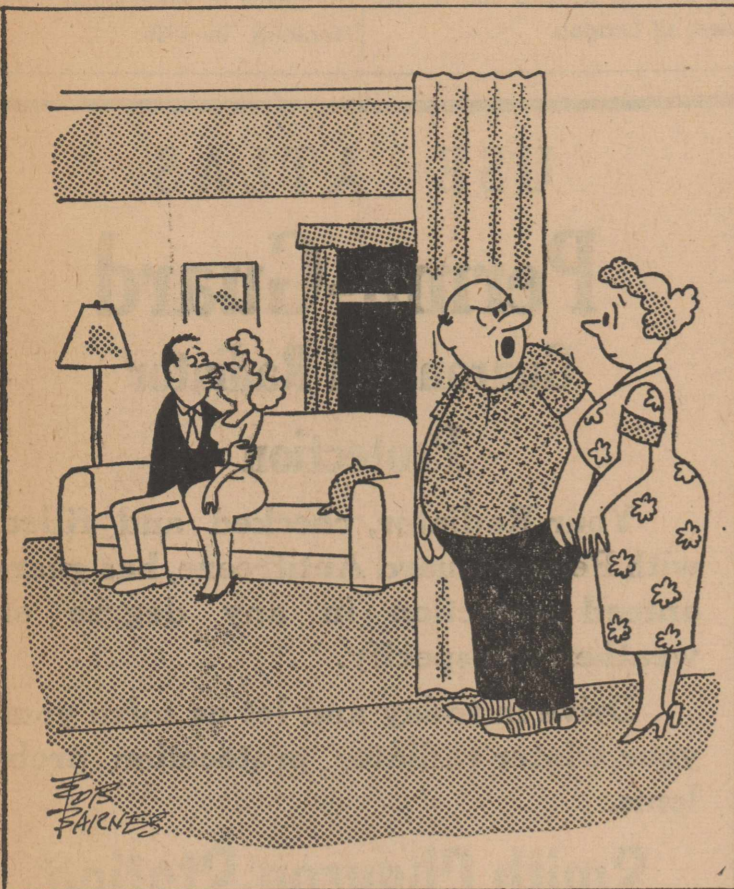

A GREATER enjoyment of the things about us is the reward for a little knowledge about the things of nature.

Take trees, for instance, so beautiful in this season as leaves begin to turn red and gold; so refreshing and inviting during the warm days of summer.

The story of trees has been told in many famous poems and writings. Individual trees have been associated with famous and infamous deeds in the great history of our country.

Trees not only provide comfort and shelter for various forms of wildlife; they also serve mankind in numerous ways. Wood is a most versatile material.

Among the most useful woods are oak, birch, cedar, cypress, redwood, walnut, cherry, gum, beech, elm, maple and pine.

Knotty pine is an American favorite. It is not a type of pine, but a name given to knot-filled lower grades of several pines, most common of which are white pines. Idaho white pine frequently chosen for paneling and cabinet-making because the knots are small and tight.

The cypress tree is often pictured in "typical" Southern scenes. A durable outdoor material, cypress is popularly known as red, yellow and white cypress.

Redwood is mainly a California product, and along with cypress, is one of the most durable woods for outdoor use. Its color varies from light pinkish red to dark reddish brown.

One of the toughest woods is the red oak, which comes from the East and South. Moderately hard and heavy, cherry is a strong wood that has high resistance to shock and denting. It grows throughout the East.

A total of 25 water works employees are attending the course. Sponsors of the school are the Panhandle Water and Sewage Works Association, the State Department of Public Health, and the city of Dumas.

The course is a part of a series of courses conducted by the EES water works training department, which includes: basic and advanced water works operations, surface production, water distribution, water meter service and repair, and basic and advanced sewage works operations.

Eligible persons who satisfactorily complete the course will receive 20 hours' credit toward the requirements for certification under the State Sanitation Law of 1945. Following the school a sanitation engineer from the State Department of Health will give examinations for certification to those applying and who meet the requirements of experience and hours of instruction.

Science Interests Sixth Grade

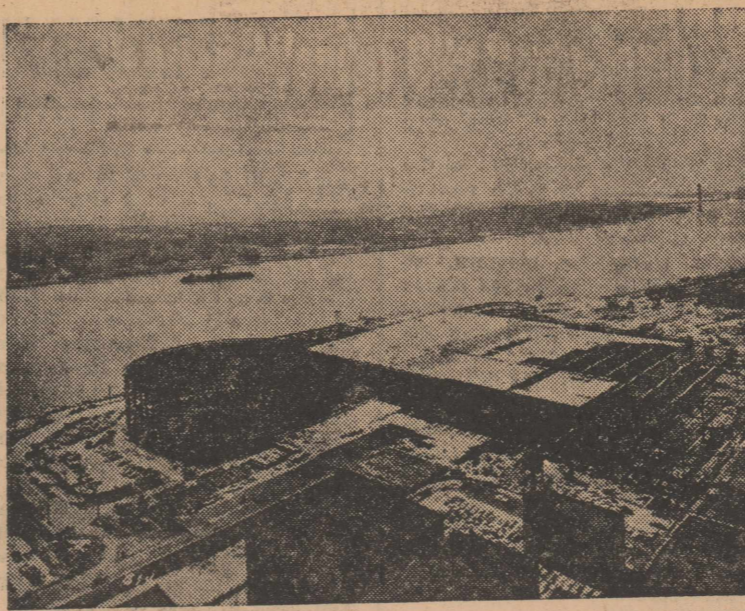
