Church Youths Plan October 30 Treat Drive

Ghosts and goblins of Stratford are scheduling a trick-or-treat collection for overseas relief for the night of Thursday, October 30, under the sponsorship of the First Baptist, First Christian and First Methodist Churches. The drive will begin at 6:00 p. m.

Young people of the community plan to make Halloween of 1958 an occasion for sharing with hungry people overseas through CROP (Christian Rural Overseas Program). Replacing the usual trick-or-treat for candy, apples, doughnuts etc., the young people will make house to house calls seeking contributions for the CROP campaign.

Proceeds will send government surplus food overseas through Church World Service to feed hungry people. Such surplus foods are supplied free of charge to approved voluntary relief agencies. Last year every \$1.00 collected distributed over 300 pounds of food to starving people in other countries. Young people in Texas collected \$49,058.67 in the 1957 Halloween trick or treat campaign and hope to do much better this year.

In 1956, 62 young people canvassed the residential section of the city and raised \$221.60. Influenza and colds decreased the number of youthful workers in 1957, but the 20 boys and girls who visited the homes of Stratford raised a total of \$247.00.

Those who prefer to give used clothing instead of money, may present the bundle to the young people instead of a financial contribution.

BAND IN MARCHING CONTEST

Stratford's 49 piece marching band will enter the interscholastic league marching contest for district 1-A bands to be held at the Amarillo stadium Tuesday, October 28. Class 1-B bands will start marching at 6:00 p. m. and class 1-A bands will appear in the contests at about 8:00 p. m.

Thirty-five bands will take part in the interscholastic league competition. About 12 of these bands are district 1-A bands.

Three judges will view the performances and will assign one of five ratings to each band. Ratings are interpreted as: 1, superior; 2, excellent; 3, average; 4, fair; and 5, poor.

Joe Mack Hill is directing the Stratford school band. Frankie Aduddell is the drum major and Ann Caraway is the band president.

Burn Weeds With Fire Department Protection

Citizens desiring to burn high weeds or grass growth are invited to do so while a fully manned City Fire Truck stands by to prevent flames from spreading to valuable property.

Those desiring to burn weeds from vacant lots may phone or contact Leon Guthrie, Claude Fedric or Rex Hudson of the Fire Department, or the City Hall, and arrangements will be made for the fire department to stand by while the tall weeds and grass growths are being burned.

In the event of a sudden change in the wind, members of the fire department already present at the scene of the blaze, would extinguish the flames before nearby property was damaged.

Fire fighters prefer to be called before the fire rather than after it endangers property.

C. C. Plunks At Conference On Family Living

Boys Ranch To Invade Elk Field Friday Night

FFA Members Invest \$11,281.83 In 60 Steers

Fourteen members of the Stratford Future Farmers of America organization received 60 head of feeder steers this week for their 1958-59 commercial feeding program. The purchase represents an investment of \$11,281.83. Another 20 head of steers are expected to be added to the feeding program within the next two weeks, giving the boys a total of 80 head of feeder cattle.

For the past two years, the boys have been feeding heifers. In the 1956-57 feeding program, the FFA members fed 40 head of Angus heifers. These heifers were marketed in Pueblo, Colorado. In the 1957-58 program, the boys fed 60 head of Hereford heifers, and marketed them in Oklahoma City.

This is the fourth year for the commercial feeding program, and the boys are looking forward to a bigger and better year with their steers.

Plans for the current feeding program call for the steers to be pastured on wheat or stubble until the middle of February. At this time the steers will be placed in the feed lot for a 150 day feeding program. The FFA members expect to market their cattle by the middle of July, at a weight of 1,150 pounds. Other than the pasture, the boys expect to market through the cattle, 50 bushels of milo maize, 150 pounds of cotton seed meal, 150 pounds of alfalfa pellets, and 900 pounds of bundles per head. In addition to the above ration, Stilbestrol and Aureomycin will be fed.

Jack Dettle, a member of the adult committee, made arrangements for the cattle received this week. The steers were purchased from the Moore Ranch northwest of Boise City. Mr. Dettle is being assisted on the advisory committee by Kenneth Borth and Baskin Brown. H. M. Flores, as in the past, is working very closely with the boys in this project.

Funeral services for Homer Smith, age 57, were conducted Tuesday afternoon in the First Baptist Church by Rev. M. E. Upchurch. Mr. Smith died Saturday afternoon with a heart attack while he was at his farm, about 15 miles south of Stratford, feeding cattle. He was found by his wife and Mrs. Baskin Brown, who drove to the farm when Mrs. Smith became alarmed over her husband's failure to return from the farm.

Interment was made in the family burial plot in the Stratford cemetery.

Homer Smith is survived by his wife, Mrs. Mattie Smith; and five sisters, Mrs. John Kidwell and Mrs. Sam Wohlford of Stratford, Mrs. H. V. Holden of Fort Worth, Mrs. Ben Horn of Honeywell, Kansas and Mrs. Harley Snyder of San Antonio.

Mr. Smith had previously had heart trouble. Although he had been advised to avoid strenuous exertion, he had lived an almost normal life until the time of his death.

Stratford Elks won their first conference 1-A football game Friday night on the local field by defeating Sunray 26 to 6. Both teams were victims of fumbles and mistakes of over excitement. Although the final score gave the Elks an undisputed victory, the Sunray Bobcats were in a position to change the tide of the game on several occasions.

In the first quarter of the game the Elks received the kickoff and drove down the field to the Sunray 30 yard line. Sunray recovered an Elk fumble which momentarily changed the complexion of the game. Three plays later the Sunray team fumbled and the Elks recovered the ball on the Sunray 35 yard line. James Spurlock made the first touchdown and the try for extra points was successful, giving the Elks an 8 to 0 lead.

In the second quarter Sunray forced the Elks back to their own six yard line. Kenneth Knight intercepted a short pass and assisted by the blocking of his teammates, ran 85 yards for the second touchdown. The try for extra points failed. The half ended with the Elks enjoying a 14 to 0 lead.

Stratford's marching band gave a well executed marching exhibition during the half time period.

Fumbles and penalties marred the plays of both teams during the third quarter. Sunray took advantage of the breaks of the game and scored their only touchdown but a try for extra points failed. Sunray lost the ball on downs on the Elk 27 yard line and the Elk squad displayed their driving power. James Spurlock made the touchdown but a try for extra points failed, leaving the Elks in the lead 20 to 6.

Elks and the Bobcats swapped yardage during the last quarter of the game. While in a scoring position, Cagle Kendrick scored a touchdown to give the Elks a 26 to 6 victory in their first district 1-A conference game.

Hale-Aikin Group Reverses Stand On Federal Funds

Texas' Hale-Aikin Committee reconsidered and reversed its previous stand that Texas schools should not take federal aid for lunch rooms and vocational education.

Ed Ray, San Antonio Express-News editor, affirmed the committee's belief in state control of education but said he did not feel this would be lost by accepting federal aid for lunches, vocational education and for large numbers of children brought into a district by federal activities. His report also endorsed the desirability of the federally-financed activities covered by the National Defense Education Act.

The Hale-Aikin Committee of 24 lawmakers, educators and other citizens was set up by the Legislature to advise it on public school needs and problems. Some six weeks ago it stirred up a hornet's nest by recommending that Texas quit accepting several million dollars a year in federal school aid. Arguments, pro and con, flared over the state, and many legislators were rendered uncomfortable by the necessity to take a stand. In many cases, the lawmakers disapprove federal centralization in principal but were hesitant to get in a position where they might be accused of taking milk from the school kids.

The Hale-Aikin Committee also gave final approval to a recommended program of public school improvements. It would raise school costs by about \$112,000,000 a year, mostly for teacher salary raises, sick leave, building upkeep and transportation.
