Undefeated Elks Will Battle For Title Friday

Undefeated Stratford Elks will tangle with the Gruver Greyhounds in a game to decide the district 1-A championship Friday night. The game will be played at Gruver and the opening kick-off has been set for 7:30 p. m.

Stratford Elks, champions and contenders for the title of district 1-B for many years, moved up into district 1-A this year and have eliminated all of the contending teams they have met with decisive victories. Offensively and defensively, the Stratford Elks and the Gruver Greyhounds are well matched as opposing teams. The Elks hold a slight edge in points which they have scored against the same opposing teams.

The Elks will go into the game well aware that one fumble or one penalty may easily decide the district 1-A title in the game Friday. They will be prepared to take advantage of whatever breaks luck may give them in the championship game in which either team could win with a score of one point.

Elks Smash Stinnett In Homecoming Game

Stratford Elks won over the Stinnett Rattlers in a game here Friday night by a score of 24 to 12. The Elks scored one touchdown and two additional points before a howling duster from the north blew in. They made their yardage on ground gains. Stinnett did the unexpected and completed two passes which resulted in their two touchdowns.

Jerry Galloway and James Spurlock made the yardage gains for the first touchdown early in the first quarter and the try for additional points was successful. Stinnett rolled down to the Elk 10 yard line before Stratford recovered a fumble. Exchanges in yardage gains completed the second half with the score remaining 8 to 0.

In the third quarter Cagle Kendrick ran 68 yards for the second Elk touchdown and James Spurlock made the extra 2 points. Stinnett Rattlers did the unexpected and hurled a pass into the wind which blew back in the hands of a receiver for their first touchdown. Stinnett completed another long pass in the fourth quarter and scored their second touchdown.

Settling down to business, the Elks started a long ground drive on their own 49 yard line. Kenneth Knight scored the touchdown and carried the ball across for the two additional points for a score of 24 to 12 over the Stinnett Rattlers.

This win completed the elimination of Sunray, Spearman and Stinnett from district 1-A conference play. Stratford and Gruver are undefeated teams of the district.

Seek County Sugar Beet Acreage Allotment

Garrison Motor Co. Display '59 Chrysler Car

Garrison Motor Co. is showing the 1959 Chrysler car in their showroom this week. Strikes delayed the showing of the new car which was originally built to be displayed here on October 24.

According to information released by the Chrysler Corporation, the new models have major styling changes, including new front and rear designs, side trim and roof styling. New optional features include front swivel seats, an electronic rear view mirror, an automatic headlight beam changer, extra large super soft cushion tires carrying 16 pounds air pressure and rear air suspension for automatic leveling. Changes have been made for functional improvements which contribute to agility and handling ease of the car on the road, and on economy, safety and passenger comfort.

The new Golden Lion engines, although large in displacement and with greater rated horsepower, will perform as economically as the engines they replace. Chrysler engines took top honors in competitive western economy runs last spring, and in previous years. Low numerical axle ratios throughout the line, a reduction in engine weight and extensive use of aluminum in both trim and functional parts, contribute to economical operation of the 1959 models.

Horsepower of the new engines ranges from 305 to 380, a modest increase from previous models except for the Chrysler 300E which is unchanged in horsepower.

The auto-pilot, a dial and push button device for controlling

New models of the 1959 Studebaker cars are on display in the showroom of the T. O. C. Motor Co. According to advance information the Studebaker Lark is a completely new series of smaller, more economical, more maneuverable car. Described as establishing a revolutionary concept of automotive transportation, the brand new 1959 Studebaker Larks were newly designed from tires to roof-top to meet the specific demands of today's driving needs.

The new Larks are smaller in over-all size, yet actually are roomier inside than previous models. This was accomplished primarily by reducing front and rear "overhang" to a minimum, while at the same time maintaining a "big car" passenger compartment to enable six adults to ride in comfort.

The wheelbase of sedan and hardtop models in 108½ inches, while over-all length is only 175 inches, shorter than previous models by more than two feet. Yet, front leg room is equal to last year's Studebaker, and rear leg room is actually greater.

Although slightly lower-overall, the new Studebaker Larks provide headroom that is unexcelled in the low-price field. Shoulder and hip room are similar to last year's models.

Available in deluxe and regal versions, the 1959 Larks by Studebaker are richly and tastefully appointed both inside and out to appeal to the public's desire for luxurious transportation.

In describing the new models, Studebaker-Packard President Harold E. Churchill explained that "the completely new 1959 Studebaker Lark is the car the motoring public has told us it wants, and has urged us to build. It is a car of modest price, yet featuring the high quality, sound engineering and distinctive styling that is traditional with Studebaker. According to R. M. Buckles, chairman of the new crops committee of the Sherman County Development Association, 40 farmers attended a sugar beet meeting held Thursday night of last week in the new county fair building. Discussions centered around the procedure Sherman County farmers must follow if they are to expect to receive a beet allotment for the county.

Bill Hallam, an official of the Holly Sugar Company with headquarters in Colorado Springs, Colorado and a Mr. Yeager, one of the company's plant managers, attended the meeting. Hallam and Yeager spent most of Thursday touring Sherman County and observing its potentials for sugar beet production.

Bill Hallam, made the statement, "They would be ready to move into the area with a receiving plant for sugar beets, when and if a beet allotment could be secured for the county." "To secure a beet allotment, the farmers of Sherman County will have to start now, and fight for perhaps two or three years before receiving any benefits from their efforts."

"It is not impossible to receive a new growers allotment from the sugar division of the U.S. D.A., but experience of other areas indicates that years of constant work are necessary." Mr. Hallam also stated that "Less than 25% of the beet sugar consumed within the United States is grown in this country, the balance is imported. Texas has a 1959 allotment of less than 2,000 acres. This allotment has been received from the Sugar Division of the U. S. Department of Agriculture."

As a result of the information divulged at the meeting Thursday night, the new crop committee has decided to contact the senators and representatives of the state, and ask them to look into the possibilities of securing a new growers allotment for sugar beets for the farmers of Sherman County.

Mr. Hallam said that the Holly Company would continue to plant sugar beet demonstrations plots in the county next year, and that both he and the company stood ready to help the people of Sherman County in any way that they could.

Paul Chesmer furnished doughnuts and coffee which were served at the close of the meeting.

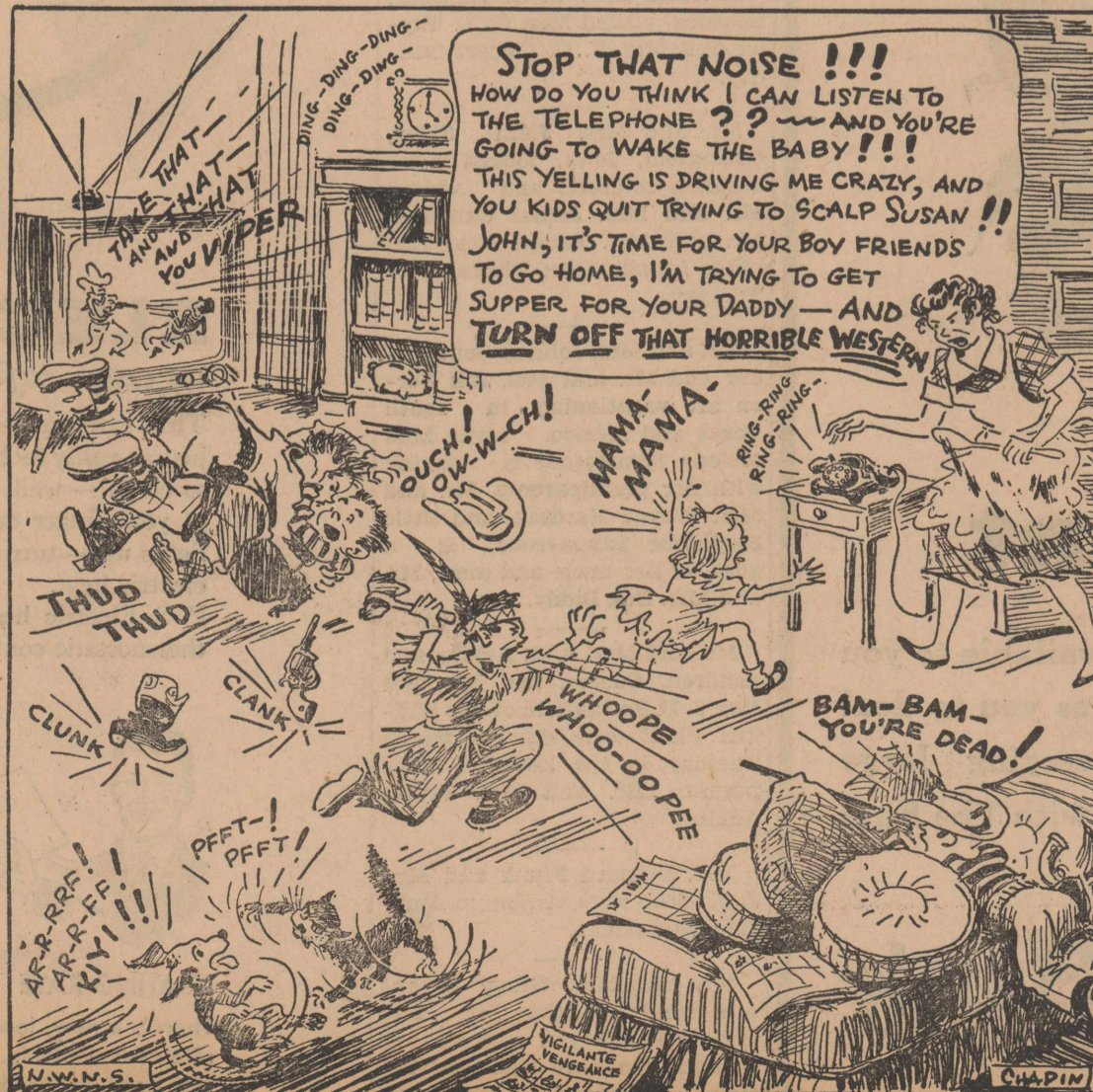
Janetta Willey Lacerates Leg Jumping Fence
