

From Mary Overstreet, Mallard, Iowa: I remember early in the 1870's when corn was picked it was piled near the house on the ground. We had no cribs in those days. The prairie chickens were so plentiful the men shot them from the window when they came to feed on the corn.

We salted, smoked and dried the breasts like dried beef, and made milk gravy of the shaved meat, like creamed, dried beef. Not a bad change from the pork which sometimes was our main meat supply.

They killed seven rattlesnakes

the first summer we were there, all in the little yard near our house. They were large snakes, with seven or eight rattles. Fortunately, no one was bitten.

In the 80's, decent country butter sold as low as 4 to 8c a pound. Eggs in summer were about 8c per dozen, calico as low as 4c per yard. The weather got down to 30 below and there was nothing to stop it or protect buildings, other than a haystack-no trees, and prairie fires killed every shrub in

We lived in a frame house, but many of the settlers had sod houses or dugouts which were quite warm.







1/2 teaspoon vanilla 1 cup heavy cream, whipped 1/2 cup finely chopped walnuts
