Stratford grade school girls lost their second game of the tournament to River Road by a score of 31 to 32. Yvonne Gamble was named on the girls all-tournament team.

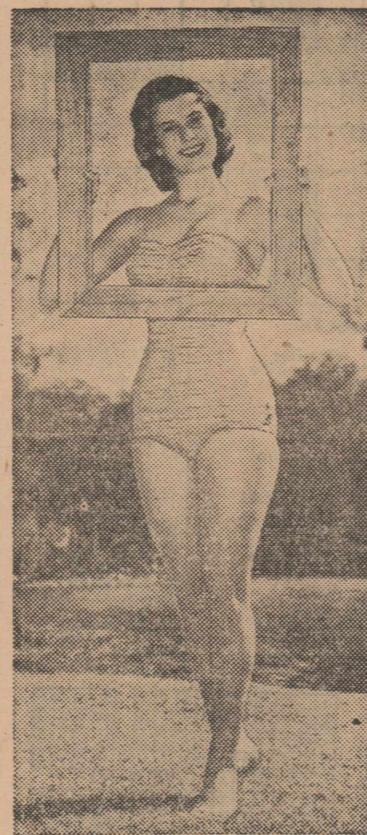
County Gets One Drilling Location

Announcement is made of the location of the Phillips-Massie B. No. 1 to be drilled 1,980 feet from the south and west lines of section 12 in Block 1-T. The potential depth of the well is 3,600 feet. The well is located 10 miles north and 3 miles west of Stratford.

Two Locations In Dallam

O. Gamble No. 1 is located 1,250 feet from the North and East lines of section 83 in Block 1-T. The potential drilling depth of the well is 4,000 feet.

Kate Galbraith et al No. 1 is 1,250 feet from the south and east lines of section 51 in Block 1-T. The potential drilling depth of the well is 4,000 feet. These wells are located approximately 10 and 12 miles northwest of Stratford.

Legislation In Austin Concerning High Plains

(By J. L. Bass Jr)

The 56th Legislature of the State of Texas is less than two months under way and to date there have been 532 Bills introduced before the House of Representatives and 230 Bills introduced before the Senate. These Bills have been referred to committees for various changes, amendments and necessary re-writing after countless hours of research and reports so that they will best serve the needs of the people.

Your representative, J. W. Buchanan, has been appointed to work on five committees by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, Waggoner Carr, from Lubbock. The committees are: Appropriations, Conservation and Reclamation, Highways and Roads, Agriculture, and Livestock and Stock Raising.

Mr. Buchanan has introduced before the House a Bill which will correct the surveys in Sherman County.

Your representative aside from the many hours of other committee work has been taking part in the hearings before the Appropriations Committee. This committee hears the various requests from all the organizations, agencies, hospitals, and schools, etc., of the State and then an appropriations Bill is drafted to try to set a fair and equitable appropriation and still keep the amount low enough so that taxes will not have to be increased. The hearings have now been conducted and soon the first draft of the Bill will be written and introduced before the House of Representatives.

Mr. Buchanan has also introduced House Bill No. 271. This Act would validate the Dallam County Underground Water conservation District No. 1.

Another Bill of interest to the people of the Panhandle was approved by the Senate State Affairs Committee. It is a bill, sponsored by Senator Hazlewood of Amarillo, which would enable the National Guard Armory Board to transfer land to West Texas State College. The college could take over two small tracts of land adjoining the campus and make way for a new road around the campus.

The Animal Health Council's bills are moving steadily in both Houses, House Bill 151, hog feeding, HB 184, bovine TB, and HB 31, brucellosis, having all passed the House. Senate Bills 38 and 39, brucellosis and market livestock inspection, were heard February 24, 1959 and have been reported favorably.

Other bills introduced which might be of interest were: SB 177, Willis, unlawful to issue bad check or fraudulently stop payment.

HB 418, Cowen, certificate of title on boat motors.

HB 439, Bridges and eleven others, which would end the death penalty and make life imprisonment the maximum penalty for capital cases.

HB 44, Whitfield, which would have the same effect.

HB 75, Anderson and James, relating to speed limits on vehicles.

HB 33, Sealigson, would increase certain taxes and repeal others.

HB 495, Lewis et al, providing that all teachers sign an oath that they believe in God before being eligible to teach in Public School.

HJR 6, Cole et al, could provide regulation of money lenders and interest rates.

HB 375, Parsons, would amend

Pete Bateman Resigns At Stratford

M. P. (Pete) Bateman, head football coach and girls basketball coach at Stratford High School, has resigned to go into business in Liberal, Kansas. Bateman's father-in-law and brother-in-law, operators of a large tire store at Liberal were both killed last fall in an auto accident near Pueblo, Colorado.

Bateman has been in the Stratford system four years, first as an assistant and the past two years as head coach. His football record is 16 wins and 3 losses. His team in 1957 won 8 and lost 2 ending in a triple tie with Groom and Darrouzett for the 1-B crown. Stratford moved to class A and his 1958 team lost to Gruver 22-12 for the district 1-A title for the only loss last fall. His girls basketball teams had a 50 win against 26 loss record.

The Board of Trustees agreed to release Bateman March 1, so he could immediately make his change. The board regrets to lose a man of Bateman's caliber. Superintendent of Schools R. W. Standefer in commenting on Bateman's loss said, "Bateman was an excellent coach, good teacher, popular, yet well respected by the students." Standefer further said, "Bateman was not only an excellent coach but a man good for the school system."

No immediate successor will be named until a later date.

Miss Crabtree is the daughter of Mrs. B. R. Crabtree of Dalhart and a sister of Newton Crabtree of Stratford.

A gift of matched luggage from the society was presented to Miss Crabtree by Rev. W. R. Lawrence, pastor.

Miss Crabtree worked in the AAA office in Dalhart following her graduation from Stratford High School until she began her college work. She attended Wayland Junior College in 1941 and 1942, and was graduated from Baylor University in 1944. In 1946, she received her Master's degree from the Woman's Missionary Union Training School at Louisville, Kentucky.

In 1946, she also received an appointment by South Baptist Foreign Missionary Board and left for the field in Africa in January 1947.

She is beginning her return trip to Africa March 10 when she leaves Amarillo by plane for New York. She is scheduled to sail from there March 13 on the S.S. African Grove. Her work is in Nigeria, which is in West Africa.

Miss Crabtree is principal of Agbor Baptist Girls' High School. Enrollment, she said, was 140 in 1958. All are boarders, some coming as far as 500 miles to go to a high school. The teaching staff includes two American missionaries and six to eight Nationals. Other employees are a cook and helpers, carpenter, painter, tailor and helper, and yard worker. She also said students there study subjects similar to American high school students.

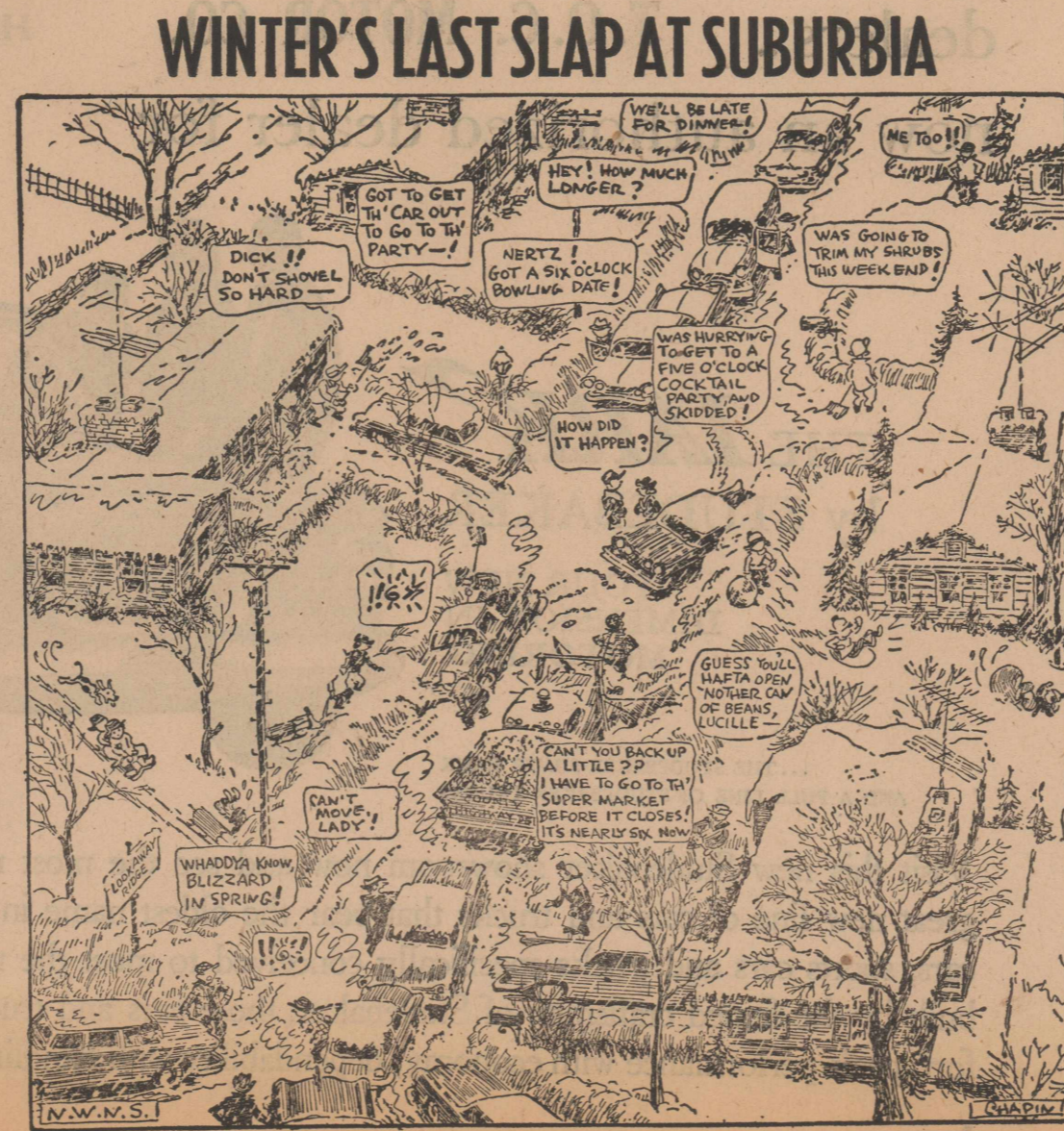
Cotney Buys Smith Chevron Service Station

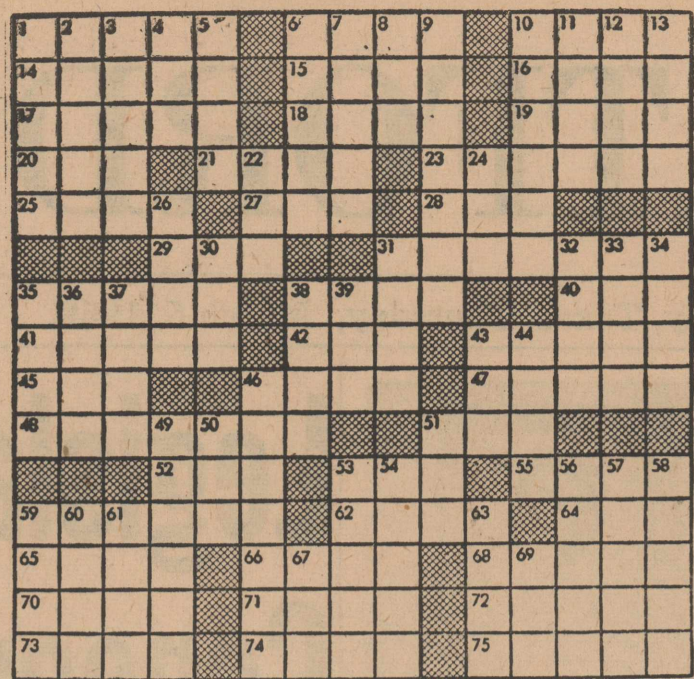

Your County Tax Collector is Required under the Law to Examine the Title and License Receipt before he can renew the registration of your vehicle.

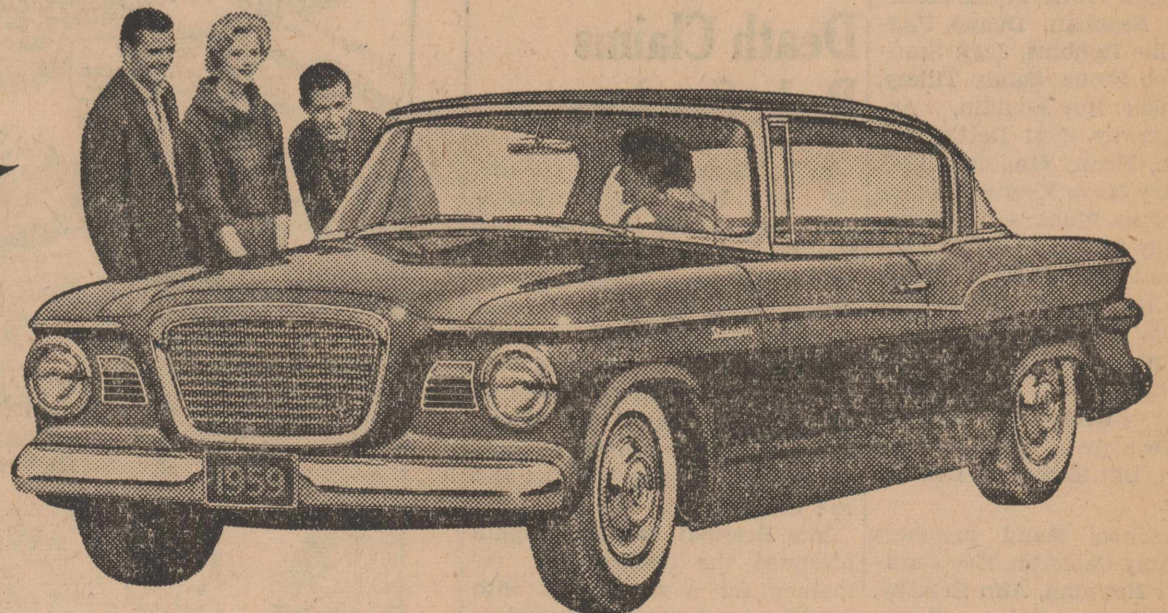

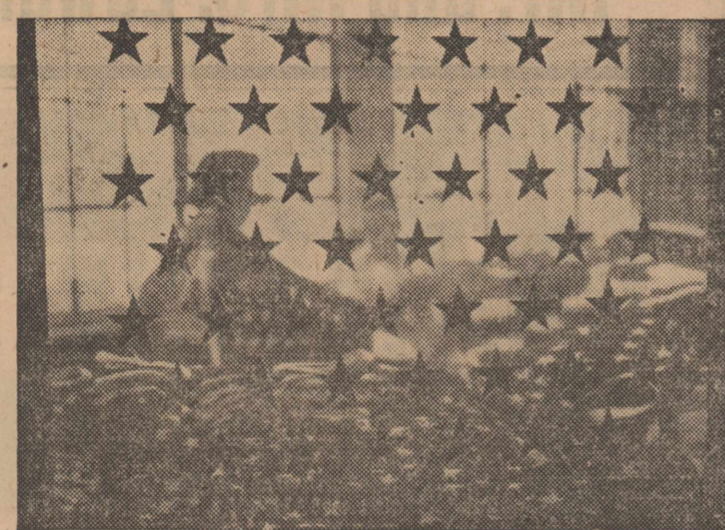
Elaine Cummings To Appear On Talent Show

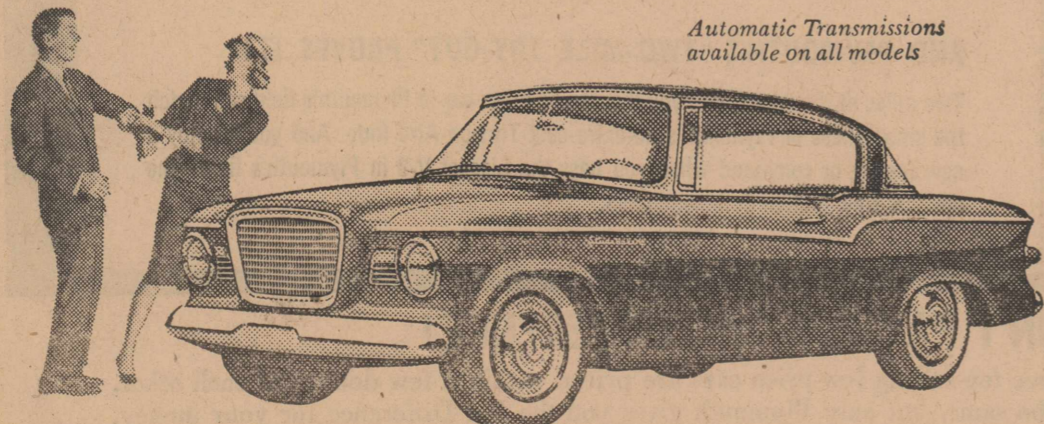
