Farm Bureau Presidents To Meet March 26

AMARILLO — A state-wide meeting of county Farm Bureau presidents will be held here March 26 to discuss current commodity problems, particularly in regard to wheat, according to J. H. West, Bishop, president of the Texas Farm Bureau.

Attendance will be limited to county presidents or their appointed representatives for the one-day session which gets underway at 10 a. m. at the Herd Hotel.

Dr. Warren Collins, Chicago, assistant director of the American Farm Bureau Federation's commodity division, will be the main speaker. He will bring factual information on "the situation we face" regarding commodity problems and will also discuss the current status of farm program legislation in Congress, West said.

The state Farm Bureau president stressed the fact that the meeting will deal with the problems of all commodities, not just wheat.

"I know that you are already aware of the many 'pie in the sky' solutions to our problems that are now being considered by Congress," West said in a letter to county Farm Bureau presidents. "The wheat program, of course, is of utmost urgency, but these rosy solutions now being considered are not limited to that commodity, and would change the '58 program for such commodities as cotton and feed grains which have not yet had a chance to work. In light of this situation, it is imperative that farmers and ranchers be given the opportunity to know the facts."

Representative Reports From Austin

The spotlight was shared this week by the beginning of the hearings on the Hale, Aikin et al School Bills. The counterparts of HB 22 and 220 were aired at a public committee hearing in the Senate Chamber on Monday night. About 3,000 persons were present in the chamber and the balcony and standing in the aisles. More than 20 witnesses were called. Most of these were from teacher associations, but others included people from other professions. Mrs. W. D. DeGrassi of Amarillo, president of the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers was a witness for the proposed bills. The delegation from Dalhart, Dumas and Stratford was appreciated.

HB22 (same as SB 5) would raise teachers pay from \$3,204 to \$4,000 for a teacher with a bachelor's degree and \$4,200 for a master's degree. The top salaries for a bachelor's and master's degree would be \$5,000 and \$6,000 respectively. The bill also provides for an additional increase for each school bus, a sick leave plan for teachers, an educational library, and to teach English to pre-school Spanish speaking children.

It is estimated to cost \$300,000,000.00 in new tax money to take care of the deficits, normal increase in cost of State government, and put the Hale-Aikin bill into effect for the next biennium.

In another hearing this week the Texas Educational Commission recommended an increase in tuition for all students attending any one of the state supported colleges and universities. It was recommended, above student and others protest, that the increase be set at an amount so that tuition fees would pay about 20% of the students' educational costs. Tuition is now \$100 per year (for the nine month term) for resident students and would be increased to \$125 or \$130 beginning in September 1959. Fees of the medical and dental schools would not be affected. A formula plan was introduced to have automatic increases in tuition so as to maintain a 80-20 ratio.

Tuition fees for non-residents would be increased so that they would remain four times the resident fee. Out-of-state fees are now \$400 per year.

HB 118 passed the House March 9. This bill would permit investment of up to half the permanent school fund of the University of Texas in corporate stocks and bonds. Opposers of the bill say that the Regents of the University are spending too much money on commissions and brokerage fees.

HB 74, by Mr. Buchanan, was also passed on Monday. This bill was necessary to make the boundary line of Sherman County coincide with the Texas-Oklahoma line. Mr. Buchanan's HB 271 was also passed on the local and uncontested calendar. That is the bill validating the boundary lines of Dallam Co. underground water conservation District No. 1, North of the Canadian River in Texas. This is in the Texline vicinity.

County Has Good February Driving Record

The rural traffic accident summary for Sherman County for the month of February was released this week by Sergeant D. W. Duggan, Patrol Supervisor of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

There were no accidents investigated by the Highway Patrol which resulted in property damage, personal injury or fatal accidents.

The sergeant advised that too many people look upon driving as a thing apart, something divorced from the code of morality which governs the other activities of their lives. The result of this split thinking is a staggering annual traffic toll.

To reduce the death rate during 1959, the sergeant stressed the necessity for drivers, as well as pedestrians, to maintain vigilance and observe the lifesaving rules of the road. He urged greater compliance with the speeding and driving while intoxicated laws, pointing out that in 1958 these were prime factors in traffic accidents.

Make Four Drilling Locations

Drilling locations have been announced for four wells to be drilled in this territory.

A revision has been granted to locate the Phillips Judd A No. 1, 1,250 feet from the north and west lines of section 3 in Block 1 PSL. The well is located 10 miles north and 3 miles west of Stratford and will be drilled to a potential depth of 3,600 feet.

The Phillips Judd B. No. 1, 10 1/2 miles north and four miles west of Stratford, is located 1,250 feet from the north and 2,850 feet from the east lines of section 2 in Block 1 PSL. Potential depth of the well is 3,700 feet.

Shamrock Oil & Gas Corporation Leroy Judd et ux No. 1, is located 1,250 feet from the south and east lines of section 13 in Block 1-T. The well is located 10 miles north and four miles west of Stratford and will be drilled to a potential depth of 3,800 feet.

In Dallam County, the Gulf E. Foxworth "B" No. 1 well is located 1,250 feet from the east and south lines of section 85 in Block 1-T. The well is 5 miles south of Kerrick and will be drilled to a potential depth of 4,000 feet.

A Perilous Time Faces The West

(By Ralph W. Yarborough)

These are perilous times. Not since Pearl Harbor has our country been in such grave peril. Not since I have been in Washington have I written to you on so grave a subject. Khrushchev and his Communist conspirators for world dominion have set a time bomb for the West by ordering us to get out of Berlin by May 27th. It's up to us to either defuse the bomb or be destroyed by it. In open violation of the Yalta and Potsdam Agreements, Khrushchev has ordered the Allies out of Free West Berlin surrendering it to the Communist dictators. We of the West, the United States, England and France owe a duty to freedom. We are in Berlin by solemn international agreement. We owe a duty to keep the torch of liberty lit in West Berlin. If we let the Iron Curtain of Communism engulf West Berlin, we will have seen a second Munich in our time; a second Munich more horrible and more disastrous in its results than the first.

What's happening in West Berlin? Since the Iron Curtain of Communism lowered over East Germany, more than three million people have escaped from East Germany to the freedom of West Germany and to the West generally. One quarter of a million people per year flee Communist domination in East Germany and come to the West. About 4,000 a week escape from East Germany to the West and most of all these have come through West Berlin. Khrushchev has said that he is interested in the people in Berlin because he doesn't want these living witnesses, a quarter of a million of them a year, to come to the West because they are living witness of the terror and failure of Communism.

At this time as in all periods of grave crisis, all of us stand firmly with President Eisenhower. If the Soviet leaders think they will find us divided in our fight against Communism, divided by political parties or divided by political ideology or divided on any other ground, they have made what will prove to be their greatest mistake and their fatal mistake. Personally, I think we ought to follow the diplomatic policy at this period of time of another great President, Theodore Roosevelt, who said in an international situation of tenseness, "Speak softly (Continued on Page 6)

Only 45% of the vehicles registered in Region No. 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety have been safety inspected for 1959, according to Captain Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection Supervisor in this Region.

With slightly less than one month separating them from the April 15 deadline, 236,679 motorists of the sixty-county Region still have not obtained their stickers which have been available at inspection stations for several months.

"This number includes about 1,137 vehicles in Sherman County where there are 2 inspection stations to do the work," said Captain Johnson.

Many motorists are going to find long lines awaiting them as the deadline rolls nearer as the inspection stations will not be able to cope with the usual last minute rush.

He added, "It is as much a violation to display an old sticker as not to have one at all."

The Captain pointed out that the law provides a fine of from one dollar to two hundred dollars plus court costs for operating a vehicle registered in Texas without the current inspection sticker.

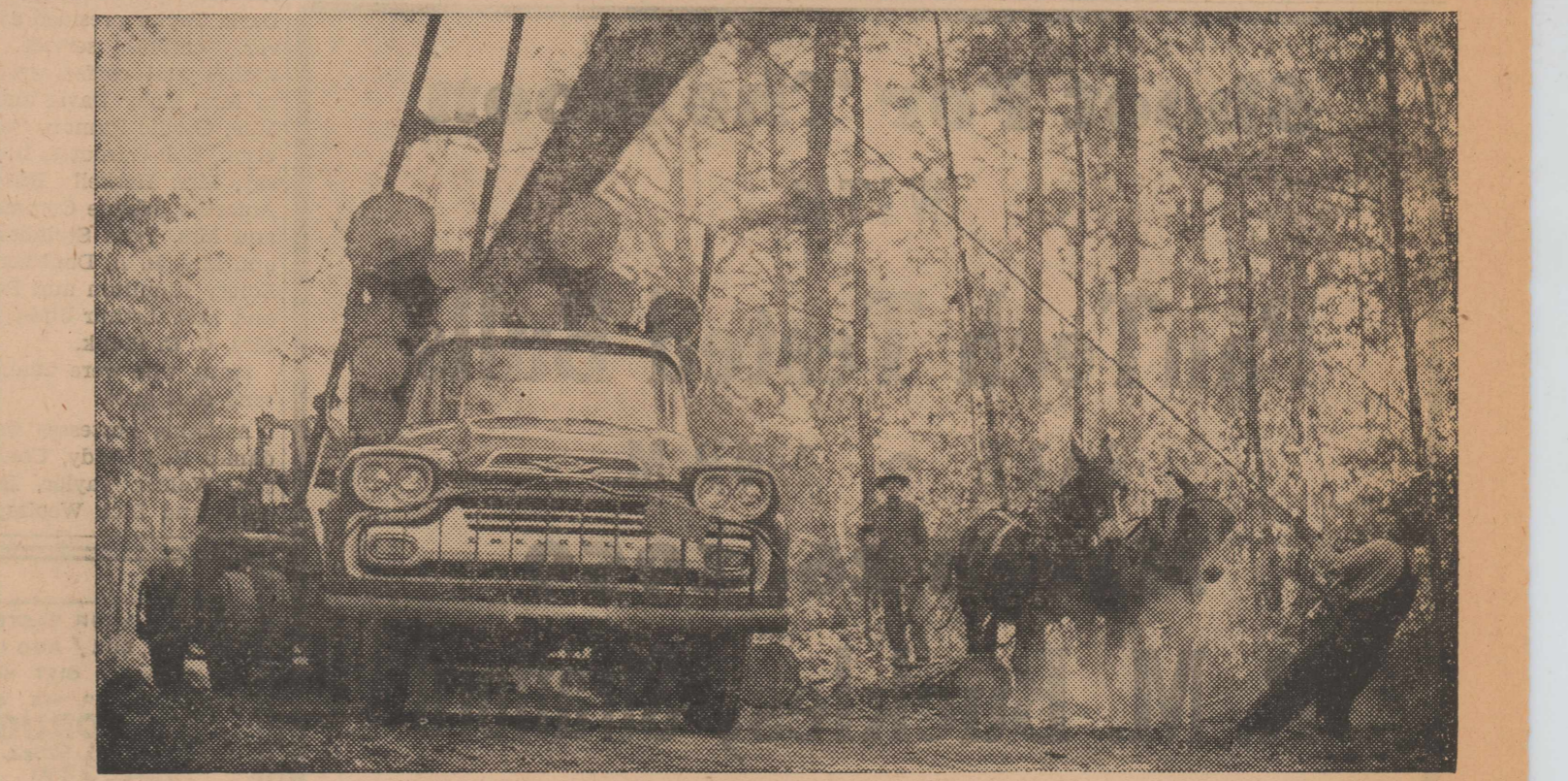

cessful in getting a bill through the senate committee on transportation. Basis for the bill is that factory-franchised dealers, some independent dealers, service, financial, and insurance businesses are not open Sundays.

Proponents of the Sales tax bill are still not near a majority, but there is indication that sentiment is increasing for the bill in the House. At the beginning of the session an informal head count showed 90% opposed, this has been slimmed as some members of the house are seeking a single tax measure which will provide the necessary increase that must be met. A majority in the House is 76.

New tax measures introduced in the House this week were: HB 585, Oliver, called the advertising bill and which would place a tax at the rate of 5% on gross revenues on all advertising. This would apply to newspaper, radio, TV station, and outdoor billboard advertising. HB 659, Anderson, license tax on water craft within the State. HB 678, Oliver, occupation tax on the business of parking or storing motor vehicles. Also Seeligson's bill, designed to raise \$67 million and to be used for the school bills. This bill was long

Another was an omnibus tax bill which will supposedly raise \$200 to \$300 million a year. This bill also has an education provision and would provide for a \$60 increase in salary for teachers. 1959 Harvest Farm Price Supports

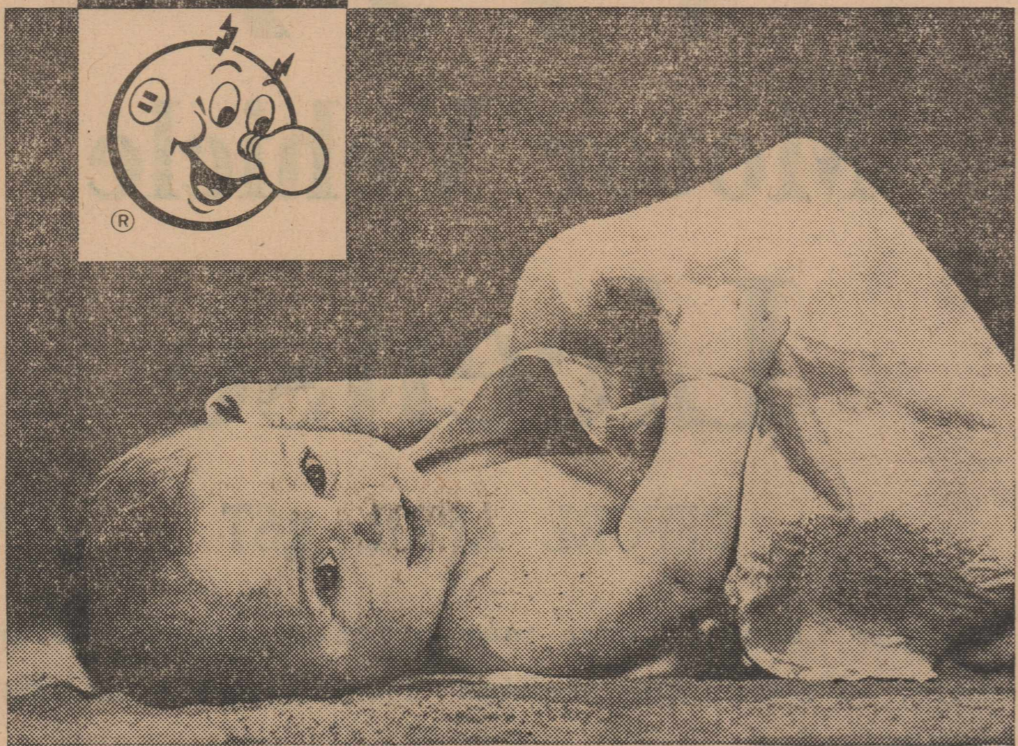
Farm operations may be based on recent minimum national average price supports for grains which can be produced locally.

Wheat rates announced on March 2 are based on the minimum national average wheat support price for \$1.81 per bushel for 1959 production announced on March 1, 1958.

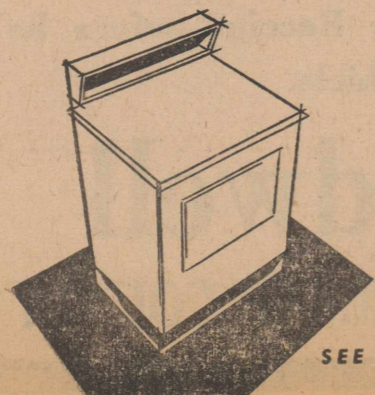
The national average support of .90 a bushel for rye announced February 18 reflects approximately 60 percent of the February 1959 parity.
