MY FACE IS RED

(By Walter Rogers)

On March 8, I wrote a newsletter pointing out several items concerning the national debt and the amount of money that we in this country are required to expend each year. I also placed some figures in the newsletter with regard to the ownership of certain property by the Federal government. Among these figures I included the number of vehicles owned by Uncle Sam. These figures had been acquired from the Library of Congress and the other agencies of government that are supposed to have their information correct and up-to-date. When we received the information that the Federal government, civilian and

military owned some 200 million vehicles, it somewhat startled us. We rechecked with the sources of information and were advised that those figures were correct. However, in the last few days a new recheck has revealed that the figures were in error. The first figures I had included too many zeros at the end, and represented millions of vehicles rather than thousands. The actual figures (that is, the last that we have received) reflect that the civilian arm of our government owns 107,049 vehicles and the military 108,743. Needless to say, I regret that this error was made, but figures have always confused me, especially when we get into the big ones. The Federal government has grown so big that it is highly unusual to talk about anything less than a million. Most of the conversation and talk refers to items in the billions. This probably explains why the information sent us by the Library of Congress referred to millions rather than thousands. Perhaps the folks doing much of this research work have had so little to do with minuscule items like thousands that they don't recognize them when they see them. In any event, we apologize and assure you that the mistake was a mistake of mind and not of heart.

Since we are on the subject, it might be interesting for you to know some of the other statistics concerning the vehicles owned by the Federal government and the cost of their operation. The 224,956 government-owned vehicles (this figure is slightly higher than the two above figures added together, because a few different types of vehicles have been included in this total figure) were driven a total of 1,900,032,525 miles. These vehicles consumed 202,414,833 gallons of fuel for an average of 9.39 miles per gallon. The expenses incurred for all motor vehicles, government-owned and rented or leased, including direct operating expenses, maintenance and repair, depreciation, direct expenses for renting or leasing, overhead, indirect expenses, and miscellaneous expenses, amounted to \$228,073,721. These figures have been copied from the Annual Motor Vehicles Report of the General Services Administration and if any of them are wrong, it is because they were wrong in that report.

Foreign Aid
The foreign aid bill which the President is supporting is in for some troublesome times. The President has asked this Con-

gress to give him the additional sum of \$3.9 billion. This measure is being thoroughly combated in the Committee on Foreign Affairs in the House of Representatives. This is excellent, because many of the bad features of the program can be brought out into the light and stopped. The Committee on Foreign Affairs has submitted an interim report on the subject which has some interesting facts. Among these were examples of poor stock keeping. In one instance, only one car-buretor for 2 1/2 ton truck engines was found to be in stock for an entire army, and at another depot there were none. One installation had a 185-year stock of one particular type of ammunition. Another item of interest was the records in one motor pool that reflected a supply of 44 tires for each truck in the motor pool. Other instances reflected that we were furnishing equipment far too complex for the military needs of some of the countries, the reason being that the models which would have best met the needs of these countries had become obsolete, but no adjustment had been made in furnishing the advanced equipment, even though it did not meet the needs. Numerous other such instances indicate and have indicated for a long time that some affirmative action was required in the Administration by correcting some of the administrative practices of the I.C.A. All of these will be fully aired in the debate before the House, and it will make some interesting reading.

Buchanan Views Texas Legislation

Are you in favor of a 3% Sales Tax? Are you in favor of a tax on Trading Stamps? What kind of tax do you suggest? These and many other questions were heard in tax hearings this week. This is only the start; beginning the first of this week there will be a daily session by the tax committee to air bills. The committees decided to meet the revenue problem with a broad front and try to get through the 50 bills on the docket.

The "broad based" tax bills are first on the agenda. HB's 800, 84, and 786 will be heard on that date. Others have already been scheduled for the first week. The goal is to have the revenue committee wind up its public hearings and be in a position to report to the floor when the budget needs for the next biennium are determined.

Thanks for the letters concerning HJR 51. Pari-mutual betting was outlawed in Texas on horse racing in 1937. This constitutional amendment if passed by the House and Senate and approved by the Governor would allow each county to make up its own mind.

The proposed measure would levy a fifteen per cent tax on all bets taken at the race tracks. It would also set up a Texas racing commission to supervise racing, licensing of horses, jockeys and tracks.

Counties would get two per cent of the tax and race tracks would get six per cent. The State's seven per cent would go for health, welfare and education services.

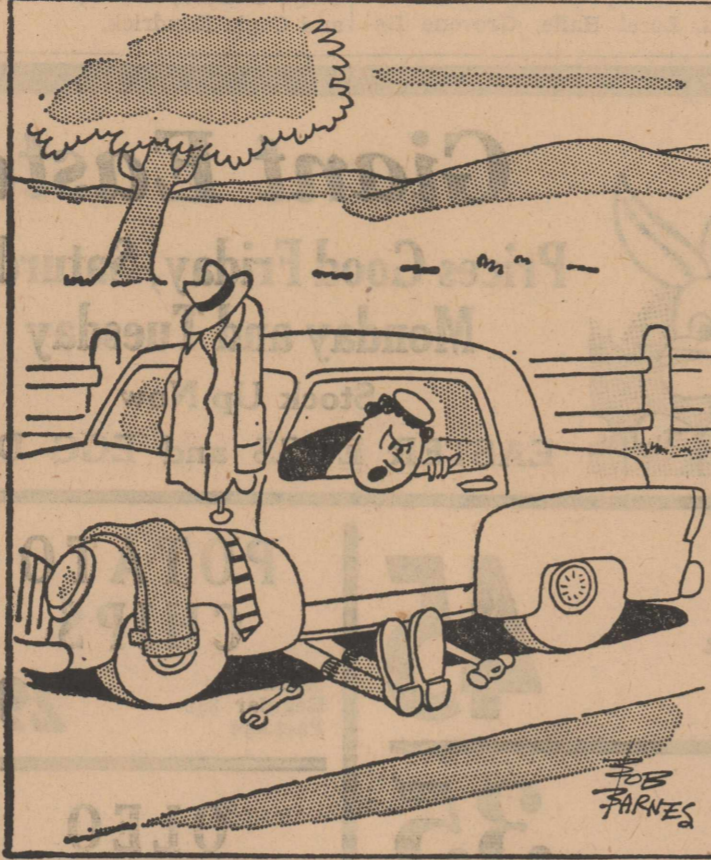

**Insurance Bill
In Hands Of
Subcommittee**

AUSTIN — Flexible insurance
legislation which would save
Texans \$34 million a year on
automobile insurance this week
was in the hands of a sub-com-
mittee of the House Insurance
Committee.

The full committee completed
last week three days of hearings
on the merits and opposition to
a flexible rating system, such as
used successfully in other states.

The main witness for the pro-
ponents was Vestal Lemmon,
general manager of the National
Association of Independent In-
surers, who testified that Tex-
ans were being "overcharged
and gouged" on automobile in-
surance.

He cited dozens of examples
that showed that Texas car in-
surance buyers were paying
from \$15 to \$50 a year more for
car insurance than residents in
other states, where the flexible
rate system prevails.

"Texas is the only state in the
union which bars competition in
the car insurance field, and the
result is that Texans are paying
higher rates," Lemmon said.

"The insurance companies in
Texas which are opposing flexi-
bility deviate in other states, but
they are ashamed to let the peo-
ple of Texas know they are sell-

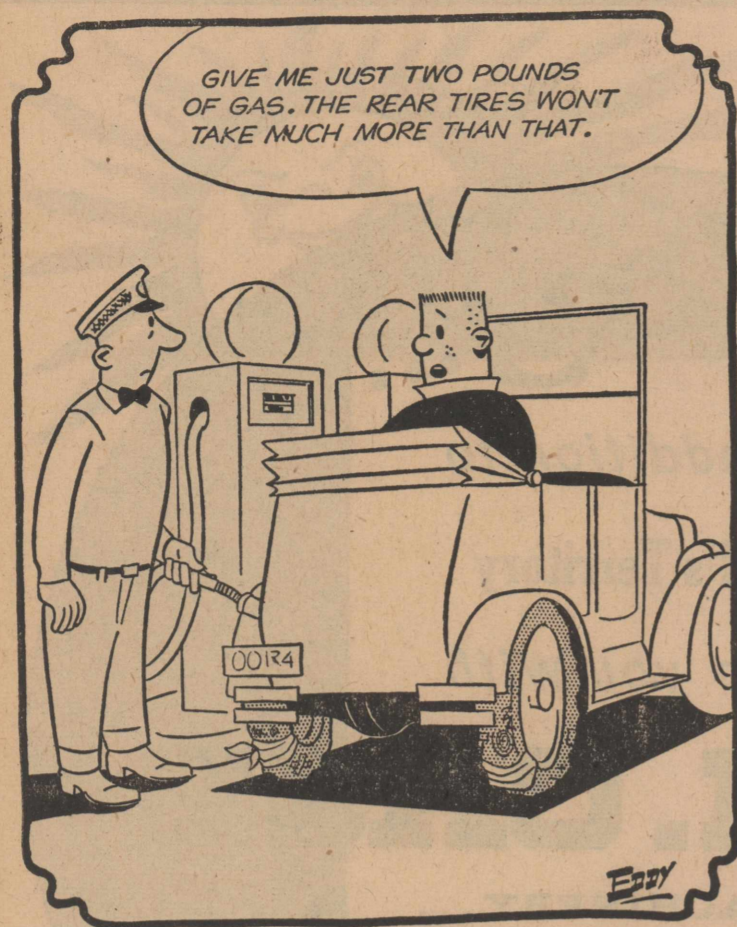

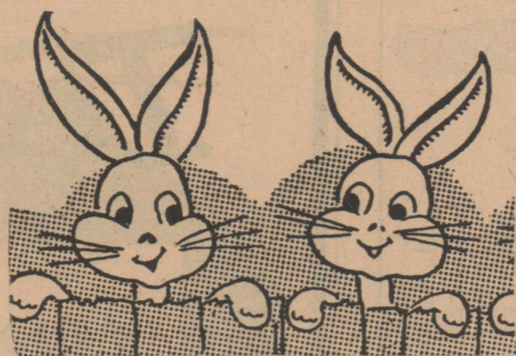
