

Call Wheat Growers For New Program Plans

Texas Wheat Growers Association will hold a one day state wheat convention in the Herring Hotel in Amarillo November 24. The Secretary of Agriculture has said the number one farm problem facing the 1960 Congress is wheat. His proposed solution to the wheat problem is to reduce the price support. Some producers believe that the secretary of agriculture wants to reduce the price of wheat until it will compete with other feed grains at the market place. Many feel that a program of this type will not reduce the surplus of wheat, but will reduce the farmer's income. There are some, however, who feel that a reduction in the price of wheat would help in moving the surplus grain.

From 10:00 a. m. until 12:00 noon, the convention will be devoted to a two hour discussion of what program the farmers think will be best. The Wheat Stabilization Program, a bushelage allotment approach to the problem, will be thoroughly analyzed and have both its weak and strong points discussed. The merits of other wheat programs will be discussed. During this period of the program growers will be invited to participate in the discussion.

Officers of the Texas Wheat Growers Association are of the opinion that unless the wheat growers themselves develop a workable wheat program, some other group will offer a solution or even worse, wheat producers could find themselves operating with no program at all.

Ted Fiedler, a wheat farmer, who is administrator for the Colorado Wheat Administrative Committee, will speak on The Great Plains Wheat Marketing Development Association, following the noon meal. This association is active in finding new markets for wheat. Fiedler is expected to divulge important information.

Senator Ralph Yarborough will speak on the problems of wheat growers and the American farmer in general.

Officers of the Texas Wheat Growers Association are appealing to producers to attend the convention and help in working out some solution to the wheat problem.

Officers of the organization are C. L. Edwards of Panhandle, president; Leo Witkowski of Dimmitt, vice president; and Kenneth Kendrick of Stratford, secretary-treasurer.

1959 Farm Census In Progress

The 1959 census of agriculture, now under way in Sherman County, will bring up to date farm statistics last collected in 1954, when the farm census revealed the following facts:

The value of products sold in 1954 by farm operators was \$4,673,683.00.

The value of all crops sold was \$1,919,000.00 and included \$1,917,705.00 for field crops. The value of vegetables marketed was \$982.00 and a total of \$313.00 for fruits and nuts was recorded.

The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$2,754,683.00 and this includes \$1,968.00 for dairy products and \$15,845.00 for poultry and poultry products.

W. J. Lowe Funeral Rites Friday Afternoon

Funeral services for W. J. Lowe, 59, will be held Friday at 2:00 p. m. in the First Christian Church. Bruce Clark, minister, will conduct the service.

The 59-year old rancher, farmer and business man, died in his sleep with a heart attack at about 2:00 a. m. Wednesday. Mrs. Lowe discovered her husband's death about 7:30 a. m. when she went to his bedroom to see why he had not followed his usual custom of getting up to listen to his favorite radio program.

Mr. Lowe had suffered a heart attack in April of 1958 but did not reveal his illness to the members of the family until he was stricken with a second heart attack about three weeks ago. He was brought home from the hospital Friday and seemed to be getting along nicely.

Mr. Lowe had lived in the Panhandle most of his life. He was born February 11, 1900 in Indian Territory near the present town of Hardesty, Oklahoma. He moved with his parents to Las Vegas, New Mexico in 1908 and came back to Texas to live at Old Hansford in 1913.

In 1923 Mr. Lowe came to Stratford and was employed as a cowboy on the ranch of the late W. G. O'Brien. From 1925 to 1929 he worked as a mechanic in Stratford garages.

Mr. Lowe and Miss Madge Foster were married August 26, 1928, and in April of 1929 they moved to Gruver where they operated a service station until 1946 when they returned to Stratford, and he became engaged in farming.

Surviving are his wife, Madge; two sons; Glendon of the home, and James Lowe; and two sisters, Mrs. Joe Billington and Mrs. Howard Etheridge.

Interment will be made in the Stratford cemetery under the supervision of Boxwell Bros. Funeral Directors. Pallbearers will be: Homer Martin of Spearman, Emory Roper of Dalhart, Archie Cleavinger of Conlen, Bob Monroe of Conlen, Fred Cooper of Gruver, Henry Bryan of Dalhart and Merrit Green of Stratford.

26 Men Study Meats In City Swine Clinic

Twenty-six producers completed studies in producing better classes of meat for market in the swine clinic held at the county exhibit buildings Thursday and Friday. Six hogs were contributed for the clinic from Moore, Dallam, Hansford and Sherman Counties. They were judged by the group of men and classified in market classes of one, two and three.

Later the hogs were slaughtered at the local locker plant and the group viewed the percentage of lean meat dressed out from each carcass.

A number of breeding gilts were judged and producers received training in judging back fat by probing. This is a new technique used in swine production in actually measuring the thickness of back fats.

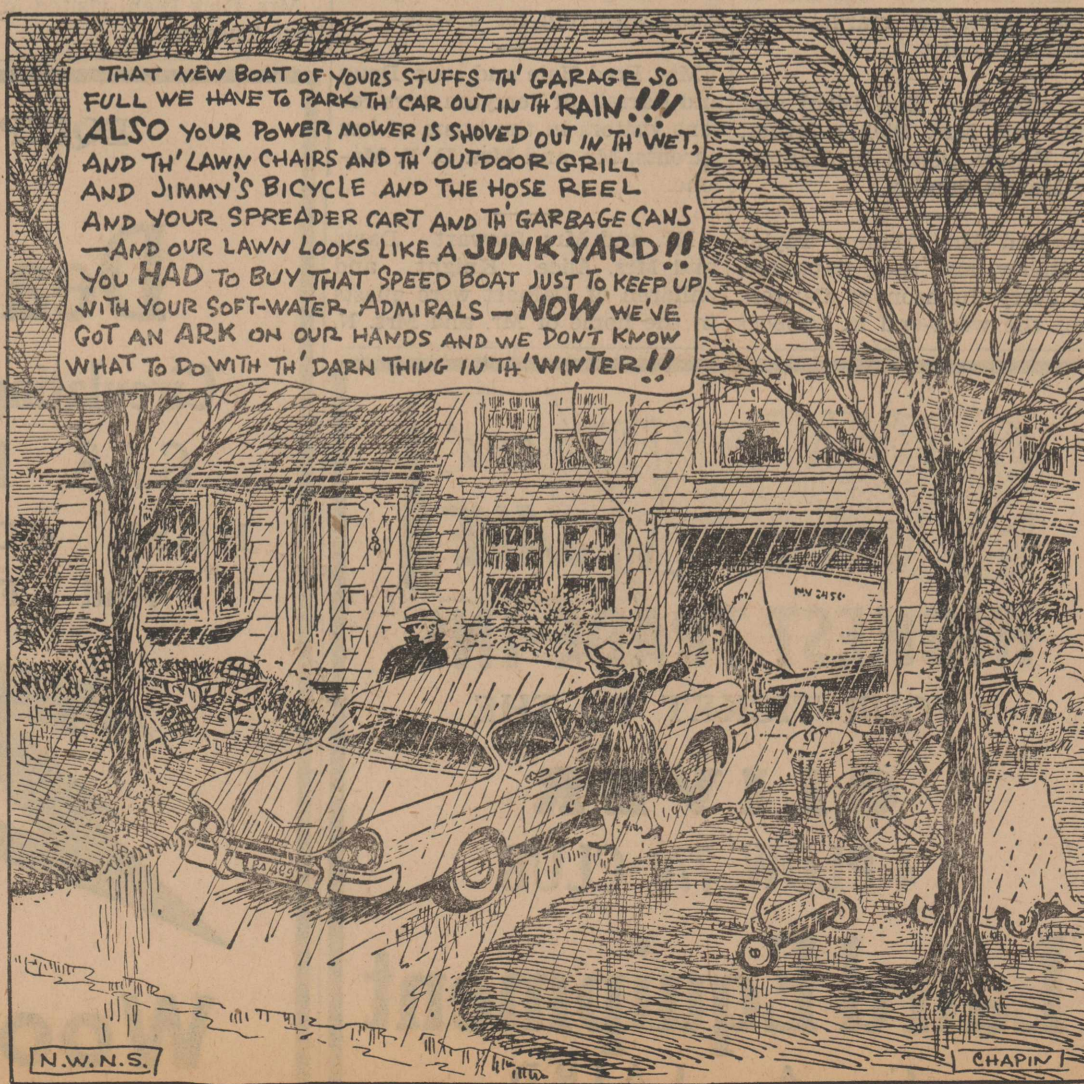

Big Problem: Permission To Date

This week's letter: "I am 14 and my father won't let me date or have a boyfriend. The parents of most of my girl friends are beginning to let them date and have company. But, I can't although I do have a boyfriend. Why can't I have dates like my friends do?"

She didn't say, but apparently our young friend is having dates that her father knows nothing about. This being the case, we feel

that we must point out that this is certainly no way to earn his trust and confidence—and the right to have dates and to receive company at home as her friends do.

The first duty of a girl of fourteen is to honor and obey her parents. If her parents say that she is not to have dates, then she is wrong to do so—for two reasons: one, she is almost certain to be "caught" at it; secondly, it's dishonest, like cheating at cards or

in a contest. If we "cheat" in little ways, sooner or later, we begin to "cheat" in bigger things.

Another thought: Because some people do certain things, this does not necessarily make it right for us to do them. Too many teens (and grownups, too, for that matter) never seem to understand this. But my family can't buy a new car this year just because the next door neighbors did. My family can't go to Florida this winter just because some people we know can afford the time and money to do so. The lamest excuse in the world for wanting to do something is that someone else has done it or is going to do it.

We must live our own lives, each individual, each member of a family. And, teens must learn that their parents are sometimes "right" as well as "wrong." Children may not always agree with decisions and established rules and regulations where dating is concerned, but they should abide by them and work to earn the greatest confidence and respect from their parents.
