Everett Turner Survives Skid On Pavement

Everett Turner, 9-year old son of Harold Turner, is rapidly recovering from the experience of sliding across the pavement on Main Street to the muddy ground near the Stratford Grain Co. on New Years Eve.

Harold and Everett had eaten supper at a cafe on the highway and were returning home. As the car made the left hand turn from U. S. Highway 54 on to Main Street the right door of the car at which Everett was standing, came open and the boy was thrown from the car. He slid across the mud covered pavement and into a muddy pond near the Stratford Grain Co. office. Harold stopped his car and leaped outside. His son was not in sight. Soon he heard him cry from fright and rushed to his side. The frightened boy, covered in mud from head to foot, sustained one cut and some bruises about the face. He was treated at the Stratford Clinic and is recovering from the experience without any sign of permanent injury.

In telling of the experience Harold Turner said, "We usually check that door but this time we both got in the car under the steering wheel and failed to see if the door on the other side of the car was securely fastened."

Will County Citizens Lose \$100,000 In '60

(By Wayne Chapman)

If the answer to the question in the title is yes, I'm sure each of you would be greatly alarmed. I'm equally sure if this fact could be proved each of you would be willing to take action to stop this tremendous yearly loss. I will state facts in this series of articles which will show how I arrived at this figure which I consider conservative.

This week lets consider why I think Sherman County citizens will lose at least \$100,000 in 1960. I believe this will happen because you will not receive the benefits available from having a Soil Conservation District in your county.

These benefits include promoting conservation of our soil and water. No one will argue that our land is as productive now as it was even 10 or 15 years ago. This reduction in productivity, which of course means reduction in income, is brought by improper use of soil and water resulting in erosion. If this soil and water erosion be reduced by one percent the savings both to the present farmers and future ones would easily exceed \$100,000.00.

I do not mean to imply that this improper land use is true any more so in Sherman County than any other county. However, I do say that of the 254 counties in Texas, only Sherman County and two or three others have not taken action to form a soil conservation district to help combat this soil and water erosion.

A soil conservation district is not a governmental agency as some may believe. It is an organization which must be voted into being by the people of Sherman County. It must be run by five farmers or ranchers of Sherman County elected by the people of Sherman County. It will accomplish its desired results only by farmers and ranchers of their own free will in becoming soil conservation district cooperators. These soil conservation district cooperators then develop a conservation plan of use for their farm or ranch. The farmers or ranchers themselves are responsible for developing these plans. They

may use any assistance available in developing this plan such as from other leading farmers and ranchers, the County Agent, ASC office, or the Soil Conservation Service. All the above mentioned people are available in Sherman County except the Soil Conservation Service.

When a Soil Conservation District is formed they must then request that the Department of Agriculture send a Soil Conservation Service unit into the district before they will do so. In the following articles I will discuss more about the services available through the Soil Conservation Service and what makes up a conservation plan.

Income Tax Help Available

Taxpayer self-help will again be urged by Internal Revenue Service during the income tax filing period until April 15, Hubert B. Hammill, administrative officer of the Amarillo office said this week.

"Self-help" Hammill explained, "means that the taxpayer is asked to complete as much of his 1959 return as possible before asking help. This saves the time of IRS people who, in turn, save taxpayers' money when uninterrupted from their routine duties of seeing that every taxpayer bears his fair share of the tax burden.

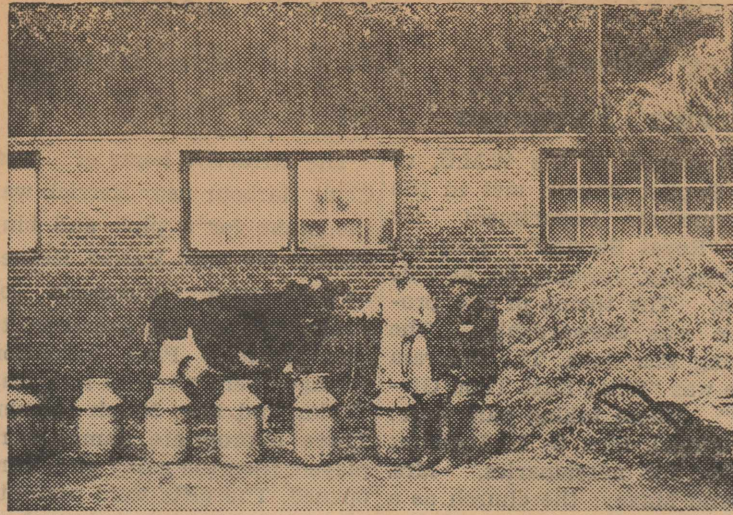
The Revenue representative revealed that many tax problems can be solved by studying the comprehensive instructions that accompany Federal income tax forms for 1959.

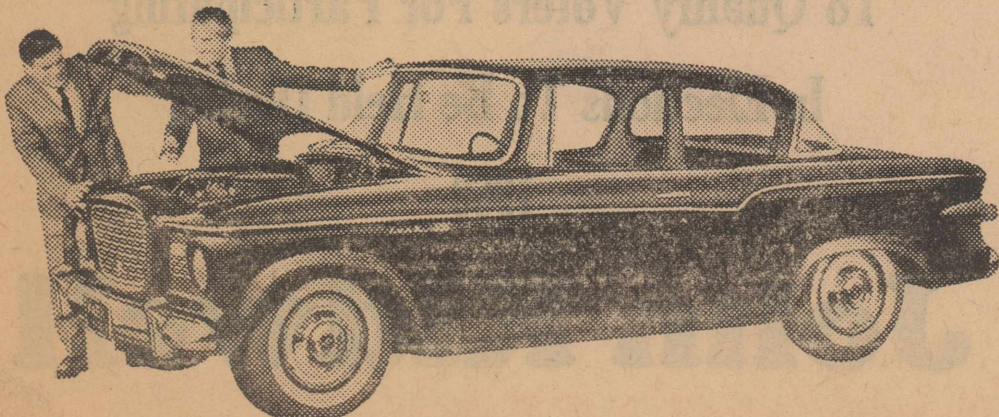
