





Hong Kong is a tourist shopping center as it is a free trading port. Fine Jade, lovely English woolens, are tailored and finished within twenty-four hours for the tourists. In the new territory leased from China for ninety-nine years, the farmers are hard working supersticious Chinese peasants, who would not allow pictures to be made of them, thinking it brought on Evil Spirits. Although they employ the most primitive methods to till and water their land, yet they have turned the rock slopes of the valley into cutivated land and grow food under the most unpromising conditions. Rice is the main crop; vegetables, potatoes, sugar cane, sweet potatoes and ginger are subsidiary crops. Most of the fields yield one harvest a year. Women tilling the fields with wooden ploughs drawn by water buffalo can be seen. In the new and more modern shopping center of the city, the visitors not only are able to admire the brilliant window displays, but also to observe the elegant, slim Chinese ladies, beautifully dressed in their "cheongsams" as they go about their shopping. But to get acquainted with Chinese customs and peculiarities, we were told to visit The "Thieves Market," which we did. After buying my friend, Ruth Hutton, a small gift, we roamed on down through the markets, where we saw the same items at half the price we had paid.
