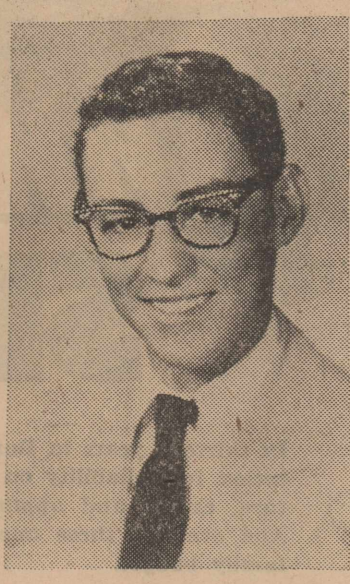

## Homer Casey Injured In Car Wreck Sunday

Homer Casey sustained two lacerations about the head and lay on the ground in a state of shock for about two hours Sunday morning after his car turned over on U. S. highway 54 about one mile east of Stratford.

The car, traveling west, veered to the north side of the highway and turned over one and one-half times. A small jack-knife, saturated with blood, lay near an open car door. Casey, about 19 years of age, lay a distance of about 60 feet from the car.

Donny Jacobs first noticed the car near the highway when he answered a call from a drilling crew near Texhoma. When he returned to Stratford he could see the condition of the car and notified night police chief Albert Lee. Lee investigated and found Casey laying some distance from the wrecked car.

Casey was given first aid treatment at the Stratford Clinic and was taken by D. W. Boner and Ross Turner in the Boxwell ambulance to Dumas Memorial Hospital for further observation.

Casey was released from the Dumas hospital Monday afternoon. The boy said he suddenly realized the car was slipping sideways, and really did not know what caused the accident. No other vehicle was involved.

## State Insurance Board Sticks To Policies

The State Board of Insurance has announced five minor changes in the safe driving insurance plan, but in broad effort, the plan remains the same. The Board stuck to its guns despite a barrage of criticism.

The main change is that an insurance company cannot deny liability on a policy if false or inaccurate information is given by the policy holder. For instance, a person taking out a policy might, intentionally or unintentionally, fail to tell the insurance company how many accidents or traffic violations were on his driving record.

However, the company would be entitled to collect the higher premiums or damages from fraud if the policy holders had not admitted to his true driving record.

Premiums go up in proportion to the number of accidents and violations on a driver's record.

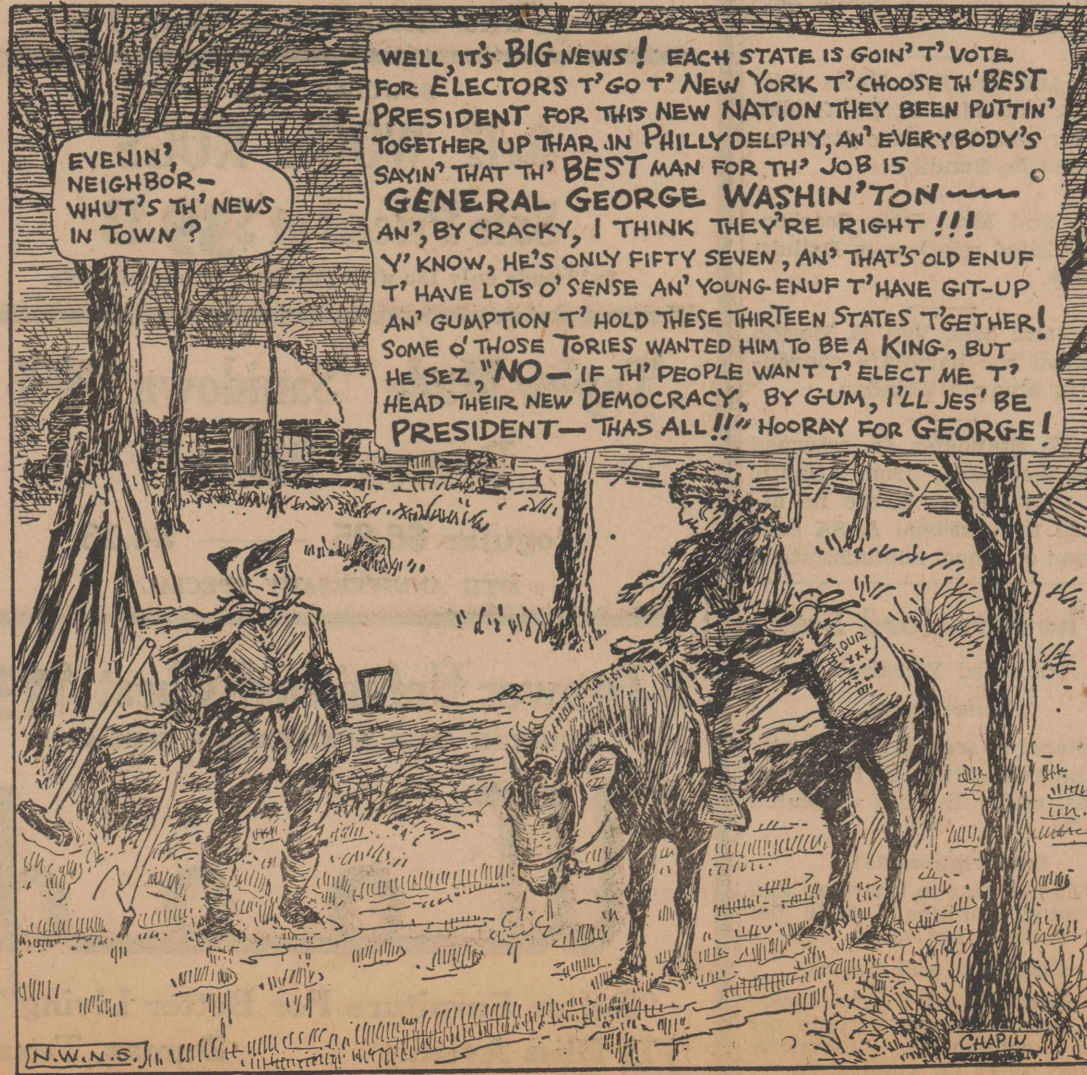

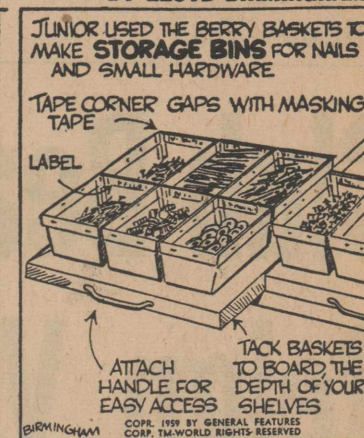

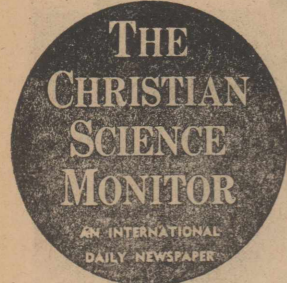

Both the boy and the girl become so interested in themselves and in each other that there is no room for friendship or association with other boys and girls. We enjoy being with people we like. And when we find someone with whom we have much in common, it is more fun to be with them than anyone else. And yet,

there are many others about us who have almost the same recommendations, with whom we have much in common—hobbies, interest in sports or other activities; but we're too interested in going steady to remember that we can have other friendships and enjoy being with other people.

We must admit that what most parents consider "kid-stuff" is a serious matter where teenagers are concerned. And teenagers believe that "going steady" is "for real." Sometimes, perhaps, it's too "real." They have time only for each other. They are always together and yet, in a sense, they are alone—they have neither the time nor the desire to make new friends or enjoy the companionship of other boys and girls.

Actually, teenagers, going "steady" probably monopolize each other's time and attention more than married couples. 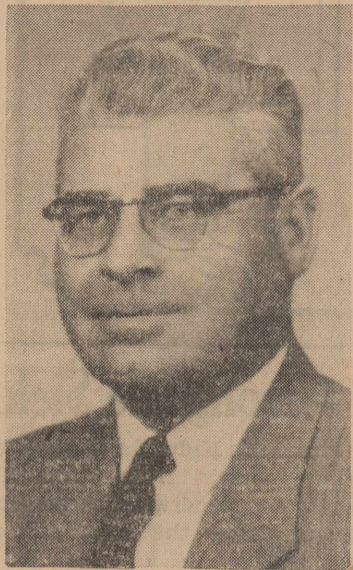

### No Sharp Break In Cattle Prices Likely In 1960

A sharp break in cattle prices is not likely in 1960 but we are entering a period which calls for weariness, is the latest word from John McHaney, extension economist. The small increase in cattle slaughter expected for 1960, together with a large hog slaughter, will take the bloom off cattle prices.

Prices of cows and feeder cattle will likely show greater declines than fed cattle, said McHaney. Seasonal price changes will likely be evident in these lower grades and a major part

of the year's expected decline will probably be felt during the late summer and fall. Fed cattle prices in the spring of 1960 may average a little below a year ago with little prospect for price advances before summer.

On January 1, 1959 there were 96.8 million head of cattle in the United States and during 1959 cattle producers probably added over five million head to this number, setting a new record of January 1, 1960. Mc-

Haney said some economists have estimated the January 1960 figure at somewhere between 101 and 103 million head. This expansion in numbers will result in an increase in slaughter and a decrease in prices; however, the increase in slaughter and the decrease in prices is expected to be moderate in 1960 unless a drouth should occur causing heavier marketings.

If cattle numbers expand at a fast pace, there is a possibility numbers will reach 115 million

head by 1964, making available 94½ pounds of beef per person. McHaney emphasized that an output of this size would demoralize beef prices.

Imports also added much to the large beef supplies. Net imports in 1959 probably reached the billion pounds mark (carcass weight equivalent). This was enough meat to provide 5½ pounds more per person in our civilian population. Imports of live animals and meat accounted for about nine percent of our

meat supply in 1959. However, McHaney said imports are not expected to be quite as large in 1960.

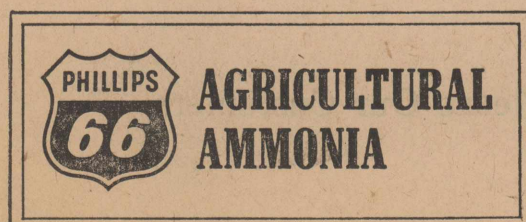
