T. S. Brannan Retires As **Bus Driver**

20 years of service as a school bus driver for the Stratford schools and has retired from active duty with the school systems under the teacher's retirement act at the age of 60. Brannan drove school buses for 191/2 years without an accident when he was disqualified as a driver because of a heart attack. During this period of service Brannan drove school buses for a distance of over 400,000 miles and on several occasions had students of the second generation of several families on his school buses.

During the last semester Brannan served as safety officer directing traffic on the Stratford School grounds to complete his remaining months of service required by the teacher retirement act.

Brannan is the first person to have retired from the Stratford Public School system while serving in any capacity other than that of a teacher.
