In a statement Sunday, Senate Majority Leader Lyndon nouncement by the Russians of Art Festival an "international university" in Moscow underlined a great and Friday Night growing weakness of the Soviets. In a statement for homestate constituents in Texas, Johnson said the Russian program called for students to come to Moscow for study, but they would work in an institution separate from the Russian students.

He said this was in sharp contrast to a proposal he spearheaded last year, which called for creation of an international center in Hawaii where students and scholars from both East and West would join.

"No one knows what was behind this latest example of Russian thinking," Johnson said. "But I suspect the Communist leaders are fearful of what Russian students might learn if they were exposed too long to the thinking of the outside world." The greatest Russian fear, he said, "is fear of the truth."

"This is their great weakness. In that weakness is our great strength," he said.



Alaska may cover more territory than any State in the Union, but the word "big" is still prominent in every Texas dictionary. Texas is a "big" State, with plenty of wide, open spaces and plenty "big" cities that are among the most modern in America. One familiar sight to Texans and to visitors from across the nation is Dallas's BIG TEX, towering 52 feet above crowds at the State Fair of Texas. Tex, naturally, is a big attraction at the annual October exposition, world's largest state fair. The big cowboy who "talks" in a deep voice-with a Western drawl, naturally-is often used as a symbol of the Western hospitality that has made Dallas famous. The \$35 million fair grounds draws more than 21/2 million visitors during two weeks for a variety of events, ranging from big-time college football in the Cotton Bowl and livestock judging in the Pan-American Livestock Exposition to popular comedy and variety shows. The Fair is also the home of the State Fair Musicals, which present six shows each summer with Hollywood and Broadway stars in production equalling anything the New York state has to offer. #### **Gourmet Tricks for Foods**

Those creamed soups which you're serving now, like mushroom, celery, chicken and potato can be much enhanced with slices of avocado added just before serving or one of the following: ripe olive pieces, salted whipped cream or thinly sliced rye bread spread with garlic butter and toasted. Sliced tomatoes need not be common if you spread them

with a mixture of 1 tablespoon instant onion soaked in 1 table-

HELEN'S FAVORITE: Spiced Oranges (Serves 4) 4 large oranges 1/4 cup red cherry juice 1 stick cinnamon whole cloves 1/4 cup currant jelly Pinch of salt Flaked coconut Pare and section oranges. Cook together cherry juice, currant jelly, cinnamon and cloves for 3 minutes. Add oranges and chill in refrigerator for eight hours or overnight. Serve with flaked coconut sprinkled on top.

By C. A. Dean, M.D. (Q) "Some time ago I read about a concentration drug to help people think better. Can this drug be obtained, and what is it called? Also, I smoke cigars but don't inhale. Is there any danger in this?"

D.E. (A) I know of no such medicine. Perhaps you are referring to drugs which stimulate the nervous system and thereby, supposedly, make us think more clearly. We certainly could use a concentration drug, but unfortunately we have none at this time

Cigar smoking without inhaling is probably the lest harmful form of smoking. Incidence of lung cancer is much higher in cigarette smokers who inhale. However, there is slightly more lung cancer among cigar smokers than nonsmokers.

(Q) "I am allergic. The exact cause of my allergy isn't known. I have heard there is a one-shot method which can cure allergies. Is this so? How effective is it?" F.C.B. Jr.

(A) For several years researchers have been trying to develop a one-shot desensitization. The product being tested is a concentrate of the material causing allergy in a fluid which delays release and slows absorption. This has a prolonged effect and eliminates the need for more frequent injections.

Some clinical trials have produced good results, but the biggest problem appears to be the number of bad reactions. If attempts to correct this are successful, we will have a more convenient method to control allergies.

Incidentally, the cause of allergy must be known for this method to be effective.



than six park project sites. They may ask, without limitation, for additional acreage for small roadside parks and rest sites of not more than 10 acres each.

Not only has the Public Lands Law been liberalized—it has been strengthened. The new law requires that lands conveyed will be used in perpetuity for park and recreational purposes. Previously, the law required only that the States use the land for this purpose for at least 25 years.

The wise fisherman, we are told, never finds himself short on fuel for his outboard motor. But. fisherman sometimes make the mistake of going to some lake or region that is so out-of-the-way replacement fuel is not readily available.

What can be done in an emergency, when it is not possible to purchase the oil or gasoline rec. ommended by the outboard motor manufacturer?

Outboard engineers say that a well-designed outboard engine should be able to digest regular automotive gasolines and oils without appreciable loss of performance and without danger of mechanical failure. Needless to say, however, a prolonged diet of modern "super additive" automotive gasolines and oils will eventually lead to trouble.

So, be safe, use the prescribed gasolines and oils-except when there is a real emergency.

Home Safety Guarantees:

Alertness alone doesn't guarantee home safety. There are certain specific precautions to take to prevent injuries and these require thoughtful planning. Avoid the danger of dark stairways. This is best done with

light switches put at both top and bottom. Stairs should be covered with slip resistant pads if they're cov-

ered with glossy materials such as enamel paint, linoleum or ceramic tile. Check to make certain no pads are loose.


Helen's Favorite: **Broiled Frosting** (For 9-inch square cake) 3 tablespoons butter 1/2 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed 2 tablespoons cream 1/2 cup chopped walnuts 1 cup miniature marshmallows Cream the butter, add sugar and blend well. Stir in cream, walnuts and marshmallows. Mix lightly; spread on top of baked cake while still in its pan. Broil slowly 5 inches be-low heat for 2 or 3 minutes or until top is bubbly and light brown.
