

City-Road Paving Bond Hearing Friday Morning

A hearing on the proposed \$350,000.00 bond issue to pave approximately 63 blocks of streets in the city of Stratford in addition to Fifth Street north to the city limits, approximately 1.25 miles of road on the north side of Stratford, approximately 1/2 mile of paving from the Gruber Highway to U. S. 287 on the south side of Stratford, and a bout 11 miles of paving from U. S. 54 in Stratford north on the Beaver Road to the Oklahoma line, will be held at the Court-house Friday at 10:00 a. m.

Tom Wakefield, county commissioner of precinct four, and W. O. Bryant, mayor of Stratford, are carrying much of the responsibility in fulfilling the desires of the paving bond petitioners.

According to their statements the proposed paving programs would place a paved street in front or beside the homes of 95% of the people of Stratford.

A map showing the routes of the proposed paving is available in the city hall. Every person interested in the routes of the paving is invited to visit the city hall and become acquainted with the proposed paving program and as to whether or not it will place their home on a paved street before the opening of the hearing at the courthouse.

The public hearing on the proposed bond issue is held for the purpose of allowing qualified resident taxpayers an opportunity to examine the proposed paving program and determine as to whether or not they are securing their share of the benefits from the taxes they will pay for the improvements.

Mayor Bryant said that it was his understanding that the paving on the city streets would consist of a 24-foot width of pavement in the center of the street. Under existing contract prices it would be possible for each individual along the paving route to secure concrete curb and gutter, and an extension of the pavement to the curb and gutter along their property for a cost of \$2.50 a running foot. Paving constructed with the bond issue will lack six feet of reaching the curb and gutter along the property lines.

To the best of the knowledge of all officials involved the proposed paving has been planned to serve as many people as possible within the limitations of existing costs.

The hearing will be held to allow citizens to check the routes and make recommendations which may be feasible if they will better serve the public within the limitations of the proposed \$350,000.00 bond issue.

Customarily, officials do not change the course of the routes of the proposed paving, after the close of the public hearing on the proposed bond issue.

Mayor Bryant said that it had been estimated that taxes on property within the city limits of Stratford would pay approximately one-third of all the costs of any paving constructed with bond issues in precinct four. The proposed paving of city streets is an attempt to supply these taxpayers with some of the direct benefits which will be derived from improved paving programs.

THIS WEEKS LETTER: "I have two questions: 1. What can I do about a very large nose? I've tried every hair style and nothing helps. 2. I just can't speak up in class. Even if I know an answer, I am afraid to say it. Sometimes if I answer, and my voice sounds stupid, everybody starts laughing. Is there any way I could overcome this?"

consult a professional hair stylist. Whatever the cost, it will be worth it in self-satisfaction. You will probably find there are many things you can do to minimize the appearance of your nose. Consult this professional, do what this person recommends, then turn your attention to developing your personality—and forget about your nose as much as possible. **About speaking up:** Certainly the fact that you do not want to speak up in class is based, in part, on your concern over the size of your nose. You don't want to attract attention to yourself.

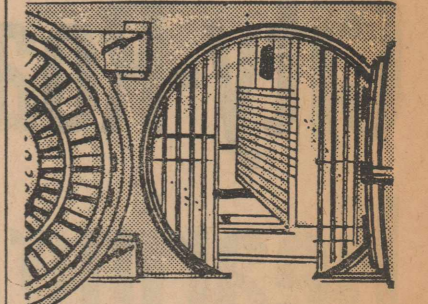
Forget about everything but the subject being discussed in the class. When you have something to contribute, be forceful about it; don't hesitate; don't start to say something, then stop. Make up your mind what you have to say, then say it.

In addition to confidence, there is another important "C"—concentration. A daredevil who walks across Niagara Falls on a tight wire is a study in concentration. He forgets about everything else. If he starts thinking about the crowd that might be watching, or about what he plans to do tomorrow, he will surely get into trouble. If someone taking part in a discussion or a class is thinking more about himself or herself than what is going on, that person will likely not make a satisfactory contribution of any kind.

Confidence and concentration have nothing to do with a person's physical attributes—but the individual who cultivates these two talents is certain to command a fair share of respect and attention.

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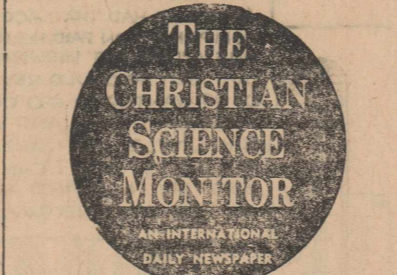

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Dickerson Recognizes Cunningham

Walter E. Dickerson, executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission, has recognized the work of Sam L. Cunningham in his efforts to develop the potential industrial resources of Sherman County. Dickerson stated: "Your endeavors to secure certain types of industries for Stratford and Sherman County are very commendable. It is hoped that we might be of some constructive assistance to you in your efforts.

As a beginning point, in order that we might be of most assistance to you, we will need certain information on your city and section. With this thought in mind, we are enclosing a brochure prepared by this Commission, and would very much appreciate your completing the survey forms contained in it and sending them to this office. Normally, the Chambers of Commerce of the cities and towns undertake this work with the assistance of the local electrical utility companies. Inasmuch as we have not received a brochure from Stratford, perhaps you can give us the assistance we need by contacting these organizations and working with them.

The efforts of the Texas Industrial Commission are being greatly handicapped by having very little money from State appropriations to carry on a very competitive operation. This is best illustrated by the attached sheet which shows this state's annual appropriation of only \$2.49 per thousand population compared with \$281.00 per thousand population for the state of Arkansas. This is a condition which should be, and I feel sure will be, corrected when properly presented to the State Legislature."

Urge Early Filing Of Wool Applications

R. C. Buckles, chairman of the Sherman County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee urges all wool growers who sold wool or lambs during the 1959 marketing year which ended March 31 to file their applications for payment under the national wool program as early in April as possible.

Early filing is highly desirable, Buckles said, because the information on applications is needed for use in computing the average price received by growers. This must be done before May 2.

Applications being filed at this time are to show all sales of wool and unshorn lambs during the period between April 1, 1959, and March 31, 1960. For a sale to be considered completed during that period, title must have passed to the buyer, the wool must have been delivered, and the last of the factors needed to determine the net sales proceeds must be available.

Under the wool program, payments are made to growers as an incentive to increase wool production. The payment rate is the percentage necessary to bring the national average price received by growers up to the incentive level of 62 cents a pound. Under the percentage system, the grower who receives the highest price for his wool also receives the largest payment.

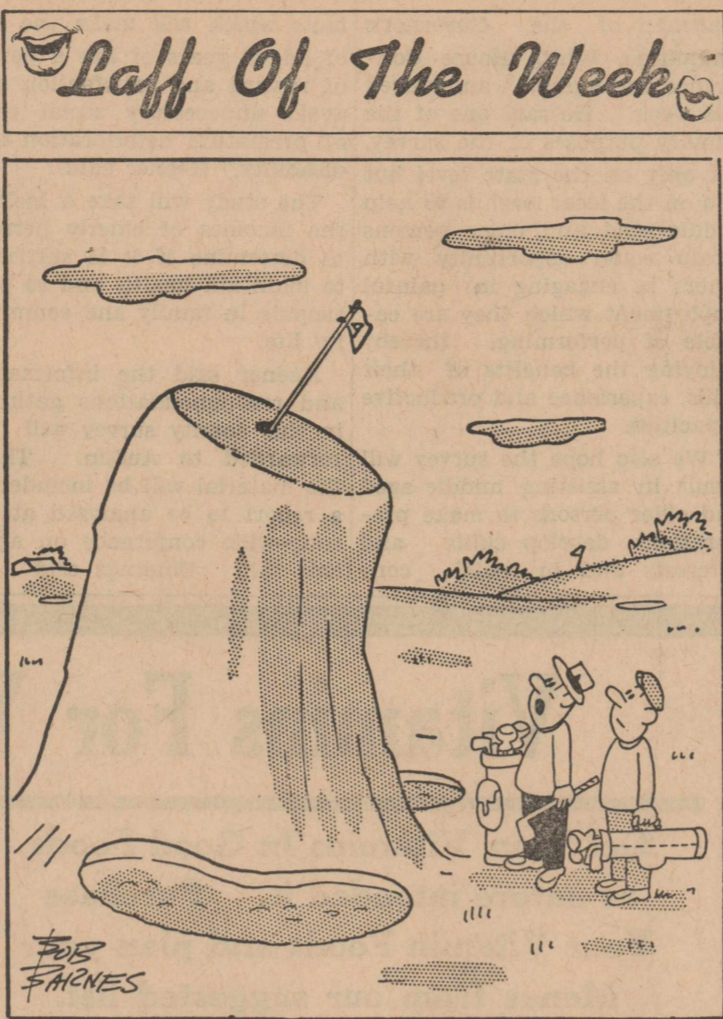

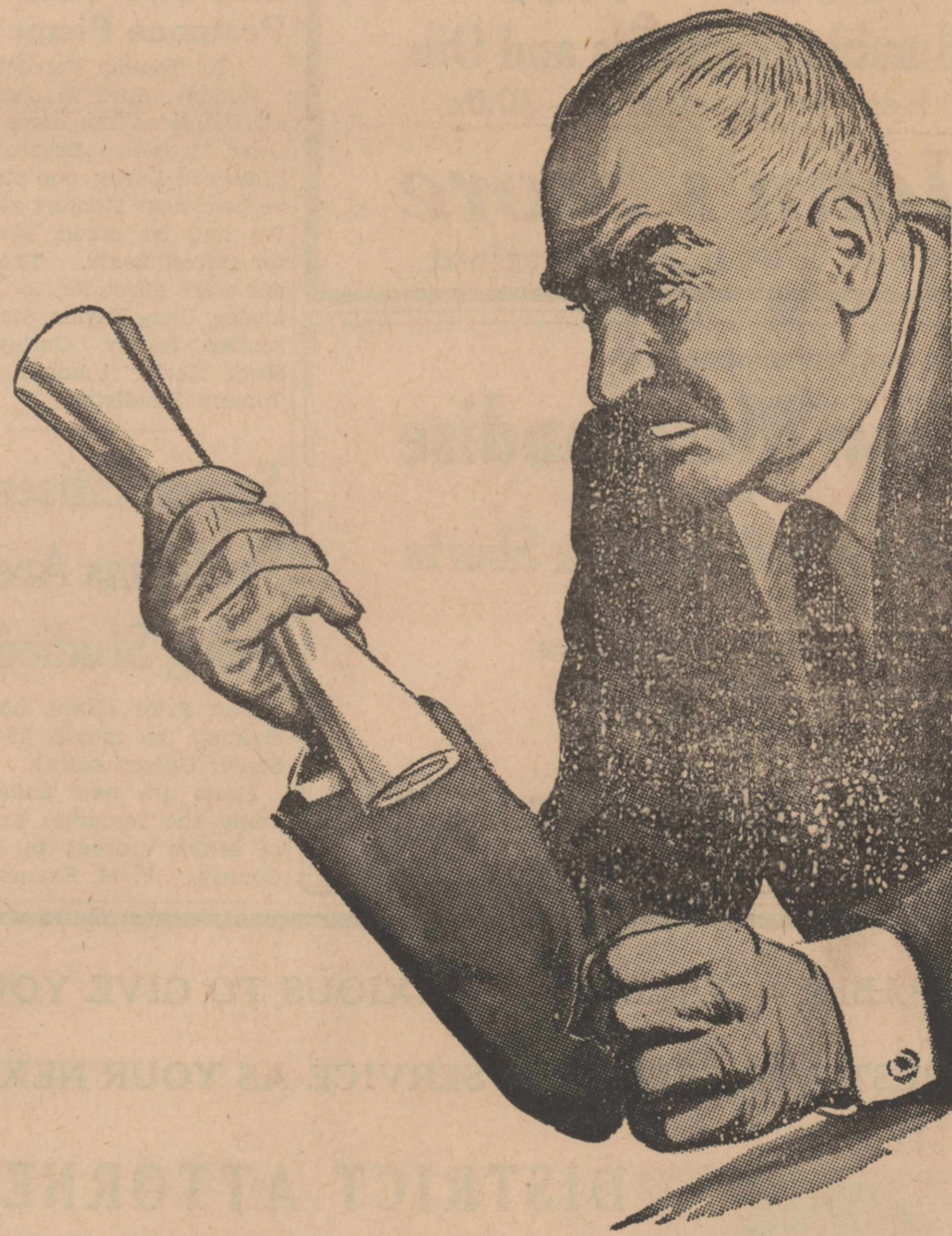

Senior Citizen Problems Are Being Studied

Gov. Price Daniel has proclaimed the month of May as Senior Citizen Month.

Plans are now underway to study the resources and needs of senior citizens in Sherman County. F. M. Keener, county

chairman of the Governor's Committee, White House Conference on Aging, announced this week. He said one of the primary purposes of the survey, not only on the state level but also on the local level, is to help middle-aged and older persons attain equal opportunity with others in engaging in gainful employment which they are capable of performing, thereby enjoying the benefits of their skills, experience and productive capacities.

"We also hope the survey will result in assisting middle-aged and older persons to make preparations, develop skills and interests and in social con-

tacts which will make the gift of added years of life a period of reward and satisfaction and avoid unnecessary social costs of premature deterioration and disability," Keener said.

The study will take a look at the incomes of elderly persons to determine if it is sufficient to maintain health and to participate in family and community life.

Keener said the information and recommendations gathered in this county survey will be forwarded to Austin. There, the material will be included in a report to be analyzed at the state-wide conference on aging this fall. Findings and re-

commendations will then go to Washington for the White House Conference in January of 1961.

The Sherman County Committee working on this assignment includes Dr. Paul E Smith, Duard Lamb and Rev. Raymond T. Dyess. They expect to complete the survey by May 15.

One Texan out of every 13 is 65 years of age or older. The number of aged in the State has doubled every 20 years since the turn of the century.

For some the sunset years are truly golden, the strivings and passions of youth have given way to quiet reflection, enjoyment of the fruits of living,

greater wisdom, increased gentleness and wider tolerance.

But for many, old age is a distressful time of uncertainty and fear, sickness, poverty, want and bitter loneliness. The problems of these aged ones are manifold, both to themselves and to society.

Increasingly, these problems are being recognized and approached by government agencies on the federal, state and local level; by private and public organizations, and by individuals. They are seeking an answer to the question of how to provide a more satisfying and fruitful old age for a greater number of people.
