

Democrats Will Select Nominees In Election Saturday

The polls will be open in all four precincts in Sherman County Saturday from 7:00 a. m. until 7:00 p. m. as affiliates of the Democratic party elect their nominees for many of-fices in the first primary elec-tion.

The county judges race holds the spotlight of interest in the county. F. M. Keener is op-posed by Sam L. Cunningham. Supporters of both candidates have taken an active part in soliciting votes during the cam-paign.

The sheriff's race commands the interest of many voters al-though an aggressive cam-paign has not been waged by the supporters of either can-didate. A. L. (Doc) Wilson and Albert Lee, both ex-perienced peace officers, are seek-ing election to the office.

In the two other county races John Kidwell is unopposed for the office of tax assessor-col-lector and E. E. Coons is unop-posed for the office of county at-torney.

Albert Zimmer and Roscoe Dyess are candidates for the of-fice of county commissioner of precinct 1. Both men have made active campaigns.

Bob Burgess is unopposed for the office of precinct chair-man of precinct one.

Travis Spurlock is unopposed for the office of precinct chair-man in precinct two.

Tunisian Youth Makes Study Of Sherman County

Mohamed Kouki, 20-year old youth of Tunis, Tunisia is a guest of County Agent E. Goule. He is visiting in the county to study the work of the Extension Service in promoting better farm practices in the area where conservation of moisture is ne-cessary for producing crops.

Kouki has a surprising com-mand of the English language for one who has spent only 4 months mastering the English vocabulary. He says his ma-jor problem is the proper usage of prepositions. He speaks Arabic, his native tongue, French and English.

Mohamed Kouki studied En-glish in his native country for a few weeks but did not have an opportunity to speak the lan-guage until he arrived in Wash-ington, D. C. where he received a month's training. He visited at A. & M. College at College Station for two weeks, was a guest in the Charles War-minski home near Panhandle for two weeks, and will remain with County Agent Goule for another week before visiting in California, Arizona, Arkansas and South Texas.

The small north African country of Tunisia covers 48,300 square miles and has a population of 3,232,383. Agri-culture prospers along the Med-iterranean coast line but rains inland are blocked by a moun-tain range. It is necessary for one teaching agriculture in his county to master the cli-matic conditions of dry climates as well as the favored terri-tories.

Kouki has completed three years of college work and must complete six years of university study before he qualifies him-self for his ambition of becom-ing an instructor in the Agri-cultural Center of Tunisia, where he will do work similar to that of a county agent.

Tunisia sent 10 boys to the United States under the ex-change program this year.

Plan Annual City Pet Mass Rabies Inoculations For Saturday

Stratford dogs and cats will be given their annual rabies inoculations in the City Fire Hall Saturday. A veterinarian will be on duty from 10:00 a. m. until noon, and from 1:00 to 4:00 p. m.

The cost of the rabies shots will be \$2.00. This will include a vaccination tag for the pet.

A city ordinance provides for the annual inoculation of all pets kept within the city limits. As rabies is on the increase in Texas this year it is

very important that the owners of all dogs and cats give the children of the city this protection against the possible infiltration of the disease among local pets.

A further precaution taken by city officials is the passage of City Ordinance No. 151 which prohibits dogs from running at large within the city limits. The entire ordinance is published in this issue of the paper and should be read by every person

who plans to keep a dog in Stratford. The ordinance provides for the impounding and disposal of dogs running at large, and empowers the animal warden with the authority to enter upon any unfenced premises on which a dog is at large.

Provisions of the ordinance provide for a maximum penalty of a \$200.00 fine for violation of the law, and for redemption of dogs which have been impounded and sold to other people.

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



City Ordinance No. 151

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING DOGS from running at large on public or private property; providing for vaccination of dogs; providing for the wearing of collars with tags attached; providing for impounding of dogs; providing for notice of impounding of vaccinated dogs;

providing for release of dogs: upon payment of fees; providing for the sale or destruction of dogs not redeemed; providing for redemption for dogs sold; providing for certain records to be kept; providing for various dogs: providing for inspection; providing for unconstitutionality; and providing publication:

Section 1. (Dog) shall for the purposes of this ordinance mean male or female.

Section 2. In the following sections any impounded dog without collar and tag attached showing it to be properly vaccinated will be considered as unvaccinated.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person owning, or having control over or having custody of any dog to permit or allow such dog to run or be at large upon any public highway, street, alley, court, square, park, sidewalk, or any other public grounds or public property or any unfenced lot, tract or parcel of land within the corporate limits of the city of Stratford, Texas.

Section 4. It shall be unlawful for any person to maintain a dog more than six months of age on any premises within the corporate limits of the city of Stratford, Texas, unless such dog wears a collar or harness securely attached to its body to which shall be securely attached a tag issued for said dog by licensed veterinarian, licensed to practice veterinary medicine in the State of Texas, showing that the dog has been, within the current calendar year vaccinated against rabies. The provisions of this section shall not apply to dogs less than six months old.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the animal warden to seize and impound, subject to the provisions of this ordinance, all dogs found running at large upon any public highway, street, alley, court, square, park, sidewalk or any other public property or any unfenced lot, tract or parcel of land within the corporate limits of the city of Stratford, Texas, whether in the immediate presence of the owner or custodian or otherwise, and such animal warden is hereby authorized to enter upon any unfenced lot, tract or parcel of land for the purpose of seizing and impounding any dog running at large thereon.

Section 6. The animal warden, when impounding a dog shall make a complete registry, entering the breed, color and sex of such dog and whether vaccinated and the place and time of taking into custody. If licensed he shall enter the name and address of the owner and the number of the vaccination tag. Vaccinated dogs shall be kept separate from unvaccinated dogs.

Section 7. After the impounding of any vaccinated dog, if not redeemed within (5) five days from the date of impounding, said dog shall be disposed of by sale or destruction. After the impounding of any unvaccinated dog if not redeemed within (5) five days said dog shall be destroyed.

Section 8. The owner of any vaccinated dog impounded may redeem such dog at any time prior to destruction or sale, by the payment of (\$5.00) five dollars impounding fee and (\$1.00) one dollar per day for each day such dog shall have been impounded.

Section 9. The owner of any unvaccinated dog impounded may redeem such dog at any time prior to sale or destruction by having such dog duly vaccinated against rabies, and the payment of (\$5.00) five dollars impounding fee and (\$1.00) one dollar per day board fee for each day dog is impounded.

Section 10. The owner of any dog at the time it is impounded may, within (30) thirty days after such dog is sold, redeem the same from such purchaser by paying to him the amount of the purchase price paid by him to the animal warden, and in addition thereto the vaccination charges, if any were incurred and in addition thereto, a charge of (\$1.00) one dollar per day for the number of days from the date of sale to the date of redemption. At the end of (30) thirty days from the day the dog is sold, the right to redeem shall expire.

Section 11. The animal warden shall keep such records as required to show in detail the disposition of all animals impounded and the money collected by him and such other records as are required by the City Council. All money collected by said warden shall be delivered as required by city council to the city clerk who will deposit same in the general fund.

Section 12. If any dog within the City of Stratford, Texas, shall bite, scratch or otherwise attack any person, and the person so attacked was not at the time trespassing upon the property of the owner or person having control of such dog, or if it cannot be proved beyond a reasonable doubt that the person so attacked was not at the or teasing such dog, the corporation court of Stratford, Texas, shall have the authority to order and hold a hearing, and if such court shall determine at such hearing that such dog is vicious or dangerous to persons or other animals, the court may order that said dog

be kept muzzled, or that such dog be kept within a sufficient enclosure, or that such dog be delivered to the animal warden and by him destroyed.

Section 13. Any other owner who shall maintain or keep a dog more than six months of age on any premises within the corporate limits of the City of Stratford, Texas, which has not been vaccinated as required by this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined any sum not to exceed (\$200.00) two hundred dollars.

Section 14. Any person who shall refuse to deliver any (unvaccinated dog to the animal warden upon demand for impounding, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined any sum not to exceed (\$200.00) two hundred dollars.

Section 15. Any owner, keeper or custodian of a dog who shall allow such dog to run (at large) as such term is herein defined, whether on public or private property, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in any sum not to exceed (\$200.00) two hundred dollars.

Section 16. The animal warden shall have the right at any reasonable time to inspect any dog to determine if such dog is vaccinated as required by this ordinance and shall have the authority to enter any premises for such purpose, and it shall be unlawful for any person to refuse entrance to such animal warden or to impede, obstruct or exclude such animal warden when attempting to enter such premises for the purpose of inspecting such dog and any person who shall refuse entrance or impede or obstruct such animal warden shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in any sum not to exceed (\$200.00) two hundred dollars.

Section 17. If any section, sub-section, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of this ordinance.

Section 18. This ordinance shall become effective when and if it passes third reading by the City Council of Stratford, Texas.
