Mrs. Foster Laid To Rest Thursday

Funeral services for Mrs. Agnes Augusta Foster were conducted at the First Methodist Church in Stratford this afternoon (Thursday). She died at 6:05 Tuesday evening in Coon Memorial Hospital in Dalhart.

Mrs. Foster suffered a heart attack at her home in Stratford about 8:00 o'clock Tuesday morning and was taken to the hospital. She would have been 82 years of age on June 21.

A native of Georgia, Mrs. Foster came to Texas when she was a young girl. She and her late husband, C. R. Foster moved to Sherman County in 1901. They were engaged in farming, real estate, and founded the county's first commercial dairy. Mr. Foster died in 1941.

Mrs. Foster took an active part in social, civic and business life even in her retiring years. She was an active member of the Methodist Church and mastered many of the new art crafts after she was over 75 years of age. Recently she completed painting a piece of china for each of her children and grandchildren.

Surviving are four sons, John Preston of El Paso, Sheldon of Lubbock, Newton of Dalhart, and Arthur of Lubbock; two sisters, Mrs. Clarence Dietrich of Colorado Springs and Miss Ineva Headrick of Amarillo; two brothers, C. N. Headrick of Amarillo, Jim of Clarendon, 11 grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Cunningham Will Retire June 1st

Sam L. Cunningham, a veteran of 46 years of railroad life, will retire from his duties as agent for the Santa Fe Railroad in Stratford on June 1.

Cunningham started his career with the Cotton Belt as a night telegraph operator at Rison, Arkansas on July 12, 1912. He later worked for the Missouri Pacific, the Frisco, and Rock Island Railroads in various capacities. In 1932 he took a breather during the depression years and served as county welfare director of his home county in Arkansas. He served in the Arkansas Legislature from 1937 to 1940, and according to the Arkansas hand book for the session of 1937, he was credited with passing more legislation than any new member of the house.

December 7, 1941 Cunningham started to work for the Santa Fe Railroad and has been employed by the railroad since that time.

Sam L. Cunningham was born September 22, 1893 in Malvern, Arkansas and was married in that city to Miss Ola Brooks. Mr. and Mrs. Cunningham have three children, Major Elmo E. Cunningham of Rome, Italy, Mrs. Cloyce K. Box of Dallas and Mrs. Gordon B. Fedric of Castroville, California.

The retiring rail veteran is a member of the First Methodist Church of Stratford, the American Legion and the Order of Railroad Telegraphers.

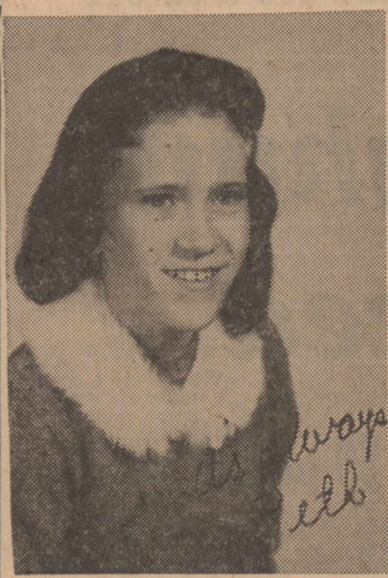

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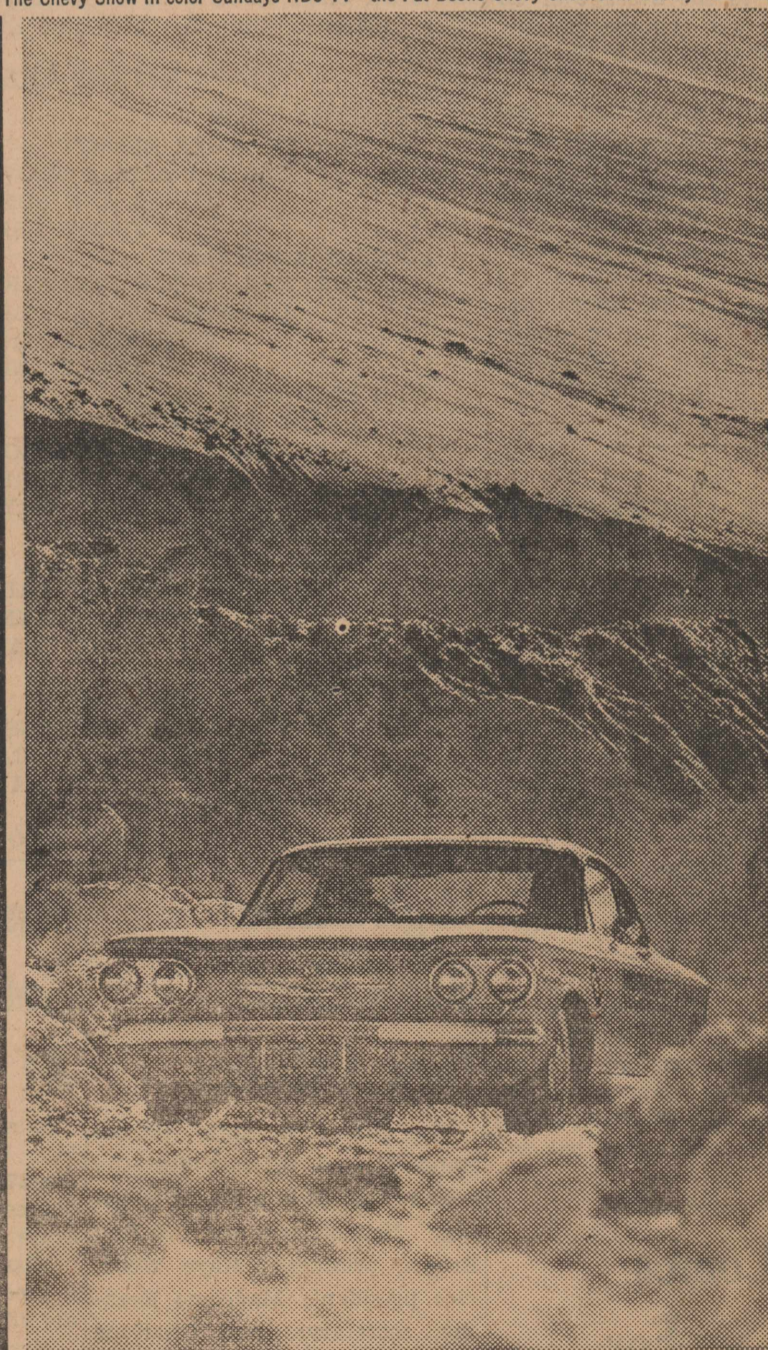

Acreage Limited On Conservation Reserve Farms

Farmers who have placed part of their cropland in the Conservation Reserve have an important crop acreage limitation to consider before completing their planting this spring, according to R. C. Buckles, chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. That limitation is the acreage of Soil Bank base crops that may be planted on the farm. In general, the Soil Bank base crops include the grains, row crops and oilseed crops.

When part of the cropland on a farm is placed under a conservation reserve contract there is a permitted Soil Bank base acreage established for the farm. The permitted acreage that becomes the maximum acreage for Soil Bank base crops that may be grown under the contract. On farms where all the cropland has been placed in the program, the permitted acreage of crops for harvest is zero.

In addition to the limitation of acreage devoted to crop production, the contract also provides that the cropland retired into the conservation reserve must not be grazed nor a crop harvested from it, nor can noncropland be brought into crop use.

R. J. Noblitt Tells Story Of Boys Ranch

Ray J. Noblitt, retired Clarendon business man, was the principal speaker at the meeting of the Stratford Lions Club Monday night.

Noblitt told the story of the work which is being done at Boys' Ranch to make useful citizens of delinquent and homeless boys.

Bickering and quarrels between parents often results in an indignant youth, the speaker said. Boys' Ranch was established to rescue these boys from the gates of reformatories and penitentiaries. They are taught discipline and useful trades, and given the opportunities of an education. In the educational program, there is one thing that is not forgotten, and that is a complete spiritual training. A full time chaplain is at the head of this training.

There are 261 boys at the ranch at the present time. Half of these boys are from the better group and half are from the bottom of the barrel, Noblitt said.

The dormitories which are the homes for the boys, each house 36 youngsters, with a man and his wife in charge. The Ranch never hires a man and woman as managers of a dormitory unless they have one or more children of their own.

Most of the boys in each dorm have hardly ever throughout their lifetime known the care and love of a mother. The dorm mother becomes a real mother to them because she treats them, cares for them, with the same love and affection she does her own children, Noblitt said.
