Heavy rains Sunday night which have been followed by intermittent steady showers have poured an estimated 1.5 to 2.5 inches of moisture into fields and pastures over most of the territory.

The rain will be beneficial to growing row crops and may induce several farmers to plant sorghum for a forage crop. Roughage feed is likely to be in with a neighborhood post nup- tivity Week, July 11 to 17. All demand this fall as dry weather depleted most of the reserve hay supply during the spring and summer.

Most all wheat stubble land had been plowed. The moisture will be advantageous for summer fallowing and encourage the early sprouting of volunteer wheat in sufficient time for it to be killed out before the drilling season.

Where good fields of ripened grain were wiped out by hail storms, it is questionable as to whether all of the volunteer can be killed out in time for planting this fall, but owners of such fields will have a much better chance than they would have had with seasons of marginal rainfall.

Most of the slow steady rain fell while the territory was under the influence of a high pressure system of 30.5.

Temperatures which were rising to over 100 in the summer heat wave have fallen into the 50's with the cool rainy sea-

Guatemala is an Indian land, for only about 10% of the inhabitant are white. Women make pottery, weave bright blankets and embroider their cotton blouses in colorful patterns. Each tribe and village has its own distinctive design so that an Indian girl's dress always indicates where she was born. For dress occasions, the men wear cotton suits and in addition, a small apron of plaid material. On their heads they wear bright kerchiefs or small folded blanket squares. Altogether, the countryside of Guatemala is as picturesque and beautiful as one could wish. The area of the country is 42.042 square miles and the


